NINE BILLION DOLLARS

The Conference of State Taxpayer Associations, representing 37 independent state organizations of taxpayers has demanded a \$9 billion reduction in nonessential spending by the Federal government.

- How much is \$9 billion? Nine billions dollars would: 1. Buy the initial equipment for 48 armored divisions or 113 infantry divisions. 2. Buy 3,600 medium bombers for the Air Force, or 225 destroyers for the Navy, or 45,000 medium tanks for the Army. 3. Pay for all of next year's proposed Marshall Plan and other international expenditures, including military, enough left over to buy a machine gun for every member of the U. S. armed forces. In terms of taxes, nine billion dollars is: 1. A burden of \$240 for the average American family. 2. More than the total collected by every one of the 48 states in fiscal 1950. 3. Nearly enough to put the inflated national budget on pay-as-

we-go basis without a tax increase. There can be no question about spending whatever we need for adequate defense, but the fact is that some \$30 billion of the \$71 billion in the proposed federal budget is for non-military expenditures. Every dollar spent by the government for peacetime frills means either an extra dollar in taxes or a dollar taken away from legitimate military expenditures. It is probably true that we must "tax until it hurts," but it is equally true that in all fairness the federal government should start "saving until it hurts" on nonessentials.

Aliens Working Under Contract Not Subject To Social Security

Mexican agricultural workers imported under contract are no longer subject to Social Security, according to a statement by Geo. D. Clark, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Administration today. This change has come about by the passage of Public Law 78 amending the Social Security Act to exclude services performed by foreign agricultural workers under contracts entered into by their government and the United States. The effective date was July 12, 1951.

Beginning on January 1, of this year, agricultural workers were brought under the Social Security Act if they worked regularly for one employer (60 days in a calendar quarter, following one full calendar quarter) and received cash pay of \$50 or more in the calendar quarter. This still applies to Mexicans illegally in this country who are doing agricultural work, if they meet the regularity

and cash pay test, and to processed Mexican laborers prior to July 12, 1951.

sound as if there were several times as many attackers as were actually in the engagement. This tactic unnerved our young troops many times, resulting in unnecessary losses. If the men in this situation will sit tight, they can't take us, we've got too much fire power.

"When the attack comes, ammunition trains start up from the rear. Artillery and mortars open up and rifles and machine guns from the foxholes. If they get too close, there are plenty of hand grenades to stop them.

"We knock off the first wave and then there's blowing of bugles and whistles for regrouping and the next wave comes. We knock them off, and so on. We just sit there and kill Chinamen until they get tired, or until daylight."

Sgt. Bledsoe said that it seemed to him that the entire Communist forces were after him from the time he got his orders to pack up to go home until he finally got far enough at sea to feel safe. Returning from a mine sweeping patrol, his top sergeant told him to go get his things together, that he was to be sent home.

"I didn't believe him," Bledsoe said. "He insisted and showed me the order, three of us from my company. I went to my pup tent to get my belongings and when I picked up my bedroll I found a huge shell fragment imbedded in the roll. If I'd been there, I would not be here."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2
proposing an amendment to Section 49b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of bonds and certain conditions relating thereto; and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA- TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be secured by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature. Provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest. "In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation. "All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund. "The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law. "All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided herein for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that as much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or as much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of the State of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been authorized and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR the Amendment to Section 49b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

These opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters cast their vote in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereon. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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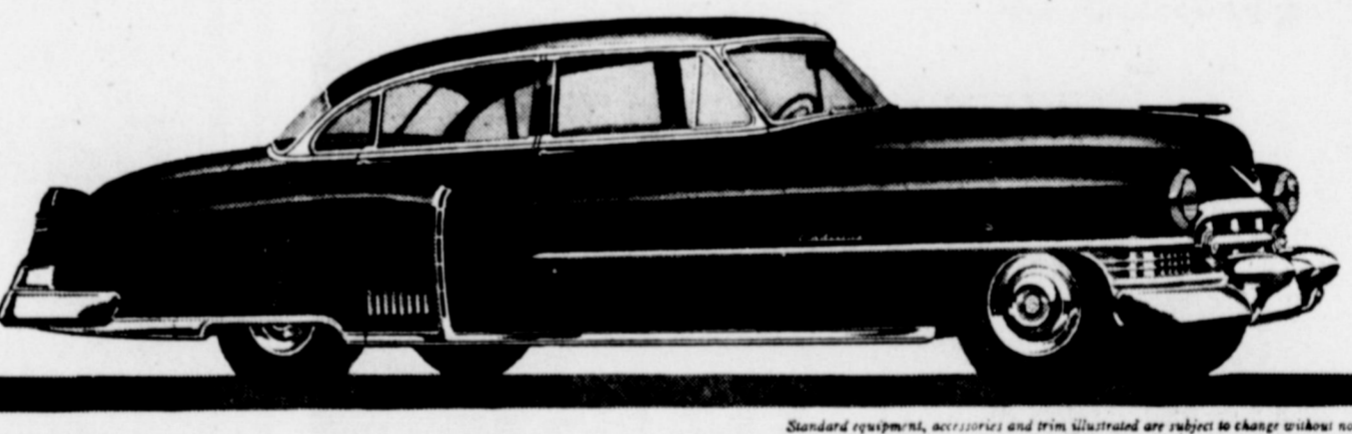

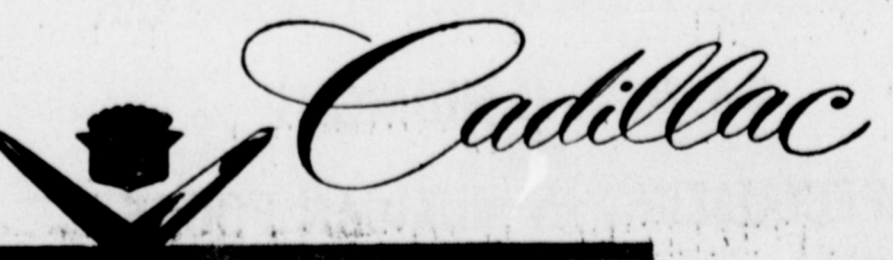

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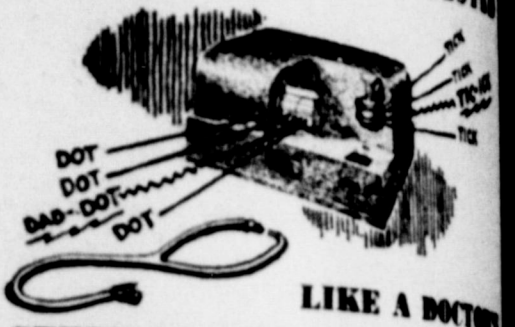

ICC Orders Uniform Class Rates on Rail Freight E. of Rockies

WASHINGTON. — Rep. Ken Regan, 16 district, Midland, was informed that the Interstate Commerce Commission today, August 1, ordered uniform class rates — to be effective later — on all railroad freight moving east of the Rocky Mountains.

At the same time, it ordered the railroads to file within four months a uniform classification of freight. Until this is done and the classification adopted, the new rates will be held in abeyance.

The uniform rate adopted on distances up to 3000 miles will mean reductions up to 15 per cent in Southern and Western territory lying east of the Rocky Mountains. Rates will remain virtually unchanged in Eastern territory, which is the area east of the Mississippi and north of the Potomac and Ohio river.

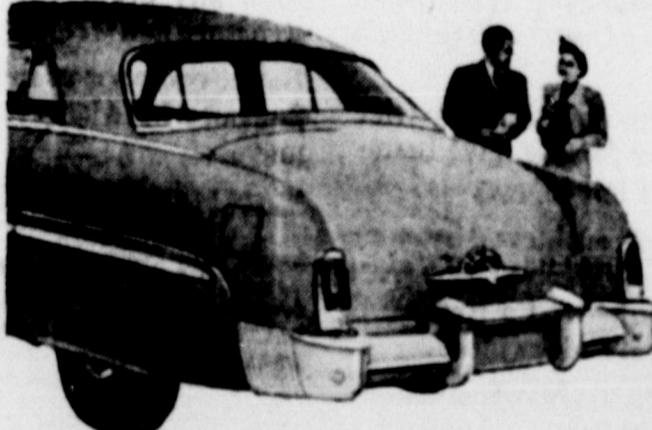

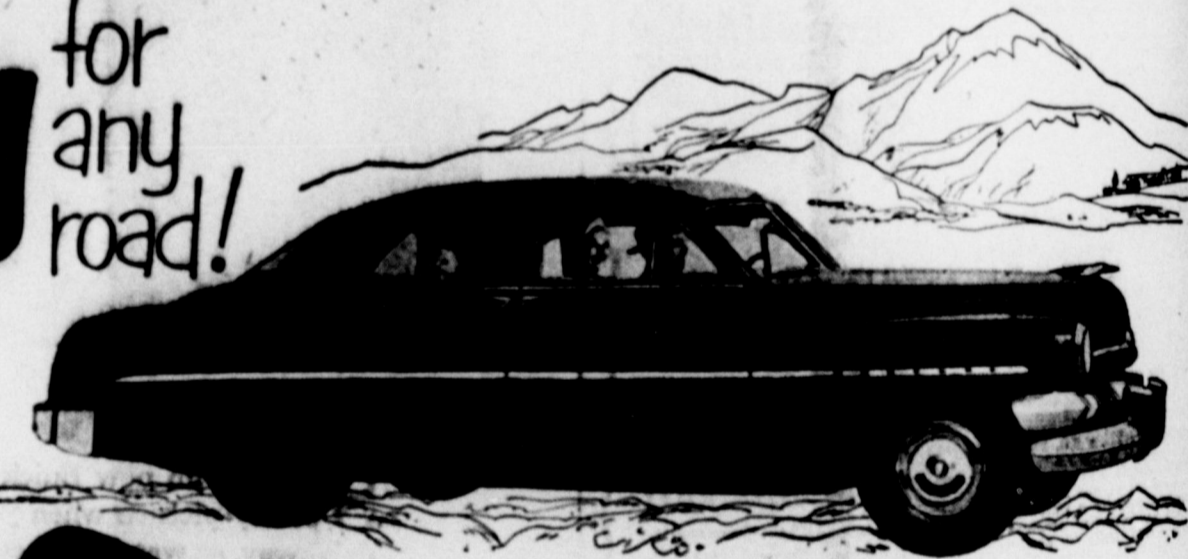
