## Members Of Soil Conservation District Elected

### Supervisors Name Officers; Meet June 8 Plan Program

Step in organization of the County Soil Conservation District which embraces all lands within the boundaries of this county taken at a meeting in the courthouse Tuesday afternoon when the remaining three members of the district Board of Supervisors were elected and the organization of the district was completed. The board of supervisors will meet June 8 for the first meeting for transaction of business. At that meeting, the board will name committees and plan of work for the district, a prerequisite to acquisition of the district to accomplish of soil conservation objectives.

The purpose of giving legal status to the district while in the process of formation, two supervisors named by the State Board of Supervisors following the creation of the district, two directors, Ralph Jones, sub-division No. 2 and T. A. D. Jr., from sub-division 4, and L. B. Cox, Jr., from sub-division No. 5.

A. Kincaid, Jr., was elected chairman of the first board. R. D. Gos, field representative of the State Soil Conservation Service was present at the meeting and assisted in the organization of the district. The district will share in the state apportionment of funds.

Completion of organization of Crockett County Soil Conservation District makes the district eligible to share in the state apportionment of funds.

## Construction Work Begins on New Water Storage Tank Here

Construction of a new 200,000 gallon water storage tank on water works hill has been started. The work is being done with local labor under the supervision of Jack Brewer. Total cost is estimated at \$12,000.

The new storage tank will supplement the present 200,000 gallon tank which was built as a part of the modernization program the district undertook in 1941 after acquiring the water works property. The additional storage will assure the community continued uninterrupted water service and will meet requirements of the state Fire Insurance Commission for maximum insurance key rate credit.

Construction of the storage tank is the last in the expansion program of the district authorized by the voters when they approved a \$150,000 bond issue in 1948. Proceeds from the issue have been used by the district board of directors to expand the water and sewer lines to take care of the needs of the growing community. It is estimated that nearly \$30,000 of the authorized \$150,000 issue will remain unexpended after completion of the tank and the extension of water and sewer lines which have already been made.

## Sheriff's Posse Barbecue Supper Tuesday Night

### Charter Membership To Be Completed At Meeting

Every made citizen of Crockett county eligible for membership in the Crockett County Sheriff's Posse is invited to attend a free barbecue supper to be staged in the city park at 7 o'clock next Tuesday evening. The invitation stands whether or not you contemplate membership in the posse.

Bill Bergfeld, chairman of the arrangements committee for the barbecue and meeting has announced that an entertaining program will be arranged for the group to precede the business meeting of the posse. Other members of the arrangement committee are Miller Robison, Posse president, J. P. Pogue, Gene Williams and Cleophas Cooke.

Charter membership in the posse will remain open until the Tuesday night barbecue and business meeting. ## Rev. Troy Hickman To Be New Pastor Methodist Church

### Former San Marcos Pastor Replaces King In Local Pulpit

Rev. Troy Hickman, for the past five years pastor of the First Methodist Church in San Marcos, and one of the top ministers of the Southwest Conference, has been assigned as pastor of the Ozona Methodist Church for the coming year.

The appointment of Rev. Hickman to the local pastorate was announced at the close of the 62nd annual Southwest Texas Conference in San Antonio Sunday night. Rev. Hickman will succeed the Rev. Horace M. King, who as pastor here the past three years, led the congregation in the construction of its beautiful new church plant. Rev. and Mrs. King accepted positions in Inter Board Council work of the Conference and will be stationed in Kerrville. Rev. King as secretary of the Inter Board Council, will direct teacher training programs in the various churches of the Conference and Mrs. King will do laboratory work in children's religious education.

Rev. Hickman and his family are expected to arrive in Ozona Friday and plans are being made by the congregation to welcome them to the town and church. The Woman's Society of Christian Service will sponsor an open house in the church social hall next Sunday evening following church services to welcome the new pastor and his family. All members and friends of the church are cordially invited to attend.

Rev. Hickman served for six years as pastor of the First Methodist Church in Uvalde before going to San Marcos. He was invited unanimously by the San Marcos congregation to return to that post another year.

"I have been hearing about the Ozona church and am anxious to go there," the new pastor told Ted M. White, delegate from the local church to the annual conference. The Hickmans have four children, a daughter 19, one 16 and two boys one 14 and the other 9 years old.

## Magnolia Gasser Renews Prospect Of Gas For Ozona

### Hobbs Man Advises Of Plans to Seek Franchise from County

Completion of the Magnolia No. 1 Clayton ranch wildcat as a producer of gas and distillate has renewed prospects for Ozona to have a natural gas distribution system.

The gas well, located about 10 miles east of Ozona, has been gauged up to more than 13,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily in recent tests by the operators. The gas is "sweet" — free of poisonous sulphur gases — according to tests and is believed of sufficient volume and pressure to insure long continued production.

County Judge Houston Smith received an inquiry by long distance telephone early this week from a man in Hobbs, N. M., who indicated that he and associates were interested in securing a franchise to bring natural gas to the city. The man inquired if the Commissioners Court would grant such a franchise if the operators could show sufficient capital and begin immediate operations. If arrangements can be made for purchase of the gas from Magnolia, the caller promised to meet with the court at a future date.

Efforts were made by a group of operators recently to secure a supply of gas from Todd field to supply the city, but multiple interests in operation of the field stymied negotiations for purchase of the gas according to information furnished local officials.

## Judy Ingham, 3, Injured In Freak Ranch Accident

### Stepped on by Horse, Child Escapes Serious Injury

Providence and a gentle horse were credited with saving the life of Judy Ingham, 3-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Jr., in a freak accident at the Ingham ranch in western Crockett county on the Pecos river Tuesday morning.

A horse, which had just been saddled by an older sister, Alma, 10, stepped in the child's stomach when she fell under his feet from a corral gate from which perch she had been watching her sister saddle the horse.

The child's right arm at about the elbow was badly bruised and it was thought that the horse's hoof also struck the arm which possibly took most of the weight.

Alma reported that the horse lifted his foot when he felt it strike the child, thus shifting his weight and saving the child from possible fatal crushing under the hoof. The horse held his foot up off the child's body until her older sister pulled her from the danger spot.

The injured child was rushed to the Ozona hospital where x-ray pictures showed no broken bones and she was being kept in the hospital for further examination. Bruises on her stomach indicated that the horse's hoof landed squarely in her stomach but it is believed that the horse's action in shifting his weight prevented the child from suffering internal injuries.

Judy is a granddaughter of Mrs. B. B. Ingham of Ozona and Mr. and Mrs. Theo Johnson of McCamey.

## Magnolia Clayton Gas, Distillate Well Completed

### Four Producing Sections Treated and Well Cleaned

After four production horizons had been perforated and acidized, Magnolia Clayton No. 1, wildcat 10 miles east of Ozona, was operated to clean out over the week-end.

The gas and distillate producer made gas up to more than 13,000,000 cubic feet daily with distillate production at the rate of approximately 6 barrels an hour.

Location is 1,329 feet from the south, 1980 feet from the west line of section 12-GH-GC&SF.

Spartan and Hamm No. 1 Montgomery on the Hunt ranch was drilling at 2,692 in sandy lime after recovering 12 feet of drilling mud on a one-hour drillstem test from 9,527 to 9,567 feet at mid-week. Humble No. 1-C Cox was making hole at 6,846 feet in shale and lime.

## 12-County Rural Telephone Coop Launched in W. T.

### Crockett Cooperators To Be Signed Here At Meet June 12

Initial steps having been taken at a meeting of representatives of the several counties in San Angelo Monday to form a 12-county rural telephone cooperative in this West Texas area, organization of Crockett county users is to be completed at a meeting set for next Thursday afternoon, June 8, in the courthouse in Ozona.

Carroll Land, representative of the Concho Valley R. E. A., and Chester Kenley of San Angelo, named chairman of the proposed West Texas Telephone Cooperative, will attend the local meeting to help explain the cooperative proposal and to assist in signing up prospective users of the new telephone service.

Application for a \$500,000 federal loan was filed Feb. 10 in Washington and action is expected to be taken on the loan application as soon as details of installation, number of users, etc., is made available to the government. The loan is to be repaid in 35 years at 2 per cent interest.

Counties included in the proposed West Texas Telephone Cooperative area are Coke, Coleman, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Menard, Reagan, Runnels, Schleicher, Sutton, Sterling and Tom Green.

Miller Robison, Ira Carson and County Agent Bill Bergfeld, attended the meeting held in San Angelo Monday afternoon to hear details of the organization plan and these three were appointed a committee to represent Crockett county on a central committee to coordinate efforts toward acquisition to be spread over the 12-county area. This central committee, with two or more representatives from each county as members, will meet again in San Angelo at the Hotel Cactus on June 19 when it is hoped the 12-county committee will have completed applications from each of the county committees.

It is the plan of the organization to have all applications from subscribers in hand in time to make application for federal funds before July 1, 1950, the end of the present government fiscal year, so that the money will become available this year.

A membership fee of \$5 will be required from each subscriber to be paid with the application. The maximum investment for each subscriber will not exceed \$50, including complete installation of telephone and service.

A completely new and modern two-line system will be installed and all lines and equipment will be maintained by the cooperative. A fair monthly rate for service will be charged subscribers in addition to the initial investment. At this time the monthly rate is expected to be approximately \$3.50.

The initial fee is required of subscribers because only a 90 per cent loan can be secured from the government for telephone cooperatives because of the lack of "equity incentive" as in the case of REA users who must invest in wiring, household appliances, etc. It is estimated that a \$50,000 payment must be subscribed to assure success of the West Texas cooperative.

The rural lines are to be connected with existing private exchanges as selected by subscribers, and all of the usual local and long distance service will be available. Subscribers will pay their monthly service bills to the cooperative and the coops will arrange for the exchange service and maintain all equipment.

**THE MOST COMPETITIVE PEOPLE ON EARTH**

In a modern industrial society either competition or bureaucracy must act as the governor of the economic machinery. So far the governor in this country has been competition and will continue to be as long as the people choose to live under the capitalistic system.

This is the opinion of Raymond Rodgers, professor of Banking, New York University, who says:

"As the chain of production lengthens, and there is less and less opportunity for us to retreat to the self-sufficient world of the pioneer, competition (or, God forbid, bureaucracy!) becomes our only protection. Fortunately, the most valuable feature of capitalism — the one feature which no other system offers is competition. In fact, competition is such a dominant element of capitalism as we know it, that it should more properly be called competitive capitalism. You have only to look at the newspapers, read the magazines, listen to the radio, or submit yourself to some of the 'horror' of television, to realize that Americans are the most competitive people on earth!"

If this country were the land of the big monopolies as claimed most vociferously by the admirers of bureaucracy there would be no need for the endless stream of publicity and advertising by big and little business of all kinds. Monopolies don't need to advertise to keep themselves in business any more than dictators have to "stump their countries for reelection. By the same token the advertising which keeps the wheels of competitive capitalism turning is also the financial bulwark of a free press.

**TWO GREAT DANGERS**

Senator Robinson of Virginia recently said that American constitutional liberty is being threatened by big government and big labor. As examples he cited an unbalanced social security system, a system of Federal aid to education which would lead to Federal control over public schools, and proposals for compulsory health insurance which would bring socialized medicine.

Then he spoke of the constant efforts to invade the rights of the individual to obtain special privileges for certain groups. As an instance of this, he pointed to the exemption from antimonopoly laws given to the labor groups. Finally, he observed that he has introduced a bill in the Senate to end this exemption which would not interfere with labor's legitimate collective bargaining rights — but would prevent unreasonable of labor's monopoly powers to strain trade or commerce. There are differences of opinion as to just what kind of effective measures should be enacted to control the labor movement. But it should be clear to all that decisive action must be taken soon if the interests of the honest labor, and the national security are to be protected.

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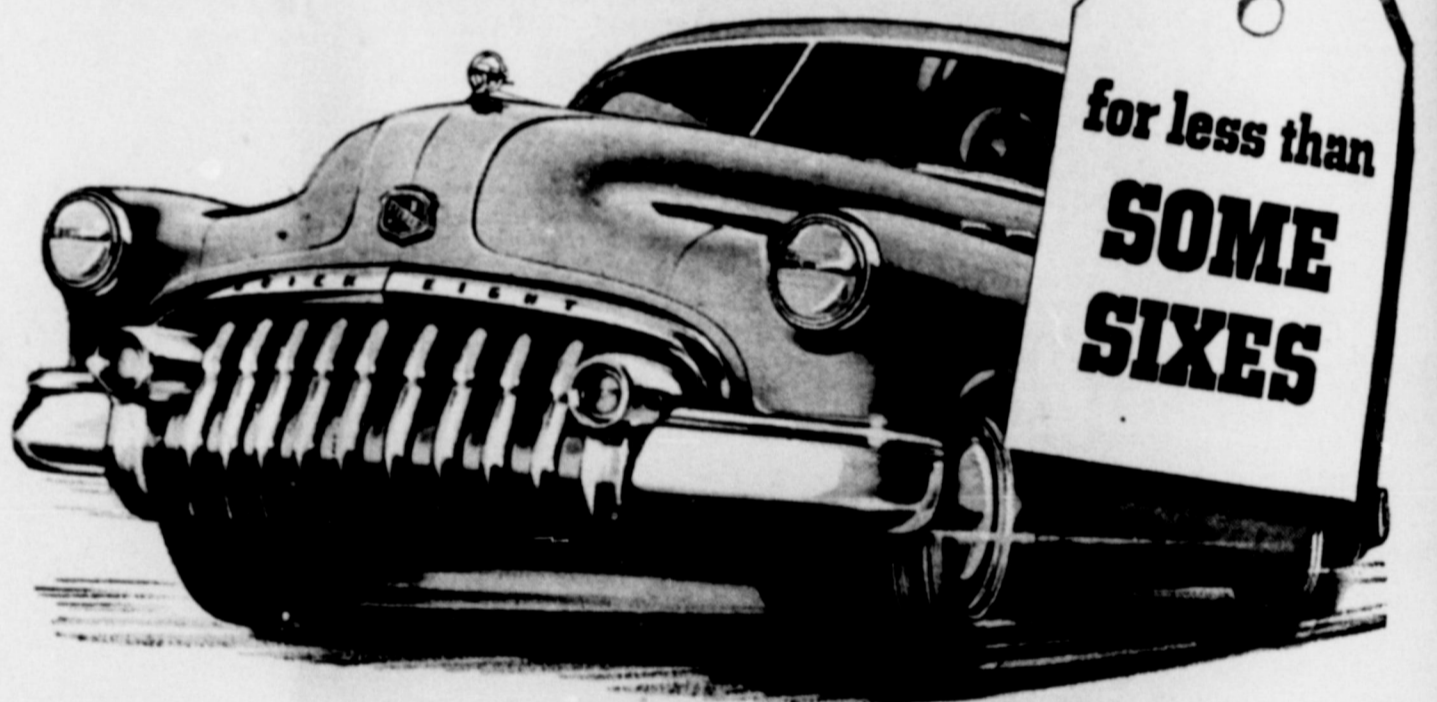

He attended Texas A. & M. Col-

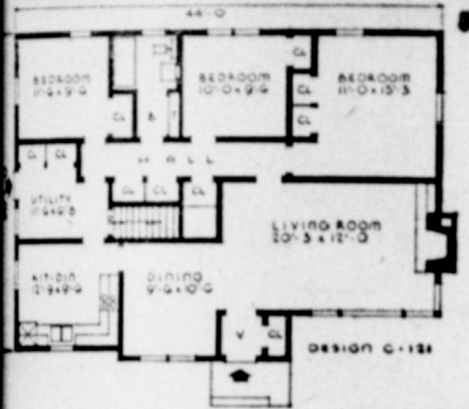
lege and was graduated from the University of Missouri's School of Journalism.

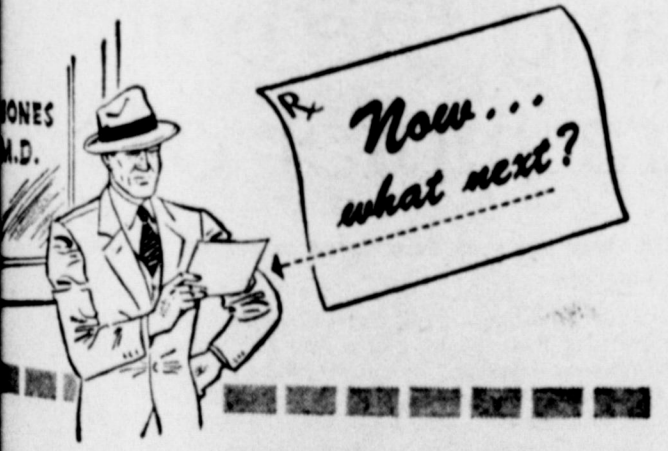
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**A Man Who Gets Things Done..**

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**Not Necessary for Children to Have Whooping Cough**

AUSTIN. — How many people do you know that still cling to the old-fashioned idea that the sooner children catch the so-called diseases of childhood, the better off they'll be.

Take whooping cough, for example. Isn't it ridiculous for children to have to suffer with it when it may be prevented by simple vaccination?

Whooping cough goes by the scientific name of pertussis. Regardless of what you call it, it still means a violent, painful wracking coughing that takes the breath and tears at the chest and throat walls.

Pertussis is prevalent among children everywhere. About 15 out of every 100 cases are in children under two. North America, from time to time, seems to have more than its fair share of cases.

Sometimes it's fatal, especially

to very small children. About 85 out of every 100 whooping cough deaths are among two-year-olds and less. And, strangely enough most deaths are among girls. In 1949 Texas had 46 whooping cough deaths. So far in 1950, an average of 323 cases have been reported every week.

Whooping cough is spread by droplet infection — that is by breathing air contaminated by a sneeze or cough of an infected person. You can get it from using personal things of an infected person, too. It is communicable from about 7 days after exposure until three weeks after the coughing starts.

The important thing about the disease is that vaccination may protect against it. It's the only thing that will. If an unvaccinated child gets whooping cough, he will thereafter have what is called a "definite and prolonged immunity." But the fact of the matter is that second attacks have been known to occur.

Vaccination of all preschool children is the answer to control. "Booster" shots may be advisable within a year after the initial vaccination.

Thirty million acres, if you are not up to snuff on acres, is a parcel of ground that would hide Connecticut, Delaware, Maryland, Mass., New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont — and a little left over. And with the Planners in their feverish befuddlement over too much wheat and corn for too many

acres, what happens. Well, out there "where rolls the Oregon" our President tells how the Govt. kilowatts to pour from the Grand Coulee dam will turn motors hooked up to giant pumps for irrigating, will reclaim thousands and thousands more acres for more abundant crops.

And now, sisters and brothers, if you are not yet befuddled, you

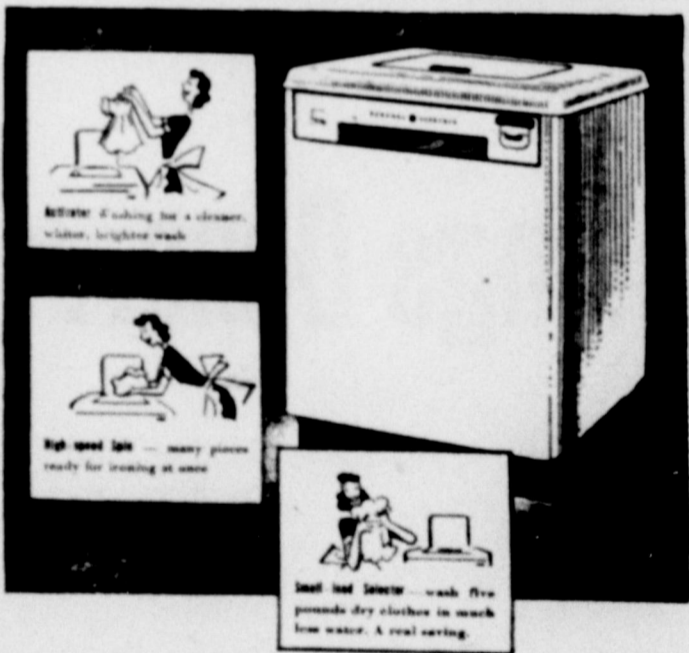

appropriation of \$5 million to be distributed over a two-year period among the organized districts of the state. The money is to be administered by the district supervisors and is to be used for the benefit of the entire district in such projects as purchase of machinery, seeds, fertilizers, etc., for use of and resale of cooperators within the district.

One of the biggest jobs facing the newly organized district is the completion of its program and plan of work. This task includes the writing of a complete history of the district, its development, its problems and needs and a summary of objectives to be accomplished by the district toward restoring the land's original productivity. Preparation of this program and plan of work will be named by the board of supervisors. As soon as this treatise is completed, the district will be in position to start functioning in cooperative endeavors for the betterment of farming and ranching in the county.

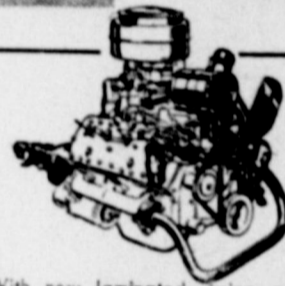

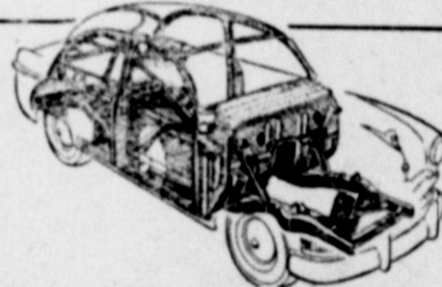

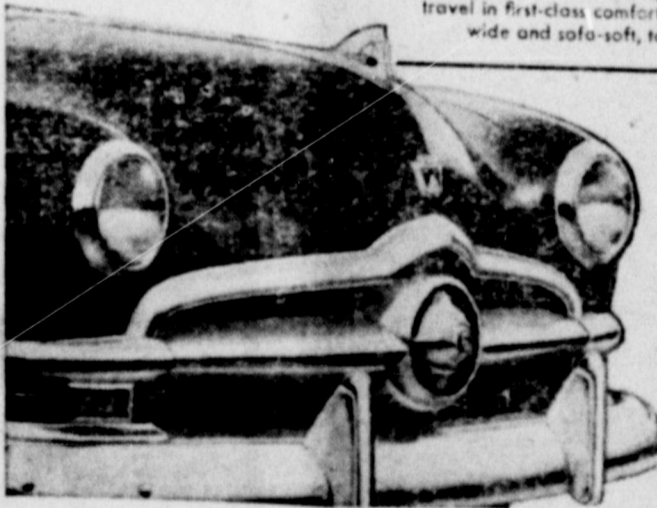
