Negotiations are now under way with contractors for installing the system and actual work of running cables is expected to be started short-

Tests have been under way the past month at the base of the 400-foot tower to select the best and it has been determined that San Angelo, Midland and San Rotary drilling to 6,500 feet to Antonio stations will be included in the local system. The San Angelo stations has produced perfect since the tower was erected. Reception from the Midland station has been marred somewhat by a local interference, the source of which has been largely determined and work toward cleaning up these sources of interference is expected to begin after some more testing to locate them more specifically The same interference or noise is affecting the San Antonio signal which has proven satisfactory at certain hours of the day and may be improved somewhat with clear-
