Kenneth Parker Critically Hurt in Crash East of Ozona

Laura Walley, 15-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Cecil R. Walley of Ozona, was killed instantly at about b o'clock Saturday afternoon when the car in which she was riding overturned in the barrow ditch on Highway 290 about two miles east of Ozona.

Kenneth Parker, 17, Miss Walley's companion on the fatal ride. is in critical condition in the Ozona hospital. Parker suffered fractures of both legs, possible back and internal injuries. His condition has remained critical since the accident but at midweek attending physicians were hopeful of his recovery. He had been given several blood transfusions during the week. He had previously had his blood typed for the Walking Blood Bank and donors with matching types were called from the Bank's file for the transfusions. 




