Soaking Rains Promise End To Prolonged Drouth Most Of County Gets Inch Or More In Slow Fall

The prolonged drouth may not etery at 4 o'clock Saturday afterprocess was definitely begun this finest fall parched West Texas has received in more than two years, soaked the tinder-dry range lands of most of Crockett county.

Falling slowly and intermittently, the rains have averaged better than an inch throughout the inches and more in some parts.

Beginning in the early hours Sunday, rains soaked a wide scope of the county to the west of Ozona in an all-day fall Sunday. Resuming Sunday night, the falling moisture moved eastward and Ozona received nearly an inch fall that night, and reports from the northern part of the county gave the moisture up to two inches in some sections. More rains fell slowly Monday and cloudy weather continued and scattered falls extended into Wednesday, adding nearly half inch in Ozona.

Voters Approve **Swim Pools Bonds** By 2 To 1 Margin \$85,000 Issue Voted To Build Two Pools For Ozona

NUMBER 49

Taxpaying voters of Crockett county approved by a margin of more than two to one the proposal to issue \$85,000 in bonds for the purpose of building two swimming pools in Ozona in the countywide election held last Saturday. The vote was 236 in favor and 111 opposed.

The issue won approval by approximately three to one in the four voting places in the town of Ozona which accounted for all but 56 of the votes cast. The vote in the four town boxes showed 217 voters favoring the issue with 73 opposed.

Two out-of-town boxes went solidly against the proposition, the Powell Field box in far northcentral Crockett casting 14 votes against to none for. The Owens Ranch box cast 7 against and none for. The only other box voting against was the Millspaugh Ranch box, 3 for and 10 against. The Midway Lane favored the bond issue 7 to 5. There were no votes cast at either the Todd Field box or at the W.T.U. Pecos Power Plant.
