THE HISTORY OF CHRISTMAS

The giving of gifts on Christmas is a very ancient custom centering in the homes. Actually we have no clear picture of exactly how this practice came to us. It was an old Roman custom to give gifts on New Year's Day; and in Japan and France that day is still reserved for exchanging gifts. In most countries it is done on or very near Christmas Day. In Britain, December 26 is known as "Boxing-Day". In medieval times the priests opened the alms boxes and distributed their contents to the poor of the parish. Those who worked, the servants, apprentices, and others, kept their savings in earthenware boxes throughout the year. At Christmas these were collected, broken open, and the savings were given to the poor.

The Christian practice of gift giving has been inspired by the example of St. Nicholas, the well-loved fourth-century saint who was Bishop of Myra in Asia Minor. The story is that though he was born of a rich and noble family, he was an orphan when very young. And so as a child he knew a deep loneliness. He decided to devote his life to the service of God and part of this service was giving gifts in secret. Tradition tells us that he slipped money and gifts through the windows of the poor as they slept. He helped children especially and came to be known as their protector.

St. Nicolas is called by many names. Our name for him is Santa Claus. There is a beautiful idea in this ancient practice of gift giving and we must strive to remember this idea and not commercialize Christmas by the giving of gifts.

Method Of Sealing Surface Tanks Is Developed By SCS

There are many earthen tanks in the Crockett Soil Conservation District that are very short lived. There are several reasons for this condition. A major reason is that the storage depth below spillway level is not adequate to withstand the extreme evaporation that is found in this climate. The annual evaporation which exceeds six feet necessitates a deep hole in order to have a year round water supply.

In some cases the drainage area is too small or too large for the storage capacity of the tank; which can result in a quick dry up or washout.

Inadequate spillway design will cause backside erosion. In some instances where the topography allows, a damless tank can be more easily and cheaply constructed, and still give the same desired depth and storage capacity. Location in the pasture, number of livestock watered, depth of soil, not to leave out available capital, are all factors to consider in construction of an earthen tank.

If the tank is slow about sealing or a highly porous subsoil is found, these can be made to hold with a minimum of work and expense. One pound of salt per 3 square feet area, in most instances, will seal the bottom of the tank.

The salt deflocculates the soil by breaking the soil structure down to single granules and burns the organic matter out of the soil making it seal over night tight. The salt can be spread and disced into the top six inches of soil then packed with whatever means are handy — a sheeps foot roller or livestock. Recent experiments in Albuquerque, N. M. have proven this system of sealing tanks very effective when properly used.

Development and improvement of existing stock water facilities is just one more step toward a well founded conservation plan for ranches in the Crockett Soil Conservation District. Detailed information on sealing ponds can be obtained from the local SCS office.

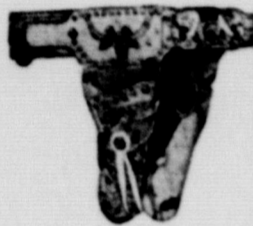

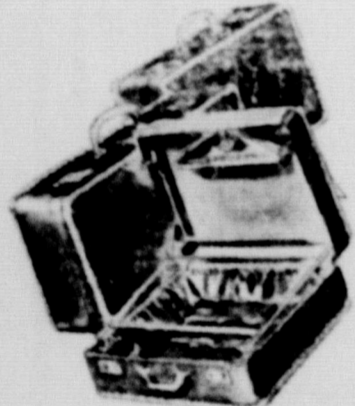

Whitey Fisher, from the State Motor Vehicle Department, dropped by to discuss some of our local traffic problems.

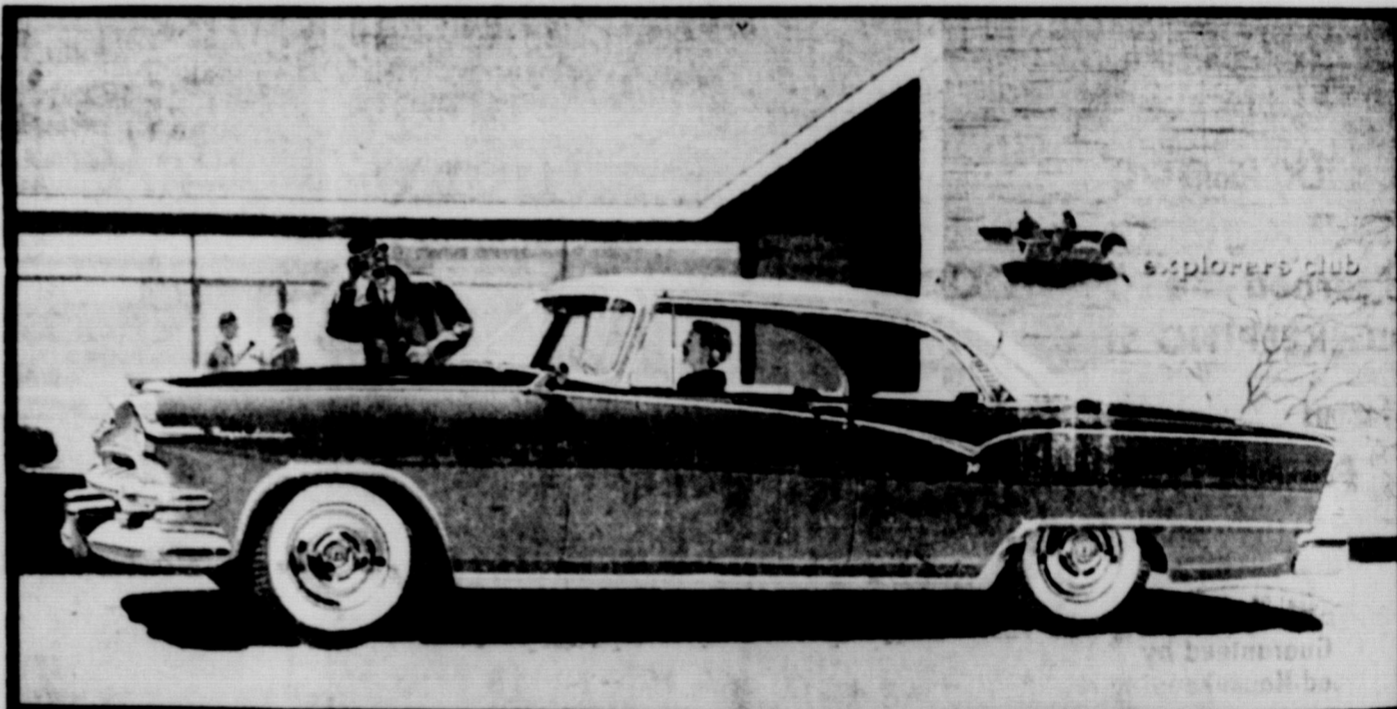
"Up at Center Junction," Whitey says, "they've got a new sign that really slows down the traffic going through town."
