The newly elected Adult Advisory Committee will be responsible for organizing the fourth Annual Livestock Show which will be held in January and also for the activities of club members during the year of 1951. All club members are urged to attend the meeting to elect the adult committee and to participate in the discussion of plans for club activities for the coming year.

Ranchers Urged to Ready Sprayers for Grass Fire Calls

Crockett county has been fortunate in escaping the outbreak of serious grass fires, but the stage is all set for a disaster and extreme caution is urged on everybody to prevent such a disaster. Bill Cooper, chief of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, this week issued a reminder to ranchmen to check up on their livestock spraying machines and keep them in readiness for quick action in case of fire on their own places or neighbors'. Of course, the sprayers can not be kept filled with water in winter, but the motors should be checked and gas tanks filled and a plan for quick filling devised in advance.

Mr. Cooper also urged that each ranchman check with his nearest neighbors to find which have sprayers so that everybody would know which neighbors to call in case of fire. Prompt and effective fighting of grass fires when they are small will save the loss of big areas of grass and the livestock sprayers are an effective weapon for combating blazes and often can reach the scene much quicker than the town fire fighting equipment.

Tippett Field Gets Test; Three New Wells In Vaughan, Shannon

Champlin Refining Co. of Enid, Okla. has filed application for permit to drill a 6,000-foot rotary test in the Tippett field in Crockett county, 12 miles east of McCamey.

The company's No. 1 Tippett well is 1,172 feet from the south, 440 feet from the east line of section 26-36-H&TC survey.

R. B. McGowan No. 3 Archie Bean, test in the Vaughan field in section 8-UV-GC&SF, was completed on the pump in 24 hours for 125 barrels of 27.4 gravity, pipeline oil. Production was from open hole between 1,370 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and 1,385 feet, the total depth, which was acidized with 4,000 gallons.

In the Vaughan pool in section 85-OP-GC&SF, Malco No. 63 Isabel Vaughan finished for a 24-hour flow of 94.12 barrels of 28 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 468.1. The flow was through an 8-16-inch tubing choke and open hole between 1,401 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1,435 feet, the total depth. The section was acidized with 4,000 gallons.

Continental No. 2 J. M. Shannon in the Shannon (San Andres) field was completed on the pump in 24 hours for 133.03 barrels of 28 gravity oil plus 2-10 per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was 509.1. Production was from open hole between 2,373 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and 2,407 feet, the total depth. Location is in section 2-Q-EL&RR.

Murphy H. Baxter No. 1 E. H. Hunt, wildcat nine miles southwest of Ozona, has been plugged and abandoned at 3,537 feet in sandy lime. The failure was 1,980 feet from the south, 660 feet from the west line of section 2-1-GC&SF.

Drillstem testing the Ellenburger from 8,799 to 8,839 feet was under way in Magnolia No. 1 Addie Clayton, wildcat 11 miles northeast of Ozona.

Three producers have been gained in the Vaughan (San Andres) field in Crockett county.

Stricklin Drilling Co. No. 7 McClatchey - Gauvey finished on the pump in 24 hours between 1,442 and 1,459 feet, the total depth, which was acidized with 3,000 gallons. The well is 1,650 feet from the south, 2,310 feet from the west line of section 7-UV-GC&SF.

H. L. Hunt No. 9 M. A. Shannon estate pumped 120.33 barrels 28 gravity oil in 24 hours. Production was from open hole between 1,392 and 1,410 feet, the total depth, which was acidized with 2,000 gallons. Location is 990 feet from the south, 2,310 feet from the west line of Mrs. Oglesby survey 2, abstract 5,101.

Pumping 86 barrels of 28 gravity oil in 24 hours, The Pure Oil Co. No. 2 R. L. Vaughan was completed from open hole between 1,299 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and 1,435 feet, the total depth. The section was acidized with 6,000 gallons. With ground elevation 2,599 feet, No. 2 Vaughan is 990 feet from the north, 330 feet from the most westerly line of section 61-OP-GC&SF.

120 Blood Tests Made First Three Days Of Campaign

Citizens Urged to Cooperate in 'Walking Blood Bank' Plan

Late Wednesday afternoon, three days after start of the drive to create a walking blood bank in Ozona, Mrs. Valentine Melvin, medical technician and manager of the Ozona Hospital, reported a total of 120 individuals had volunteered for the blood typing tests.

The blood bank, being sponsored by the Ozona Rotary Club, began Monday morning, after the necessary materials had been assembled by the hospital for testing the entire population of Ozona and Crockett county. The testing is carried on each week-day, Monday through Friday from 8:30 to 5 at the hospital laboratory.

The schools are cooperating in the undertaking by giving classes time off at different intervals for the tests and the teachers, too, are reporting for the typing.

Mrs. Melvin asks that Ozonans volunteer for the tests as soon as possible. She hopes to complete the blood bank by the end of next week.

Ozona citizens are urged to take a few minutes of time off from work or household duties to visit the hospital and give a small sample of blood for the tests. Each individual reporting will be typed and a permanent record of the test kept on file in the hospital. For the individual's own protection, in case of accident while away from home, each will be given a small card which may be carried in billfold or purse, giving the person's blood type and Rh factor.

THE PRECARIOUS PROFESSION

The story is told of a demagogue in the French Revolution who once said:

"There go the people, let us hurry and overtake them. I am their leader!"

This is a somewhat ironic but not wholly untrue commentary upon political behavior. As a general rule, the successful politician is one who adopts a course based upon sentiment which has already been built or is clearly building in the public. He then forges to the front as their "leader."

Sometimes, it is true, a political figure miscalculates. If he does this too often, he becomes an ex-political figure. Keeping this this hazard before them like a guiding star, intelligent politicians eagerly seek information on how the public feels.

This is as true in Texas as it is anywhere else. Yet it is probably true that no Texas politician has ever had the benefit of knowing the true sentiments of the majority of the people of our state. Each for his own reason, the majority doesn't express its sentiment one way or the other.

When the Texas Legislature meets in January, various organized groups are going to take advantage of that fact. On issues in which they are interested, they are going to try to convince our legislators that they express the true sentiments of the people of the state.

If nobody but a pressure group bothers to write them, or phone them, or talk to them, nobody else has a right to criticize how the

legislators vote. Most politicians would genuinely welcome an organized "people's lobby" — representative citizens who would tell them in a straightforward manner just what they think about the issues which will come up in the next legislature.

The members of the precarious profession of politics need our help. If they get it, we Texans will get better government.

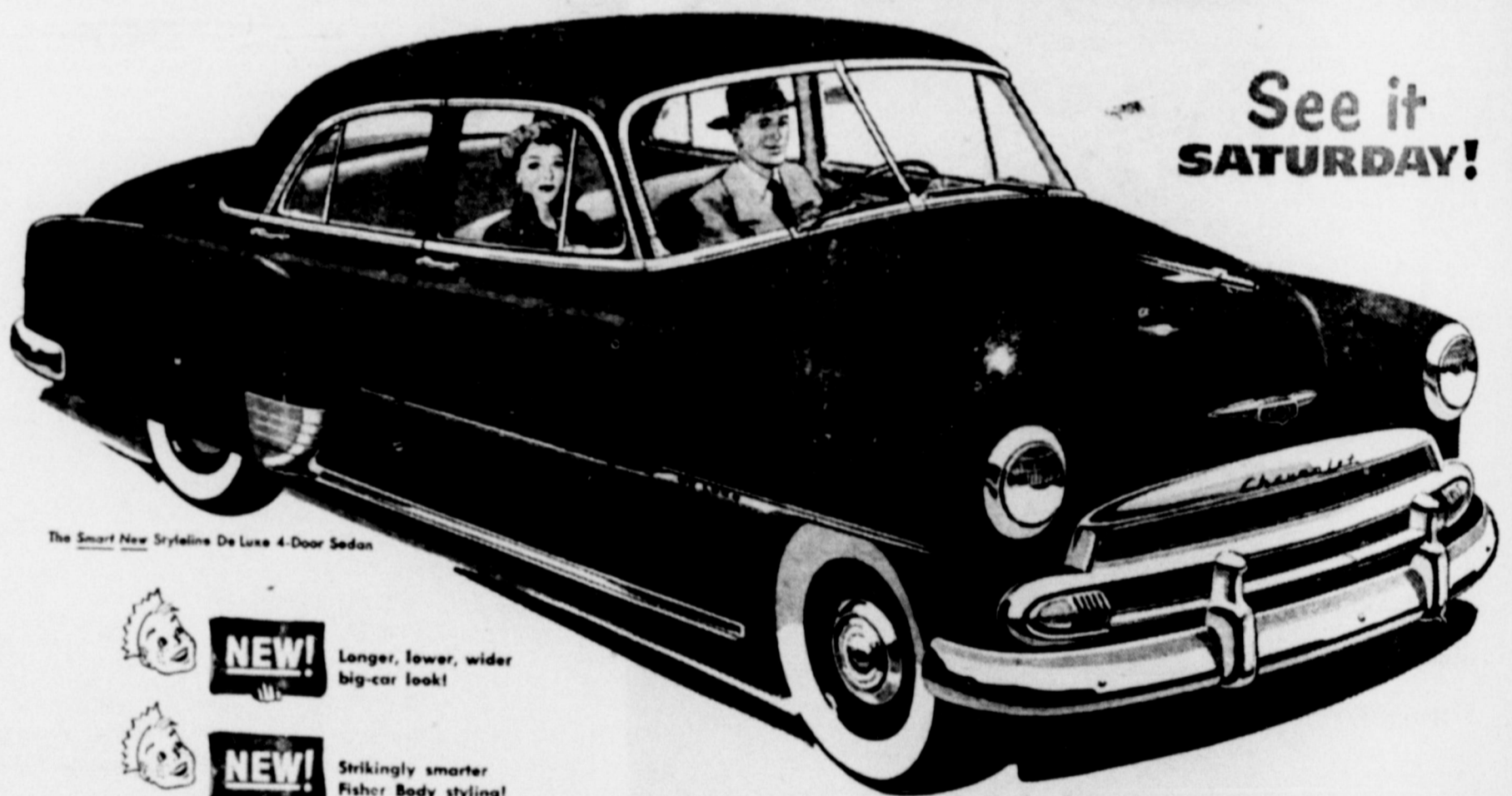

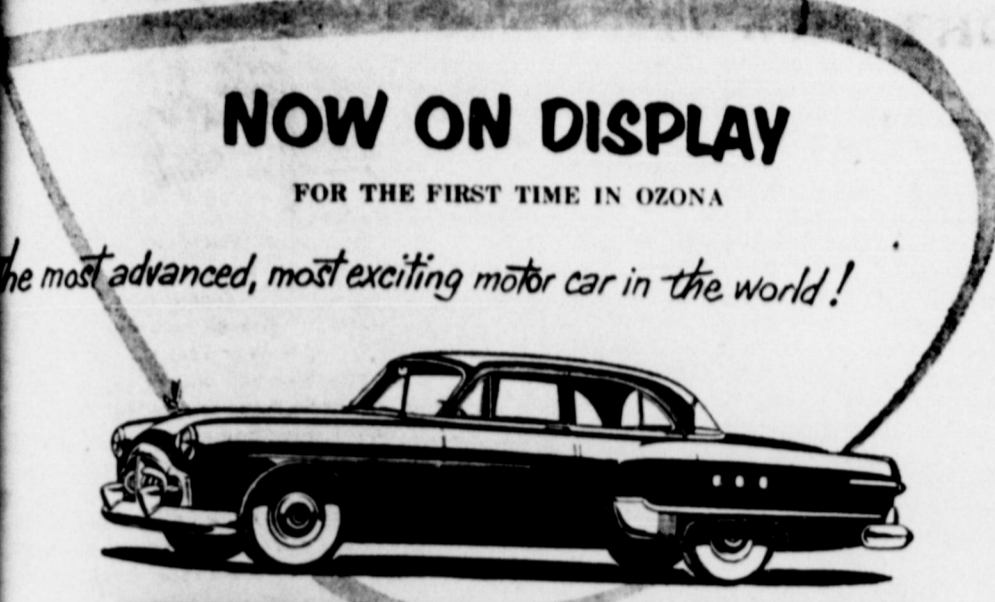

 Social Security Law**
 "Do you have a maid?"
 Not so very many households
 these days can answer yes, but
 those who do have a maid or any
 other household worker will need
 a copy of a brief booklet bearing
 that question as a title. George
 Clark, manager of the San Angelo
 social security office has begun
 distribution of this booklet. This
 colorful leaflet sets out, in a few
 sentences, just how the lady of

the house, or any employer of do-
 mestic help in or around the home
 may tell whether or not the work-
 er is brought under the new social
 security law which becomes effec-
 tive January 1.
 The work of those regularly em-
 ployed in private homes will be
 credited to social security and the
 employer will be responsible for
 reporting wages, along with social
 security taxes, to the collector of
 internal revenue.
 A simple test in the booklet, in
 terms of amount of wages paid and
 regularity of employment, will tell
 whether a maid or cook or laun-
 dress will get the protection of so-
 cial security — whether the house-
 wife should start making reports
 next year. If so, there's a postage
 paid postal card in the government
 issued booklet which the house-
 wife should mail for instructions.
 For the domestic worker's own
 information about her new social
 security protection, a special leaf-
 let is available at the social secu-
 rity office, San Angelo. Mr. Clark
 pointed out that regularly em-
 ployed domestic workers will need
 a social security account number
 card after January 1, 1951.
 The "Do You Have a Maid?"
 booklet does not apply to domestic
 work on farms operated for profit.

Such work is covered by other pro-
 visions in the new social security
 law.

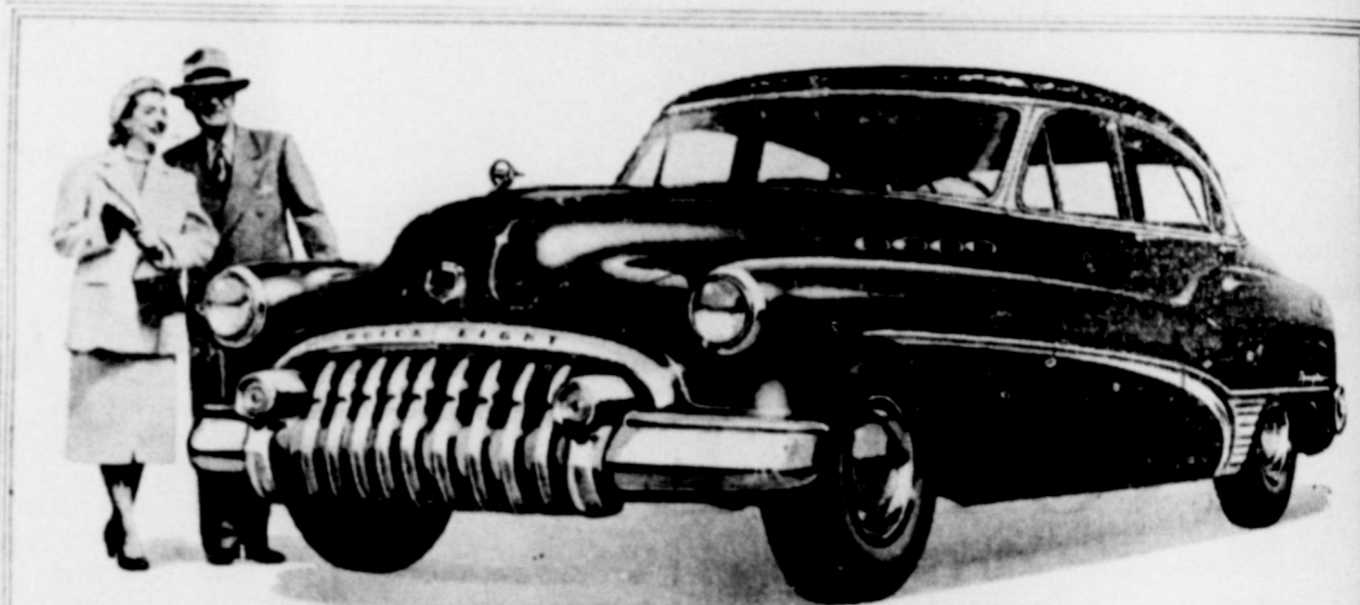

Monday, the Ozona delegation attended two radio broadcasts, Swift's Breakfast Club of the Air, with Don McNeil, and Welcome Travelers, emceed by Tommy Bartlett. At the Welcome Travelers show, the boys were given tickets to a free tour of Chicago. Following this tour, the boys put on a 30-minute television show with Tommy Bartlett as master of ceremonies.

The highlight of the trip, the boys agree, was Monday night, which was "Nathan's Jewelry Night," at the Chez Paree, one of Chicago's swankiest night clubs. This dinner and entertainment was furnished by Nathan Donsky, San Angelo jeweler, who had made prior arrangement with the management for a royal entertainment for the youngsters. At the Chez Paree, Danny Thomas of stage and screen fame, who was master of ceremonies, spotlighted the Texas group, visiting their table, and had his picture made with the boys. A song by Danny was dedicated to the Ozona 4-H Clubbers.

We are wasting manpower and material resources at a fearful rate. The fire is smothered at one place, only to break out in another. If we succeed in China — and that is a very big "if" — there will be other fires to put out. When the big showdown comes with Russia in person, will we have enough left to win? There is no assurance that we will have help. England and France will have help. France and Eng-

land are openly critical of our right in the sight of God, and then depend on God to sustain us. Let us begin by making Democracy real in our own country, and stop peddling it abroad. We have no divine commission to tell others what to believe; they will believe what they see, not what we say. Let's support a United Nations, that includes Russia, Red China, and every other country in the world, friendly, or unfriendly. As long as our enemies are across a table from us, and efforts to talk it over are maintained, there is at least a chance for settlement. Let's bring our armies home from

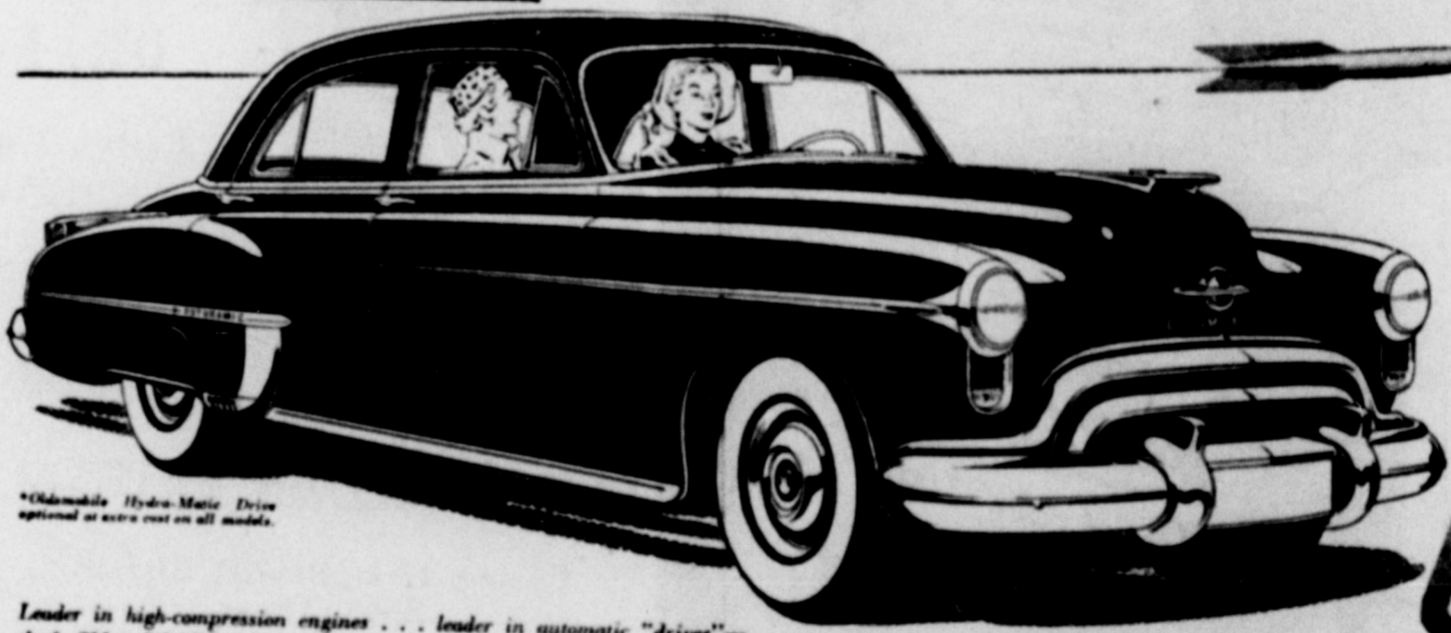
