New York Papers Praise New Dance Act Of Ozonan's Brother

New York papers were extravagant in praise of the initial appearance of Bambi Linn and Rod Alexander, a dancing team, as a feature of the floor show in the Persian Room of the Plaza Hotel in New York.

Mr. Alexander, described by one critic as "an excellent dancer, an outstanding partner and a most promising choreographer," is a brother of Mrs. Vernon Ratliff of Ozona. Bambi Linn is Mr. Alexander's wife, the two having visited the Ratliffs here occasionally in recent years.

"Light and fleet is the dancing of Bambi Linn and Rod Alexander," said the New York Herald Tribune critic of the Persian Room debut of the young dancers. "A naturalness, smiling and sweet, also distinguishes the performing of this pair who are presently engaged in bringing dance of a high technical order and of an emotionally appealing quality to the floor show in the Hotel Plaza's Persian Room. I would never have guessed that something of the freshness of springtime could be re-created in a supper club, yet Miss Linn and Mr. Alexander seem to do just that in their dances."

The New York Times critic devoted a full column of space to the new dancing team. "Their conquest of their professional world was clinched a couple of weeks ago by their debut at the Plaza in an act of their own, when they were hailed in terms of the trade as 'socko,' which is not bad in plain English."

"The show opened with Bambi Linn and Rod Alexander, a couple of clean-cut, lively, good-look-

ing kids, who duplicated their successes of around the country," began the review in The Billboard. Dorothy Kilgallen in "The Voice of Broadway," hailed the dancing couple "Bambi Linn and Rod Alexander, the delightfully fresh dance team at the Persian Room." The couple soon will appear in a Saturday night television show, "Show of Shows," produced in New York.

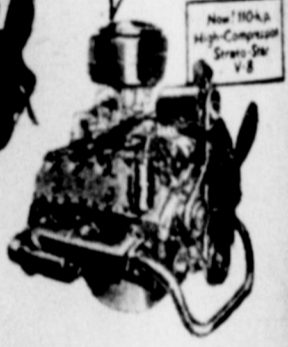

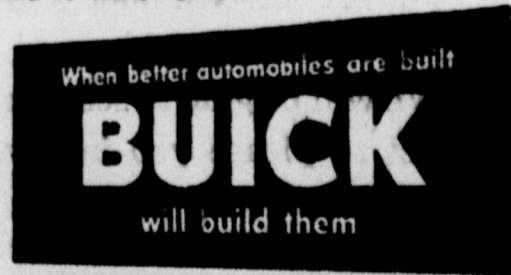

States will harvest the biggest crop of top baseball players that any country ever had.

One of the criticisms most often heard about this splendid community is that Ozona does not have enough for the young people to do in the summers. Immediately north of Ozona. The program was sponsored jointly by Texas A&M, Texas Flying Engineers, and the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

The other featured speaker on the program was Dr. Stuart I. Sperry, poison plant specialist at Texas A&M.

Dr. Sperry commented that mesquite spraying done so far in the area is still in early stages of growth. Poor kills usually result from spraying when the range is dry or when the plants are well grown and have built up a resistance to herbicides.

Most ranchmen who have sprayed bitterweed in West Texas so far have not used enough chemical, Dr. Sperry went on. It usually takes at least a pound per acre and often more to get a good kill. In one or two cases the use of too small an amount of herbicide has actually helped bitterweed grow more vigorously.

To demonstrate the methods used in chemical mesquite control, a Serman plane piloted by George Tomlin of Waco and owned by Zigler System of Texas sprayed 100 acres of mesquite early in the day.

Some visitors also looked at an area which was sprayed May 27. They did not see much, however. The brush has not had time to show much effect.

Marine stated an all-out attack. Lead replied, "Sure! They've got to get a whole lot more stuff than they've got now to run us out." Lead explained that the Communists are for the most part poorly armed. "There'll be five men waiting for one man with a rifle to get killed so they can get the gun and start shooting," he declared.

And the Communies sometimes use poor judgment in making use of what weapons they have, he said. He cited as an example the capture of an Communist position where 75 Russian-made machine guns had been concentrated in one place. American artillerymen are usually accurate with their fire with certain weapons, he said, but machine gunners often over our own time cause more casualties than the Communist attacks, he declared.

Patrolling across is something like searching for wild animals in the African jungle in pitch dark. Lead said. The enemy will emerge from a hole not much bigger than his head and attack with knives in the dark, always packing the last man in the patrol for the initial attack, he said. "They are born with knives in their hands," he opined.

Indicating that a year of it just about satiated his desire to fight the young Marine said ruefully. "I don't want to hear that command again. 'Ready, boys, we shove off at 1 a.m.' That's when you start shaking and doing a little praying."

Decency and Honor In Govt. Is Issue, Says Price Daniel

WACO. — Attorney General Price Daniel made restoration of "decency, integrity and honor to the halls of our government" a number one issue as he opened his bid for an "overwhelming victory" in the U. S. Senate race here Thursday night.

Speaking from the McLennan county courthouse lawn in Waco, where he attended Baylor Uni-

versity 20 years ago, Daniel declared:

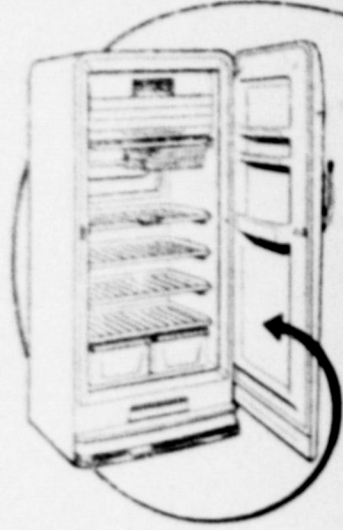
"We must get our country back to God and our government back to the people."

He laid out a specific, point-by-point program to fill what he described as "these two basic needs of America today."

Daniel, who has led the state's fight against federal seizure of the tidelands, sharply rebuked President Truman for his veto of the legislation restoring the tidelands to Texas saying that the President has "demonstrated that

he does not know what the tidelands controversy is all about. The seizure of the tidelands will go down as the blackest page in the history of centralization and lack of individuality," Daniel declared. Daniel pledged to continue his fight for Congress to take veto and said he would seek recognition by Congress in terms of the Amendment by which Texas joined the Union.

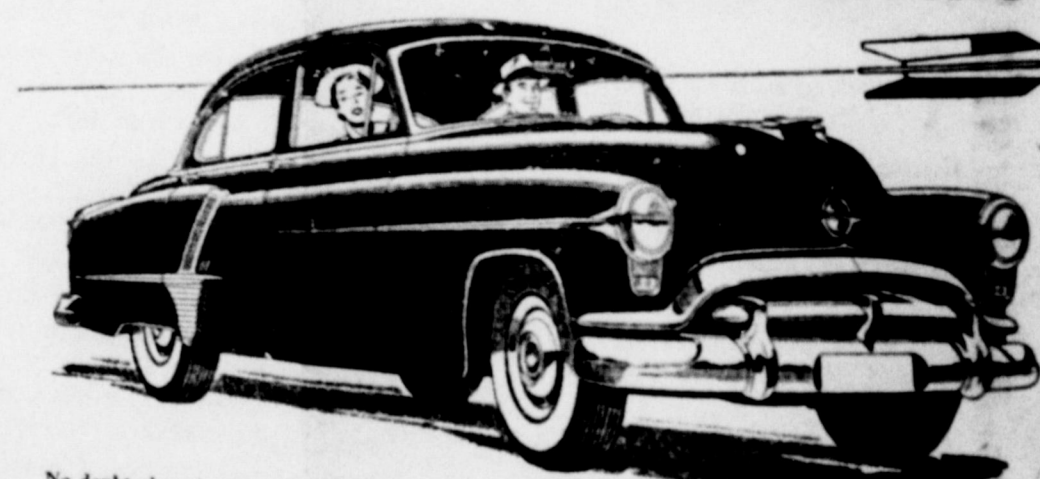
