**YOUR BEST FRIENDS NEED YOUR HELP!**

A local organization which most of the time gives freely of its own services, and they are mighty important services, now asks a little something of you — money that is.

The organization is the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department — and a more important organization Ozona has not. The fire boys have invited the Hill Country Firemen's Association to hold their August semi-annual convention in Ozona and the Association has accepted. Representatives from volunteer fire departments throughout the area east of here will attend the all-day convention.

The price of a ticket is \$2 but if you care to make it a five or a ten dollar bill it will speed up the fund raising job and make the fellows feel like they are appreciated.

We know they ARE appreciated and we know you will dig just as deep as you can when you find one with a supply of tickets.

**DO YOU WANT LOWER TAXES?**

It would be possible to reduce income taxes by 25 per cent for everyone — without eliminating or weakening any necessary government service or activity.

How could that be done? The Town Journal explains it succinctly in these words: "Here are the figures: the personal income tax takes from the people's earnings about \$30 billions a year. The Hoover proposals for shaking out the waste and inefficiency would cut the cost of Government by \$7.5 billions. That amount, \$7.5 billions, is 25 per cent of \$30 billions. Save that much and taxes could come down 25 per cent."

That \$7.5 billions could, instead, be applied to reducing the national debt, which many think should precede tax reduction. Or part could be used for debt reduction an part for tax reduction.

Some of the Hoover Commission recommendations have gone into effect. The prospect for others seems good. But many of them — including the most important, from the stand-point of saving money and making government more efficient — are dormant at this time. They can be brought to life by public interest and public demand for reform.

**THE HIGH COST OF SOCIALISM**

It is reported that Congressional appropriations for the Tennessee Valley Authority totalled \$1.95 billion during the 1934-55 fiscal years. And the state of Tennessee paid only \$24.4 million of this — not much over one per cent.

Where did the rest of the money come from? It came from the other states of course and was proportionate to their share of taxes paid to the federal government. New York, for instance, contributed \$290 million, California \$170.5 million, Illinois \$148.8 million, and so on down the list to Nevada, a state of very small population, which contributed \$2.7 million to help pay the power bills of those who use TVA's services.

This was natural and inevitable. Socialism soaks the many to allegedly benefit the few. It always has and it always will.

This brings up another point — just how greatly socialism, TVA-style, benefited Tennessee? We can go to a local authority, the Chattanooga News-Free Press, for a view on that. The paper cites a survey rating the states of the South in order of business progress during the past five years. In that list of 11 states, Tennessee stands 10th — just above the bottom.

Of this, the News-Free Press said: "The Tennessee Valley Authority has made a habit for two decades of claiming credit for everything good that has happened in Tennessee. . . Perhaps TVA wants to claim credit for seeing Tennessee rank 10th in the 11 Southern States in business progress. The leading states don't

have the 'blessing' of TVA and seem to be doing very well with the American free enterprise system.

"We hope progress isn't passing Tennessee by because of the socialism that has been established here."

There would seem to be a great deal of food for thought in this situation — for Tennesseans as well as the rest of us.

**WERE THEY CORRECT?**

The idea that American farmers "are in revolt," and that nothing short of sky-high price supports will serve to quell it, took a jolt in the Iowa Republican primary.

Iowa, with its world-famous corn-hog economy, certainly can be considered a typical farm state. In seeking renomination Senator Hickenlooper supported the Administration's flexible price support plan. His opponent, who holds a major state office and is widely known, urged high supports such as those contained in the farm bill the President vetoed some time ago. Mr. Hickenlooper won by a big margin.

It is certainly reasonable to assume that a great many thoughtful farmers must realize that the high, rigid support scheme, which must inevitably keep building up surpluses at an ever-increasing cost to the taxpayers at large, does not solve anything and simply creates more and more problems. In addition, farm prices, including livestock prices, have shown encouraging increases of late.

A man who is 100 per cent on the farmer's side recently had something noteworthy to say about farm policies and farm votes. He is Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. As he put it: "If we follow the emotional appeals of

**Continental Harris World Field Producer Rates 596 Bbls. Daily**

The World, West (Strawn) field of Crockett County has been extended one location north and west with completion of Continental Oil Co. No. 12-C T. Harris, in 1-BB2-N. A. Miller survey, 13 miles south of Texon.

It was completed for a daily, calculated flowing potential of 596 barrels of 50 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio 2.232-1.

Potential was based on an actual eight-hour flow of 198.73 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,118-136 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 8,148 feet, on total depth of 8,148 feet. Pay section was acidized with 1,000 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 8,072 feet on Kelly bushing elevation of 2,803 feet.

Tubing pressure was 1,250 pounds; casing pressure, 500 pounds.

The project will be drilled with cable tools to 1,850 feet. Estimated elevation is 2,710 feet.

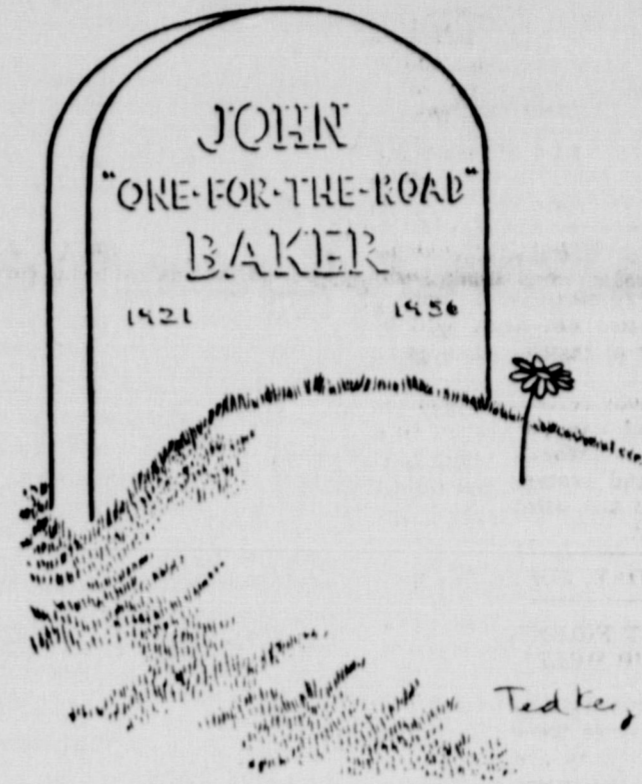
Location, on a 160-acre lease, is 330 feet from the north and east lines of the northwest quarter of 13-44-University.

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Politicians are waving their banners. Party leaders seek to rally their cohorts. But right now Texans are far more concerned about water.

Farm and city dwellers alike are hard hit. Years of drought have added up. Sizzling summer temperatures, unabated since the last of May, have finished off crop prospects for 1935 in many areas.

Few expect relief before the end of summer. Most despaired some time ago of rains that would "really break" the drought.

In Austin and elsewhere attention focussed on the often-bitter scrambles for dwindling streamflows. Prolonged and frequently heated testimony has been heard by the State Board of Water Engineers on water rights from the proposed Canyon Dam in South Central Texas.

San Antonio sought permission to take 100,000 acre feet of water annually from the dam. It is the only way, said San Antonio officials, that the city can meet its future water needs.

Guadalupe Blanco River Authority strenuously opposed the request. Joined by citizens of some 20 small towns in the area GBRA contended that the city allocation would not leave enough for downstream users, nor enough to operate a hydro-electric plant.

Testimony is expected to continue for several weeks. Ultimate decision probably will set a precedent for future controversies.

Farther South, the Rio Grande reached its lowest point since it stopped flowing completely in 1953. Falcon Dam was shut down, and a watermaster was appointed to ration the dwindling supply among Valley cities.

Legislators making up the state water resources committees came out with an idea for the future. They proposed a \$100,000,000 Texas Water Development Fund. Controversy over whether to finance water conservation by an ad-valorem or water-use tax defeated the program last session.

This new approach of financing through bonds would by-pass the

difficulty, said proponents. But it would take a long time. First, legislative action; then a constitutional amendment by the people.

Meanwhile farmers are leaving their parched fields and looking for work in town to support their families.

**Labor Unions Are Active**—Members of Texas' labor unions are working hard to place Liberals in control of state and party offices. And, a politically-confident tone prevailed among some 1,000 delegates at the State Federation of Labor convention, here.

Union labor leaders, who played a mighty important part in ousting the conservatives from control of the Democratic party, have openly announced that they will campaign to: 1. Elect Ralph Yarborough governor; 2. Elect legislators friendly to labor; 3. Defeat Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey; 4. Gain control of the state Democratic convention in September; and 5. Elect Liberals to the State Democratic Executive Committee.

**Labor Law Decision Pending**—Texas' right-to-work law now awaits state Supreme Court ruling, possibly July 11.

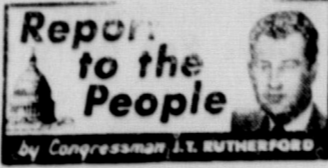
Opponents and backers of the law clashed sharply in final arguments before the court. Union attorneys declared that the Texas case parallels a Nebraska suit in which the U. S. Supreme Court recently voided that state's right-to-work law in the railway industry. Railroad attorneys objected strenuously. They declared the Texas case presents much broader issues.

Said Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard, in behalf of the Texas law: "The issue before this court is the right of any Texas citizen to work in his chosen occupation without being forced to give allegiance to any organization which might be against his personal beliefs."

**New Highway Policy**—An important new step in state policy has been announced by the Texas Highway Commission, for administering the new Federal highway aid program.

If and when the state provides it more money, the commission will begin to assume part of the heavy cost of right-of-way — now borne wholly by cities and counties. This for highways of the primary state system not included in the new federal interstate system.

Apparently Congressman Smith of Virginia has the situation well in hand as concerns his bill, HR 3, which specifies that any Federal law may not over rule any State law, unless the Federal legislation is written so as to contain this provision when acted upon by Congress.

Smith, as Chairman of the House Rules Committee, is not in position to send his bill to the Floor of the House for action now that it has cleared the Judiciary Committee.

Advocates of States Rights feel the measure is a good one, from two standpoints: first, it will restore self-government to a greater degree to the individual States, and secondly, when a bill contains the provision that it will over-ride States Rights, it will be given more careful examination by all concerned, and consequently, will be more difficult to enact. It is hoped the bill be voted on by the House within a few days.

Score one for those of us who have alleged that "mass evacuation" from Washington is impossible due to crowded highways and many, many automobiles. The House District Committee, of which I am a member, discussed evacuation last year, in the event of Atomic attack upon the Nation's Capitol. Many of us pointed to the creeping, crawling traffic during the "rush hours" here daily as evidence the plan would not work, but we ran into opposition, Civil Defense and Military authorities, at a conference here last week, officially accepted our position. Testimony revealed that the highways would probably become scenes of "stalled automobiles, helpless thousands and general panic." The not-so-easy task at hand to figure out some plan to provide adequate protection for the people of the Washington area in the event of emergency or disaster.

I was rather amused last week, when a number of controversial bills came up, at telegrams and letters directed to me from various National Organizations. Each of the organizations told its membership total, and alleged to be speaking for the entire group. At the

same time, telegrams and letters came in from individual members in West Texas, saying: "Never mind what the organization says. We don't feel that way about this legislation."

About a year ago one National group "advised" me its membership stood solidly behind a certain bill. I conducted a poll of the members in my District and found them more than 2 to 1 against the organization's recommendation! So the organizations, apparently, do not always know whereof they speak.

During the past two weeks, and in the approaching two weeks, the Congress is handling the most important legislation of the 18 months, and approaches a crucial period. All of the "hot" items seem to be crowded into the final few days of the session. Members of Congress have become accustomed

to getting some strong letters from persons who disagree with the votes cast by the Members on these controversial items. But, somehow, the persons favoring the stand taken by the Congressmen fail to write their appreciation, although they may have contacted him earlier in the session and asked his vote as he ultimately did.

So you might say these are the days which try mens souls. Some of the items considered and to be considered in the last days of this Congress include: Military Appropriation bills, Foreign Aid, Veteran's Bonus legislation, Highway Bill, Federal Aid to Schools, Federal Aid to Health, the Civil Rights legislation, and so on.

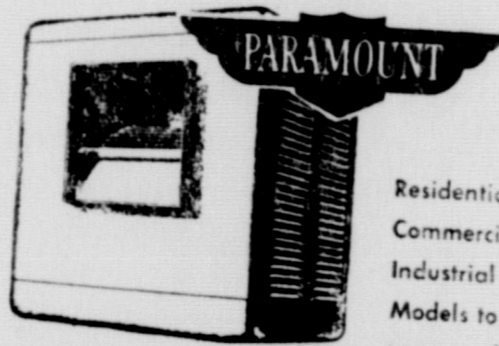
One of the reasons for the continued acceptance of these old lines, to take only one example, by Europeans is that they haven't had advertising to teach them what's new.

**The News Reel**

Run of "The Ozona Story" cleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

**The Stockman, July 7, 1927**

Frank Taylor of Ozona narrowly escaped serious injury late last week when his Lincoln sedan rolled over this side of Del Rio. A hand was in the car with Taylor but neither suffered injury.

A curtain was rung down on the greatest celebration in the history of Ozona Wednesday night more than 10,000 persons were entertained during the day event. The celebration ended off Monday morning with more than 8,000 visitors jamming town. Traffic in the downtown area and on the road to the grounds was jammed throughout the day. A free barbecue in park attracted the largest crowd in the celebration's history. Of the winners in the roping contest: J. C. Montgomery and Hodges in cow milking; Morris Dudley and Emmett second; Howard Westfall in breakaway; J. C. Montgomery in half roping; Dan Utley, Cope Cove, in bronc riding; goat roping, Albert Bailey, Ford Coates Grover King; three-day average roping, Allen Holder.

Approximately \$16,000 worth of blooded livestock, mostly sheep and cattle, were sold during the show and sale held in connection with the celebrations here last week. N. L. Johnson held the record in the sale ring.

Crockett County Rambouillet sheep breeders carried off a good share of honors in the second annual stock show and rodeo this week. Among the heaviest winners were A. C. Hoover, V. I. Pierce and B. B. Ingham.

J. E. Piner, former proprietor of the Ozona Boot Shop and a long time resident of Ozona, suffered the loss of his right foot early Thursday morning when a 12-gauge shotgun was accidentally discharged while he was attempting to unload it. Mr. Piner, who has been in failing health for some time, was preparing to leave for a hospital for treatment at a hospital here. Just before leaving he remembered that the shotgun had not been unloaded and went back to show out the shells. The gun discharged in some manner, the full load striking Mr. Piner's foot at close range. He was given first aid treatment here by Dr. G. L. Coates and then rushed to a San Angelo hospital for further treatment.

The lights may have blinked a few times during the celebration but anyway there was plenty of water for the visitors — and it didn't cost them a cent. Also there was plenty of barbecue and that

didn't cost them a cent.

**Rutherford to Remain in Washington Job In Campaign Need**

He feels he should "place his politics," Congressman Rutherford of the 16th Congressional District reported from Washington today he will remain in the nation's Capitol "until the end of the year." He has acted on a number of important, far-reaching bills which concern all our tax-payers, West Texas and throughout the nation. Rutherford added that most of the measures include appropriations amounting to billions of dollars.

West Texas Congressman Rutherford, re-election to a second term in the United States House of Representatives, said he is also "actively" giving up his earnings to attend July 4th celebrations in Odessa and Pecos, as well as events at Fort Bliss and on July 5th and 6th, "before an unexpectedly heavy Congressional action scheduled during that week of July."

At the same time, Rutherford decided that his wife, Sara, will represent the Congress in West Texas within a few days, substitute for him during the present campaign. Mrs. Rutherford will represent the Congress at various West Texas political and other public events and "assume personal control of my campaign while I am in Washington," Congressman Rutherford expressed his sincer-

ere and deep regrets that he is unable to return home at the present time and visit with the people he represents in Congress.

"I personally enjoy campaigning and visiting with the people of the District," he said, "and I know it is a natural thing to expect a Member of Congress to be in his district when seeking re-election. I know, too, I am running a certain amount of risk in not returning."

"However, the people of West Texas gave me a job to do. That job is going on in Washington right now, and I would feel remiss in my duty should I leave while major legislative items are being considered."

"During the campaign period, Congressional action includes the huge foreign aid bill, final disposition of the \$52 billion Highway Bill, the Veteran's Benefits measure, Federal Aid to Education, the so-called Civil Rights bill, National Defense Appropriation, laws to improve enforcement of narcotics regulations, legislation to correct recent decisions of the Supreme Court and to redefine States Rights, and other measures of similar importance."

He said that if he should absent himself from Congress at this time, West Texas would be without a voice and vote in vital legislation affecting the District, State and Nation.

Rutherford also pointed out that he is working on a number of projects for various towns and cities in the 16th District, and says he does not feel he should abandon

these activities at the 11th hour of the session to concern himself with politics. One of these projects on which the Congressman is lending every aid is the Johnson Draw watershed plan.

"I hope to be able to return to West Texas awhile before the election if the Legislative load lightens," Rutherford said, "but even if this is possible, my campaign time will be limited with 19 Counties and 42,000 square miles to cover with a few days."

**Proper Management Of Range Key To Profits, Says Range Specialist**

College Station — "Proper use and stocking of range land has proven to be profitable from pounds of livestock produced as well as from conservation of soil and water to withstand droughts," says G. O. Hoffman, Extension Range Specialist, Texas A&M College.

In speaking of the practices, Hoffman referred to them as the tools of range management. Each individual should choose the range management tool that will best help him maintain a long lasting, profitable ranching business. These range land practices are:

proper use and stocking, deferred and rotation grazing, brush control, reseeding, cross-fencing, salt and water distribution and walkways in marshlands.

Hoffman says the rancher should graze only the number of livestock that he has grass for, with stocking rates figured on usnig half and leaving half of the current year's growth. Another good practice is deferred grazing. The deferred pastures can be mighty important as a feed reserve during winter. Or, by rotating livestock, one pasture can be deferred while grazing others, says Hoffman.

"By controlling brush, water ordinarily sapped from the ground by trees is left for grass. Brush

control should always be followed by deferred grazing," Hoffman cautions. Cross fencing should be planned where each area has the same grazing potential. This means that an acre of bottomland may graze as many livestock as 5 acres of upland.

When it is not profitable to fence, then proper salt and water distribution can give the rancher a chance to use grasses in the ungrazed corner. Livestock do not need water and salt together as once thought. Livestock will find salt when it is moved into ungrazed areas if they need it.

"Practice of these conservation methods will assure a more profitable business in the future," says Hoffman.
