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

Oct. Collection Brings In 90% Of 1953 Taxes

\$652,452.20 Poured In To County, State and **School Coffers**

October tax collections in Crockett county brought nearly 90 percent of the total assessed state. county and school taxes into the county's treasury for distribution among the three taxing divisions.

Overall collections averaged 89.7 percent during the opening month of the four-months taxpaying period, a report from the office of Sheriff V. O. Earnest shows. The collection represented \$662,344.89 of the county's total assessed tax bill of \$737,811.25 for county, state and school purposes.

Actual money collection was \$652,452.20, the net after allowing a 3 percent discount on state and county taxes paid during the month of October .A very small part of this total represents delinquent collections.
