**Billy Graham, Baptist Evangelist, to Speak At Dallas Rally Jan. 9**

DALLAS. — Billy Graham, dynamic young evangelist known for preaching to huge crowds from coast to coast, has added Dallas to the list of Texas cities where he will speak early in 1951.

Graham will speak Tuesday evening, January 9, before the annual Baptist Evangelistic Conference. The conference will meet from Monday evening, January 8, to Wednesday noon in Dallas' First Baptist Church.

More than 5,000 pastors and laymen from all over the state are expected to hear Graham and 30 other denominational speakers. The purpose of the conference is to explain to Texas Baptists the need and methods for winning 250,000 new Christians in 1951.

The goal of a quarter-million new Christians this year was set by the Baptist General Convention of Texas meeting in Fort Worth in November. This number does not refer only to new church members

and will not include Baptists who move their membership from one church to another.

Since the largest number of converts ever won by Texas Baptists in one year was nearly 58,000 in 1950, the new goal is more than four times as many as they have ever reached before.

Dr. C. Wade Freeman, state superintendent of evangelism for Texas Baptists, is in charge of arrangements for the conference and for eleven regional evangelistic rallies to be held in Texas cities from January to March.
