



J. Frank Dobie **Begins Autobiography** In Southwest Review

dist University quarterly.

"A Plot of Earth" is the account of Dobie's boyhood on his father's ranch in Live Oak County, in the Brush Country of South Texas. There were deer and wild turkey on the ranch when he was a boy: he remembers his father riding in one day with a wild turkey, which he had roped on the prairie, tied to his saddle. Hogs were killed and hams cured by smoke from a corncob fire kept smoldering for days on the dirt floor of the smokehouse. The children made balloons from the bladdens by warming them slowly and gradually blowing air into them through the guill of a turkey feather.

Dobie moved with his parents to the near-by town of Beeville in 1906 and after that only returned to the ranch for summers. The land was sold in 1951, but Dobie says, "no matter who holds title to the ground, my roots into it. invisible and unmaterial, will be ineradicable. . . . 

AUSTIN --- Total February shipments of Texas livestock dropped 26 per cent below January and 13 per cent below February, 1952, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Declines from January included hogs (77 per cent), calves (58 per cent), sheep (45 per cent), and cattle (16 per cent). In the February, 1952-February, 1953 comparison, hog shipments receded 96 per cent, calves 5 per cent, and cattle 5 per cent. Sheep shipments were up 17 per cent.

Regiment ran up the Lone Star Flag. In 1883 the government bought a tract three miles square from Sam Maverick for \$60,000.

Ft. Clark came to be one of the best known and most essential units in the lines of frontier posts. The list of officers who served there includes the names of most of the military elite of that period. One building still standing is known as the Headquarters of General Robert E. Lee. During the Second World War a large group of neuro troops were trained at FL Clark. Shortly after V-J day the establishment was abandoned. It was bought by a Mr. Brown of Austin, who uses it as a guest ranch.

Although Brackettville has not grown to be large, it is a larger and prettier place than it appears to be from the highway. Hidden back in the hills and trees are some lovely modern homes. The business district is housed for the most part in stone building from the old days. Although the closing of the fort took an estimated onefourth from the peak population, the present citizens include many substantial and permanent ranch and business families who are progressive in every way. It is a town with a future.

Nestling under big oak trees back off the road are some very picturesque examples of frontier architecture, adobe and stone varieties. For many years the weekly newspaper has been published by a Mr. Price, who sets all his type by hand. When I visited him in his shop, he was working at the compositor's desk without any copy before him. He was composing and setting type in one operation.

Stands Packed for King and His Court Game with Local Team


