## 15,000 Foot Test On Mitchell Ranch Planned By Sun

### County's Deepest Exploration Set To Test Huge Block

Sun Oil Co. plans to start at once a proposed 15,000-foot wildcat in the extreme southwest part of Crockett county.

Sun's test will be No. 1 Mrs. Myrtle Mitchell of Ozona, 1,318 from the north, 902 feet from the east line of section 111, block 1, I&GN Ry. Co. survey. It will be 40 miles southwest of Ozona, 2 1/2 miles north of Val Verde county line and two miles east of Terrell county boundary. Drilling to about 2,000 feet with cable tool then continuing with rotary is planned.

The wildcat will be on a checkerboarded block of approximately 10,000 acres in Crockett, Val Verde and Terrell counties which Sun acquired from J. J. Perkins and Charles N. Prothro, both of Wichita Falls and W. J. Green, both of San Angelo. There was a cash consideration and Sun also assumed an obligation to drill a test to 15,000 or 400 feet into the Ellenburger.

Sun's checkerboarded leases are in alternate quarter and half sections out of a block of approximately 53,000 acres in Crockett, Val Verde and Terrell counties. John W. Hampton of Wichita Falls took 10-year leases on the block for Perkins, Prothro and the Greens and received an interest in them. His work started late in 1947 and required nearly four years.

The Crockett county venture will not be Sun Oil Co.'s first worked out with Perkins, Prothro and the Greens. They pooled leases on which Sun on Dec. 21, 1949 opened the Pulliam (Strawn and Cayton) field in Tom Green county only four miles west of San Angelo. The second of two gas distillate wells in the Kamekar field near Garfield was drilled by Perkins, Prothro and J. S. Bridwell of Wichita Falls on land of Mrs. Myrtle Mitchell of Ozona.

Sun No. 1 Mitchell in Crockett county will not be West Texas' deepest wildcat if it goes to 15,000 feet. Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Ada Pierce in Pecos county was abandoned at 15,279 feet after showing promise of production for a while. It was in the CSE NW 11-104-TCR 27 miles south-east of Fort Stockton.

One and one-quarter mile south-west of the opener of the Elkhorn Ellenburger field in Crockett county, Wilshire Oil Co. has staked location for a 7,500-foot rotary test.

Beginning by Sept. 7, the company's No. 4 J. M. Shannon will be 660 feet from north and east lines of section 37-UV-GC&SF survey.

Neville G. Penrose of Fort Worth No. 1 University, wildcat 12 miles of Sheffield, was drilling at 2,415 feet.

## Junior Kindergarten For Latin-Americans At Community Center

Registration has been set for Monday, September 3, for the Junior Kindergarten classes to be sponsored by the local Community Center, Miss Beulah Morton, deaness, announced this week.

The kindergarten classes will be for children four years of age. Parents will be required to submit birth certificates certifying the child will be 4 years old on or before September 1, 1951.

Tuition charges for the junior kindergarten will be 25 cents per week or \$1 per month. Miss Morton said this fee will cover the cost of lunch for the children and all materials used in classes. Miss Morton will be assisted in teaching the kindergarten by Maria Torres.

The Ozona Public School will open a kindergarten for 5-year-old children of the Latin-American community for the first time this fall. Mrs. L. B. Harris, Jr., has been assigned the South Elementary kindergarten.

## P. T. A. To Launch Membership Drive As School Opens

### All Parents Urged to Join in Program of School Betterment

Ozona Parent-Teachers Association will launch a membership drive on the opening day of the 1951-52 school term Tuesday, September 4. Mrs. Ashby McMullan, P. T. A. president, announced this week.

Mrs. McMullan said that the organization plans to seek as large a membership as possible as a means of bringing parents in closer contact with the schools and a better understanding of the problems of school administration and teaching.

"We want everybody in the P. T. A., not only because we need your help but because we think you, your children and your school benefit by your active membership," Mrs. McMullan said.

"To you parents with beginning pupils and you, our new neighbors just moving in, we welcome you and want you to become active members and take your place in our program. Our local P. T. A. is set up with its officers accepting their jobs for two years. This year's officers are 'old heads' and should do a better job this year than last. Our unit is what P. T. A. means, 'Parent and Teacher.' We meet monthly to 'learn' from good program but mainly to plan and help our school program."

Active work in the P. T. A. is the best way to become acquainted with the faculty and school problems. Mrs. McMullan pointed out. Dues are \$1 per year, "a small investment for such big dividends." Monthly meetings are held the third Monday in each month at 3:30 p.m.

Joe Fogaley, field instructor for the State Firemen's Training School of the Engineering Extension of A & M College, completed a five-day training school for fire chiefs and fire marshals in this area at a final school session held at the local fire station Wednesday night. The fire session school was spread over a period from August 20 to 25.

Firemen, fire marshals and chiefs from Ozona, Sheffield, Big Lake and Sonora attended sessions of the school. Lecturers and demonstration of the most common causes of fires, electrical connections, gas explosion, chemical fires, arson, etc. were presented by Mr. Fogaley and several local business houses.

## 30 Boys Out For First Football Practice Session

### 11 Lettermen to Form Nucleus of 1951 Lions Squad

Coach L. J. Wilkins called for a "count-off" at Lions Field Monday morning and found thirty husky lads ready for the first warm-up to launch the 1951 football practice sessions to get ready for a ten-game schedule which opens September 14.

Forming the nucleus of this year's Lion grid squad will be eleven returning lettermen, plus a couple of squadmen who got a lot of experience even though they failed to letter, and a transfer and some hotshots from last year's junior high team.

Of the veterans, four are backs, Virgil Machado, 138-lb. Senior; Tom Piner, 140 pound Junior; Billy West, 148 pounds, also a Junior; and Baldomero Roman, 140 pound Sophomore.

A bunch of hefty linemen are to be found among the remaining lettermen. Onesimo DeHoyas, 210 pounds, a Senior, will be at guard. Bobby Womack, weighing 185, Senior; Pete Cisneros, Senior, 220 pounds, and Kootsey Smith, Sophomore, and a 180 pounder, will vie for the tackle slots, along with some promising squadmen from last year, Graham Childress, Sophomore, 175 pounder; Sam Martin, 183-pound Junior, and Kenneth Phillips, 170-pound Sophomore. For the center position will be two lettermen, Charles Garlitz, 160 pound Sophomore, and Bill Schneemann, Junior, weighing 170. Bill Maness, 140-pound Junior is the only letter-wingman, but Coach Wilkins sees plenty of promising material in Kenneth Bledsoe, Senior, weighing 145 pounds; Scott Hickman, rangy 150-pound Junior; and Andres Azaire, 160 pound Junior.

For the guard slots, in addition to veteran DeHoyas, there will be Dan Cooper, 175 pounder, a Junior, transferred last year from Kermit; Buddy Whitley, a 150-pound Junior; Ronnie McMullan, 155-pound Freshman, with experience on the Junior High team last year; Jimmie McMullan, Junior, weighing 140 pounds; David Price, 135 pound Junior, and Wilburn Conklin, 140 pounds, and a Junior.

Five boys from last year's Junior High squad, will mix it with the veterans for the backfield positions, and one Senior, Joe Bailey, out for the first time, may see some backfield action. Bailey weighs 140 pounds and is being groomed for some of the quarterbacking chores.

The promising crop of ball carriers in the Freshman class include Jody Jones, 145 pounds; Sonny Martinez, 120 pounds; Albino Sanchez, 120 pounds; Antonio Rodriguez, 125 pounds; and Charles Hale, 135 pounds. Don Taylor, a 115-pounder who showed lots of speed in Junior High play, will try for some backfield play in this his Junior year.

The Lions open the 1951 season at home against the Reagan County High School Owls from Big Lake, a non-conference tilt. On Sept. 21 they go to Iraan and the following week-end meet the San Angelo Kittens here. A "trip to Llano on October 5, and then to El Paso on October 12, will complete the pre-conference schedule.

On October 19, the conference schedule will open in Menard. Eltorado comes here October 26 and then the Lions go to Junction on Nov. 2, to Eden on Nov. 9 and finish the season on the home field as hosts to the Sonora Bronchos.

Sam Henderson and others of Ozona have staked location for a slated 1,000-foot cable tool wildcat in Crockett county, 20 miles south of Ozona. Their No. 1 Geo. Harrell estate is 2,310 from south, 330 from east line of section 22, block XX.

Continental Oil Co. has filed application for permit to drill three one-half mile outposts to its opener of the Elkhorn Ellenburger field. The three projects will be projected to 7,400 feet with rotary and will be in section 22-UV-GC&SF survey.

No. 4-A J. M. Shannon, one-half mile southwest of the Elkhorn opener will be 668 from south, 2,068 feet from west line of section; No. 5-A Shannon, half mile northwest of the opener, will be 2,003 from north, 2,068 feet from west line of section; No. 6-A Shannon, half mile southeast of the discovery, will be 668 from south, 689 feet from east line of section.

Gulf Stream Oil Co. of San Angelo has filed amended application for No. 1 University, Barnhart field project, 2,389.8 from north, 330 feet from west line of section 21-40-U. The number of the slated 2,500-foot cable tool test was changed from 2 to 1.

Mrs. J. W. Howell suffered a badly lacerated hand and two broken fingers in a unique accident at her home Friday.

Mrs. Howell was operating an electric lawn mower. She turned off the power to clean out accumulated grass cuttings from beneath the machine. The still spinning blade struck her hand as she attempted to turn the machine upside down. Mrs. Howell would have suffered even more grave injuries had she not been wearing a glove. She spent several days in the Ozona Hospital receiving treatment for the mangled hand, which was reported healing satisfactorily this week.

## One Vacancy In Faculty On Eve Of Term Opening

### Two Places Filled; 3rd Grade Post Yet To Be Filled

Two of three vacancies created by last-minute resignations from the faculty of Ozona schools were filled during the past week and the one remaining vacancy, the post of third grade teacher in the North Elementary, was expected to be filled before school opening time next Tuesday.

Supt. Lem Bray announced this week the employment of two new teachers, one for the post of principal of the South Elementary School and teacher of Freshman and Sophomore English in high school.

W. H. Stockard, for the past two years principal of the elementary school at Rhame, Texas, has accepted the post as principal of the South Elementary here. Mr. Stockard's home is in Lewisville, Texas. He has his Master's degree from North Texas State College at Denton.

Filling the post as Freshman and Sophomore English teacher will be Miss Marydell Koepf of Fort Worth. Miss Koepf is a 1951 graduate of North Texas State. Mrs. Charles Womack, originally assigned the freshman and sophomore English classes, will succeed Mrs. Taylor Deaton as girls' physical education instructor.

Ozona schools will open Tuesday morning, with opening exercises scheduled for 8:30 a.m. in the high school auditorium. All pupils will report to classes immediately after the assembly program.

## Ozona Is Stop On 3,000 Mile Texas Air Tour

### Value of Private Aircraft Demonstrated in Tour of State

Ozona's air port will receive a mass flight of private aircraft composing the third annual All Texas Air Tour sponsored by the Texas Aeronautics Commission at Austin, Texas, according to notice received here the past week from Asa Burroughs, acting director.

The 3,000-mile air tour of Texas will get under way October 6 and continue for one week. The flight of private aircraft will start at Temple and stops are scheduled at some forty Texas towns in a tour which will circle the state to Monahan on the West, Borger in the Panhandle, Paris, Marshall, Tyler in East Texas, to Galveston, on the Gulf and to Brownsville on the southern tip of Texas, ending at Laredo on the Mexican border.

The flight is scheduled to reach Ozona from Eagle Pass on Sunday, October 7, proceeding the same day from here to Monahan, to Midland and to San Angelo for an overnight stay.

The purpose of the flight as explained by Mr. Burroughs is to "focus attention on the need for emergency planning and to spotlight the role of private aircraft as an asset in a national, state or local disaster. Scheduled supplies, food, doctors and nurses will be flown into each stop along the route. Other activity will be planned to place additional emphasis on your local emergency planning effort."

The active participation of every town along the route is being invited by the Commission.

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#### PROFIT CONTROL

In his mid-year message to Congress, President Truman came out flatly for government control of all business profits. This, he said, should be the basis for regulating prices.

Here is a concept that, if it were ever adopted, would have a cataclysmic influence on the American economy and the American

system of government. First of all, profit control would destroy the incentive which makes for growth, progress, and higher living standards for the people. Why should a man or an enterprise take a chance when, if he is successful, his profit will be stringently limited, whereas, if he fails he will have to bear the whole loss?

Second, profit control would make it next to impossible for small business to grow. It would not be permitted to earn the money that could be used for expansion.

Third, profit control would have the worst possible effect on all the productive resources of the country, at a time in world affairs when the whole free world depends upon America's productive strength for survival.

Fourth, profit control would inevitably lead to an economy which would be entirely dominated by the government. That sort of economy is but one step short of totalitarianism.

In a free enterprise system, we always have profit control — by competition. Arbitrary, political profit control could ruin us.

#### WHERE'S TEXAS, ANYWAY?

Texans at the Lions' Convention in Atlantic City impressed Delegate Fred Dickerman with their flair for boosting. He thought the New Englanders there were too

quiet for their own good and might have learned a lot from the Lone Star folk. Some of them paraded down the Boardwalk with two guns as a State trademark. They passed out maps and other materials to prove Texas is not only the biggest State but also the richest.

Now boosting is all right for the professional Texan. When he leaves home, he has to talk loud and long to reassure himself among strangers. But the New Englander, who has had time to grow up, doesn't need to tell the world how good he is. He feels it inside and that inner confidence is enough.

Let's admit this part of the country has its faults: it's slow-moving, tradition-bound and often hostile to progress. But it has qualities of character that are valuable these days, though they can't be measured in terms of "bigger" this or that.

No, New England needn't import the Texas brand of boosting.

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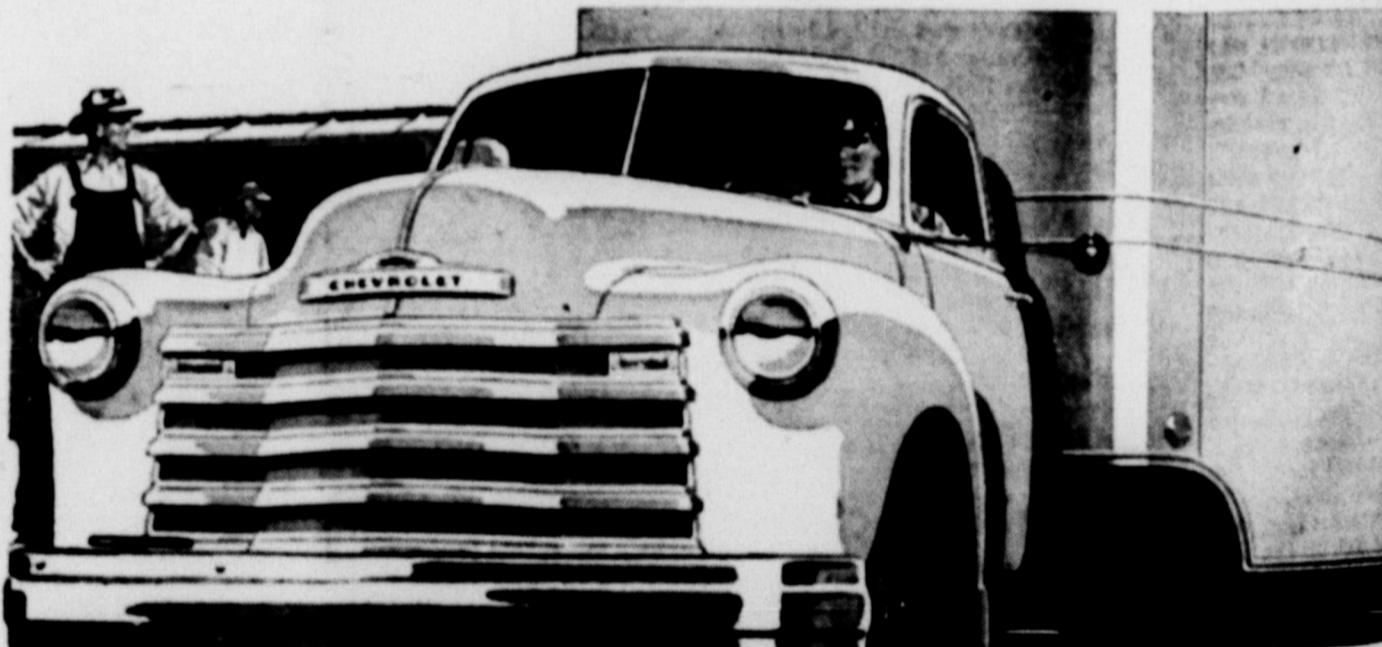

**Polio Peak Reached But Incidence Still Short of Last Year**

AUSTIN. — The state last week logged its highest polio incidence of the season, but it was still far short of the record set last year. Ninety-seven cases of the virulent disease were reported by the State Department of Health for the week ending August 11, bringing the year's total to 874. Last week's report bested the previous week's incidence of 92 cases by five.

"Even one case of polio is too much," State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox said, "but I'm mighty glad we don't have polio in wholesale lots like we did last year and the year before."

"Of course we still have to get through September and October

— they can be mean for polio too," he cautioned.

Last year Texas suffered 2355 cases for the entire season. There were 210 deaths for the entire year, State Health Department statistics show, 88 of them occurring during the first six months. Twenty-nine polio deaths have been recorded through June of this year.

Counties heaviest hit last week were Dallas, 17 cases; Tarrant, 10 cases; Bexar, 10 cases; and Harris, 7 cases.

Meanwhile, dysentery, always a leader among communicable diseases, continued its hot weather rampage. Morbidity statistics show 16,775 cases to date. Border counties — principally Cameron, Hidalgo and Webb — reported the highest number of weekly cases.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4**

Approving an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and receive the payment of same to needy persons over the age of sixteen (16) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years, needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years, removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such purposes; providing that the amount of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power to provide, laws to subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as it may deem proper, for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate, and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1951, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1951, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance and the value of such sale was not less than the actual market value, such person and spouse shall not be disqualified to receive assistance until the expiration of the period of five (5) years during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual net value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate, and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded if under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid if reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FIRST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age, removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purposes each year."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age, removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purposes each year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

### Hunting, Fishing Licenses Must Be Renewed September 1

AUSTIN. Fishing and hunting licenses for the fiscal year beginning September 1 will be in the hands of Texas agents the last week in August, according to the Chief Clerk of the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission.

He said 1650 persons in practically every community in Texas will help distribute the licenses.

Approximately 315,000 individual resident sport fishing licenses and roughly 310,000 individual resident hunting licenses will have been issued to Texans for the current fiscal year ending August 31.

One important change to sportsmen is the new combined \$2.15 resident hunting license which is good for both big game and small game, barring antelope which requires a special \$5 permit. All persons over 17 years of age must have a hunting license.

The resident license for sports fishing in fresh water costs \$1.65.

It must be used by all persons over 17 years of age when fishing beyond their home counties or adjoining counties. Licenses must be possessed even then if artificial bait is used in the home county or artificial or live bait are used in adjoining counties.

### McBrides to Move to Brownsville; Whitaker S. T. Manager Here

W. A. McBride, manager of the South Texas Lumber Co. here, has resigned his position here, effective October 1, when he plans to move with his family to Brownsville where he is to take over management of an individually owned lumber firm of which he is to become part owner.

Mr. McBride will be succeeded as local manager for the South Texas by Winston Whitaker, who has been manager of the company's branch in Merton for the past four years. Mr. and Mrs. Whitaker were to have moved to Ozona this week.

### Texas Crusade for Freedom Would Pierce Iron Curtain with Truth

DALLAS. — Texas Crusade for Freedom Chairman Lieut. General Preston A. Weathered today announced goals of the 1951 state-wide drive to quench the fire of Communist lies.

Quotas of 826,500 signatures and \$120,900 were set for Texas. Texans will be asked to sign pledges to "combat Communism and send more messages of truth and hope to millions trapped behind the Iron Curtain" to show their hatred of Red aggression.

Messages to enslaved people will go via Radio Free Europe, a network of stations placed along Soviet borders operated by the Crusade for Freedom. RFE is not hampered by government restriction.

"The effectiveness of these stations in hurting the Reds is proved by their trying to blackmail us off the air," General Weathered said. "They have paid us two

great compliments — protesting violently and trying to imitate our programs."

He said the freedom stations spike lies of the Kremlin, name traitors and Bolshevik collaborators by name and expose plots created by the Communist aggressors. They pull no punches, he added.

Contributions to the 1951 drive

will expand the freedom radio network in Europe and establish a similar operation in Asia to thwart Red propaganda in the Far East.

The 137 chapters of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce will spark the Crusade in every section of the state. Jaycees adopted it as a statewide project. Many other organizations have pledged active support.

The freedom drive is a nationwide program. It was organized by Generals Dwight D. Eisenhower and Lucius D. Clay.

The Crusade for Freedom will open Labor Day and run for a five month period.

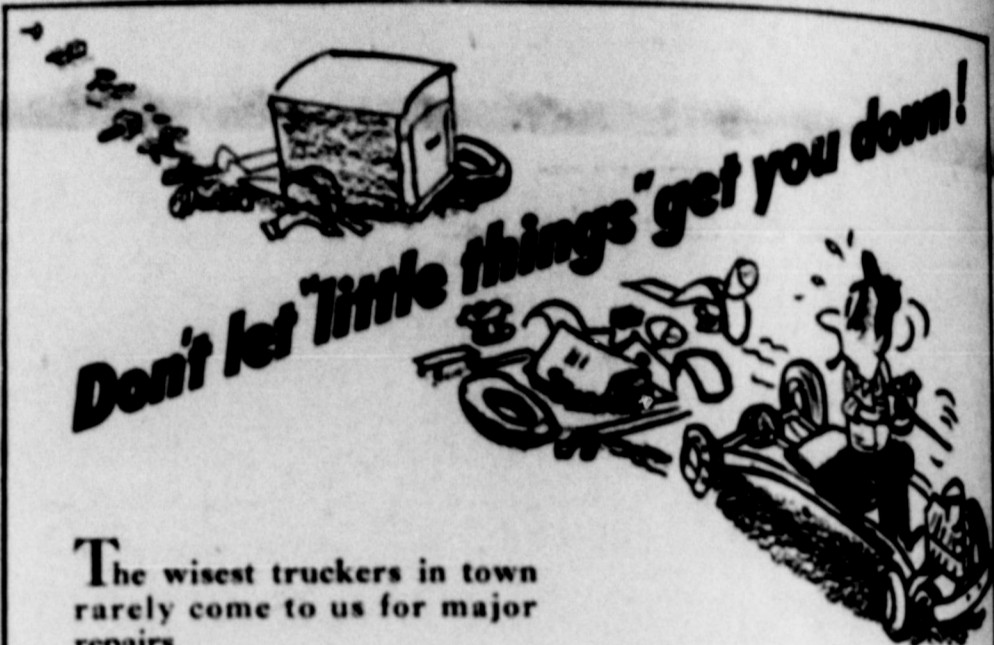

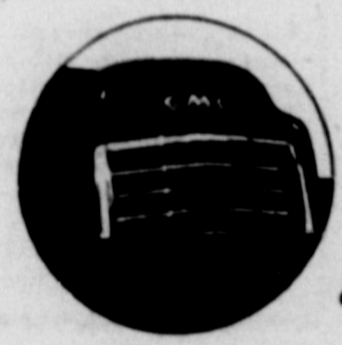

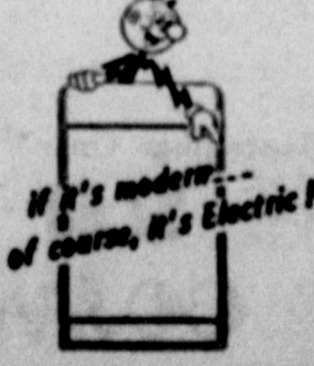

**Malco Completes San Andres Outpost; Southland Has Show**

Completion of an outpost and the showing of free oil by a wildcat Tuesday highlighted Crockett county developments.

Malco Refineries, Inc. and others northwest of the nearest producer in the Betty (San Andres) field, was completed on the pump in 24 hours for 49.78 barrels of 28.2 gravity, pipeline oil from open hole between 1,457 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1,467 feet, the total depth. Location is 330 from south, 1,650 feet from west line of section 34-UV-GC&SF survey.

Southland Royalty Co. and others No. 1-8Todd, 4 1/2 miles southwest of the Todd multipay field and 2 1/2 miles southwest of Amerada No. 1-HTodd, lone producer from crinoidal lime which is about two miles south of the Todd crinoidal field, recovered 110 feet of free, 36.8 gravity oil and 198 feet of drilling water on a two hour drillstem test from 6,615 to 6,640 feet.

A two-hour drillstem test from 6,640 to 6,665 feet yielded 150 feet of mud and 350 feet of salt water. All pressures were zero. Drilling on to the Ellenburger was planned. The wildcat is 1,933.3 from south, 660 feet from east line of section 8-XW-GC&SF survey.

Continental Oil Co. No. 1-B J. M. Shannon, wildcat nine miles southeast of Iraan, swabbed 68 barrels of salt water in 14 hours through perforations from 6,198 to 6,223 feet in Wolfcamp dolomite. Seven-inch casing had earlier been set at 7,389 feet, with total plug back depth 6,230 feet. Location is in J. Wiley Heins survey 2.

Continental No. 2-A J. M. Shannon, Elkhorn field test, section 22-UV-GC&SF survey, has been plugged and abandoned at 1,720 feet in San Andres lime.

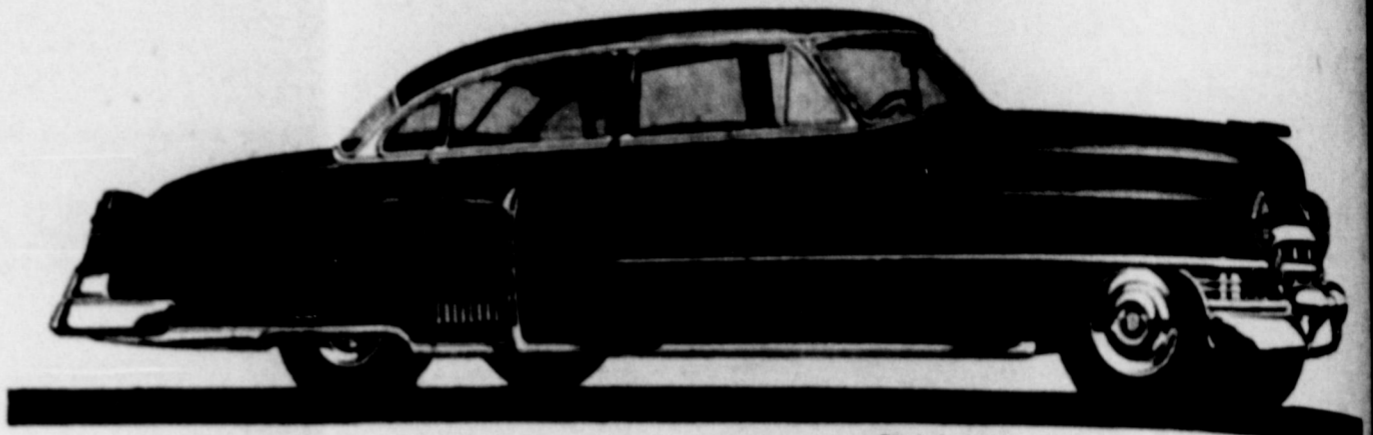

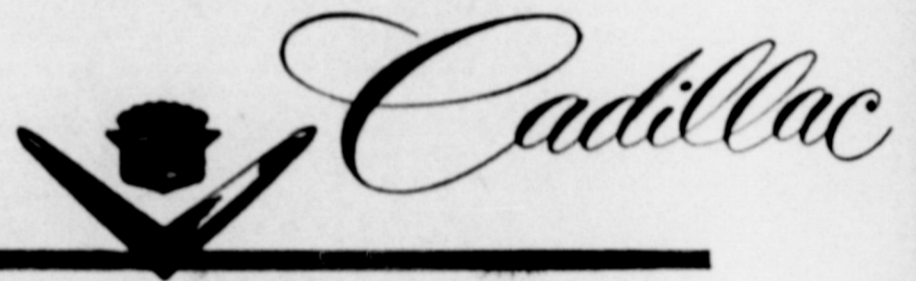
