New Structure Provided for by Bond Issue Voted Apr. 8

Members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department worked out details of the proposed new fire station for Ozona in conferences this week and plans are now being prepared by Doyle Maddux. San Angelo architect, for the new building.

Ideas for convenient and utilitarian arrangement of the building were gathered by the groups from visits to towns in the area and these were incorporated in the broad plan adopted after the conferences of the groups this

The new fire station and courthouse office building is to be erected on a lot just south of the county jail, purchased recently by the county from Mrs. W. E. West. It is to be large enough to house four fire trucks and will incorporate living quarters for one paid fireman, assembly room for the department, storage space and a wing to be used for county offices.

Approval by the voters of a \$35,000 bond issue in the recent election will make construction of the station possible. Voters also approved a \$15,000 issue to be used in repairing the present courthouse.


