Although outscored 26-0 by the fast running Pecos backs, the Lions were in possession of the ball most of the evening and the game was in no wise the one-sided affair the score might indicate. In fact the Lions made 15 first downs to 13 for the visitors, who had possession of the ball only seven times during the four quarters.

It was the fast running of the ace back, Son Langham, and King. which accounted for the four Pecos touchdowns. Langham reeled off one 70-yard and one 41-yard gallop for two touchdowns in the second quarters and scored another from 15 yards out in the third. King cleared the end for 12 yards and a marker. Langham kicked one extra point and Guiterrez the other.

Ozona came within a yard of a touchdown early in the game, but a penalty set them back and the ball went over on downs.

Natural Gas Installation To Begin Here at Once

Contract Let To Odessa Firm For Laying Pipe Lines

Contract has been let by the Empire Southern Gas Co. for laying a 4-inch gas line from the Clayton Ranch gas well 10 miles east of Ozona and for installing the distribution system in Ozona to provide local residents with natural gas, J. P. Kenney, vice president of the company, announ-

ced this morning. Contract for installing the system was awarded to M. L. (Jack) Moore of Odessa, the work to be completed in 60 working days. Pipe is now being moved from the gas company's warehouse yard in Big Spring to Ozona and work of ditching for the main line from the well to town is expected to begin early next week. Service is expected to be available in late

November or December. Mr. Kenney and J. C. Jagers, engineer for the company, were here today making final surveys for the installation of the distrimade to tear up as little of the

Many sections of Ozona were laid out in the early days and no alleys were provided, or were closed by buildings, fences, etc. In such cases. where the engineers find it more economical and where breaking pavement can be avoided, property owners will be asked to grant easements for the lines across

their property. Three sizes of mains will be installed in the distribution system, Mr. Kenney said. A four-inch line will bring the gas from the well to town and will continue into the city. From this line, three inch and two-inch lines will branch and one-inch service lines will go to homes and business houses. Pipe is to be stored on the coun

ty lot at the south edge of town where it will be wrapped and coated before installation. James Isbell, local manager for

the company at Big Spring, will move to Ozona about November 1 to become manager here, Mr. Kenney said. The company has not yet secured office and display room quarters. They plan to offer a full line of gas appliances.



Your 1951 county, state and school taxes are now due and payable.

Except for school taxes, the same discount schedule for prompt payment as in previous years will be in effect this year. The discount will not be allowed on school taxes, but on county and state portions of the total tax bill, a discount of 3 per cent will be allowed in October, 2 per cent in November and 1 per cent in December.

If you mail in your tax remittance, deduct the amount of allowable discount, taking only the county and state portion of your taxes for computing the deduction. No discount may be taken from your school tax or poll tax.

The Ozona Volnnteer Fire Department is asking the cooperation of every business owner and householder in the community in making a thorough Fire Prevention Clean-Up – to eliminate every apparent fire hazard and to keep constantly alert in the future to guard against the outbreak of fire. Such a clean-up will be of benefit to everybody.

Ozona now enjoys a 25 per cent good fire record credit on its insurance key rate. One costly fire could result in the withdrawal of this credit and the imposition of a penalty addition to fire insurance rates. This good fire record credit, plus other rate reductions brought about through the purchase of efficient fire fighting equipment, the organization of the Volunteer Fire Department, provision of water storage and other safeguards against fires, has resulted in an annual saving of approximately \$18,000 to property owners in Ozona in fire insurance premiums.

To say nothing of the tragedy of fire destruction, with its attendant danger to life and loss of property and personal treasures, this annual insurance saving is incentive enough for the people of Ozona to go allout in the current Fire Department sponsored cleanup. You owe it to yourself and to your neighbors to protect your property against fire in every possible way.

Trained members of the Volunteer Fire Department are currently engaged in making inspections of premises throughout the community. These inspectors, trained in recognizing hazards which might escape the attention of the average property owner, will recommend changes and corrections to eliminate such hazards and they deserve the cooperation of everybody in making immediate corrections in all such cases.

The forces of law can be brought to bear to force action on the part of those who refuse to eliminate apparent fire hazards, but the sponsors of this page feel that the public spirted men who compose the Volunteer Fire Department deserve the voluntary cooperation of every firm and individual in this campaign and for that reason have donated this space for making this appeal to the citizens of Ozona.

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
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
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
