Deer Hunters Send Hides To Texas TB Hospital Patients

Austin — Deer hunters are asked to throw a handful of common table salt on the hides they send TB hospital patients.

The request came today from the man who ought to know, L. M. Rathbone, Austin taxidermist, who is receiving the hides for the patients.

Mr. Rathbone says the hides coming in at the rate of 10 to 15 a day are of excellent quality and most are arriving in good shape. But he says the salt will insure against spoilage.

The Volunteer Advisory Council for Texas TB Hospitals will pay for the tanning. Mr. Rathbone is handling the hides free of charge.

Mrs. Helen Smith of Austin, council chairman, asks that the hides be marked "Charity", addressed to Mr. Rathbone at 2708 South Lamar, Austin, and shipped by motor freight.

She says where this procedure is followed all of the major motor freight lines are hauling the hides free of charge.

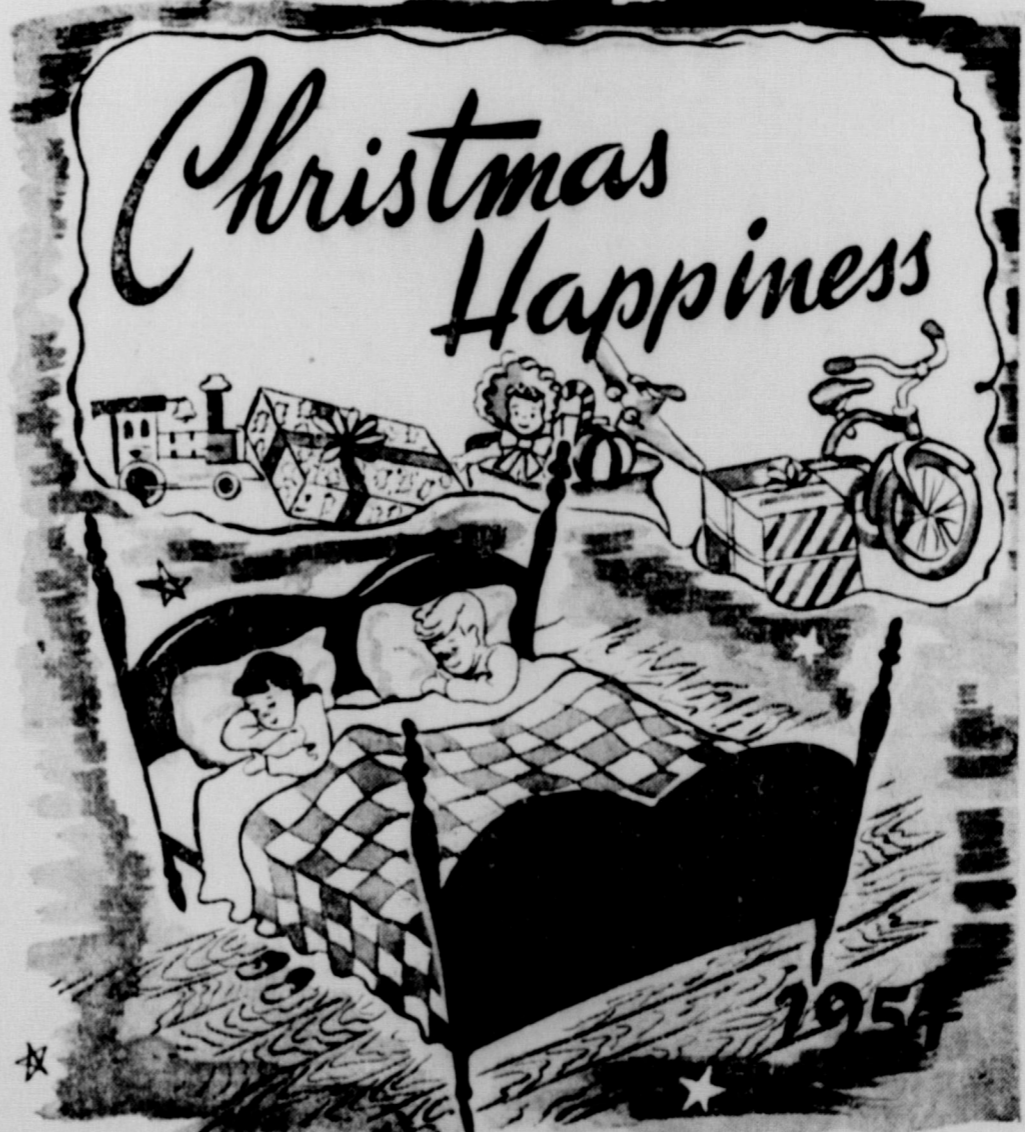

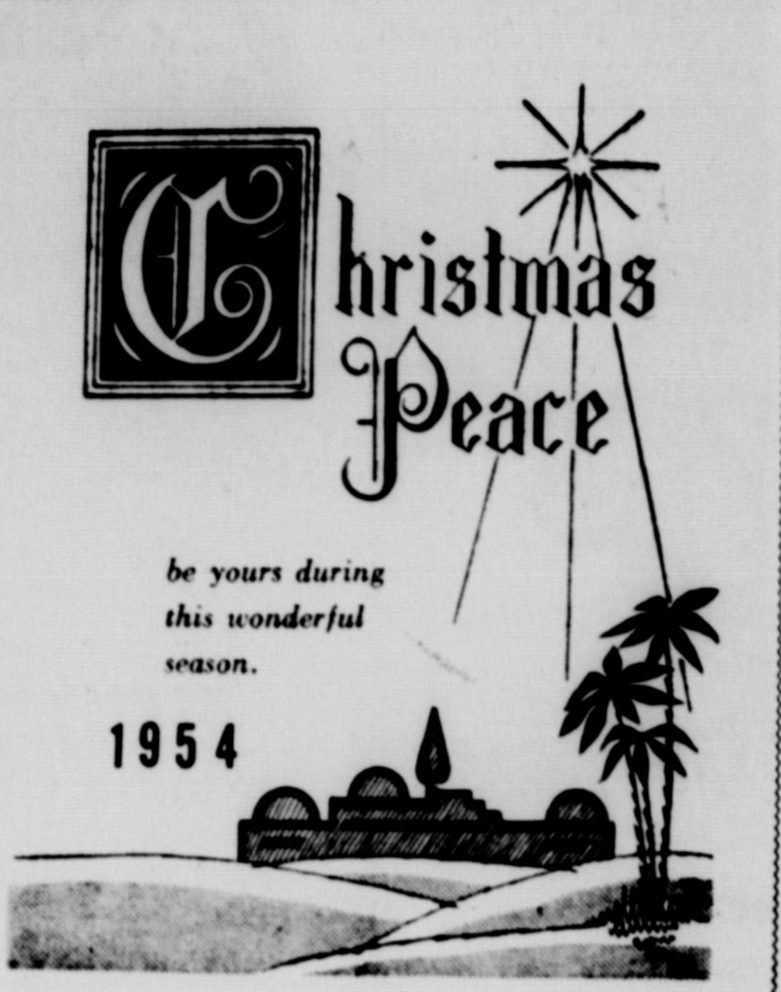

Forest Completes N'west Extension To Vaughan Field

The Vaughn field of Crockett County has been extended one location northwest with completion of Forest Oil Corp. No. 3 Isabel Vaughn for a daily pumping potential of 142.38 barrels of 29.7 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 36.2-1.

Production was through perforations between 1,423-30 feet in 5½-inch casing set at 1,473 feet. Pay section was acidized with 500 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 1,423 feet, on elevation of 2,603 feet. The project was drilled to 1,474 feet.

Location is in 88-OP-GC&SF, 10 miles northwest of Ozona.

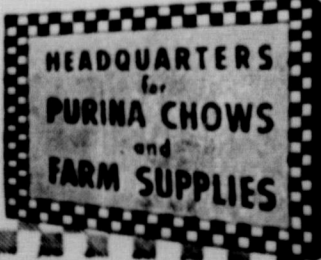


