Consider Blessings Of Freedom Is Theme Of Americanism Week

It is appropriate that the All-American Conference to combat Communism, which sponsors annually, the Know Your America Week program has chosen for its 1955 theme: "Consider the Blessings of Freedom."

Coming as it does during the Thanksgiving period, the nationwide observance will be a reminder to all Americans that they must not take for granted all the liberties they enjoy.

Unfortunately, many persons forget that the blessings they receive have come down to them through the bitterness of several wars. Indeed, there has been a tendency on the part of some to shun their responsibilities as citizens and react indifferently to the vital needs of our country.

The All-American Conference, a cooperative of 54 national organizations with a combined membership of more than 50,000,000 has recognized the need of a unified power to meet the subtle tactics of this subversive menace.

Last year more than 2700 communities observed Know Your America Week. Many pooled their organizational resources to develop well-rounded and positive Americanism programs. Participating in this endeavor were members of varied religious faiths of the community, veterans groups, fraternal, services and civic groups; prominent women's clubs; business professional and labor organizations, teachers, school children, Chambers of Commerce and neighborhood trade associations.

November 20 to 26 has been set aside as Know Your America Week. It has been endorsed by President Eisenhower.

The week will give all of our citizens and opportunity to re-dedicate themselves to democratic principles, to understand how our nation became strong and great, and to realize that knowledge of America will foil the thrusts of communism.

All citizens should participate in this important observance to keep alive the spirit of freedom as against the tyranny of communism.

Ozona Junior Cubs Close Season With 26-14 Win Over Iraan

Ozona Cubs closed out their season last Thursday night with one of the best exhibitions of offensive football seen this season. The game was a thriller from the first to the final whistle with coaches Womack and Lewis turning the boys loose to drub the Iraan Juniors 26 to 14.

For the first time this season the Cubs took advantage of their passing ability as Bob Meinecke completed 10 to 15 passes attempted for a total of 241 yards, three of them for touchdowns. Meinecke passed successfully to George Ybarra, good for 80 yards, to Jimmy Freeman for two completions good for 89 yards, to Alonzo Galindo for three completions good for 62 yards, one time to B. B. Ingham for 10 yards and one time to Johnny Jones for no gain.

Jimmy Freeman scored on runs of 57 yards, and 32 yards after taking passes from Meinecke. George Ybarra scored on a run of 50 yards after taking a pass from Meinecke and then later swept left end for 28 yards and another score. This was all the scoring for the Ozona Cubs but they continued to threaten all through the game. Ozona Cubs had a rushing gain of 311 yards for the night added to the 241 yards gained from passes made a grand total of 372 yards. Ozona made only 5 first downs because most of their long runs resulted in touchdowns.

Iraan made their first touchdown in the first quarter on a run good for 27 yards and in the final quarter scored again on a run good for 12 yards. Iraan completed only one pass during the game and that good for 43 yards on the next to last play of the game and a touchdown was saved by George Ybarra when he hauled the ball carrier in before he crossed the goal line. Iraan made a total of 194 yards from scrimmage and 7 first downs but could not do much with the Cub line when they got down close to the goal line.

Defensive stand-outs for Ozona were Adolph Rivera, Jim Williams, B. B. Ingham, Deeny Holden, Bill Petty, Dickie Flanagan, George Ybarra, Alonzo Galindo, as well as all other boys who played. 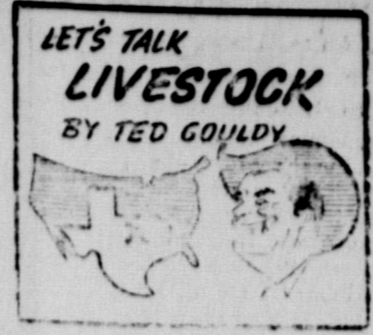

Cattle Trade Uneven

Fort Worth — Mature fed steers attracted sharply lower bids at Fort Worth Monday. Local packers reported steer beef inventories high in their coolers and moving out very slowly, and this accounted for the lower offers. A few lots sold early to small packers about steady, but later sales were generally 25 to 50 cents lower.

Cows were steady to strong. Bulls held barely steady. Higher grade slaughter calves and the upper grades of stockers were steady, but the inbetween grades and plainer kinds were easier.

Comparative prices: Good and choice steers and yearlings \$16.50 to \$19.50, a few yearlings to \$20.; common and medium sorts \$10.00 to \$16.00; fat cows \$9.00 to \$11.00; canners and cutters \$6.50 to \$9.50; bulls mostly \$9.00 to \$12.00, some stocker bulls \$12.50; good and choice slaughter calves \$15.50 to \$17.50, and cull, common and medium calves \$8.00 to \$15.00; stocker steer calves of good and choice grades sold for \$16.00 to \$19.00 and steer yearlings cashed at \$17.50 downward; stocker cows sold from \$8.00 to \$12.00.

Sheep and Lambs Dip:

All classes of slaughter sheep and lambs were lower on the opening session at Fort Worth Monday. Fat lambs lost \$1 per hundred, and yearling muttons sold around 50 cents to \$1 lower. Ewes and other aged sheep weak to 50 cents off. Feeder lambs were about steady, some mixed feeder and fat lambs at \$16.50 Monday on the strong side.

Good and choice fat lambs sold at \$16.00 to \$17.00, the latter figure for some woolled lambs; shorn fat lambs drew \$16.50 downward. Cull, common and medium offerings cashed at \$9.00 to \$15.00; stocker and feeder lambs sold at \$13.00 to \$16.50, latter price for mixed feeders and fat lambs. Yearling wethers of good and choice kinds sold from \$14.00 to

\$15.50; and aged wethers sold from \$7.50 to \$11.50; old ewes drew \$5.00 to \$6.50; and aged bucks sold around \$5.00.

which is of most vital concern to Ozona and Crockett County, by the United States Soil Conservation Service. An agreement has been reached by Crockett County and the SCS whereby this county will furnish one-fourth the cost, not to exceed \$200,000 toward completion of a flood control project on the Johnson Draw watershed, the balance of the cost to be provided by the federal government, through appropriation which it is hoped the 1956 session of Congress will provide.

Field work on the survey is now nearing completion and paper work is expected to be completed by early January. Meanwhile, the wheels are beginning to turn locally to bring about a bond issue election, also in early January, so

that this county will be ready with its part of the financial bargain by the time the complete data is ready for submission to Congress.

Crockett County advanced funds needed to make the SCS survey and plan, such funds to be deducted from this county's share in the total cost. The flood control measures, when finally completed, will provide 100 percent control of flood in Johnson Draw, forever preventing a repetition of the flood of June, 1954, which took 16 lives and did property damaged estimated at over 12 million dollars.

Award of contracts and construction supervision will be in the hands of the Crockett Soil Conservation District board of supervisors.
