Judge Moss Making Vigorous Campaign For Congressman

ODESSA, May 4. — Carrying his campaign for Congress directly to the people, District Judge Paul Moss of Odessa today prepared to make his second tour of cities in the 16th Congressional District.

Last week, Judge Moss visited Balmorhea, Toyahvale, Valentine, Fort Davis, Marfa and Alpine.

At each place, he talked with business men, chatted with housewives, and exchanged greetings with passersby.

Next, week, he plans a trip that will carry him to Fort Stockton, Marathon, Sanderson, Sheffield, Iraan and McCamey.

"I want to meet as many people as I possibly can in every city and town in this district," Judge Moss said.

"I want to know them personally. That is the only way any man can know their problems and represent them properly at Washington."

Judge Moss made his trip last week by automobile.

At Balmorhea, he again pledged himself to support a broadened soil conservation program, and to follow "A middle of the road policy in government."

"We cannot turn back from the atomic age to the horse and buggy days of government," he told a

group of listeners.

"We must meet scientific and industrial progress with a program of sound government in keeping with the times."

"I don't think an extreme liberal philosophy is the safest course. But I am equally opposed to following the path of reaction and Republicanism."

At Valentine, he appeared before approximately 50 Southern Pacific workers who were leaving a safety meeting in the railroad yards.

There he repeated his stand in favor of a program of government-

al progress, and pledged himself to support adequate national defense.

While visiting in Marfa with friends, he promised to "work with full vigor" to balance the national budget.

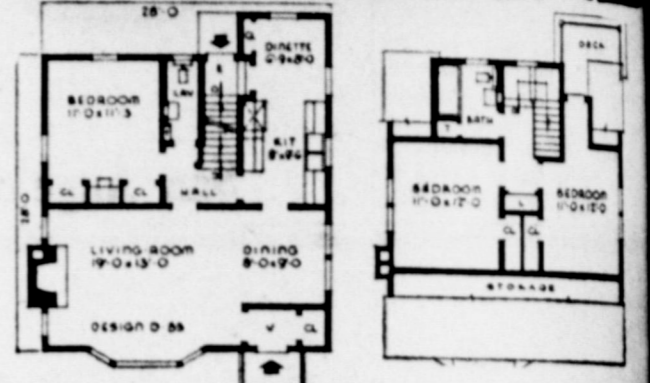
Cattle Lead in Texas Farm Income Producer in March

AUSTIN. — Farm cash income in Texas totaled \$51 million in March, a 24-per-cent increase above February's total and a 6-per-cent drop from March 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business reported.

Farmers in the Northern High Plains district turned in the largest dollar income in March—\$11,522,000. Black and Grand Prairies with \$5,914,000, and Southern Texas Prairies with \$5,433,000, ranked second and third.
Cattle was the greatest source of income in March, bringing in

\$18,852,000. Milk production mounted to \$9,475,000, and brought a total of \$20,000,000. There were notable increases over February in market mohair, wool, cattle, calves, sheep and lambs, while decreases in corn fruits and tables.

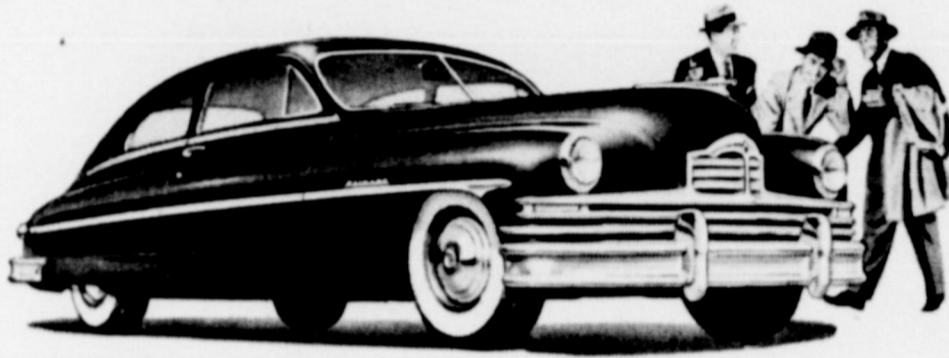

Two wildcats for Crockett county — one scheduled to explore into the Ellenburger, the other shallow — were reported Wednesday.

The deep venture will be Standard-Fryer Drilling Co. of Dallas and associates No. 1 P. L. Mitchell in northwestern Crockett, 5 miles northeast of the Yates field. It will be 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 43, block HH, GC&SF Ry. Co. survey.

The drilling deal was worked out by Travis B. Dean and A. R. McElreath of Fort Worth, who turned it to Standard-Fryer, keeping an override and an interest in some of the leases in a spread of several hundred acres around the location.

H. E. Chiles, Jr., of Midland will drill the shallow test, No. 2 Mrs. Clara Couch, 330 feet from the south and east lines of the northeast quarter of section 15, block ST, GC&SF Ry. Co. survey. The operation, about seven miles west of Ozona is projected to 1,300 feet with cable tools.

Highway 290 and west of State Highway 163, an area embracing almost half the county, but with the smallest qualified voting population, from the Soil Conservation District standpoint. This area has 10 landowner-operators, while Area No. 2 has 12, and areas 3, 4 and 5 have 16 each.

Subdivision No. 2, which will be represented by Ralph Jones under Board appointment, embraces the northwest area of the county east of Highway 163 and from the Irion county line south to take in a

small section of country south of Highway 290 to the north line of Section 23, Block F, extending approximately 10 miles south of Ozona, and thence east to the Sutton county line.

Subdivision No. 3 in the southeast corner of the county, bounded on the north by the Division No. 2 line and including all land lying east of Ozona-Comstock (Divide Route) road of Johnson Draw

Subdivision No. 4, to be represented by T. A. Kincaid, Jr., under appointment of the State Board, is the center section of the south area of the county, including all lands lying west of the Johnson Draw line, south of U. S. Highway 290 and east of the county road following Howard Draw to the Val Verde county line.

Subdivision No. 5 is the southwest corner of the county, including all lands lying west of the county road following Howard Draw and south of Highway 290.
