## WEST TEXAS FACES A BATTLE FOR WATER

Often makes men blind to the call of conscience.

An example was the coldly calculated demands of certain Lower Rio Grande Valley irrigationists, represented at the public hearing on flood control held by the Army Corps of Engineers here last week.

These people, in effect, served notice that they will oppose any effort on the part of West Texas people to protect themselves and their loved ones and lands from death and destruction of their property by floods so that they, the Valley irrigationists, have every available drop of water that falls on this section of Texas to irrigate their fields.

The water master of the Falcon Dam Water Compact Commission served notice on West Texas landowners at that meeting that they are going to face a stiff fight to obtain any part of the rainfall that falls on these lands. They will oppose the construction of any type of flood control dam, retardation dam or even "stock ponds" which might tend to diminish the supply of water reaching Falcon dam on the Rio Grande, the Valley people say.

The Valley irrigationists say the waters of Falcon dam are "already over-appropriated," which is true, but the Valley people themselves are the ones who have over-appropriated them. Land promoters have earmarked nearly a half million acres for irrigation whereas there is water available from the Rio Grande for only half that number.

Naturally, they are anxious for one or more floods per year, the like of June, 1954, for West Texas, for it would be by only such freaks of nature, frequently repeated, that they could hope for enough water to irrigate that vast acreage.

So avaricious and callous are these Valley promoters that they have, in the past, questioned the right of West Texas land owners even to defer their land from grazing to pit it or seed it, or make any kind of conservation move which would tend to make the land itself take up more water from rainfalls and thus diminish the run-off of flood waters to the Rio Grande.

Absurd? Certainly. But these people are well organized and well financed and at the present time the law is on their side. There is no doubt that they intend to try, and keep on trying, to do the very things they threaten — that is, to tie the hands of West Texas landowners and dwellers in flood-threatened cities and towns so that they can make no move to keep the God-sent rainwater on their lands nor to protect themselves from the ravages of floods.

At the present time the only organized group in West Texas fighting this menace, and fighting to bring about enactment of legislation in Texas which will protect the rights of all the people regarding the use of water that falls on the land is the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. This organization has named a committee of land-owning ranchmen who have been working and will continue to work in the years to come to bring about an equitable solution to this problem, and other allied problems concerning the use and conservation of water.

For its work in this battle alone, the TS&GRA deserves your support, especially if you are a ranchman or a land owner.

## Lions Club Plans All-District Grid Banquet Jan. 16th

### Work Plan Expected To Be Given Congress In Jan.

Outstanding event in post-season District 6-A football circles, the annual All-District banquet honoring boys from the district's participating schools who are chosen on the all-district teams, sponsored here by the Ozona Lions Club, has been set for Monday evening, January 16, club officials announced this week.

Although a speaker has not yet been chosen for the event, efforts are being made to uphold the tradition of the banquet to bring an outstanding coach or athletic director from one of the colleges or universities of the state. Efforts are being made to bring one of the Southwest Conference coaches to deliver the principal address to the honored players and other guests.

The 1955 banquet will be the sixth annual event honoring the all-district teams, their coaches and officials of the member schools. A train of outstanding figures in Southwest athletics has moved across the speaker's rostrum in the past five years. Included were Sammy Baugh, TCU All-American record-smashing passing ace, and at the time holder of many records of football pro circles as a member of the Washington Redskins pro football team; Mike Brumbeulow, head coach at Texas Western in El Paso; Billy Gilstrap, former University of Texas star and assistant coach at the University at the time of his appearance here; Abe Martin, head coach at Texas Christian University; and Jess Neeley, head coach at Rice Institute.

This year's banquet will be held in the new High School cafeteria. All-District players will be presented with certificates attesting the honors and the annual sportsmanship award, given by Edgar Glasscock of Sonora, will be presented to the District 6-A team winning the honor on vote of participating coaches and officials.

## Moore Sets Wildcat South of Vaughan; Discovery Testing

Crockett County gained location for a wildcat and a discovery was testing to complete.

John I. Moore of San Angelo has announced location for a 2,500-foot rotary wildcat, 2 1/2-mile south and slightly west of the Vaughan field and 16 1/2 miles northwest of Ozona. It will be drilled as the No. 1 Todd Ranch.

Location is 330 feet from the south and east lines of 33-WX-GC&SF.

The prospector is also 1 1/2 miles northeast of the shallow Howard Draw field but separated by a dry hole.

Superior Oil Co. No. 1-10 Shannon, Wolfcamp discovery in 10-BB-EL&RR, 20 miles southwest of Big Lake, was continuing to test through perforations between 6-637-57 feet.

On a 24-hour test, the project pumped 113 barrels of fluid, which was 1.4 per cent basic sediment and mud, the rest oil.

Union Oil & Gas Co. of Louisiana will drill an outpost and a step-out to production in the Amigo (San Andrea) field, 25 miles northwest of Ozona.

The tests, on a 322.95-acre lease in 2-50-University, will be drilled to 3,000 feet with rotary.

The No. 5-D University, 1/2-mile west, is 330 feet from the north and 2,970 feet from the east lines.

The No. 4-D University, 3/4-mile southwest, is 1,662 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the east lines.

Keweenaw Oil Co. has filed application to change location on its No. 1-M University, 3,000-foot Crockett County wildcat, located 19 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 2,310 feet from the west lines of 14-33-University.

## Congressman Rutherford Looks For Busy And 'Often Hectic' Session When Congress Meets; Pledges Cooperation In Flood Control Plans

West Texas' voice in Washington, Congressman J. T. Rutherford, looks for a "very busy and often hectic" session in Congress during 1956.

Congressman Rutherford, who will leave West Texas within a few days to again take his seat in the U. S. House of Representatives, for the second session of the 84th Congress, has just about completed several tours into all of the 19 counties in the sprawling 19th Congressional District.

"Our schedule during the coming session will be busy because of several major legislative items due to be considered," he says. "And with a Presidential election coming up in 1956 you may be assured at least a portion of the session will be hectic."

Rutherford, serving his first term in Congress after six years in the Texas Legislature, says he hopes politics will be held to a minimum during the approaching session.

"We must consider far too many key issues of paramount importance to our Nation to allow politics to interfere with our work," he says. "I hope all of us — Democrats and Republicans alike — will not resort to time-killing, costly delays merely because of the fact that a Presidential election is approaching."

Congressman Rutherford thinks a variety of matters will come before the 84th Congress for action. He cites the Harris Natural Gas Bill, passed by the House and awaiting Senate action in 1955; the Highway Construction program, defeated during 1955, but certain to arise again; the question of Federal aid to education; the Upper Colorado River Project, passed by the Senate but yet to be considered by the House.

"In addition," the West Texas Congressman says, "falling farm prices will come in for discussion, with both political parties striving for a plan which will put the farmer on a more stable basis."

Rutherford said he is certain more attention will be paid to flood control legislation, in the wake of recent heavy, damaging floods.

Rutherford has several projects on which he is working in behalf of the 19th District. He is hopeful the Harris Natural Gas Bill will clear the Senate, freeing producers and gatherers of natural gas from Federal control. He is also hopeful oil imports will be reduced, and is interested in seeing less cotton brought into the United States, more exported, so that larger cotton allotment acreages will be allowed West Texas farmers.

For Crockett County in particular, Rutherford is awaiting the activation of a radar station to be located near Ozona, bringing more than 200 military men and their families. He is also looking ahead for additional flood control work in the county and hopes actual construction of the flood retaining facilities will be started in the not-too-distant future. He pledged his cooperation when the matter reaches Congress.

## Quiet Observance Of Christmas Is Prospected

Ozona seems headed for a quiet observance of Christmas as the holiday approaches this week-end.

Since Christmas falls on Sunday this year, places of business will observe Monday as the official Christmas holiday and most firms will be closed that day. Some will close Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Christmas services are planned in all the churches Sunday morning. In the Methodist church, the college age youth of the church will participate in the services, with the sermon by Dr. Eugene Harris, district superintendent, in the absence of the Rev. J. Troy Hickman, who is recuperating in a Dallas hospital. There will be Christmas music and sermon in the Methodist and Baptist churches and in the Church of Christ, but beyond this no special services are planned.

## Lion Cagers Win One, Lose One In Week's Basketball Activity

Coach Swede Pelt's basketball team split two games during the week as they dropped a 67 to 64 contest in Rankin and then captured a 55 to 43 tilt from an improved Rock Springs team in Rock Springs.

Bobby Martinez and Johnny Ramirez led the attack in both contests but were very impressive for the first time this season as they scored 22 and 21 points respectively in the Rankin contest.

The Lions led through most of the Rankin contest and held a five point margin at the end of the third quarter only to see their defense, which had been poor all through the contest, collapse and allow the Rankin team to score ten points while the Lions were held scoreless.

In the Rock Springs game Tuesday night the Lions faced a vastly improved team from the one that had played here earlier. The Lions held a slight margin through most of the contest but pushed into a commanding lead in the fourth quarter.

Johnny Ramirez hit 21 points to lead all the scorers while Bobby Martinez had 10.

The Lions employed a new type of defense for the first time during the contest as Coach Pelt sought to improve a sagging man to man type of play which has not proven successful this season.

## Flood Plan May Get Approval By Early In March

### Speaker From S'west Conference Coaches Sought For Event

Soil Conservation Service officials predict early completion of the work plan on the Johnson Draw watershed control project and if the plan is ready for submission to Congress early in the 1956 session starting next month, that final approval may be forthcoming by March, opening the way for actual construction to begin next spring or early summer.

SCS officials have indicated that a conference will be held with local flood control committees and county officials shortly after the first of January for final approval and exchange of commitments, after which the plan will be ready to be sent to Washington.

On January 10, Crockett county voters will be asked to give approval to a \$200,000 bond issue for flood control purposes, this fund, or such part of it as will be necessary, representing Crockett county's part in the construction costs of a multiple dam flood retardation plan which will offer 100 percent control of upper Johnson draw flood waters and forever erase the threat of a repeat of the disastrous flood of June, 1954, which took 16 lives here and devastated Ozona and the ranch country to the south.

Although final cost figures will not be made public until the conference here between SCS officials and local groups, it has been learned that the recently completed survey has revealed that the cost likely will be kept within the estimated \$800,000, in spite of the fact that the estimated percentage of control of the watershed was increased from the original projected 50 percent to 100 percent. Of this amount, Crockett county's share of the cost, figured on the agreed not-to-exceed 25 percent will be \$200,000 or less.

When the work plan is submitted to Congress, that body and other government agencies will have 60 days in which to examine the plan, according to available information, and after that period of time, unless the project is turned down by Congress, it will stand approved.

Letting of contracts and supervision of the work will be in the hands of the Crockett Soil Conservation District, acting as agents for SCS and the county.

A total of seven structures have been planned in the SCS watershed control plan, six of them on Johnson and its tributaries north of Ozona and the seventh on Gurdley draw a mile northeast of the city.

OF ELECTION FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF CROCKETT

President qualified property voters of Crockett Texas: Notice that an election will be held on the 10 day of January 1956, in obedience to the order of the County Court on the 12th day of December, 1955, which is as follows: That a special election be held in said County on the 10 day of January, 1956, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

Therefore, be it ordered by the Commissioners of Crockett County, Texas:

That a special election be held in said County on the 10 day of January, 1956, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

Proposition Shall the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding Thirty-four (34) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes.

Not exceeding Thirty-one (31) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements.

Not exceeding Fifteen (15) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges.

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has been heretofore, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

Official Ballot For Re-Allocation of County Taxes

"Against Re-Allocation of County Taxes."

Each voter shall vote on the proposition hereby submitted by placing an X in the square beside the expression of his choice or said voter may scratch or mark out one of said expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

The polling places, presiding officers and special canvassing board for canvassing ballots of absentee voters, shall be as follows:

Table with columns: Prec., No., Voting Place, Presiding Officer. Includes locations like Court House, High School, North Elem, etc.

Special Canvassing Board: County Clerk's Office Leta Powell.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "Notice of Election For The Re-Allocation of County Taxes," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for three weeks prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall also be given by publication thereof in a newspaper of general circulation published in Crockett County, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than (Continued on Page Four)

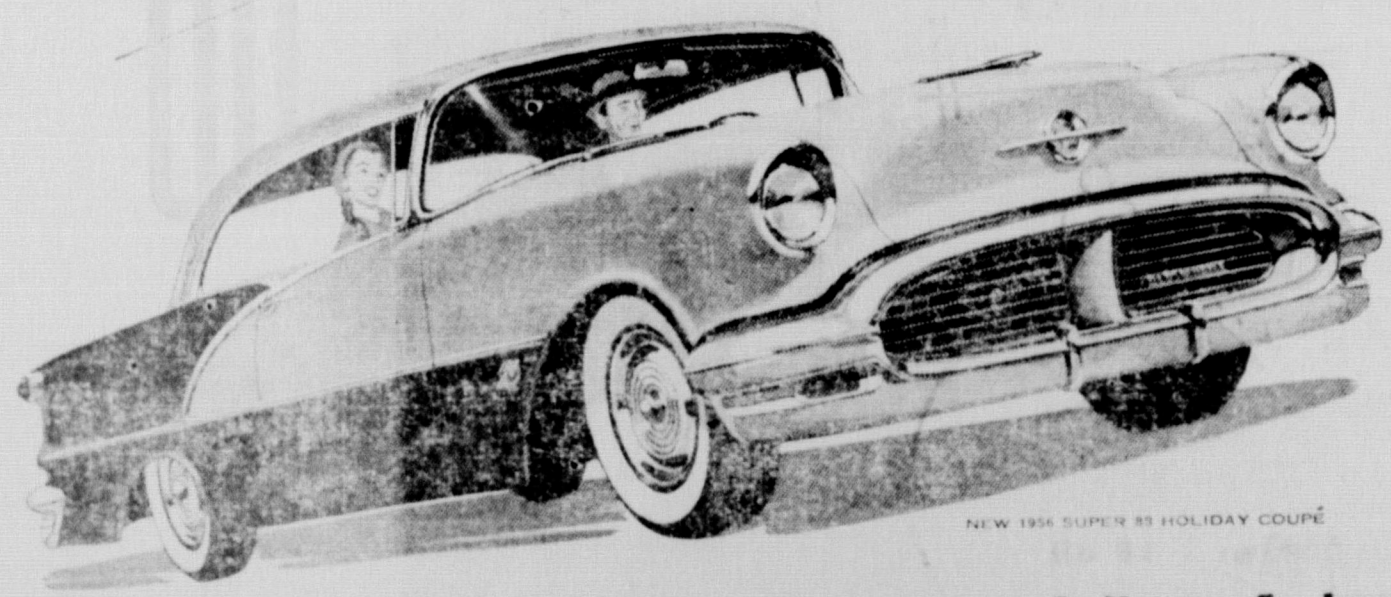

Take notice that an election will be held on the 10 day of January, 1956, in said County, in obedience to an election order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 12th day of December 1955, which is as follows:

Whereas, this Court has investigated the submission of the proposition of voting ad valorem taxes as provided by Acts 1949, 51st Legislature, Chapter 464, as amended, to the resident, qualified, property taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and this Court affirmatively finds that it would be beneficial to the county and the property located therein; and

Whereas, the Commissioners Court deems it advisable and to the best interest and beneficial to said county and the property located therein, to submit to the resident, qualified, property taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County in the sum of \$200,000.00, for the purpose of constructing permanent improvements for Flood Control purposes in said County;

Therefore, be it ordered by the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas:

That an election be held on the 10 day of January, 1956, in Crockett County, Texas, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

Proposition No. 1

Shall the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, be authorized to levy, assess and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within said County, except on the first \$3,000.00 valuation of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty (30) cents on each \$100.00 valuation in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, and all laws, as amended, enacted pursuant thereto, and provided that the revenues therefrom shall be

used by the Commissioners Court of said County in the manner and in the proportion as they shall determine, as authorized by Acts 1949, 51st Legislature, p. 849, et sep., Chapter 464, as amended, for the purpose of the construction and maintenance of Farm-to-Market and Lateral Roads or for Flood Control, either or both, and for the purpose of acquiring machinery, equipment and materials which are useful and necessary in carrying out said Flood Control purposes under the conditions specified in said Act, as amended.

The County Judge is further authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published within said County, on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14)

full days prior to the date set for said election.

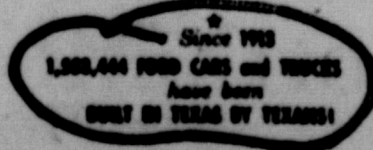

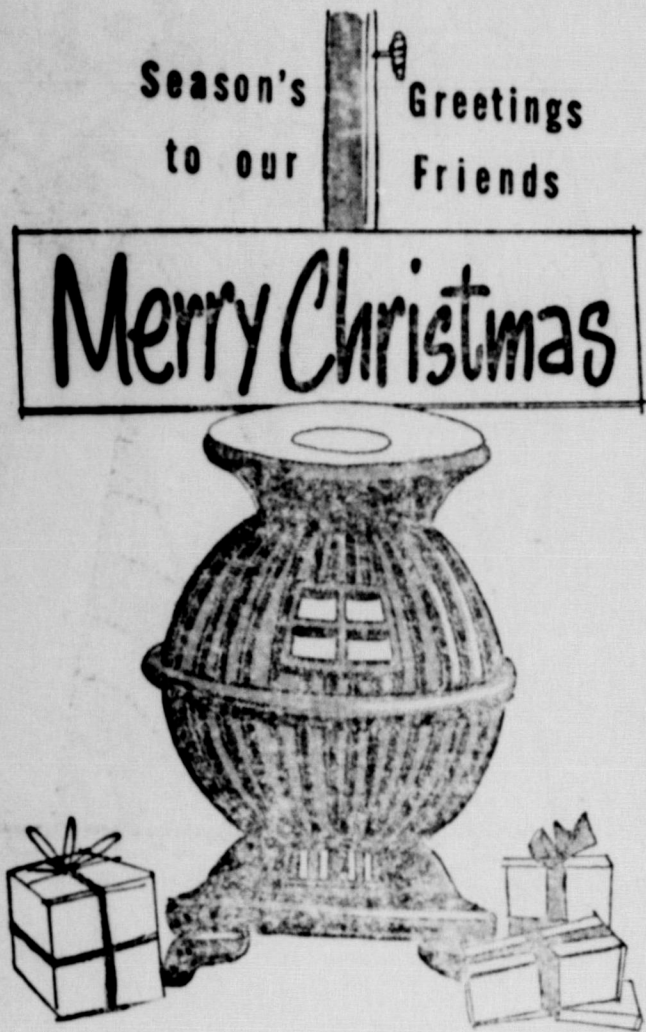

### UNIVERSITY ADMISSION EXAMS START FEB. 4

"Testing Time" for high school seniors and graduates begins Feb. 4, 1956, as the University of Texas begins a history-making system of selective admissions.

The system is aimed at choosing, through aptitude tests, only the best students, instead of admitting

applicants on the first-come-first-served basis.

The tests are designed to measure two very general abilities, working with words and with numbers, needed in academic work. Results of the tests are confidential. The University will give no publicity identifying scores of an individual student or school.

A student handicapped by blindness, paralysis, or similar disability in taking the tests, and a student who through prolonged illness is unable to take the tests at any of the dates specified should present a statement from his high school principal. All high school seniors and graduates who plan to apply for admission to the University as freshmen should take the tests. Test application blanks will be distributed to high schools and will be sent to individuals on request.

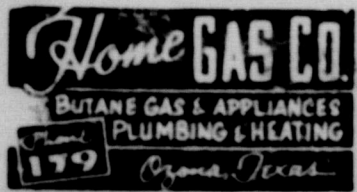

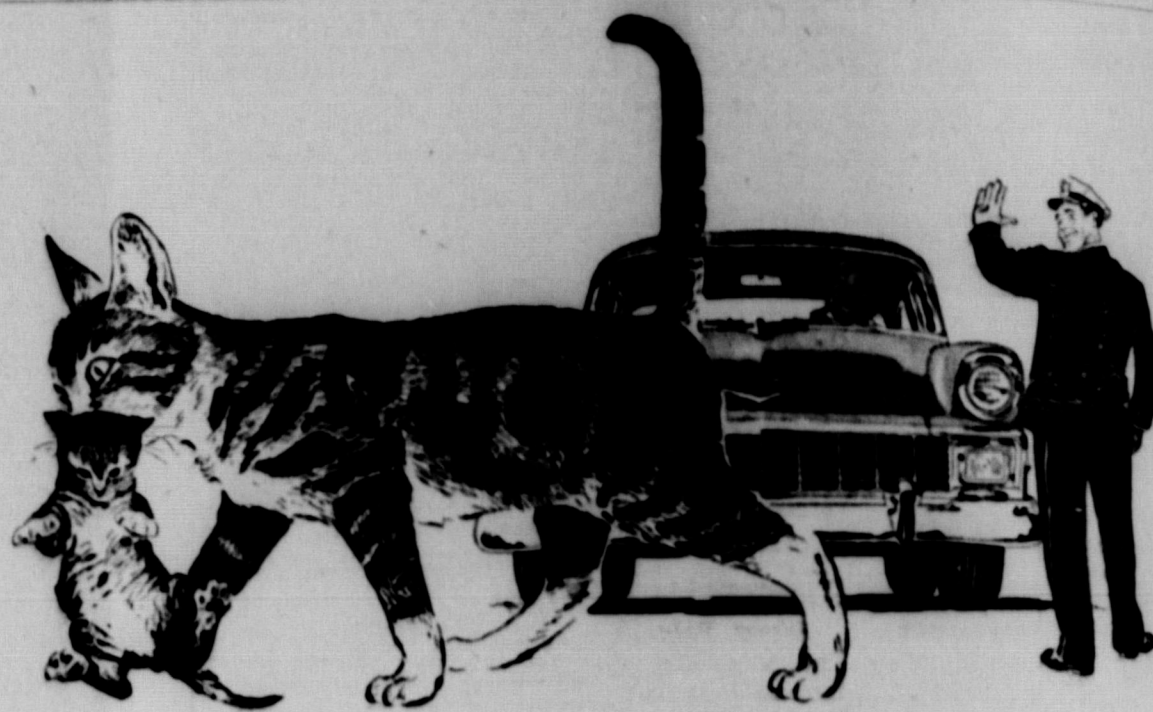
