That voters of the Crockett Consolidated Common School District would have a full slate of candidates from which to choose three new school board members in the annual election scheduled for Saturday, April 7, was indicated this

Although the Stockman waited past press deadline time, the complete list of candidates whose names will appear on the ballot was not available. A petition had been prepared for presentation to the county judge listing the names of candidates but what names will be included on this list was not available in time for this issue.

The law provides that a candidate for school trustee may file for a position on the ballot any time before the final ten days before an election. Within that tenday period, however, a petition signed by five qualified voters is necessary to include a name on the ballot. Such a petition was being prepared for additional candidates.

"Any dog, whether registered and tagged or not, when found attacking any sheep, goats, calves and or other domestic animals or fowls, or which has recently made, or is about to make such attack Call Stockman Office - Phone 210 on any sheep, goat, calves and / or other domestic animals or fowls. may be killed by anyone present and witnessing or having knowledge of such attack and without liability in damage to the owner of such dog. Any dog, whether registered and tagged or not, known or suspected to be a killer of sheep goats, calves or other domestic animals or fowls, is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and such dog may be detained or impounded by any person until the owner may be notified, and until all damage done by said dog shall have been determined and paid to
