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

Permian oil has been logged in Magnolia Petrolium Co. No. 1 W. G. Montgomery Crockett county wildcat located C NW NW 6-J-GC&SF.

At total depth of 3,377 feet, the project was fractured between 3,-300-3,377 feet with 3,000 gallons. It flowed out the load in 11 hours, then swabbeed 31 barrels of new 35.6 gravity oil plus six per cent salt water in 13 hours.

Magnolia No. 1 Henderson, Crockett wildcat, drilled out to 6,-651feet, then perforated between 6,580-6,620 feet and swabbed 27 barrels of load oil in five hours.

It then acidized with 500 gallons and swabbed 27 barrels of load oil in 75 minutes. It was running electric log surveys.




