Agent Here To Aid Ranchers To Renew Bracero Contracts

A representative of the Texas Employment Commission of San Angelo, Texas, will be at the county courthouse here on Wednesday, April 12, at 1:00 p.m., and Thursday, April 13th until 3:30 p.m. to take applications for renewal of contracts for foreign workers that are employed by ranchers of Crockett County and surrounding territory, according to L. W. Keilers, manager of San Angelo TEC. It is urged by Mr. Keilers that ranchers whose contracts expire during the latter part of April and during May and the first part of June, contact this representative at that time. This will save ranchers and farmers a trip to San Angelo for the purpose of renewing their applications for contracts.

It is necessary that each rancher know the expiration date of his contract with the Mexican Nationals that he has employed, as this information is necessary to renew these contracts.

Uncover Remains Of Pre-Historic Elephant

DENTON — Remains of a pre-historic elephant, believed buried by a glacier 20,000 years ago, are being uncovered by North Texas State College geography students near Denton.

Students working under direction of Dr. Walter Hansen of the geography department have already uncovered a five-foot tusk and a large pelvic bone.

The bones were first discovered by workmen digging in a gravel pit southeast of Denton.

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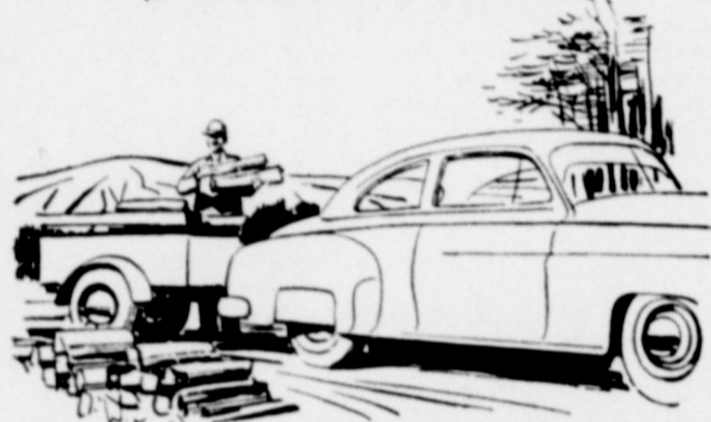
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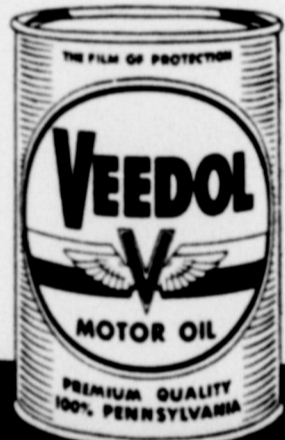
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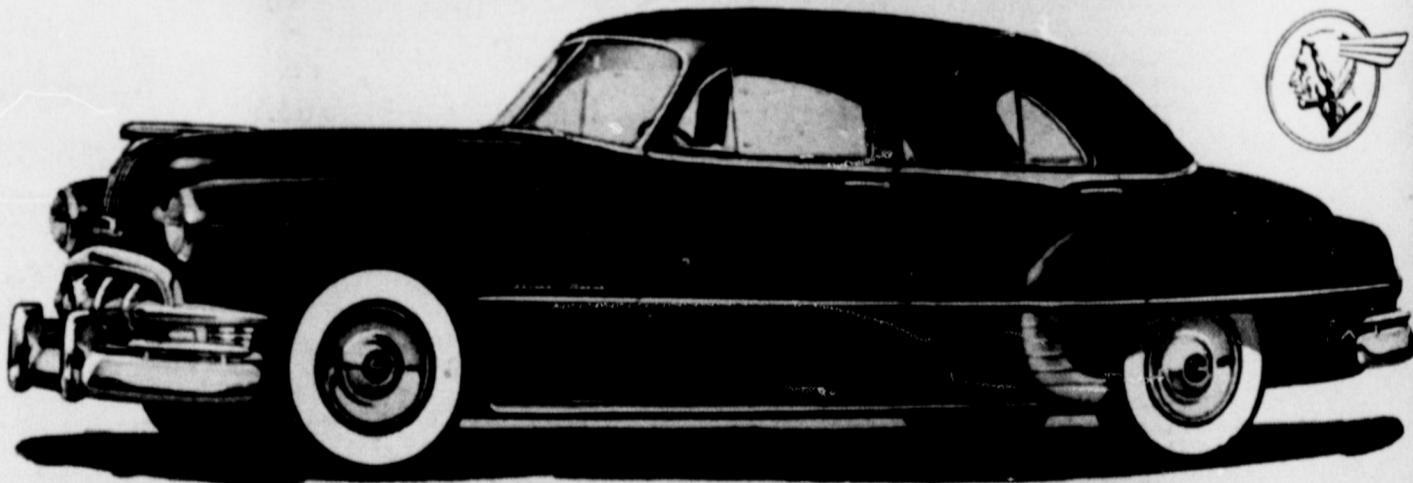
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Kerrville Man Nominated For State Representative

J. Antoine, Retired Dealer, Seeks 86th District Post

The Ozona Stockman is authorized to announce the candidacy of J. Antoine of Kerrville for election to the office of State Representative of the 86th District.

Antoine (pronounced Antoinette) is a retired real estate broker, 36 years old, married and the father of two grown children. He was born in Alabama and lived in Houston 20 years before moving to Kerrville four years ago. As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the two propositions, respectively.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the General Election Laws of this State, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, Vernon's Annotated Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, Revision of 1925, as amended, and none but resident property-taxpaying qualified voters of said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote at said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper of general circulation published in Crockett County, Texas, on the same day in each of two successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election, and in addition thereto, a copy of this order shall be posted in each of the election precincts for said election and also at the County Courthouse at least fifteen days prior to the date of said election.

The County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notice to be published and posted as hereinabove directed and further orders are reserved until

the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officials and received by this Court.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted AYE: Charlie Black, Jr., and E. R. Kinsler, and the following members voted NO: _____

Entomologist Urges Fight On Hornfly

COLLEGE STATION — A tiny fly, grayish to black in color and about 3/8 of an inch long about this time of the year, or a little later, begins to rob the livestock producer of pounds of beef and dollars that could be profits. This small bloodsucker, according to James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A&M College, is the hornfly.

It is seen principally on the head, neck and shoulders of cattle, often in great numbers, and if permitted to multiply, they may cover 50 per cent of an animal's body, says Deer. The hornfly has a very short life-cycle—10 to 14 days. This factor, points out Deer, makes it possible for very heavy infestations to build up in the spring before the producer notices

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their presence. Control measures should be used early to check the multiplication in the first generation. The first spraying is very important and may reduce the total number of sprayings needed during the summer. Animals should be given the first treatment when the fly population reaches an average of about 25 flies per animal.

Deer says that there are two insecticides which will give very effective control against the hornfly. DDT has been successfully used for several years and a 5

per cent spray or dip will give excellent results. Toxaphene is the other recommended only for use as a spray. Deer adds that toxaphene has given equal or superior results when compared to DDT for hornfly control.

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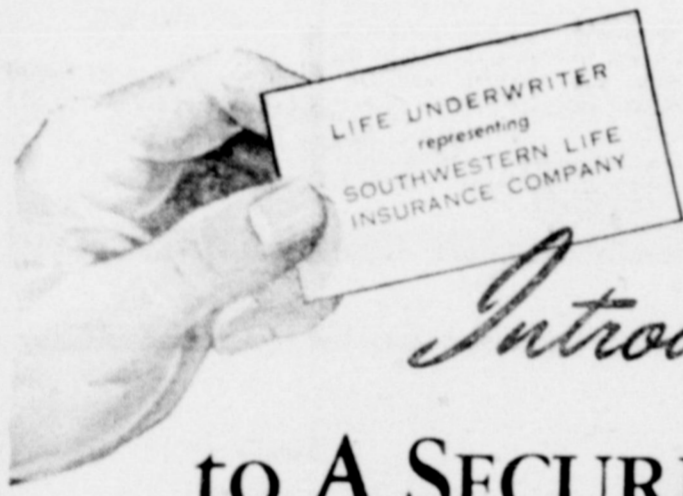
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
