If so, there's a postage paid postal card in the government issued booklet which the house-

wife should mail for instructions. For the domestic worker's own information about her new social security protection, a special leaflet is available at the social security office, San Angelo. Mr. Clark pointed out that regularly employed domestic workers will need a social security account number card after January 1, 1951.

The "Do You Have a Maid?" booklet does not apply to domestic work on farms operated for profit.







School Lunch Period To Be Extended 10 Minutes Effective Mon.

Beginning Monday, December 11, a new schedule for the noon bour and afternoon classes will b followed, Lem Bray, Ozena super intendent announced today.

Classes will dismiss at the obtime for lunch, 12:05, but will take up at 1:00 instead of 12:50 as previously done. Afternoon classe will run ten minutes longer, t 3:45 instead of the present 3:33 dismissal hour.

"The present schedule has called for our students to be dismissed at 12:05 and has given only 45 minutes for lunch. Since many of the students have to walk several blocks to their homes, the lunch period is not corresponding with the time parents have provided for lunch. Also, a number of students eat in cafes and often crowded conditions do not provide them with enough time to be served,' Mr. Bray stated.

"Therefore, the noon period will be extended 10 minutes effective Monday, December 11. The schools will dismiss at 12:05 and resume afternoon classes at 1:00 p.m. The extra 10 minutes will be added to the afternoon program, making the school closing hour at 3:45," he concluded.
