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**Best Seeds For Reseeding Drouth Denuded Range Lands Are Those Harvested Locally, Say Soil Conservation Service Experts**

The very best seed that can be obtained for seeding native ranges are those seed harvested locally. Many acres of climax grasses are to be found throughout the Crockett Soil Conservation District along roadsides and in relic areas. The value of using these areas for grass seed must not be underestimated. Small protected areas can be seeded with this grass seed to provide a cheap source of seed for future use. Even a small area planted in pastures can produce a high volume of seed as compared with the low producing annual vegetation that exists in some areas.

At the present, large areas of sidecoats grama and green sprangle top and the bluestems are seeding out in greater abundance than in many years. Examination has shown that a great deal of this seed has matured and is of good quality. Much of the grass that has seeded up until this year has not matured and has been useless for seeding purposes.

Range reseeding has become an important management tool to ranchers throughout the Edwards Plateau during the past few years.

Although a large percentage of the first seeding trials have been failures, reseeding remains a must on denuded areas. On areas where competition by live stock and drought has reduced the native vegetation to bare ground or to annual plants, reseeding, along with proper management is the quickest tool for speeding recovery.

Although rainfall has been the cause of many seeding failures, a large part of the failure has been due to lack of three main things. One, lack of proper seedbed preparation. Two, use of the wrong kind of seed such as those that come from too far north or east. Three, the failure to plant in protective cover or to defer until grass is established.

Now is the time to take advantage of this valuable source of native grass seed. The local Soil Conservation Service office can furnish additional information on various methods of harvesting native grass seed.

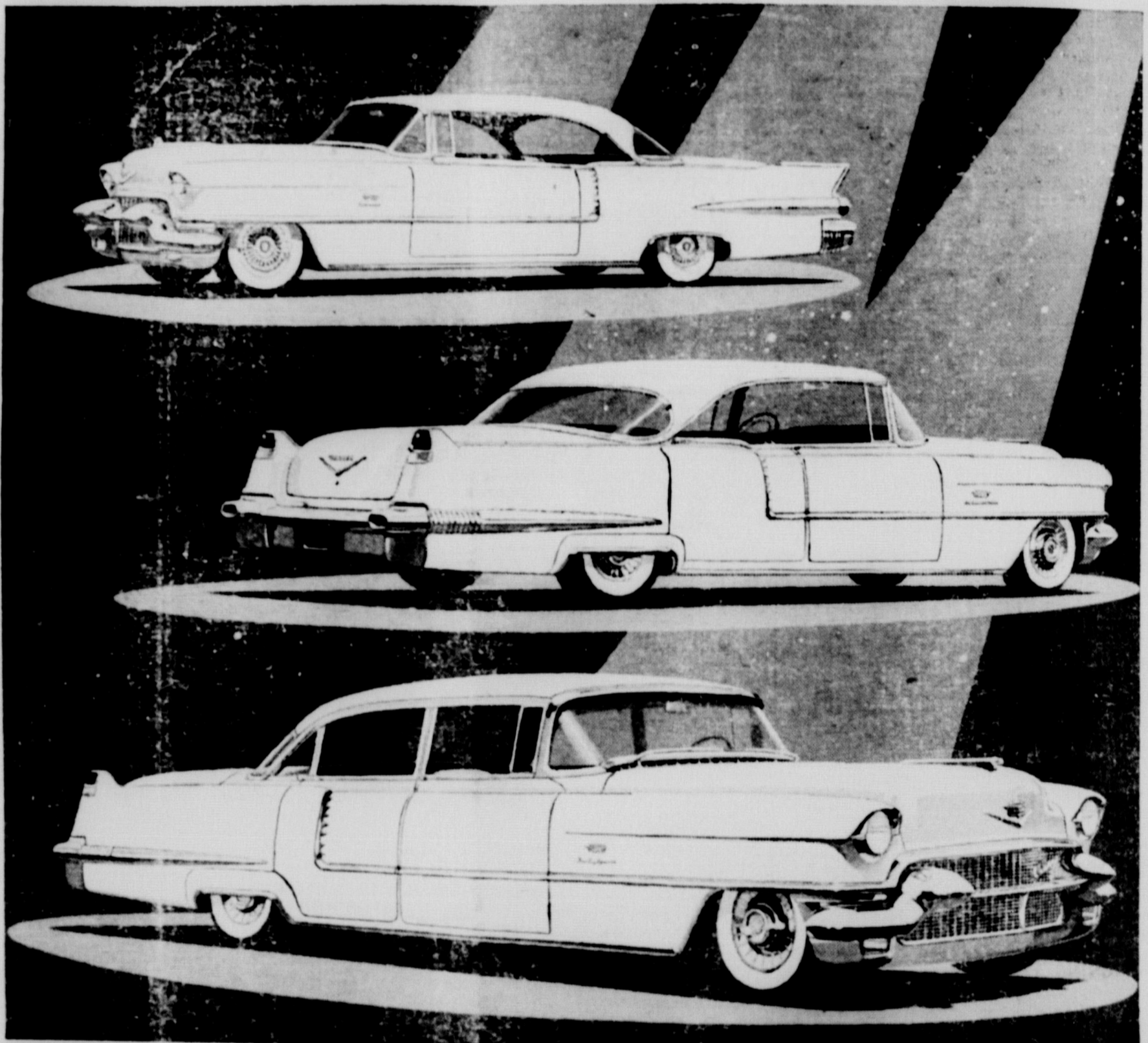
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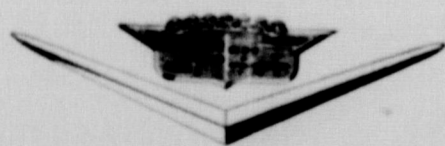
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### The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" is gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

October 28, 1926

Stating that in his opinion a jury would not be secured in Crockett county, Judge C. S. Sutton on his motion Wednesday afternoon changed the venue of the Bob Bates murder case to Bexar county. Bates is charged with the slaying of Jim Waldon, customs house officer, formerly stationed at Del Rio.

Leaking oil, ignited by signal lights, destroyed two tanks cars and badly damaged a third at Barnhart early Wednesday morning. The crude oil was leaking from one of 38 cars being moved from the oil fields to eastern markets. Steam lines from the engine were used by the trainmen to fight the blaze.

A herd of approximately 300 head of mixed cattle from Crockett county ranges were being driven to Aubrey Ball of Eldorado, Texas. Among the local ranchmen contributing to the herd were John Hays, W. H. Augustine, W. A. Adams and Warren Clayton.

George Ybarra of the Ozona Cubs returned the opening kickoff for 80 yards and a touchdown behind beautiful blocking, to chalk up Ozona's scoring in a 6-6 tie game with Grandfalls. That one run was the end of Ozona's offense for the afternoon. The cubs picked up only 3 first downs during the game.

With the score Ozona 6 and Grandfalls 0, the Cubs settled down to play one of their very best defensive games of the year, allowing the much heavier boys of Grandfalls only 6 first downs.

The final score could have easily been 6-0 in favor of the Cubs had it not been for one mistake. Just before the first half ended Bob Meinecke a pass to David Sikes that was intercepted on about the fifty and returned all the way for a touchdown making the score 6 to 6. The remainder of the game was all defense with neither team getting any closer that the forty with one exception when Kenneth Deland running from a spread reached the Grandfalls 20.

Coaches Womack and Lewis came out in a spread for this game and used Deland, Flannagan, Sikes and Bob Meinecke in the tail back position. The most effective runner turned out to be Deland who, with a bit better blocking, could have been a dangerous runner.

Ozona's best offensive play was the punt, with Bob Meinecke kicking four times for an average of 30 yards with no return and on two of those punts the boys were knocked loose from the ball and Ozona recovered.

Vicious tackling was the rule of the game with Ozona getting their share. By far the best defensive man on the field was B. E. Ingham with Kenneth Deland close behind.

One of the best games we have seen on defense from the end position was that displayed by Jimmy Freeman.

Other boys showing up on defense were: Carlman, Flannagan, Ybarra, Williams, Sikes and Galindo.

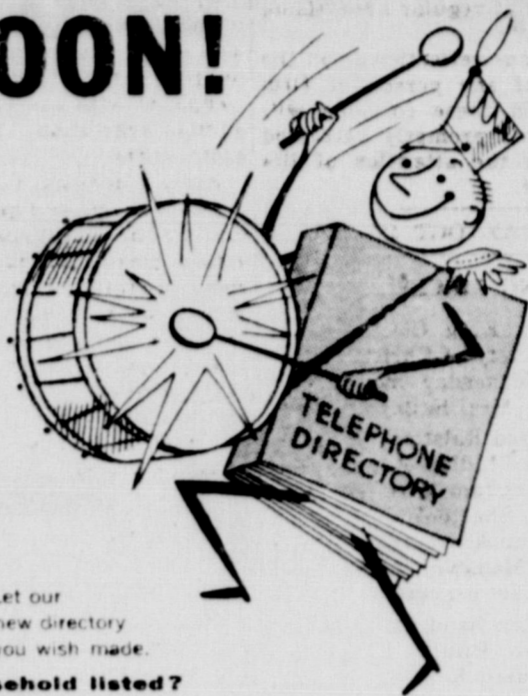
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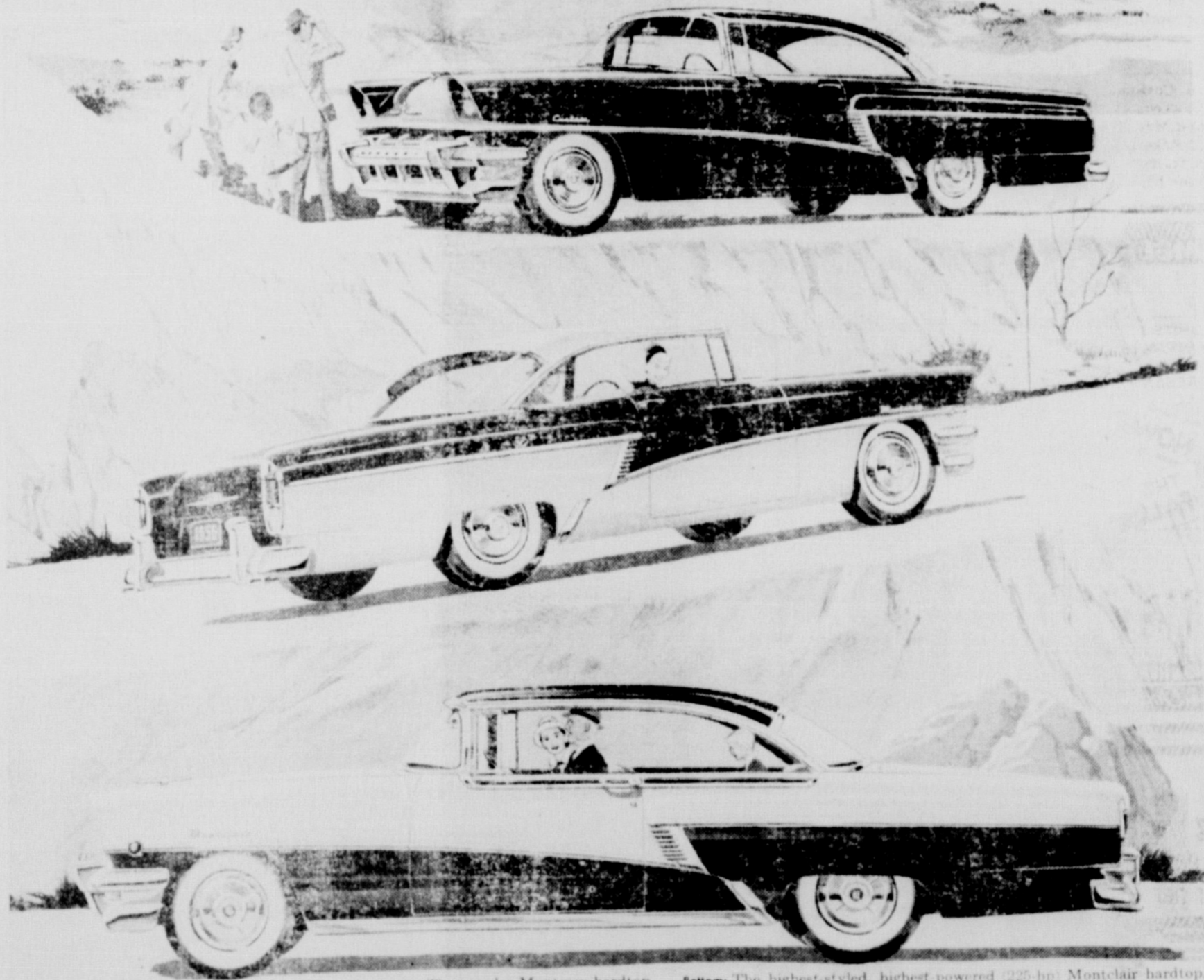

As a part of research done in appraising school lunch programs, laboratory determination has been made of the nutritive value of some school meals eaten by children.

The meals analyzed followed the lunch pattern suggested for the National School Lunch Program, which includes 1/2 pint of milk as a beverage, 2 ounces of meat or other protein rich food, 3/4 cup of vegetable or fruit or both, 1 slice of bread, and 2 tablespoons of butter.

Each day the Ozona Cafeteria has a meal based on this schedule.

**Lt. Carden Promoted To First Lieutenant**

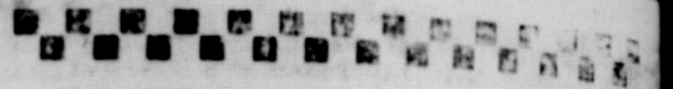

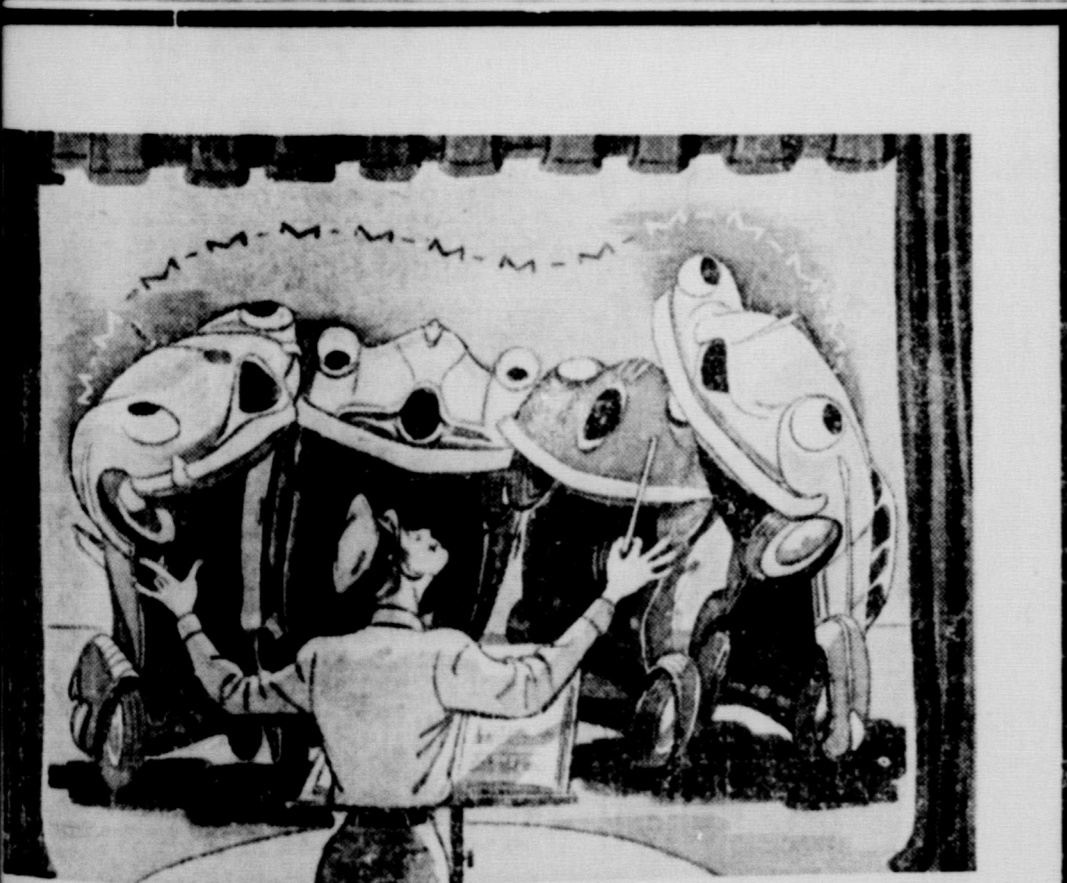

hit Lloyd West on the sixteen and Bobby Sutton went to the five on a reverse. Clayton went to the two, but on second down a wide sweep failed, losing three. Bobby Martinez then fooled the Sonora defense by calling a sneak which went to the one. Mike Clayton rammed into the end zone and the score was tied. Clayton's try for extra point was low.

Even though the game was barely in the second quarter the scoring was over and only one more serious threat was to occur. Late in the third period with a Sonora effort running out of gas on the Lion 36 George Johnson attempted a field goal. It was not close, but the effort set the Lions back to their twenty and on the next series, a twenty-five yard pass interference ruling set the Broncos up on the Lion eleven.

On first down the Broncos were guilty of holding and were penalized to the 26. In three downs the Broncos got the ball back to the nine but elected another field goal effort which failed.

In statistics, Sonora rushed for a total of 206 yards and gained 4 yards on one pass completion out of eight efforts. Ozona rushed for 76 yards and passed or 33 more on two completions out of seven efforts, making the total offense 210 for Sonora and 112 for Ozona.

In first downs, Sonora led 12 to 6. In the matter of penalties the Lions drew five for 75 yards while Sonora drew three penalties for forty-five yards.

Ozona kicked six times for an average of 34.3 per try while Sonora was forced to kick twice for a 22 yard average.

George Johnson was the leading ball carrier for the night with 163 yards on thirty-four carries for an average of 4.8 yards per try. Mike Clayton was next with 42 yards on eleven efforts. Vasquez carried the ball ten times for 36 yards and Bobby Sutton had 11 yards on 12 efforts. Sutton however was the victim of several fumbles which cost big yardage and were not the result of Sonora defensive play.

The game goes into the record book as a 6 to 6 tie and will not be decided on any basis other than score. If both teams were to

go on unbeaten they would flip for the right to represent the district in bi-district play, but not for the title as the teams would be co-champions. However, with Eldorado, Junction and Menard still to be met, it is poor taste to even think of such an event. This week Junction, 20 to 6 winner over Menard, plays Sonora in Sonora and Ozona meets Eldorado in Ozona while Menard draws a bye.
