Justifiable homicide was the court's finding following investigation and hearing into the facts surrounding the fatal shooting of W. C. (Bill) Cook in the yard of the family home here last Thursday night.

In an unusual hearing before County Judge Houston Smith, sitting as a juvenile court judge here Wednesday morning, details of the incidents leading up to the shooting and the death scene were described by the principal witnesses, the boy and his mother, Mrs. W.
