HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas—Texas is moving clean up its insurance "mess". A study of reform proposals has been scheduled by the Texas Legislative Council, with a special committee of legislators in charge of the project. Other state agencies will participate.

W. Worthy, executive director of the council, said that Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey has written to all insurance companies operating in Texas, asking for their co-operation in the study. Sixty insurance companies have responded in Texas since 1939, Worthy said. The council will look at the records of these companies to see if they went bankrupt.

Another aspect of the council's study will be to examine Texas' insurance laws and recommend changes "to assure a sound and profitable insurance industry."

Good Business

John R. Stockton of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research says that a trade recession is over and recovery has begun.

Business activity rose two per cent from March to April in Texas, Stockton found, representing a recovery of approximately half the decline from January, 1953, to January, 1954.

The finding indicates, Dr. Stockton said, "that the decline in business which has been under way since the spring of 1953, is approaching an end."

Lots of Roads

Construction program for 1955, costing about \$211 million, was announced by the state highway commission. It was the largest program ever approved in Texas.

Involved is the construction of 10,000 miles of roads, but, said commission chairman E. H. Thornburg, Jr., "it can only eliminate a small per cent of the critical deficiencies of the (highway) system."

About \$43 million of the money is for highways within cities. Some of the worst bridges will be repaired or replaced.

Political Scene

State political campaigns opened with principal interest in the governor's race.

Here, the contenders are incumbent Allan Shivers; Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney; and J. Lee Holmes, Austin contractor. Yarborough opened up with a speech in which he talked about the need for integrity in state government and a sound program for the advancement of Texas.

Meanwhile, Austin political observers heard reports from the Grande Valley that national leaders are going all-out in an effort to defeat Shivers. These reports said that the CIO has put \$50,000 to finance Yarborough's campaign and already has 300 paid workers in the field campaigning against Shivers.

Shivers, who is beginning to slip his pace in the race, says he is not mad at anybody. I just want to be Governor of Texas."

Shivers' Race

Shivers, returning from Korea, said that the thing for Texans is to keep our government at home and not turn it over to outsiders.

In a press conference, the governor said he expected some opposition from Democrats who supported Adlai Stevenson last time.

Shivers pointed out that he led the fight for Eisenhower because a republican nominee saw eye-to-eye with him on the tidelands, whereas Stevenson thought the tidelands ought to belong to the federal government.

On the return of the tide-lands to Texas a year ago, Shivers said this state has collected from about \$32 million in mineral taxes, and this money goes to the school fund.

Deep Wildcat In Tippett Area Is Spotted By Gulf

Shallow Test In Howard Draw Field Set By Deep Rock

Gulf Oil Corp. has filed application to drill a 7,500-foot wildcat one mile southwest of the Tippett (Wolfcamp) field in northeastern Crockett County, 11 miles southeast of McCamey. It will be the No. 1-E-J. B. Tippett.

Location is 330 feet from the northeast and southeast lines of the most southwesterly half of 38-31-R&TC.

The Tippett (Wolfcamp) field produces from pay at an average depth of 6,230 feet. The discovery well, Byrd-Frost 1 Tippett, was finished Nov. 4, 1947 for a daily potential of 1,391 barrels of oil. The project picked the following tops on elevation of 2,660 feet; Wolfcamp, 6,010 feet; Fusselman, 6,440 feet; and Ellenburger, 7,694 feet.

Deep Rock Oil Corp. of Wichita Falls has filed application to drill its 1-C University, 1/2-mile south of production, but separated by a depleted producer, in the two-well Howard Draw (Shallow) field of Crockett County, 17 miles northwest of Ozona.

The project will be drilled to 1,400 feet with rotary. Operations are to begin June 16.

Location, on a 160-acre tract, is 320 feet from the north and west lines of 35-30-University.

Bucking String Leased For Event; Many Entries Expected

Sponsor of Ozona's sixth annual All-Colored Rodeo, June 18 and 19, have leased a string of bucking horses in anticipation of a long list of entries in this featured event of the 1954 two-day show.

Ozona Roping Club officials announced this week that a string of top performing bucking horses had been leased from an owner in the San Angelo area. Prize money has been doubled for this year's bronc riding contest and information reaching headquarters here indicate a record number of entries in this event. Reports are that a large number of colored bronc riders from the South Texas area are planning to come and take a try at the West Texas horses.

But even with the addition of the pro-string, "Ole Juneteenth," the black devil from the Pecos country, as yet unconquered by any rider, white or black, holds top billing in the coming rodeo by and for the colored folk. "Juneteenth" got his rations of corn during the winter and now is grazing on lush green pastures in drought-relieved Crockett county. With another year of age and some added weight, this four-footed hellion should give the fans a rare show in the coming two-night exhibition.

Colored folk in Ozona have planned a big barbecue dinner for all local and visiting colored people at noon on June 19th. A big dance will climax the two-day show Saturday night, June 19, at the fairgrounds platform, with a six-piece orchestra from San Angelo engaged to furnish the music.

A professional colored announcer, his name not available this week, has been employed to announce the rodeo events. Roping Club officials have announced.

Highway Bridge Over Gurley On 163 Recommended

District Engineer Approves Bridge On Draw to South

A bridge over Gurley draw at the south edge of Ozona on Highway 163 has been recommended to the State Highway Commission after study by T. J. Kelly, district engineer for the Highway Department at San Angelo. County Judge Houston Smith announced this week.

The district engineer recently made a study of the project at the invitation of Judge Smith and announced that he would approve the project and recommend it for inclusion in emergency expenditures by the Department.

The short but often turbulent Gurley draw courses through the southeastern edge of Ozona and crosses Highway 163 in a narrow and deep cut at the south edge of town. When the draw is at flood stage, it not only is a traffic stopper on Highway 163 but is a real menace to safety of motorists who are not familiar with the locale. Several cars in the past have been driven off into the draw and occupants had narrow escapes from drowning.

Construction of a bridge over the draw, somehow not provided for in the original highway construction plan, may be included in Highway Department budgets for next year, the district engineer indicated. Building of a permanent highway bridge would solve a considerable problem for residents of the Latin-American sector of Ozona when the draw is flooded. There is at present no automobile crossing when the draw is running, a suspension foot bridge being the only means of negotiating the swollen draw.

Ellenburger Oil Flow Gauged At Humble Todd Test

East Extension To Production Indicated by Strike

Humble Oil & Refining Co. 1-4H Fee, Crockett County project 1 1/2 miles east and slightly south of Ellenburger production in the Todd field, 16 miles northwest of Ozona, flowed oil and gas on a drillstem test in the Ellenburger.

On a two-hour and 30-minute test between 6,920-45feet, gas surfaced in 19 1/2 minutes, mud in 36 minutes, oil in 38 minutes. On a two-hour flow through 1 by 3/4 inch choke, the project gauged 115 barrels of 36.5 corrected gravity oil and then reversed out 16 1/2 barrels of oil. Gas-oil ratio was 402.1

At midweek operators were reported preparing to run logs and casing for completion attempt after flowing oil on a second consecutive drillstem test in the Ellenburger.

On the 15 1/2-hour test between 6,944-70 feet, gas surfaced in six minutes, mud in 50 minutes, and oil in 139 minutes. The project flowed 7 1/2 hours through a 1-inch choke and made 277.59 barrels of fluid, which was 2 per cent water, 3 per cent basic sediment, the rest oil. Tubing pressure was 150 pounds. Mother Goose In Texas

I had a little pony, his name was Dapple Gray;

I lent him to a lady to ride a mile away;

She whipped him, she lashed him, she rode him through the mire.

I would not lend my pony now for all the lady's hire.

This rhyme, which has appeared in most of the Mother Goose books printed in this country, texts of which were copied from similar books printed in England, may have, indeed, inspired the following rhyme, often used as a "ride-a-cock-horse" rhyme for very young children:

I had a little pony his name was Dapple Gray;

I sent him to the barn to get himself some hay.

First he walked, Then he trotted, Then he loped, Then he galloped.

However books of Mother Goose rhymes were far from common in rural districts of this country even as late as 75 years ago. Yet long before that country kids were rhyming about their little ponies. One of the favorites being:

I had a little pony, his name was Jack;

I put him in the saddle and he jumped through a crack;

I picked up a cob and knocked him back;

Whoa, Jack!

New Poison Proves Bad News For Flies

College Station — Have you noticed how flies seem irresistibly drawn to a string hanging in a barn or other out-building?

Combining this tendency with a new kind of poison, Texas A. and M. College scientists are gaining excellent fly control—even over DDT-resistant strains.

The new poisons are organic phosphorus compounds which kill in much the same manner as DDT, although they are completely different, chemically. They gave up to 92 percent control for as much as seven weeks in recent tests.

Malathion, L-1359, diazinon, 21/199 — These are the new compounds. Some already have been approved for general use. Others are being tested.

Using malathion in amounts of five to 25 percent total weight, in a dried whey and water solution, Assistant Professor Manning Price of the college's Department of Entomology tested the string method in dairy barns. With short lengths of absorbent cotton string hung from a line of carpenter's cord, he planted the traps in handling areas and feed rooms, and obtained results mentioned earlier.

Where children and livestock will not be endangered, and in spots where it might be more effective, the poison is being mixed with a sugar bait and placed in shallow dishes or scattered on floors.

Organic phosphorus compounds attack the nervous system of the fly. They die of convulsions within 10 to 20 minutes. None have shown resistance in tests so far.

The kinds of steer calves at \$20 to \$22 readily, with \$23. Last week some 327-steer calves reached \$24 were consigned by Joy Lina of McCulloch County.

Monday some feeder steers pounds cashed at \$20. Stock find a rather quiet trade, observers agree this is large part to the scarcity cows in the runs that are largely of cut-back, culls and cows.

of the approaching Summer the good outlet for steers is considered by most interests on market. However, of great importance has been the steady demand for huge quantities of beef country.

steers, cows and bulls prices about in line with side of last week's close. Worth Monday Good and fed steers and yearlings \$18 to \$23, some \$11-lb. County yearlings at \$23. medium grassers drew \$17 while canner yearlings down to \$9 or below.

cows drew \$10 to \$13, a tier. Canners and cutters \$6 to \$10. Bulls sold at \$14. Good and choice fat cleared at \$16.50 to \$21, a move to the butcher trade. Common to medium butcher drew \$10 to \$15.50, and culls \$8 to \$10.

and lambs cleared at prices were unevenly steady on hands with the low close of previous week, except new

crop Spring lambs lost around \$1 per hundred.

Trade has been more quiet on stocker types of ewes as many potential buyers have been busy with farm work.

Good and choice Spring lambs topped at \$23 at Fort Worth Monday. Good to choice kinds sold from \$18 to \$23, with common and medium sorts \$12 to \$18, and culls \$10 to \$12. Shorn fat old crop lambs bulked at \$15 to \$16, a few to \$17. Common and medium kinds drew \$11 to \$14, with culls around \$10. Feeder old crop lambs drew \$14 down. Spring feeder lambs sold at \$16.50 down.

Slaughter ewes bulked at \$5 to \$6. Old wethers sold for \$8 to \$11. Two-year-old muttons cashed at \$10 to \$13. Old bucks sold around \$4 to \$5.

Hogs picked themselves up off the mat for a 25 to 50 cents advance Monday and a top of \$26.50 at Fort Worth. Last week they closed at \$26, the lowest levels since March here.

Hogs of less desirable slaughter qualities and less attractive weights sold at \$23 to \$26.25. Sows cashed at \$18 to \$21.

It is not often we need shed a tear for the very efficient operators of our nation's meat business. They are very able and competent, and heaven help them if they were not!

However, last week they had our heartfelt sympathy!

Last Friday the regional report from the USDA that covers the East — and such cities as New York, Baltimore, Washington, Philadelphia and Boston — reported that in the late trade lamb carcasses were selling from \$2 higher to \$3 lower, while at the same interval pork was selling from \$3 higher to \$2 lower!

With a swing of 5 cents per pound in the wholesale prices of the same kind of meat in a single day, imagine if you can a poor buyer trying to buy livestock at Fort Worth that will sell next week in that densely populated area in the East!

Wow! There are times when I've wondered what cruel fate steered my bewildered steps into the news writing game — but last week I expect the gentlemen trying to operate the packing houses were really in a state of mind that made them dream of taking up beach-combing for a living!

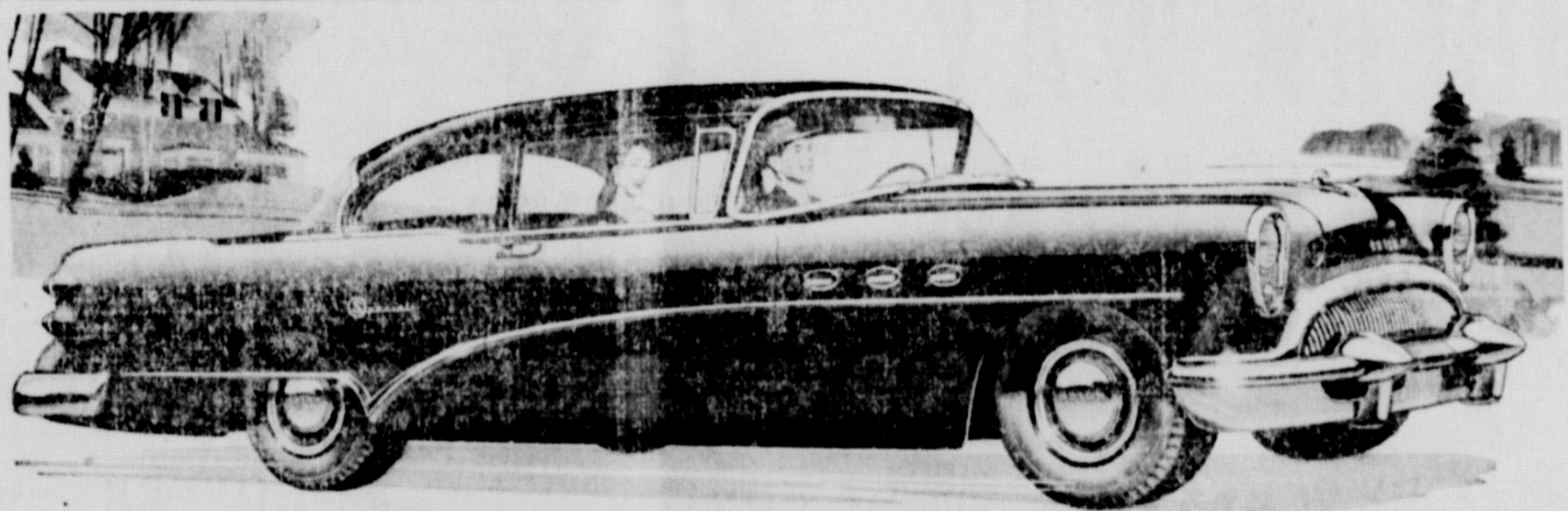

1925—Colbert said, "I believe that for most Americans there is a deep moral satisfaction in turning out a good job."

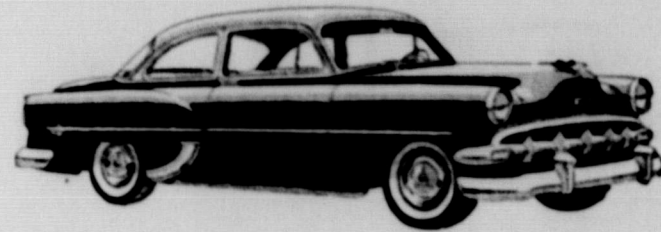
Duval Jury
