## Ozons Lions Cop District Crown With Menard Win

### Cinderella Team That Wasn't Rated Chance Comes Through

The Ozona Lions became district champions for the first time since 1946 last Friday night as they downed a good big Menard 13 to 6.

The victory for the Lions not only clinched the district title but also gave the Lions their first undefeated season since 1944. The Lions also had an unbeaten season in 1941 and won the title in 1942. Although beaten, but this is the first time since Ozona has moved to the class A that the Lions have won all other titles having been champions when Ozona was a class B school.

The victory over Menard was the first for the Lions since 1952 and resulted in one of the hardest games the Lions have had this year.

The game, viewed by a standing-room-only crowd, got under way on schedule with the Lions leading to receive after winning the toss.

Menard kicked off and the Lions promptly gave the Ozona fans a big scare, fumbling on the second play from scrimmage with Menzies of Menard recovering for the Yellow Jackets.

The Lions stopped Grosse Mohler, 216 pound Menard fullback, for a two yard gain and then called Hooten for no gain, before Sheffield broke through the right side for a 12 yard gain and a first down on the Lion 19 yard line.

The Lions braced and the Yellow Jackets lost the ball on downs with something like 15 yards needed for the first.

From their own 24 yard line the Lions started a crunching drive with Clayton, Sutton, and Martinez, doing most of the ball carrying. The drive finally ran out of gas on the Menard 34.

Menard ran three plays losing 8, 15, and 1 yard on the three before kicking out of bound short from their own 9 yard line, the kick going out on the Menard 23.

Again Clayton, Sutton, and Martinez began to move with Clayton launching some bruising runs wide and Martinez and Sutton picking up short yardage up the middle. Sutton piled into the end zone with just 3 minutes and 20 seconds gone in the second quarter. Mike Clayton converted.

The Lions kicked off and promptly swarmed the Yellow Jackets, forcing them to kick from the shadow of their own goal post. Terry Hooten got the Yellow Jackets off the hook for a few minutes two plays later, when he hauled in Bobby Sutton's long pass on the Menard goal line. Hooten ran the ball out to the nine but Menard was caught clipping and the ball went back to the one, this time the Lions held and forced Menard to kick out from deep in their end zone with the ball going out on the Menard 39.

Clayton went 13 yards down the sidelines before being stopped by a bruising collision with Terry Hooten. Sutton picked up seven more to put the ball on the ten. From there the Lions inched the ball forward to the one from where Clayton banged over for the second score. This time Clayton's try for the extra point was wide.

Ozons fans got their second big scare after the Lions kicked off. Menard with the aid of 15-yard penalty and some fine runs by Mohler, Hooten, and Sheffield moved the ball to the Lion nine yard line before the clock ran out.

Menard received the kick after the half and it looked like 13 points might not be enough for a few minutes as Mohler and Sheffield launched gain after gain with the Menard single wing offense generating the extra power. A jump pass from Mohler to Lovelace set up a first down on the Lion 34 but that was all. The Lions held and

## Football Fans To Pull Another Mass Move To McCamey Sat.

It will be "on to McCamey" next Saturday afternoon for several hundred Ozona football fans, bent on seeing the bi-district contest between the Ozona Lions, champions of District 6-A, and the McCamey Badgers, District 5-A champions.

The game will be at 7:30 p. m. and more than 500 reserved seat tickets were placed on sale here early this week — and they were going fast. The McCamey stadium will seat an estimated 4,000 persons.

One of the largest crowds of Ozona team backers ever to take the road followed the team to Menard last Friday night for the district decider between the Lions and the Menard Yellow Jackets, won by the Lions 13 to 6. Cars were strung almost bumper to bumper from Menard to Eldorado on the mass return from Menard Friday night and the numbers may go higher next Saturday night. Schools will be dismissed Wednesday afternoon until Monday morning for the Thanksgiving holidays.

## Rich Pots Featured In Roping Events At Big Lake Sat. & Sun.

Roping enthusiasts of this West Texas area are expected to converge on Big Lake next Saturday and Sunday when some of the top roping talent of the Southwest will gather for an array of outstanding matches and open jackpot roping events promoted by H. P. (Mac) McClanahan of Big Lake, a former Ozonan.

The daily programs will begin at 1:30 p. m. in the Big Lake arena. Saturday's program includes three top-notch matches ropings with purses of \$2,000, \$1,000 and \$500 at stake.

The \$2,000 match will be between John D. Holleman of Rankin and Sonny Davis of Kenna, N. M. Each roper will rope eight calves for the best total time.

Marlin Stevenson of Big Lake will match loops on ten calves against Glen Franklin of House, N. M., for a purse of \$1,000. The third match, for a purse of \$500, will be between Scotty Howard of McCamey against Olin Young of Lovington, N. M. Each man will rope eight calves in this match.

In addition to the matched events, the Saturday program will include a \$10 entry open jackpot calf roping and a \$10 entry barrel race, with \$25 added.

Sunday's program, also starting at 1:30 will feature a \$30 entry open two-calf average jackpot, a \$10 open jackpot and a \$10 jackpot barrel race.

## Two Crockett Co. Fields Extended; Three Tests Set

### Farmers, Midway Lane Fields Extended, 3 Tests In Weger

Two Crockett fields gained extensions and locations were slated for three stepsouts in another field.

The Farmers (San Andres) field gained a location southeast and southwest extension with completion of Slick Oil Co. No. 3-A University, 11-50-University, 18 miles north of Ozona.

It was completed for a daily flowing potential of 90.86 barrels of 31.4 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio 790-1.

Production was through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 2,638-662 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 2,730 feet, the total depth. Pay section was acidized with 500 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 2,638 feet on kelly bushing elevation of 2,720 feet.

The Midway Lane (Permian) field has been extended one location northeast with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 35 Chambers County School Land, in 4-Chambers est. 15 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was completed for a daily pumping potential of 31.29 barrels of 35.5 gravity oil, plus 88 per cent water.

Production was from open hole between 1,134 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set and 1,142 feet, the total depth. Pay section was fractured with 1,500 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 1,137 feet on derrick floor elevation of 2,663 feet.

Slick Oil Co. has filed application to drill three stepsouts to production in the Weger (San Andres) field, 18 miles north of Ozona.

The projects, on a 320-acre lease in 49-GC&SF, will be drilled to 2,600 feet with rotary.

The No. 5 V. V. Weger, one location west, is 1,650 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of the southeast quarter.

The No. 7 V. V. Weger, one location north and east, is 330 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west lines.

The No. 8 V. V. Weger, one location south and east, is 1,650 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines.

## New Law Requires All Trailers Over 4,000 Pounds Have Serial No.

Effective December 1, all trailers weighing 4,000 pounds or more will be required to have serial numbers stamped on the name plate, it has been announced by V. O. Earnest, local sheriff and tax collector.

The tax collector's office has an assignment of serial numbers for this county. Owners will be required to have the certificates of serial number registration before the trailers can be registered for 1956 license plates. A fee of \$1 is charged for registration for the serial number. Owners then will have to have the number stamped on the trailer nameplate and the certificate signed by the person who does the die stamping.

## Two Wildcat Tests Set In Crockett; Discovery Indicated

Crockett County gained locations for two wildcats last week. An indicated Grayburg discovery was preparing to perforate to test and complete.

Ralph Lowe of Midland has filed application to drill a 7,500-foot wildcat the No. 1 Noelke-Texas, 3 1/4-mile west-southwest of the opener and lone producer in the Clara Couch (Cisco) field, 10 miles southeast of Iran.

The project will be drilled with rotary to 7,500 feet.

Location, on a 240-acre lease, is 3,310 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 45-GG-W. H. B. Lewis survey.

The discovery, Cities Service Oil Co. No. 1-E Noelke, was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 179.49 barrels of 37.3 gravity oil plus 86.7 barrels of water, with a gas-oil ratio of 675-1.

Production was through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,580-85 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 5,591 feet. Flowing pressure was 550 pounds with packer on casing.

M. D. Bryant of San Angelo will drill a 2,600-foot combination tool wildcat, 25 miles northwest of Ozona and 3 1/2 miles east-southeast of the World field. It will be the No. 1 Shannon Estate.

Operations are to begin immediately. Elevation is 2,547 feet.

Location, on a 160-acre lease, is 1,650 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the most westerly west lines of 31-BB-TCRR.

The prospector is 3 1/2 miles of Thompson-Powell-Derrick Drilling Co. No. 1 Neal, prospective Grayburg discovery now testing to complete.

Thompson-Powell-Derrick Drilling Co. of Abilene was preparing to perforate two sections opposite the Grayburg at the No. 1 Maggie S. Neal, indicated discovery in 66-BB-GC&SF, nine miles south of Big Lake.

Production was indicated on a core with recovery of 54 feet, of which 40 feet was well-saturated and bleeding oil and gas.

A 45-minute drillstem test in the San Andres between 2,480-2,540 feet, recovered 570 feet of sulphur water. Flowing pressure was 185 pounds; 15-minute shut-in pressure, 900 pounds.

Total depth is 2,622 feet.

## Work Is Begun On Construction Of New Hospital

### Ground Is Broken For \$211,000 Structure For Ozona

First ground was broken this week to mark the beginning of construction of the new Crockett County Hospital to be built on land donated by Dick Henderson at the northwest edge of Ozona, just north of the north swimming pool.

Surveying of the site and core testing of the land was under way this week by Contractor W. C. Rutherford of San Angelo, low bidder on the project when the Commissioners Court opened bids here recently.

The contract was awarded to Mr. Rutherford after the court members of the hospital board and Architect John Lynn Scott of Austin had pared costs to within \$11-195 of the \$200,000 fund available from the bond issue approved by voters of this county for construction of the hospital.

Mr. Rutherford was low with a bid of \$268,200 when bids were originally opened. By dispensing with some items in the building construction and holding up for the present the installation of bathroom fixtures in four rooms of the structure, the conferees were able to reduce costs so that the Commissioners Court felt the county could meet the additional cost by issuing time warrants.

Nearly twelve months will be required to complete the hospital construction.

## Armed Forces Reserve Act To Be Explained In Meet Here Nov. 29

All parents of sons between the ages of 17 and 18 1/2 years of age and their sons are invited to attend an orientation assembly to be held in the high school auditorium here Tuesday evening, Nov. 29, at 7:30 o'clock for the purpose of discussing the military obligation of these young men and others under the Reserve Forces Act of 1955, which affects every male citizen of military age.

The meeting will be conducted by M/Sgt. Clark J. Farley, Senior Sgt. Advisor of the office of the Unit Advisor, U. S. Army Reserve unit of San Angelo.

"The enactment of the Reserve Forces Act of 1955 created changes in the nation's military manpower preparedness program affecting every male citizen under the age of 26 who has not entered the military service," Sgt. Farley said in a prepared letter to parents of boys of military age. Included was an invitation to these parents to attend the meeting here.

"You and your son will be free to ask questions and be given factual answers by the Regular Army personnel and local Reservists who are civilians like yourself.

"If your son is between 17 and 18 1/2 years of age, you will be interested in the special provisions of the Act that permits young men to plan their careers with the minimum of interruption. If your son is over 18 1/2 years of age, his military obligation will also be discussed."

## Lions Will Meet McCamey Badgers In Bi-Dist. Sat.

### First Time Since 1946 Ozona Team Enters Titles Series

The Ozona Lions will meet the McCamey Badgers in McCamey Saturday night at 7:30 in a game to determine the bi-district champions between district 5-A and 6-A.

It will be the first appearance of the Ozona Lions in the class A playoffs and will be the first time since 1946 that the Lions have taken part in bi-district play.

The Lions clinched their district title Friday night when they dumped the Menard Yellow Jackets 13 to 6. The win for the Lions was their ninth of the season with no defeats and one tie. The loss for Menard dropped them to third with the Sonora Broncos taking second place by virtue of their win over Eldorado in Eldorado Friday night.

McCamey clinched their third straight district title when Wink defeated Big Lake two weeks ago. The Badgers scarcely had to exert themselves to defeat hapless Fort Stockton whose narrow win over Iran constituted their only district win.

In 1953 the Badgers defeated the Sonora Broncos in the bi-district playoff in McCamey and last year the same two teams met in Sonora with Sonora winning.

Representatives of the Ozona and McCamey schools met in Big Lake Saturday morning and details of the playoff were mapped out. McCamey won the toss to decide the site of the game after all other points were decided without dissent.

Price for tickets was agreed upon at \$1.50 for reserved seats and 50 cents for students and children.

McCamey has one of the largest and best equipped Class A high school stadiums in this area and it is expected that there will be ample tickets for all from Ozona who wish to attend.

The Lions emerged from the Menard game in good shape with only a few cuts and bruises to show for the encounter. Roy Glen Sutton, who had a good night rushing the Menard passer, got a cut over one eye as well as a black eye and Benny Friend had a slight cut in the mouth.

Coaches Pete Hickman and Sonny Cleere will listen to scouting reports and send their charges through limbering up drills Monday and will wait until Tuesday before getting around to much serious game preparation this week.

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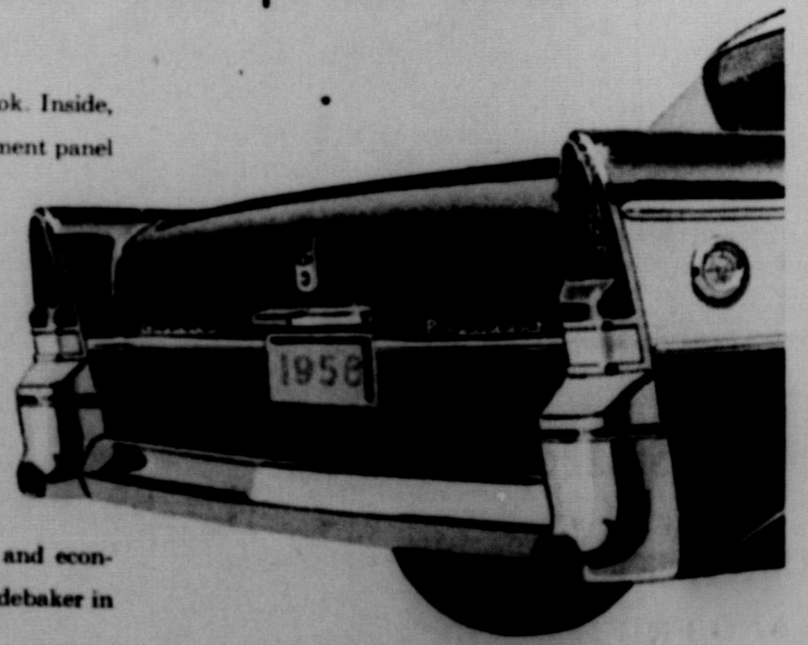
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**Oilman Discovery  
in Northern Crockett;  
Burg Show Tested**

Oilman discovery has been made in Crockett County and a large prospect was testing to date.

The Pacific Coal & Oil Co. No. 1 well, in 36-12-University, southwest of Big Lake, Texas, after being swabbed for 24 hours and flowed 42 barrels of oil through a 1/2-inch choke in 24 hours.

The well was washed through operations between 9,600 - 665 with 1,000 gallons of mud acid recovered load. Tubing pressure was 100 pounds.

On a 1/2-inch choke, the well produced 22 barrels of oil in three hours and then died. Operator then worked for hours, recovering 17 barrels of oil plus 20 per cent of mud.

The project swabbed dry and water was preparing to acidize 5,000 gallons.

The Simpson-Powell-Derrick drill, Co. et al Abilene No. 1 Mag-Neal, Crockett County Gray, prospect in 66-BB-GC&SF, 1/2 miles south of Big Lake, produced 197 barrels of load oil in 24 hours.

The well was through lower perforations between 2,306-2,320 feet. It had been fractured with 10,000 gallons and 15,000 pounds of acid.

The operator will run an eight-hour test when all the load has been recovered.

The well will then fracture and work through the upper perforations between 2,280-98 feet.
