School Trustee Election Slated Here Saturday

Names of 6 Candidates To Appear on Ballot For Dist. Trustees

Next Saturday is election day in Crockett county.

School trustee elections will be held to select four members of the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District board of trustees and three precinct representatives on the county board of trustees.

Claiming major attention will be the selection of the district trustees. Six candidates have announced for the four places to be filled on the board.

Names of the six candidates will appear on the ballot in the following order, determined by drawing: T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Royal Caswell, Brack Jones Nip D. Blackstone, H. Vernon Ratliff and Richard Flowers.

Kincaid, Jones and Ratliff are at present members of the board and are seeking re-election. A fourth member whose term expires this year, Beecher Montgomery, would not consent to become a candidate for re-election.

In the election for three members to serve on the county board, voters in precincts 2, 3 and 4 will draw a blank ballot on which they will be asked to write in the name of the person they favor from that precinct to sit on the county board. Terms of Charlie Black in Precinct 2, Jeff Owens in Precinct 3 and Peery Holmsley in Precinct 4 expire this year. Wayne West is a member from Precinct 1 and Hillery Phillips is trustee at large.

Judge Henry Russell Announces Candidacy For Appellate Court

A long-time West Texas lawyer and former district judge, Henry Russell of Pecos, this week announced his candidacy for the office of associate justice for the Court of Civil Appeals. The court is part of the Texas Eighth Supreme Judicial District and sits at El Paso. The present judge has announced he will not seek re-election.

Judge Russell came to West Texas following his military service in World War I. He was county attorney of Ward county in 1919 and served as district attorney for Martin, Midland, Ector, Winkler, Ward and Reeves counties in the late 1920's. Under a governor's appointment, Russell served out the unexpired term of William L. Kerr as judge of the 109th District of Texas. He was a member of a Midland law firm until 1921 when he moved to Pecos where he now resides and practices law.

Russell is a native Texan, fifty-eight years of age. He prepared himself for the practice of law by study in the office of his father, the late Judge Gordon Russell, who was United States District Judge in Beaumont. Russell is married and has three children. One son, Tommy, was killed last November while serving in the Navy aboard an aircraft carrier in Korean waters.

Engaged as he is in a judicial race, Judge Russell declined in his announcement to make a statement as to matters he would hope to accomplish if he is elected. Instead, he has simply said that if elected, he would serve in the best manner possible, attempting at all times to recognize established rules of law in determining law questions submitted to him for decision.

Hotel Ozona Sold To San Antonio Man; Takes Charge May 1

Jack Holt, owner and operator of the Hotel Ozona here since June, 1945, this week announced sale of the hostelry to J. Paul Blakeley of San Antonio, ranchman and hotel man.

Mr. Blakeley owns ranching interests in the San Antonio area and also owns a hotel in Fort Stockton. Purchase price for the local hotel was \$70,000.

Mr. Blakeley will take charge of the property on May 1. A Mr. Roberts will be the local manager of the hotel, Mr. Holt said he had been informed.

Mr. and Mrs. Holt own the Silver Spur Ranch Motel here and will continue to operate this business. They have been living in an apartment built on the ground floor of the hotel and Mr. Holt says his immediate problem is to "find a place to live."

Big Lake Hunters Pay \$415 In Fines For Killing Deer

The three men, J. D. Walker, Jim Lohden and A. W. Willage, paid fines totalling \$415 in Justice of the Peace Bill Johnigan's court here Wednesday morning on charges of killing a deer during closed season, hunting at night, hunting with an artificial light and shooting from an automobile.

Walker and Willage, each charged on two counts, were fined a total of \$176, including costs, and Lohden paid a total of \$63 in fine and costs on one complaint.

Overcome by Monoxide Ozona Child Saved by Unknown Del Rio Man

From Del Rio News Herald — Nine-year-old Donald McCaleb owes his life to an unidentified man who knows the art of artificial respiration.

Firemen credited the unknown hero with saving Donald's life Saturday when he was overcome by carbon monoxide gas on the main Street of Del Rio.

Here is how Bill Zorn, one of the firemen who answered the call for aid puts it:

"We arrived at the scene shortly after the call came to the station. When we arrived the man had already brought the boy around. Mr. and Mrs. Lowell McCaleb of Ozona, the boys parents, said he, Donald, stepped out of the car and fainted. One of his older sisters, who was riding with Donald in the back seat, had complained of illness earlier.

"We investigated and found the gas to have come from a faulty tail pipe. When we remembered the man who had applied artificial respiration to Donald, he had disappeared."

Donald recovered fully from the ordeal but he and his parents would still like to meet the man who saved his life.

Mrs. Boyd travelled from the U. S. to the Philippines, along with other families of U. S. armed forces personnel also stationed in the Islands, aboard the USNS General C. G. Morton.

Sergeant Boyd, who has been stationed on the Philippine base for the past three months, is assigned to the 6200th Supply Squadron of Philippines Comand (Air Force) and Thirteenth Air Force. In the military service since 1935, he served his first foreign assignment in the European theatre of operations from October 1945 through November 1945.

The Boyds are now living in the housing area for military dependents on Clark AFB. Sergeant Boyd's mother is Mrs. J. E. Boyd of Barnhart, Texas.

Location will be 1,310 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of section 7-32-University, on a 960-acre lease, 13 miles west of Ozona.

T. P. Spots 10,000 Foot Wildcat In Western Crockett

Deep Test Planned on Austin Millspaugh Pecos Ranch

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Co. will drill a 10,000-foot wildcat, its No. 1-A H. L. Bair, in central-west Crockett county. It will be on the Pecos river ranch of Austin Millspaugh.

The project will be 5,940 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 43-1-1&GN, 4 1/4 miles southeast of Sheffield and 3,400 feet north of the Crockett-Terrill county line, which is the Pecos river.

It will be 6 1/2 miles southeast of Forest & Southern Minerals No. 1 Monroe, dry hole abandoned Feb. 1, 1850, at total depth of 8,884 feet after having topped the silurian at 7,786 feet on elevation of 2,218 feet. It will also be 8 1/2 miles south and slightly west of Wolfcamp production in the Clara Couch multipay field.

Youth Recreation Program Planned Here For Summer

Little League Plans Perfected; Tennis Courts, Gym Open

A youth recreation summer program, with an active Little League slate occupying boys ages 8 through 12, tennis and gymnasium games and programs and possibly other sports, is in the making for Ozona this summer under sponsorship of the Ozona Lions Club and other interested organizations and individuals.

The Lions Club announced this week that at least four teams will be sponsored in the local Little League organization. Sponsors have already been secured for three teams and a fourth was expected to take on a team before the end of this week.

The Ozona Little League has been affiliated with the national Little League organization and will follow the Little League rules of play.

Application blanks will be available next week for all boys in the age group from 8 through 12 who are asked to sign up for participation in Little League play. A delegation from the San Angelo Little League will be in Ozona next week to confer with local team managers and sponsors and to assist in getting the program under way here. Regular uniforms will be ordered, with the sponsor's name on the backs of shirts and necessary team equipment will be purchased.

Plans are now under way for employment of a full time recreation director for the summer. The local schools are cooperating in this endeavor, the school board recently agreeing to pay \$250 toward the salary of such a director and to provide rent-free living quarters in one of the teacher housing units for the summer.

In addition to Little League baseball, the program will include softball, tennis, basketball, and possibly tumbling, gymnastics and other activities which can be carried on in the gymnasium. These facilities, the school tennis courts and the gymnasium will be open for such use, school officials have indicated.

Considerable agitation is being heard to add to these recreational facilities a swimming pool, one of Ozona's greatest needs. Such a facility, advocates point out, could be of use to both old and young and could be a worthwhile addition to any recreational program, making possible life saving courses, swimming lessons, swimming and diving meets, water pageants, and the like. Also being advocated in various organizations and among individuals is a community center, for public gatherings, for use of youth parties, play sessions or just loafing.

Realization of the swimming pool goal or the community center, however, will depend upon prompt action by civic minded groups in launching a petition for a bond election to bring about their construction, for use this year, if possible, but if not, for use in all the years to come.

High School to Be Dismissed at Noon Fri. For District Mee

All Ozona High School students will be dismissed from classes at noon Friday because of the District Interscholastic League meet of literary events in Menard Friday afternoon and night, Supt. Lem Bray announced this week.

A number of students of the local school will participate in the literary events Friday in Menard and also in the track and field events scheduled for Saturday in Junction. Because of this participation and the desire of a number of other students to attend the meets, and the fact that a number of local teachers will participate as judges and sponsors, the afternoon dismissal was ordered.

All other schools will hold classes as usual.

Here and There

back" employment as a form of harboring. However, a provision was added before the final passage of the Act to the effect that mere employment does not constitute harboring, provided such employment consists only of "the usual and normal practices incident to employment."

The meaning of this Act to ranchmen employing wetback labor will depend upon the interpretation given to certain key words. And since the definitions of the key words are not written into the Act, the interpretations will have to be built up through a series of judicial decisions which will result when individuals are tried in the courts for alleged violations of the Act. In the meantime, immigration officials and federal district attorneys will put upon the key words of the Act those tentative administrative interpretations which will best help them to apprehend and prosecute

alleged violators. Until the courts decide which interpretation applies in each situation and a body of accepted precedent is built up, no one will know just what the Act does mean. As the old saying goes, "The law is what the court says it is."

We might take a brief glance at a few supposedly "key words," realizing that no one really knows yet just what any of them may really mean.

First, it seems clear that the Act applies to any or all kinds of aliens, and not just the "wetback."

Second, transportation includes moving aliens by land, sea, or air, by any sort of vehicle or conveyance, "or otherwise." If a person were to induce or attempt to induce an alien to enter the U. S. A. by walking on foot, apparently that would be punishable under this Act.

Third, to transport or move, or attempt to transport or move "within the United States," seems to make it illegal to move an alien from one point to another within this country. Would this apply where a ranchman moves a wetback from one part of his ranch to another part of the same ranch? This moving or transporting, however, would seem to be illegal only if the ranchman knows that the wetback "is in the United States in violation of law, and knowing or having reasonable grounds to believe that his last entry into the United States occurred less than three years prior thereto . . ." What does "having reasonable grounds to believe" mean? And what if "his last entry into the United States" occurred more than three years ago? The answer to the latter question may possibly be found in other parts of the various Immigration Acts.

Fourth, no one can say just now what specific actions will be deemed to constitute "concealment," or "harboring." The only clear thing is that the ordinary employment of a wetback apparently does not of itself constitute "harboring." But if a wetback is camped in a canyon at the back side of a pasture, because his work is near this location, what then? If an immi-

gration official comes on a ranch and asks the ranchman, "Do you have any wetbacks employed here?" and the ranchman does not answer the question either way, would the failure to answer be "concealment," or would the law follow the general rule in courtroom procedure that one can not be made to testify against himself?

Fifth, what does it mean to "encourage or induce, or attempt to encourage or induce" mean? Would good treatment and fair wages given on some prior occasion constitute "inducement," or would inducement involve specific spoken offers or promises?

Sixth, what about the twenty-five mile law? The new Act says, ". . . within a distance of twenty-five miles from any such external boundary (the immigration officials shall) have access to private lands, but not dwellings, for the purpose of patrolling the border . . . etc." In our locality the 25-mile zone would presumably be measured at any given place from the nearest point of the river. "Dwellings" seem to be exempted from this access. Would that include houses occupied by the wetbacks, or only the ranchman's house. Would it also include a barn or tent occupied by such laborers?

Seventh, although the purpose of the 25-mile provision is apparently to give immigration officials a more free access to a strip along the border, the law does not say if entry warrants are required or how they are to be obtained. Perhaps this question may be answered in other parts of the total mass of immigration legislation.

Suppose that immigration officials, while operating within the 25-mile zone, came to a ranch boundary fence whose gates were all locked? What procedure would be followed in gaining legal entry?

Suppose that a part of the ranch was inside the 25-mile zone and the rest of the same ranch was outside the zone? Assuming that the aliens being sought were quartered on the part of the ranch not in the 25-mile zone, what procedure could the officials legally follow in searching the territory outside the zone?

The answers to these questions are presently unknown. It seems reasonable to believe that the immigration men will begin with assumptions favorable to the performance of their duties, and begin to arrest alleged violators accordingly. When such cases come up for judicial decision, we will then begin to know what the law

really means. Meanwhile, each man will have to do his own guessing.

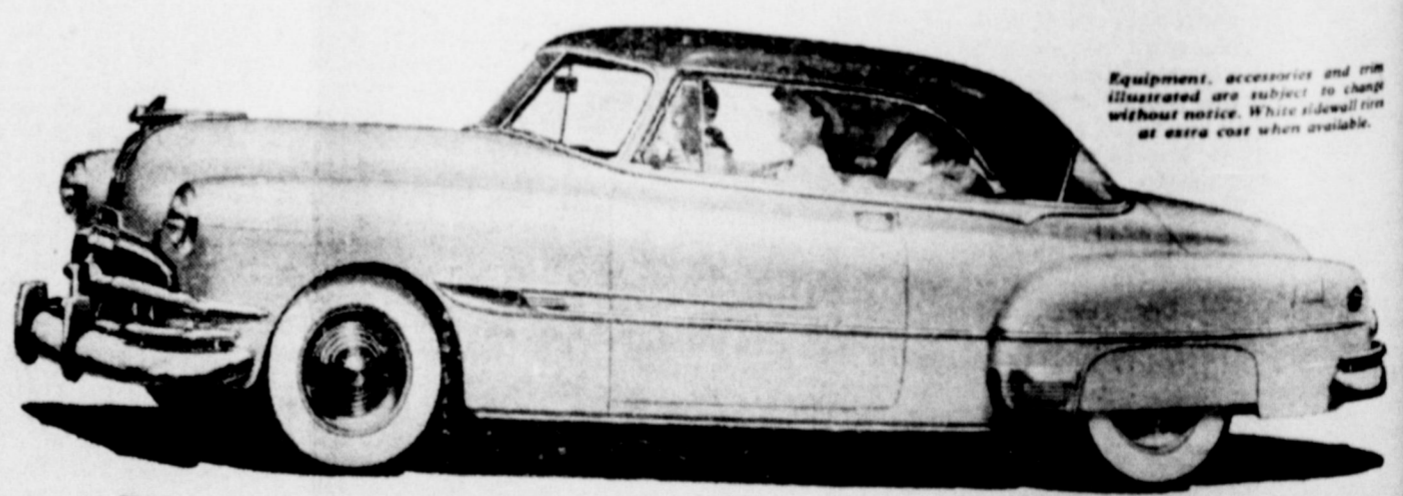

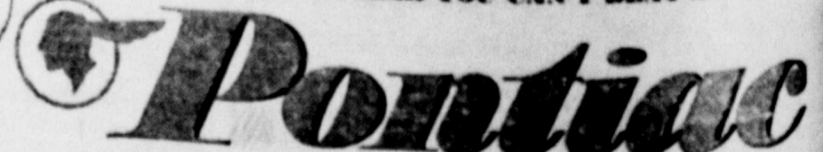



doesn't take a genius to think of interesting things to say.

Social letters should express "you," and your personality should be on that very paper. Just let yourself go and say everything that you would if the person was with you. If you have a habit of saying, "Well, Pinky Louise," put it down. It will make your receiver enjoy that letter more; and try not to write just words — be sure you say something. Avoid making your letter all "I's" and ask him some questions about himself. Try to be original in your letters.

In salutations, avoid "mushy" lines. In closing use "Always," "All my love," or "Sincerely." Love letters may sound good when you are writing them, but if you write mash notes or gooey sayings in a letter you might feel terribly silly if your letters were read in public ten years later. If you do write this type letters, keep them and read them again the next day, just to be sure you still want to send them. You may find that you want to throw them away. And boys, don't show around any letters written to you by girls.

Are "Dearest, darling, my life's light."

Suppose that in five years or ten

He reads your notes about — what then?

If you are going steady, that shouldn't stop you from writing to people of the opposite sex, but don't write anything you wouldn't want to show your steady.

Never write a letter when you are angry. You may say things you would regret later. Don't write stupid things in your letters. If you want people to laugh, make them laugh with your letters, not at them. Never quote gossip or rumors that would hurt someone and never write off-color jokes.

When writing a business letter, make it brief, concise and clear. White stationery is best for business letters. A social letter written on lined paper is not too bad, but a business letter on lined paper is POISON. When writing a corporation, say "Gentlemen" and if it is to an individual, use "Dear

Sir" or "Madam."

Follow these simple rules of letter writing and you'll be sure to acquire more friends. One last warning, though, about those social letters . . . Don't let your heart run away with your pen.

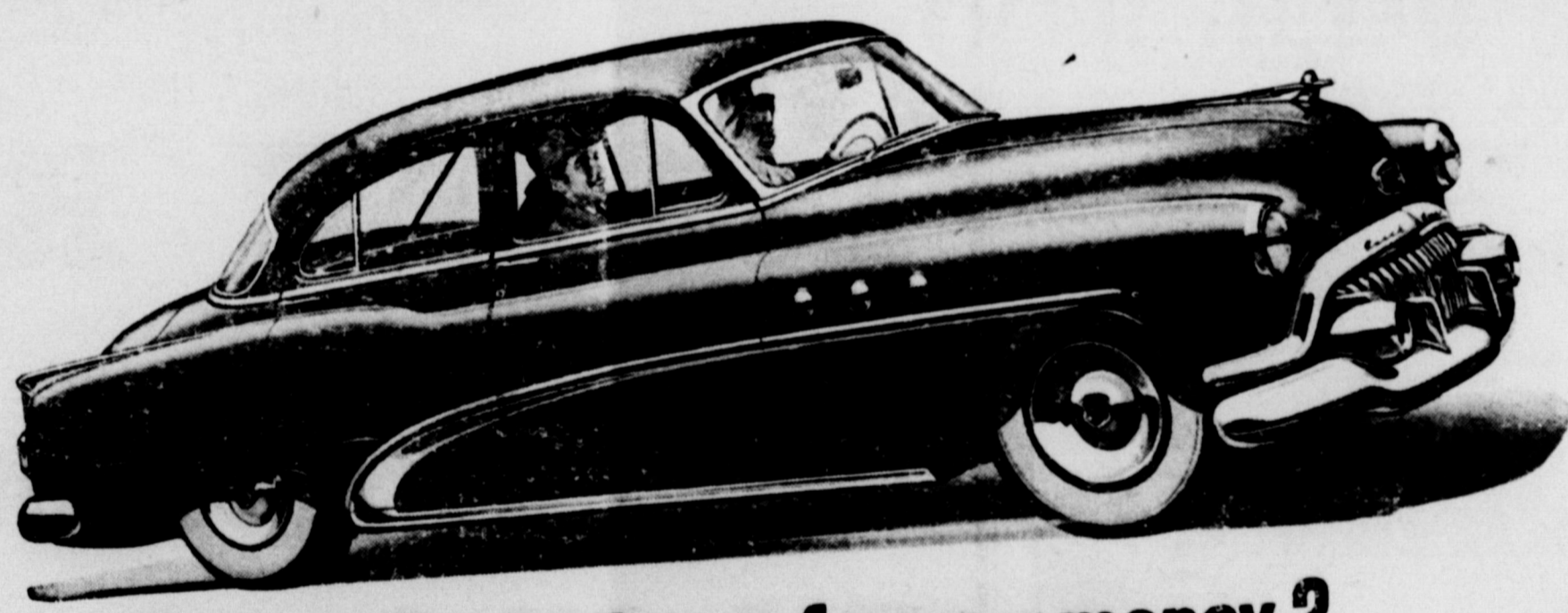
