He estiamted that up to 200,000 acres of West Texas and Rolling Plains mesquite land may be sprayed this summer but said the results are likely to be disappointing. Ranges are generally too dry, he pointed out.

For chemicals to do their best, he said, mesquites should have abundant foliage. The leaves catch the spray and convey it down to the roots. If there are not enough leaves, too little chemical is absorbed by the mesquite.

Few areas of West Texas boast abundant foliage on mesquites rains.






