**Creep Feeding Beef For Better Growth Calves Recommended**

COLLEGE STATION. — By creep feeding their beef calves, livestock men can add as much as 100 pounds of weight per head by weaning time, according to U. D. Thompson, assistant extension animal husbandman of Texas A. & M. College.

A "creep" — an enclosure with openings large enough for calves to enter but too small for older cattle — is inexpensive and easy to build. This arrangement gives calves access to additional feed.

Specifications for building a practical creep feeder and suggestions for locating it are given in a new Extension Service circular. Circular 289 also gives suggested rations for feeding suckling calves and directions for starting calves on feed.

Thompson points out that an important advantage of creep feeding is the better condition of the cows at weaning time. They are not suckled down so much when the calves receive additional feed.

In addition to being heavier and having more finish, creep-fed calves grow out more uniformly in size and condition. There is little shrinkage at weaning time.

**State 4-H Club Round-Up at A & M College June 26-27**

COLLEGE STATION. — Texas 4-H Club boys and girls will participate in three new state elimination programs at College Station this year — in addition to 13 other judging and team demonstration contests conducted in the past. These contests will be held at Texas A. & M. College on Monday, June 25, in connection with the State 4-H Round-Up, which is scheduled for June 26-27.

New contests include a soil and water conservation demonstration, a vegetable team demonstration contest and a shrub identification contest.

A. H. Karcher, Jr., assistant state 4-H leader, estimates that approximately 600 boys and girls will compete in the contests. Two teams from each of the 14 Texas Extension Service districts are eligible to compete in each of the programs.

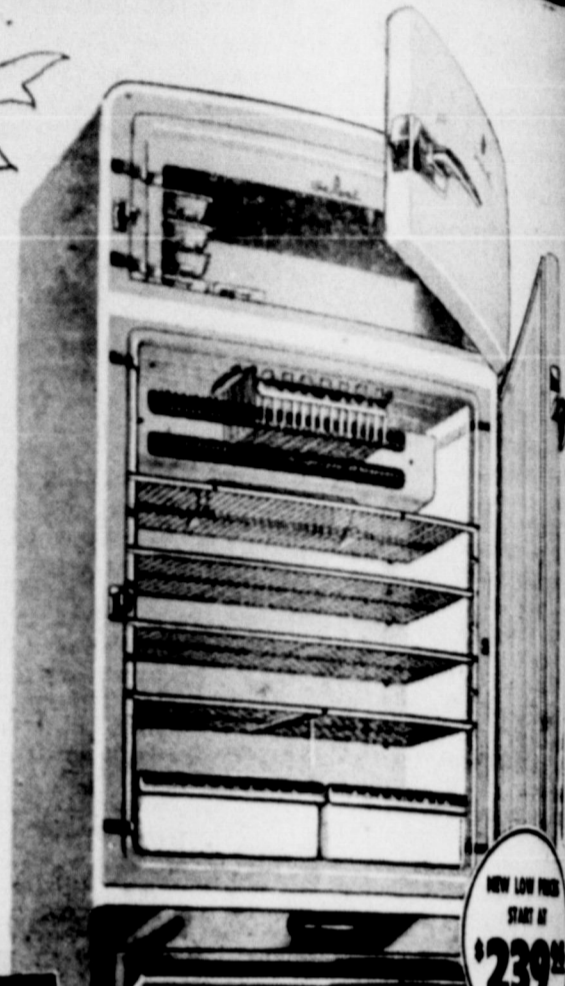


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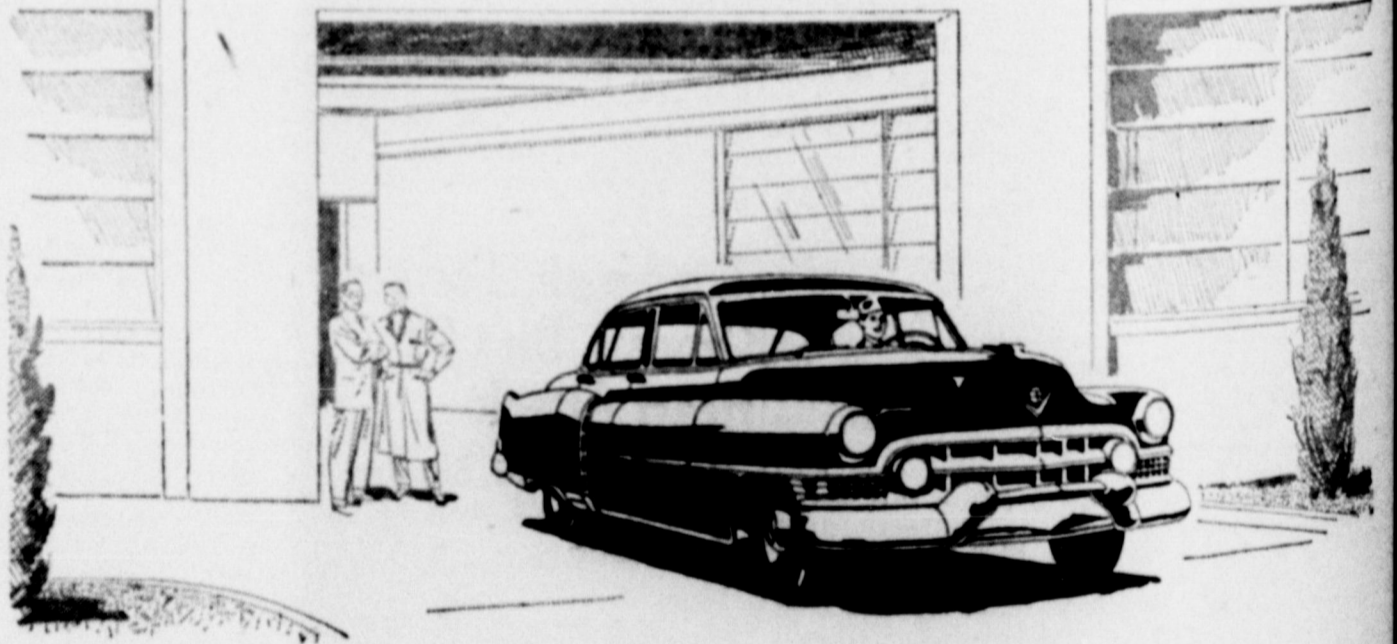

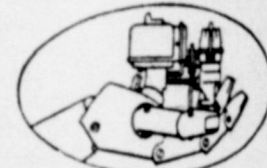

**Public Safety Dept. Plans Administration Of New Inspection Law**

AUSTIN.—Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that preliminary plans are under way for the administration of the state's new Motor Vehicle Inspection Act. Recently passed by the 52nd Legislature and signed into law by Governor Allan Shivers, the act, which is designed to enhance traffic safety by removing unsafe motor vehicles from the highways will become effective 90 days after the adjournment of the 52nd Legislature. According to Garrison, an additional period of about 60 days will be required to complete the organizational details of the inspection division which, by law, will fall under the supervision of the Public Safety Department. Garrison stated that garage owners and other individuals interested in making application for official inspection stations in their areas may do so by writing directly to him at Austin. The proper application blanks will be mailed to those making inquiry as soon as they are available. Those selected will be subject to a thorough examination of facilities and equipment and will be instructed in inspection standards. Garrison further stated that no testing devices have yet been approved and that it was not advisable for applicants to purchase such equipment until his department has set up the official standards for such devices.

**U. T. Scientists Make New Discovery in Fight on Brucellosis**

AUSTIN. — University of Texas scientists have made another advance in the search for a cure of brucellosis — the disease now costing U. S. livestockmen an estimated \$100,000,000 annually.

They have found common sulphur is toxic to brucella organisms, Dr. Vernon T. Schubarth, University bacteriology professor and brucellosis research director, said.

Laboratory tests indicate colloidal sulphur is the toxic agent in certain amino acids and peptones, protein-derived chemicals which have been found to be effective in killing brucella organisms.

"The problem now is to find a way to keep the sulphur toxic when brucellosis is treated," Dr. Schubarth explained. "Blood and chemicals in the tissues tend to change the sulphur to a non-toxic state."

Brucellosis losses are particularly heavy in the dairy industry where both milk and calf production are greatly reduced. The disease sometimes infects humans who are constantly exposed to it.

**State and Counties Lose 6 Million Year on Low-Registered Trucks**

AUSTIN. — County and state highway funds were enriched by more than \$82,500.00 during the month of April, according to the monthly activities report just released by Kent Odom, Chief of the Department of Public Safety's License and Weight Division.

The report shows 2,147 truck owners paid fine during the month for overloading, operating under-registered vehicles, using unsafe and faulty equipment on the highways and for miscellaneous offenses. There were 1,973 arrests during the month of March, 1951.

Since September, 1950, the beginning of this fiscal year, 16,086 arrests have been made by the Public Safety Department's 33 license and weight inspectors and more than \$668,000.00 in fines and additional registration fees have been collected. Over \$228,000.00 of this amount was collected from truck operators for carrying more weight than the truck has been licensed to haul.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, recently told the South Texas County Judges and Commissioners in convention at Laredo, that the State and Counties of Texas were losing approximately six million dollars a year because truck operators would not pay the registration fees on their equipment for the full carrying capacity up to the then 48,000-pound gross weight limit.

The Legislature recently increased the gross weight trucks can haul upon Texas highways to 58,420 pounds, which could produce approximately \$90.00 more per vehicle in license fees each year, if truck operators could be compelled to register for the full amount of the weight they carry.

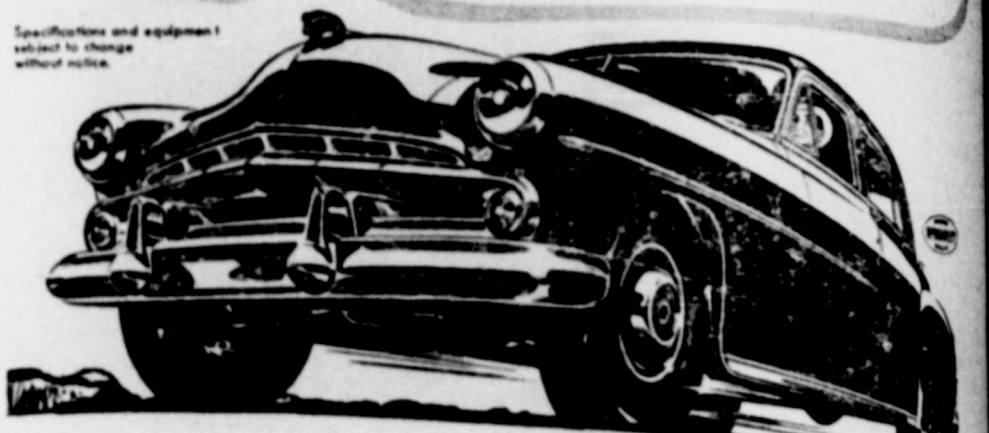
As a means of raising badly needed state and county revenue, the County Judges and Commissioners unanimously adopted a resolution asking the Legislature to look into this practice of truckers evading the payment of full registration fees.

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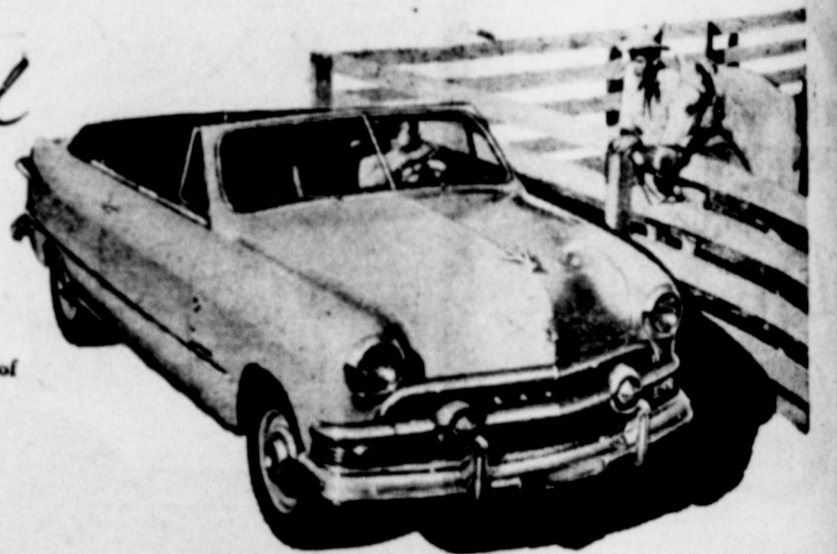
