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## Rebels To Seek Concho League Title This Year

### Lighter Prospects For Building Team; Manager Sought

The Rebels will be back in the Concho Basin League this season, if and when the league is organized. It was the decision reached at a preliminary conference of baseball fans and players last night at the Wilson Motor Hotel that the Rebels last year played in the Trans Pecos League, composed of Ozona, Iraan, Lake, and Goodfellow Field. Fans were all out for the hearty competition of the Concho Basin League. Rumors are already afloat in the Concho Basin organization meeting may be held in the near future. If so, a representative of the Rebels will be on hand to seek a place for the local team in the line-up. And Pat Taylor, Rebel backer, agreed to write the team for the \$50 fee required by the Baseball Association. A decision was reached at the meeting on the selection of a team for the coming season. Byron Stuart, who has led the load for many years, has asked to be relieved of his managerial duties this year. Available material is being gathered to find a successor. Playing material, the Rebels counted noses and came up with a promising list from which it is believed a good team can be developed. The list includes catcher, pitcher and capped hitting most any spot on the team; Mac McClanahan, second and third sacker; Eddie Reiter, third baseman; Beecher, second and third baseman; Alan Gann, second base and pitcher; Vic Montgomery, outfielder; Bill Clegg, outfielder; Joe Huffstodler, second base and pitcher; Carlton Smith, catcher; James, pitcher; Red Harris, pitcher, first sacker and pitcher; Bill Hannah, outfielder; and Coaches Jack Harris and MacDonald, and possibly others whose names did not come in discussion of possibilities. There have been heard of other recruits for various positions among crewmen stationed in the fields of the county and as workouts are called, a list will be issued for every baseball fan to show up for practice and a chance at a place on the team.

## Plans For Crockett County Horse Show To Be Shaped At Meet

Plans for a Crockett County Horse Show, to be held sometime in April, are to be made at a meeting of interested breeders to be held in the office of County Agent Sam A. Bergfeld at 5:00 p.m. Monday afternoon. General horse breeders in the county have expressed an interest in holding a show, the county agent said, and he has arranged the meeting as a means of finding out whether or not there is enough interest to make a successful show. The group decides on the dates, which will be set and judges selected. Whether or not to open the show to breeders in surrounding counties also will be decided at the meeting. All breeders are invited to attend the meeting. The San Angelo Horse Show is scheduled for April 29th and 30th. A local show is to be staged, and probably will be selected preceding the San Angelo event.

## U. S. Approves REA Line For Crockett County

Notice of approval of a new REA line for Crockett County has been received from Washington, by Don McCormick of Eldorado, manager of the Eldorado REA cooperative, according to notification received yesterday by local ranchmen who will receive service from the new line. Washington approval of the project, which has been in process of organization for many months, will mean that steps can be taken immediately toward building the line. Surveys are expected to start within the next ten days to two weeks, Mr. McCormick reported, and after the survey is completed, the co-op will be ready to ask for bids on building the line. Actual construction of the line is expected to be under way by June, Mr. McCormick estimated.

## High School Band In All-Day Clinic Under Famed Director

Members of the Ozona High School band will be engaged all day in a special clinic being conducted by Milburn E. Carey, director of bands, acting director, School of Fine Arts, and professor of music at Phillips University in Enid, Oklahoma. The clinic is being held to prepare the Ozona band for the regional band contests in which it will participate at Midland, on April 1st. Mr. Carey is one of the best known clinicians in the Southwest and John Armstrong, director of the local band, is expecting his charges to realize considerable benefit from the one-day intense study and practice under the visiting musician. Mr. Carey holds three degrees in music from the University of Illinois and has done graduate work at Northwestern University. He has studied under some of the nation's leading directors and musicians and has acted as director and guest conductor in as many as twelve different states.

## Crockett 4-H Club Boys Win Places In San Angelo Show

Crockett County 4-H Club members won \$19 in prize money by placing four lambs and a steer at the San Angelo Fat Stock Show last week. The San Angelo show was one of the strongest lamb shows ever held there, with over 900 fat lambs entered. Frankie Jones placed third and fifth with his two registered Rambouillet ram lambs, winning a total of \$6 in prize money on the two. The third place lamb was bred by Dempster Jones and the fifth place lamb by Jeff Owens. Graham Childress placed 12th with his lightweight Rambouillet fat lamb, winning \$5 in prize money. Tom Robison placed 14th in the lightweight crossbred class, winning \$2 in prize money. Ben Conklin placed 15th with his lightweight Hereford steer, winning \$6.25 in prize money. This steer was bred by Dr. Harris of Fort Worth and was brought back to the local 4-H Club barns to be fed further for showing at the State Fair in Dallas next fall.

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## Honest Thieves Return Loot From School Burglary

### Class Fund Returned With Interest; Supt. Papers Mailed

Just why a burglar would break into a safe, loot it of money and valuable papers and then return all of the loot to the owners was the puzzler which had local officers scratching their heads here this week. Remorse over their deed or just plain fear of apprehension, officers believe, prompted burglars who broke into the safe in the superintendent's office in the Ozona High School building last Wednesday night to return by mail a small amount of money and a packet of personal papers belonging to Supt. Jack McIntosh. The intruders, who evidently had a key to the superintendent's office, entered through the door and opened the school's vault by removing the hinges to an inner door, the outer door being left unlocked. An envelope, containing \$6.45, belonging to the Journalism class of the high school was taken by the burglars. This money was later returned with interest. The school received by mail an envelope containing seven one dollar bills and a note saying, "Here's your money. We made a mistake. Sorry." The note was hand printed and mailed locally in a plain envelope. A personal strong box, which Mr. McIntosh kept in the vault, and which contained bonds, insurance policies and other valuable personal papers was taken by the raiders. Monday the papers contained in the box were returned, again by mail. The papers were made into a package and mailed at Sonora, addressed in hand-printing to "Mr. McIntosh, Ozona, Texas." The strong box itself, is still missing. So far as school officials have been able to determine, the envelope containing the Journalism class money and the superintendent's personal box were all that was taken from the school—and all returned. Sheriff V. O. Earnest and his staff have been investigating the burglary and at the middle of this week, believed they were hot on the heels of the intruder.

The foreman and queen will reign over the week-long festivities, which will be culminated by the annual TCU Rodeo, March 16, 17 and 18. Sue and Robertson, who were outfitted with complete western regalia by a Fort Worth firm, led a group of TCU students in welcoming to Fort Worth a contingent of movie stars who made a personal appearance in connection with the premier showing of the movie, "Kid From Texas." Later the two students were breakfast guests of the movie stars, including Ann Blyth, Dorothy Hart, Audie Murphy, Scott Brady, Leslye Banning and Ray Turner.

The meeting will continue through next Sunday and the pastor and congregation invite the entire community to participate in the services.

## Only 200 License Plates Issued Here; Must Be On By April 1

Only about 200 new license plates have been issued to date, Mrs. Perry reported. The new plates must be on all cars not later than April 1st, and Mrs. Perry asks that local motorists secure their new plates as soon as possible to avoid a last-of-the-month congestion in the office.

## Soil Conservation District Election To Be Held Friday

### All Co. Landowners Urged To Cast Ballot At Courthouse

Tomorrow, Friday, is the day when land owners of Crockett County will decide at the polls whether or not a Soil Conservation District is to be created, embracing all lands lying within the county's boundaries. An election on the question has been called by the State Soil Conservation board in response to a unanimous expression in favor of holding the election made at a recent public hearing conducted by the State Board. Eligible to vote in tomorrow's election are, "all natural persons who hold title to farm or ranch lands lying within the district, who have attained the age of 21 years, and reside within the county." A two-thirds majority of those voting is necessary for approval of the issue. Backers of the project have mailed notices to resident land owners of the county in an effort to get as full an expression of the people as possible, and all eligible voters are urged to cast their ballots. The courthouse in Ozona will be the only voting place in the county. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Ralph Jones will act as election judge and W. E. Friend, Jr., clerk. T. A. Kincaid, Jr., was named polling superintendent. Approval by the land owners of the creation of a soil conservation district in the county will open the way for ranchers in this county to participate in the land saving and range building practices sponsored by the Soil Conservation Service and to receive technical advice and help in carrying out such practices. If the issue is favored here, steps toward final organization of the district will be taken by the State Conservation Board. This will consist of the appointment of two district supervisors upon the recommendation of land owners themselves. These first appointments by the State Board will be the only time state or federal agencies will have any part in the organization or operation of the district. These appointments are made in order to give the district legal standing so that application can be made to the secretary of state for a certificate of organization. When this step is completed, the organization is a legal unit of local government and another election will be ordered for the purpose of electing three more district supervisors from as many sub-districts, these five men to compose the governing board of the district. After organization is completed, a program and plan of work will be drawn up for the district, a comprehensive study of conditions and needs made by the ranch operators themselves and from this plan, the district will operate toward improvement of range lands, with the initiative remaining with the land owner himself in all instances. Where land owners within an operating district desire the services of conservation specialists in analyzing soil, classifying range grasses, engineering to control erosion or other improvement practices, such services will be supplied without cost through the Soil Conservation District, the United States Soil Conservation Service supplying technicians who are available at the call of districts. The organization is entirely democratic and subject to dictation from no federal or state agency.

## Water Directors Elect Officers At Organization Meet

Tom Harris was elected president of the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 board of directors, when the board met last week for reorganization following the January election of new directors. Mr. Harris and Joe North were returned to membership on the board and W. E. Friend, Jr., was named a new member as a result of the recent election. Mr. Friend filled the place previously held by Lee Wilson, now a resident of Harlingen. Sherman Taylor was named vice president of the board and R. A. Harrell secretary-treasurer. The water district is just completing a program of expansion which has resulted in the laying of approximately 2,000 additional feet of 8-inch mains, 300 feet of 12-inch and around 12,000 feet of 6-inch mains. Included in this project was a new 6 and 4-inch line connecting from the city system to the cemetery to make an ample supply of water available at last for the burial plot. Still on the district improvement agenda is a second storage tank to be erected on the hill near the present storage tank.

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## Crockett Sheriff Faces \$5,000 Suit In Federal Court

### Steve Welsh Plaintiff In Damage Action As Result Of Arrest

Suit for \$5,000 damages has been filed in federal district court at San Angelo against Sheriff V. O. Earnest of Crockett County and his bonding company. Plaintiff in the suit is Steve Welsh, painter and paperhanger, a former Ozona resident now living in Hobbs, New Mexico. Welsh seeks damages as the result of injuries he allegedly suffered when he was arrested by local officers on August 22, 1949. The petition alleges that Welsh was in a drunken stupor in his car when the sheriff jerked him from the car, struck him with a black-jack and knocked him down in the street. Later, the petition continues, the officer kicked him, put him in jail where he was left on the floor for many hours without any medical attention. The plaintiff further claims that he has become partially disabled in his work and suffers from a dislocated jaw as a result of the incident. W. A. Johnson, Sedberry and Williams are attorneys for the plaintiff. The suit is styled Steve Welsh vs the American Surety Co. of New York. Courthouse records show that Welsh and Drennan Slaughter were arrested by the sheriff's department on August 22, 1949, and held for grand jury investigation on a felony charge. The grand jury failed to return an indictment against them, however, and they were released. The arrest of the pair followed a call to the sheriff's office for assistance to quiet a disturbance at Alex's Place, a Latin-American cafe near the Community Center. Sheriff Earnest and Deputy Hearst Laws answered the call and were told that the pair had made a disturbance in the place. They were held on a charge of assaulting a minor, Johnny Ramirez, sent by the cafe manager to telephone the sheriff with an automobile. Sheriff Earnest reported that Welsh resisted arrest and was struck by Deputy Laws after he had made an attack on the deputy with his fists. He was taken to the county jail where a physician examined him, and when he was found to have suffered injuries, he was taken to his home. The officers deny the suit's charge that Welsh was "kicked and stomped" by the arresting officers.

### "MILLIONAIRES' TOWN" An Editorial

Some people in Ozona are giving this editor a lot of credit—unintentionally and through ignorance, of course.

All in connection with the much discussed article about Ozona in the Saturday Evening Post.

We say credit instead of blame because these drug store conversationalists are airing their alleged displeasure at publication of the article by giving this editor a "ride" over his presumed part in such publication. When you stop to think of it, it would be a pretty long step from editing a weekly newspaper in a small West Texas town to having a hand, even a very small hand, in editing the Saturday Evening Post way off in Philadelphia. And we must confess that we can boast no such exalted connections.

In the absence of a Chamber of Commerce and as a matter of professional courtesy, this editor did do what he could to assist the Saturday Evening Post representatives in the assembling of material for the article. But this assistance took the form of helping these men to make the contacts they asked, introducing them to the men and women whom we thought could give the information they sought, and directing them to historical

material already published.

We were asked, too, also as a matter of professional courtesy, to read the article in advance of publication—for the sole purpose of checking names, spelling and places.

The facts, anecdotes and stories were assembled and written into a readable story by one of the nation's finest writers—you have to be good to make the Saturday Evening Post. And this editor, even if he had been invited, would have been presumptuous indeed to undertake to edit a story that had already been approved by the Post editors.

It was a sufficient accomplishment to our mind for Ozona to make the featured spot in the Saturday Evening Post, even if the article did pan the population just a bit. On the other hand, it gave the people, the land and its resources a lot of credit for a tremendous step forward in its nearly sixty years of organized history. And every Ozonian should be proud, as we are, to be a citizen of a town which gained worldwide attention for such truly American virtues as tolerance, sympathy, generosity and real democracy, not to mention industry, thrift and just plain hard work.

The article was not intended as a dry recital of historical facts. Had it been, it would never have been accorded space in the Post. Some levity, some exaggeration, and some fact were all mixed to make an extremely readable story, which was the author's intent and the Saturday Evening Post's demand.

Two short wave broadcasting stations will soon be in operation in Ozona.

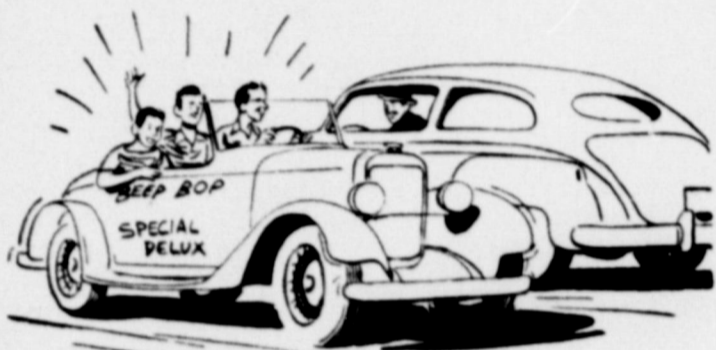

Another aerial is also in place on the hill, that for the West Texas Utilities Company. The Utilities Company shortwave system is maintained over the far properties of the company. Quick communication in emergency electric service to more than 100 West Texas communities is provided by the company.

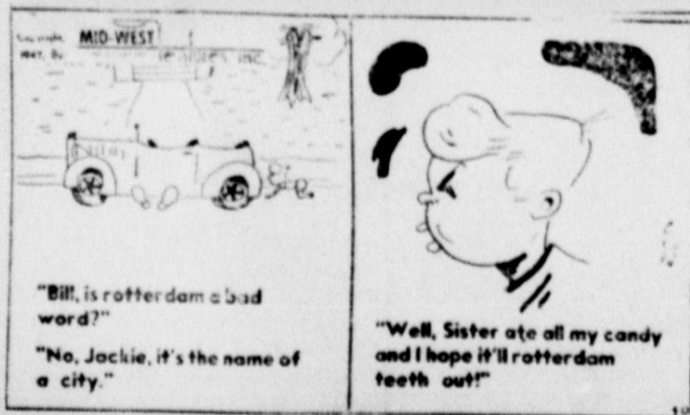

**Livestock Shipments Up 20 Pct. In January**

AUSTIN — Livestock shipments in Texas rose 20 per cent from December to 4,226 carloads in January, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Shipments of calves dropped 25 per cent in January from December. On the other hand, December-to-January shipments of cattle

rose 30 per cent; hogs, 29 per cent; and sheep, 26 per cent.

In comparison with January of 1949, livestock shipments stepped up 6 per cent in January, 1950. During the yearly period shipments of hogs were up 14 per cent; cattle, 13 per cent; and sheep, 3 per cent. Shipments of calves fell 29 per cent in January as compared with January a year ago.

**January Farm Income in Texas Shows Rise Of 40 Pct. Since 1940**

AUSTIN— Farm cash income in Texas totaled \$84,441,000 in January 1950, a 40 per cent rise from January 1940, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Cash receipts of Texas farmers was 49 per cent less in January than in the previous month, as a result of reduced marketings of cotton, rice, grain, sorghum, wool, poultry, eggs and calves. Cotton bringing \$27,666,000 was the greatest source of farm income in January. Cattle marketed during the month brought \$14,835,000, and sales of milk products

amounted to \$9,924,000. Marketings of cotton, wheat, rice, cattle, sheep, wool, hogs and fruits and vegetables were substantially above their earlier levels, while other products were lower in January 1950.

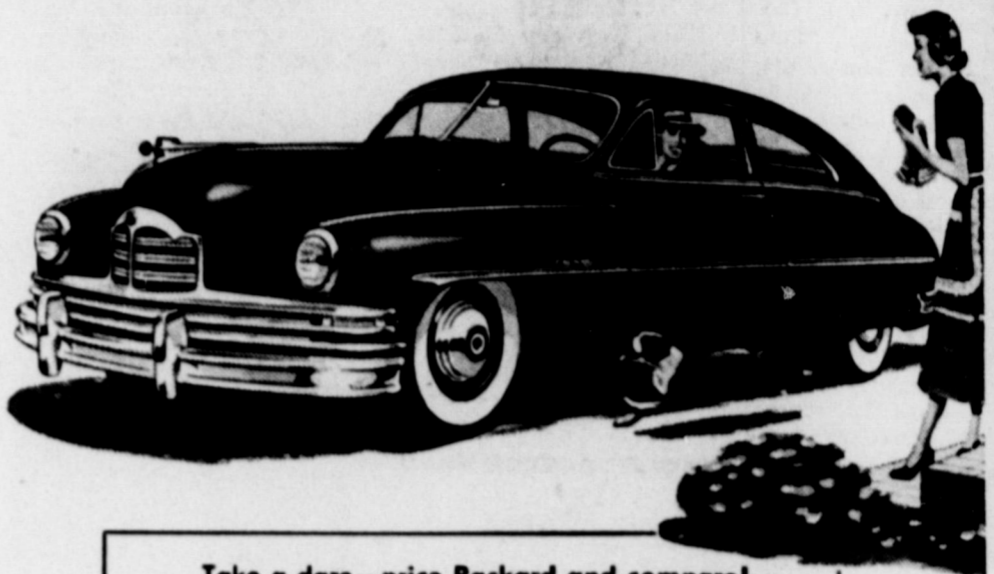
