



It flowed 37.5 gravity oil, cut two-tenths of 1 per cent with mud, at the rate of 86.3 barrels hourly Flowing pressure was 2,525 pounds; 15-minute shut-in pressure, 2,625 pounds. Operator reversed out a full string of oil.

On a 46-minute test between 5,974-94 feet, gas surfaced in 21/4 minutes, mud in 41/2 minutes, oil in 51/2 minutes. The project flowed oil steadily until the end of the test at the rate of 91.2 barrels

He alone will save his nation and maybe the world from the menace of Communism. This is where his tremendous and tenacious energy comes from. He is a dedicated man. Such men are more dangerous than the everyday kind. For they hold that the end justifies the means, and they will stop at nothing to gain that end.

A curious fact about Joe's crusade against Communists in the American government is that his motivation and methods - indeed. his personality - are very like those of the Communists themselves. He has the same ruthless revolutionary flavor, the same disregard for the rights of another human being.

To be strictly accurate, I suppose one would have to classify Joe as a Fascist. He is more the Mussolini type. However one may dread the very idea of a Communist-dominated world, he can but wonder whether a Fascist world would be any better. Joe is trying to save us out of the frying pan into the fire. Many people sense this. And in this instinctive and typically American reaction Joe and all like him will inevitably

meet their political ends. The McCarthy-Army controversy served no purpose except to convince many people who followed it on the radio that neither side could be trusted and that the level of integrity in government is very low. It posed an embarassing issue for all the senators, so it has now been swept under the rug, at least until after the next elec-
