It is expected to pass the bill, and it is not known whether the President will sign it; likely he will not. If he vetoes it, there is still a two-thirds support of both houses, which will be necessary to overcome the Presidential veto.

pitiful thought that the Supreme Court has reached that point of decline where its highest authority is thought that public policy is more important than written laws. Public policy is a nebulous thing, a mere concept, an ideal. At the other end of the scale is confusion and conflict. A written agreement is a solid, real thing. And breaking of all written agreements, however it may hurt, is in the best policy.

Supreme Court is not God. It is higher than all courts, and its decrees are above all laws and all judges. Some are of the opinion that in these times of danger the need of national defense should be the paramount consideration and that the government should grab the tidelands for the army and navy. An argument sounds more plausible and Stalin-like than the doctrine. If the army and navy need tidelands oil, let them take it from the rightful owners. It gives her sons to the defense, and, if necessary, she will give her oil. But let it be peacefully. Some, business, friendship and social order all rest on the gentleman's agreement. If these are not honored as they are, they are headed back to the law of tooth and claw.

## Fire Marshals' Training School To Be Held Here

### Marshals, Chiefs from Five Towns to Join Class Aug. 20-29

Fire chiefs and fire marshals from four surrounding towns will join with these officials of the Ozona Fire Department in a fire marshals' training school to be held at the Ozona fire station the last two weeks in August.

Plans for the training school were announced in a letter received this week by the Ozona department from H. R. Brayton, director, Fireman's Training School of the A & M College Engineering Extension Service.

The school sessions will be held evenings on an every-other-day basis, session dates being announced as August 20, 22, 24, 27 and 29, starting at 7:30 p.m. Fire Departments from Big Lake, Eldorado, Rankin and Sonora have been invited to participate in the school.

The school will be under the direction of A. J. (Joe) Fogaley, field instructor of the A & M Firemen's Training School.

"While this is primarily for fire marshals," Mr. Brayton wrote, "feel free to invite in other who may assist in inspections or are active in local fire prevention. While Mr. Fogaley is in your area, he will visit other towns, and feel free to make good use of him with public schools, civic clubs, business groups, etc."

"The Training School has just one object in starting this type of training and that is to be of service to the various communities in their efforts to reduce loss of life and property from fires which can be prevented. Mr. Fogaley is available to assist you in planning and presentation of fire prevention program before any of your local groups and organizations."

## 'Wonderful Trip' Reported By 16 Tired 4-H Boys

### 4,050 Miles Covered In Bus Tour of Northwest

A group of sixteen Crockett County 4-H Club boys returned to Ozona Monday afternoon after a 4,000-mile trip through the northwestern states in a school bus, a trip made possible by funds realized from sale of a watch donated by Nathan's of San Angelo and contributions from interested local citizens.

The boys reported a "wonderful trip" which took them as far as Salt Lake City and Cheyenne, Wyo., camping in the open at night and getting their meals in cafes. Accompanying the group were County Agent Paul Newton and Frankie Jones.

Boys making the tour included Charles and Gail Garlitz, Jimmy McMullan, Ronnie McMullan, Joe McMullan, Carl Conklin, Wilburn Conklin, Mike Clayton, John Lee Henderson, George Bunker, Jr., Erby Chandler, Charley Black, Tom Robison, Graham Childress, Brock Jones, Jr., and Jodie Jones.

The group left Ozona July 17, making their first stop at Carlsbad, N. M., where they visited the Carlsbad Caverns. The next night was spent in Albuquerque, N. M., and the following day they made the rim drive of the Painted Desert and into the Petrified Forest in Arizona on their way to the Grand Canyon. Two days were spent at the Grand Canyon, nine of the boys making the donkey ride to the bottom of the mammoth gorge.

Next stop was Kingman, Ariz., on the way to Boulder Dam, Las Vegas, Nev., was visited for a peek at the gambling houses on the way to Cedar City, Utah, and Salt Lake City. From Salt Lake City, where the boys saw the Mormon Temple and took a swim in Salt Lake, the party headed for Yellowstone Park. The Ozonians camped near Old Faithful geyser in Yellowstone and made a complete loop of the park by Mammoth Hot Springs and out the east entrance to Cody, Wyo. Overnight camp was made at the Cody rodeo grounds and from there the group went to Cheyenne where they witnessed a part of the Frontier Days celebration. The boys and their sponsors attended the Frontier Days parade in downtown Cheyenne and then attended the afternoon performance of the rodeo.

The 4-H trippers returned to Ozona by way of Denver, Colorado Springs and Cripple Creek, Colo. At the latter town they toured the famous Mollie Kathleen Gordon gold mine at the thousand foot level. The mine was discovered in 1891 and is still an active producer, over nine million dollars worth of gold having been taken from the mine. The next camp was at Canyon City and a tour of the Royal Gorge.

Two contributions of \$50 each were received by the 4-H Club to help defray expenses of the summer trip shortly before the group left. They were from Joe North, who was out of the city on the day of the county sale last January, and George Bunker, Mr. Newton announced.

## Crockett Gets \$6,100 Additional In P. M. A. Funds

### Operators Who Failed to Share Original Fund Eligible

Crockett county has received an additional allotment of \$6,100 in soil and water conservation funds from the Production and Marketing Administration for the 1951 program along with other counties of the state. Announcement of the additional funds, amounting to approximately \$1,500,000 for the state of Texas, was made by B. E. Vance, state PMA committee chairman.

The additional money allotted to Crockett county brings the total for the year to \$93,100 in federal funds available to ranchmen of the county for range conservation practices approved by the county committee.

The original \$87,000 allocated to this county for 1951 has already been exhausted, except for a balance of \$7.50, according to Mrs. Basil Dunlap, ACA secretary for this county. Ranch operators in this county have already completed conservation practices for a total expenditure by the government of \$77,500, according to Mrs. Dunlap, with 10 operators not yet having completed their projects for the balance of \$7,500.

The PMA funds were distributed \$750 per ranch operator. Most of the money has gone for eliminating cedar and prickly pear from grazing lands, with a few water wells for better use of grazing lands and one pipeline for better stock watering facilities, Mrs. Dunlap reports.

The \$6,100 in additional funds allocated the county will be distributed on the same basis as the original allotment, the secretary announced. The funds will be made available to operators who first make application for prior approval and who are ready to begin work, she said. Operators who have already received the 1951 allotment of \$750 will not be eligible this year, Mrs. Dunlap said.

## Damage Suit Is Transferred To Rankin Court

### Half of Jury Panel Is Disqualified in Monday Hearing

On the court's own motion, Judge Garland Casebier ordered transferred to the 112th District Court at Rankin trial of the \$50,000 damage suit brought by Jack McIntosh, former superintendent of schools here, against T. A. Kincaid, Jr., ranchman and member of the schoolboard which asked for and received McIntosh's resignation last fall.

The court's action came at the end of a morning session of the court when attorneys for both sides had completed the examination of the jury panel of 37 men. Nineteen of the 37-man panel had been disqualified by the court at the end of questioning by Attorney Purcell of Big Spring, representing the plaintiff. Sharp questioning of a few members of the remaining group of jurors by Defense Attorney Carl Runge of San Angelo followed the opening round of examinations, and Judge Casebier then cleared the courtroom and after a conference with attorneys announced transfer of the case to Rankin.

Trial of the case has been set for August 16 in the Rankin court on agreement by both sides. Depositions by principal witnesses have already been taken and Judge Casebier offered other witnesses the opportunity to make depositions at a Monday afternoon session here to avoid the inconvenience of making the trip to Rankin. However, all members of the school board, subpoenaed as witnesses, and several other witnesses, volunteered to attend the Rankin trial.

C. B. Simmons and others of Dallas will drill two 1,600-footer San Andres wildcats in northeastern Crockett county, seven miles south of the Childrens pool.

Both will be on a farmout from Pure Oil Co. No. 1 Powell will be 330 feet from north and west lines of southeast quarter of section 39-GH-GC&SF; No. 1 Mrs. I. Jones 830 feet from north and east lines of section 77, block GH.

Southland Royalty Co. and others No. 1-8 Todd, Crockett county wildcat 4 1/2 miles southwest of Todd multipay field, was to drill plugs early in the week from 9 1/2-inch casing on bottom 2,204 feet in lime and anhydrite and deepen. The wildcat is 1,933.3 from south 660 feet from east line of section S-WX-GC&SF.

Continental No. 4 C. T. Harris, Lula field east, section 15-3-WCRR, was drilling at 552 feet in redbeds.

Crockett wildcats, Gulf No. 1 Bean was making hole at 5,878 feet in lime, Continental No. 3-A Shannon at 610 feet in redbeds.

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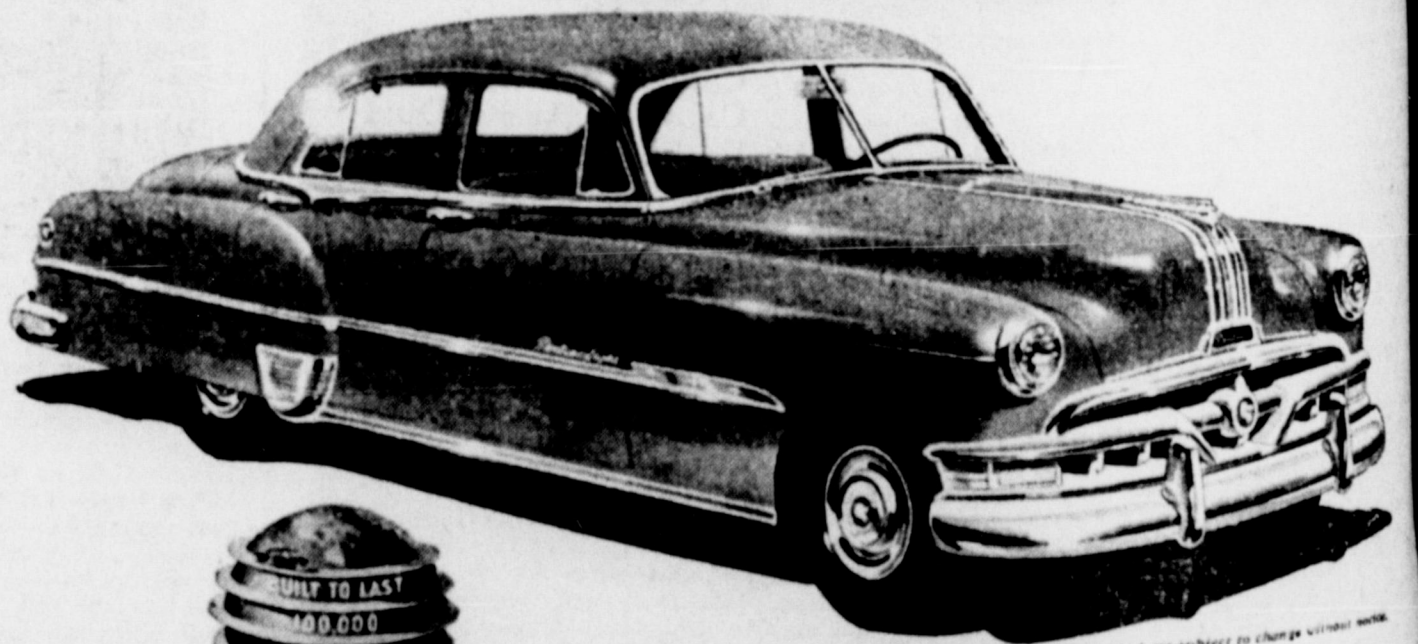

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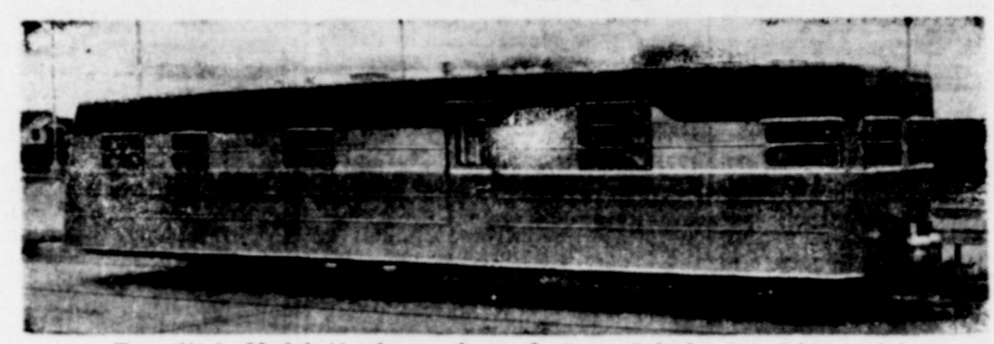

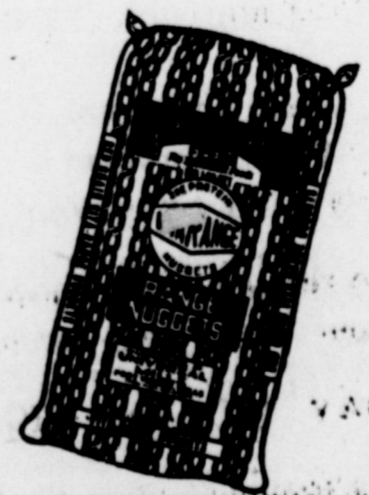

pulsory insurance law. He emphatically pointed out that the law will have no effect upon motor vehicle owners and operators until January 1st and declared that under no condition or circumstances will it compel motorists to carry automobile liability insurance.

According to Garrison, the new regulations bear no resemblance to a compulsory insurance law. He pointed further to the fact that only one state has such a law but that Texas became the 35th state to enact a security-type Safety Responsibility Law. It is true, according to Garrison that, beginning January 1st a motor vehicle owner or operator who is involved in an accident resulting in death or injury, or property damage exceeding \$100, must furnish proof of his ability to meet claims up to \$15,000 or have his motoring privileges suspended until he does. Proper insurance may be accepted as sufficient proof of such financial responsibility but the law also offers several other choices of furnishing such proof. Among these are the posting of a bond

with the Texas Department of Public Safety or the depositing of satisfactory security with the Department. Also, under certain conditions, individuals or firms may qualify as self-insurers under the terms of the law.

The alternatives will be clearly set forth by the Safety Department as a part of the education program beginning in November. All such information released by the State will be clearly identified as such, and it will be official, according to Garrison.

In calling upon the press and radio for assistance, Garrison stated: "I am asking the public-spirited newspapers and radio stations of Texas to cooperate with the Department of Public Safety, on behalf of the State, in a plan to give our people all the true facts. I am confident that they will do so. This educational program will begin November 1st, two months before the law becomes effective. In the meantime, I hope the people of Texas will not permit themselves to be misled again about this new law, which was enacted

for their greater safety and financial protection."

Texas' new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law.

Garrison emphasized that the State will conduct a thorough educational program in November and December to acquaint the public accurately and adequately with the purposes and requirements of the law which will become effective next January 1st.

At the same time, Director Garrison warned the public not to believe statements that the statute is now in effect or that it is a com-

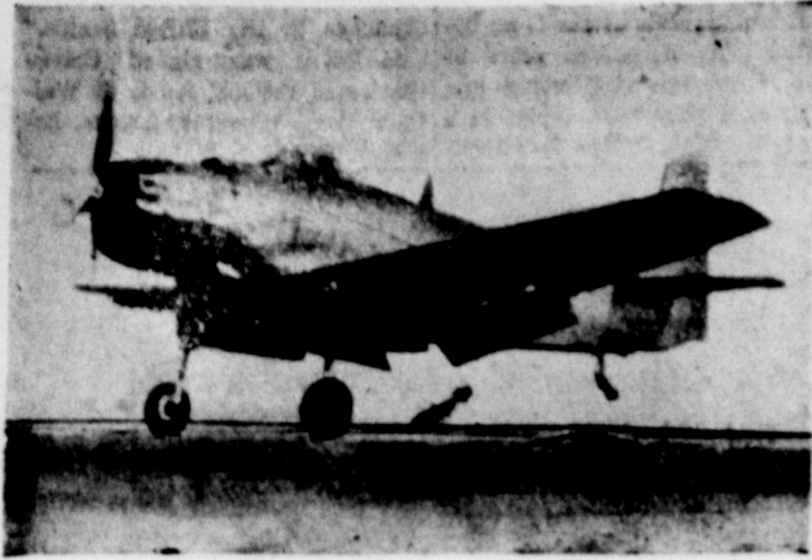

### Proposed Amendment Would Broaden U. of T. Investment Policies

AUSTIN. — Texas voters will determine in November whether the University of Texas and Texas A. & M. College can increase their income for operating expenses without increasing taxes, tuition fees or State appropriations. A constitutional amendment which will permit increased income without cost to the State will be one of those appearing on a statewide election ballot November 13. The amendment was submitted to the people by unanimous vote of the 52nd Legislature. The House approved it 129 to 0 and the Senate vote was 27 to 0.

Currently the Permanent University Fund can be invested only in certain bonds, which pay a relatively low winter rate. The interest income is divided approximately two-thirds to the University and one-third to Texas A. & M. for building construction and to pay their operating costs in part. If the amendment is approved, up to half of the Permanent University Fund can be invested in corporate stocks.

This will mean, according to an analysis by University Investment officials, that the investments of the fund will pay a substantially larger return. After a period of time, allowing for careful investment in high-grade securities which is required by the amendment, it is possible that income at present rates may be increased \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000 per year. As interest income increases the greater will be the help from this source. This will ease the demand upon the State General Revenue Fund for operating expenses of the University.

In the last year the rate of income from the investments, now limited to bonds, was only slightly in excess of 2 1/2 per cent. It has

been as high as 3 per cent in the years before the interest rate on bonds began a decline which now finds it at an historically low level. Add the declining interest rate from bonds to the fact that each dollar of such income now purchases only slightly more than half of what it would purchase before World War II and the desirability of increasing the income becomes apparent.

### Motley Ranchers See Success in Mesquite Control Measures

COLLEGE STATION. — Motley county ranchers sprayed over 14,000 acres of range land with ester of 2, 4, 5-T for mesquite control this year. County Agent J. R. Emmons

says, although it is too early to determine the results of the spraying, all reports indicate the results will be obtained. Spraying mesquite by ester of 2, 4, 5-T costs ranchers of Motley county about \$3.50 per acre. The cost to ranchers of Motley county was \$49,650. Statements made by ranchers regarding the spraying of mesquite are: "Just killing the weeds and the cost of spraying." "It is my cattle now, at the price of cattle, one calf can be lost from a cow's milk pay for spraying 10 acres. I think it was worth the cost. Emmons says between 10 and 45,000 acres are expected to be sprayed in Motley county this year — if weather and other conditions are favorable.
