\$200,000 Road **Bond Election** Set For Aug. 16

Roads in Oil Field Area Contemplated From Issue

Qualified property taxpaying voters of Crockett county will be called upon to decide whether or not \$200,000 in bonds of this county are to be issued for the purpose of building approximately nine miles of paved county roads, providing right-of-way and fencing on 171/2 miles of state constructed farm-to-market road and applying a seal coat on all paved streets in

Responding to a petition bearing 104 names of qualified voters requesting the court to call the bond election, the Commissioners Court in regular session Monday morning ordered the election to be held on Saturday, August 16, at all voting places throughout the county.

If approved, the bonds will be issued for a period not to exceed 10 years and bear interest at a 10 years and bear interest at a rate not to exceed 3 per cent per annum and "maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed 10 years from date." The election order and proposition to be submitted to the voters provides for a decision on whether or not the bonds shall be issued and ad valorem tax levied interest and principal payments. interest and principal payments to pay interest and principal payments as thye become due.



> Buffel grass (pennisetum cilare) originated in South Africa, Described as a perennial, warm season, bunch grass, it is used for the revegetation of fields and pastures. It is known that the vitality of the seel is good for at least three years under South Texas conditions.

It is adapted to soils ranging from heavy clays to deep sandy soils. Buffel grass will not withstand long periods of zero weather. The palatability of buffel grass is high in that livestock eat

The protein content of buffel grass usually tests around 16% in mature plants while young plants have tested as high as 229 protein in the boot stage. As a hay crop it has yielded 2 to 4 tons per acre on fertile irrigated soils.

Buffel grass has a wide range in its moisture requirements ranging from 10 to 60 inches of rainfall per year. 

SHIVERS AGIN AUTO INSPECTION LAW; "SHALL CHANGE IT OR REPEAL IT" He Says By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His ide is to take the red tape and confusion out of the

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on

The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)


