### Nationally Famed Musical Group to Play Lions Club Dance

Tucker and his 14-piece band, plus featured vocalists Berg, Carl Erc, George Body Guards, and an outdoor floor show featuring the Ronnie Meier dance team, gained national fame by enacting in top theatres and homes throughout the nation in radio and recording. The band has played such leading engagements as the House in Chicago, the Waldorf in New York, the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, the Elmore in New York, the Hills Country Club in Paramount Theatres in Los Angeles and Los Angeles, and an hotel ballrooms in Indianapolis, Cleveland, Milwaukee, Chicago, Boston and other cities. The rampaging Braves will be favored in the clash although the winless Lions may prove to be a surprise. Confronted with Iraan's vaunted attack and lopsided victory last week-end, the Lions refuse to concede anything except that it will be a very tough game. The upstart Lions will be seeking revenge for the 42-6 mauling administered them last year by the Braves.

The Ozona team weathered the Alpine game with few injuries to key men. Still on the doubtful list, however, is star end Raul Machado who is suffering from a severe shoulder sprain. No other serious injuries are reported.

Coaches Jack Harris and Doug MacDonald report that some shifting may be done in the regular line-up as a result of the play in the Alpine game. Well pleased with their split-T attack, they stated the Lions' defensive play would be worked on this week with concerted effort to improve the defensive tackle and end position.

The coaches singled out Kootzie Smith, mammoth Lion tackle, for his superb defensive work in the Alpine struggle. He was definitely the surprise of the game to the Lion mentors.

Proceeding the Ozona - Iraan clash, two Ozona North Elementary School football teams will play a warm-up game. These teams are composed of third and fourth graders. Their game will start at 6:45 p.m.

## West Texas Area Soaked By Heavy Rains Last Week

### Week-End Falls up to 6 Inches Brighten Winter Prospects

Most of the West Texas ranch area, already in fine condition for the most part from summer rains, received another soaking the past week-end with rains ranging from an inch or two to six inches and more.

The fall moisture, which fell slowly over much of the country except in a few spots which received torrential downpours, will insure good winter grazing over the area.

Ozona received a total of more than five inches of moisture in two rains. Thursday night and Friday morning the rainfall here was gauged at 2½ inches and is a steady downpour which lasted all through the night Saturday night and until nearly noon Sunday, a total of more than three inches fell. The western and northwestern area of the county received terrific rains in the Saturday night fall. Ernest Dunlap, west of Ozona, reported five inches of rain in less than two hours. Live Oak creek, in far west Crockett county was out of banks in one of the biggest flows in the stream in years, and Howard Draw, 15 miles west, was on a big rise. Draws through Ozona were running big Sunday morning.

Two 2,000-foot cable tool wildcats and one to 1,500 feet, have been spotted in Crockett county.

T & R Drilling Co. of Artesia, N. M., No. 1 Stanolind-University will be 330 feet from the south and east lines of the north half of section 11-39-U. It will be 20 miles northeast of Ozona.

Seventeen miles southeast of Barnhart, Vickers & Yarbro of Ozona No. 1 University is 330 from the north, 990 feet from the west line of the 338-acre lease in section 19, block 39. Drilling operations on both projects are scheduled to begin at once.

A 1,500-foot cable tool wildcat 15 miles north of Ozona in Crockett county has been scheduled by J. C. Maxwell, Inc., of Fort Worth.

The firm's No. 1-UU2 will be 330 feet from the south and west lines of the northwest quarter of section 14-42-University.

Crockett wildcats, Magnolia No. 1 Addie Clayton was drilling at 310 feet in lime, Texas Pacific No. 1-G University at 7,790 feet in lime and shale. Standard-Fryer No. 1 Mitchell at 1,965 feet in anhydrite and Humble 1-D Cox at 6,610 in hard sand and shale.
