

Driver Escapes Death In Wreck Of **Vegetable Truck**

Huge Van Overturns As Truck Plows Thru **Right-of-Way Fence**

Walter E. Lamm is under treatment in the Ozona Hospital for injuries suffered early Wednesday morning when the huge diesel powered refrigerated van, loaded with vegetables, which he was driving left the highway at a curve a mile west of Ozona and plowed to a stop across the rightof-way fence, with its trailer upside down and the tractor still upright.

Lamm, who evidently dozed and failed to make the turn at the top of the hill west of Ozona, suffered lacerations about the face, a deep cut under the left car and bruises about the body and arms. Don Cooke, employed at the O-

zona Oil Co., was the first to the wreck, which occurred about 6 o'clock Wednesday morning. While working at the station, Cooke heard the noise of the crash and went to the scene. He brought Lamm to the hospital and then returned to the wreck to see if there was another victim of the wreck. Lamm had asked if there was anybody was with him, causing Cooke and Sheriff V. O.
