## Favored Big Lake To Open Football Season Here Fri.

### Owls Will Be Seeking Revenge For 25-0 Defeat In 1955

The Ozona Lions will open their 56 football campaign at Lion stadium Friday night at 8 p. m. when they face the heavily favored Reagan County Owls.

Coach Pete Hickman's big, experience-laden ball club has been established as a two to three touch-down favorite over the local club which is woefully weak in reserve strength.

The invaders will be seeking revenge for a 25 to 0 pasting they took at the hands of the Lions in Ozona last year when, with what they considered to be their best all club in years, they were completely outclassed by the surprising district 6-A champions.

Coach Pete Hickman's squad was bolstered Monday when Robert Martinez joined the squad. Martinez, a letterman fullback last year, will add both offensively and defensively to the squad's strength.

Big Lake is reported to have a traveling squad of some 44 men opposed to Ozona's twenty-four out for football and is expected to carry about a 30 pounds to the man weight advantage into the contest.

The Lions will have Jake Young, Jimmy Brown, Roy Glen Sutton and Jess Marley back from last year's front wall and will have quadmen, Billy Bob Holden and Jerry Jacobs and first year man Ed Franklin or squadman Mark White at the center post.

In the backfield, the Lions will have Kent Babb, Bobby Sutton and Robert Martinez all of whom had a goodly amount of playing time last season along with George Bunker who saw some service. To add to this group will be quarterback Stanley Williams who was on the B team last fall after reporting for practice late.

For the first time, season tickets to reserved seats are being offered to customers. The reserved seats comprise about half of the best stands and are being offered to fans at no advance in price. At last report the tickets were selling at a rapid clip. Those wishing to purchase season tickets should go by or call the high school.

Fans not purchasing season passes should go early Friday night as a standing room only crowd is expected to view the contest which will be the season opener for both ball clubs.

Baylor University athletic director George Sauer addressed an enthusiastic crowd of men at the Ozona High School Tuesday night as the Crockett County Sheriff's Posse held its annual barbecue honoring the Ozona football team and their fathers.

Mr. Sauer in his address, part of which was directed to the boys and part to the fathers, stressed the value of making an effort on your own part to get those things we would like to have and need in our lives.

The former Nebraska All-American said that he was sure that today's fathers, like fathers in many generations want to give their sons the things they had wanted and didn't have, but he cautioned that these things should be earned if they are to be of real value to the child.

Superintendent of Schools L. B. T. Sikes introduced the speaker after Coach Fred Hickman had introduced the 1956 Lion football squad to the crowd.

A band composed of Corbett Smith, Don Lott, Jimmy Carroll, Bill Cooper and Al Fields provided musical entertainment for the group.

## Big Spring Man Killed In Labor Day Road Crash

### Woman Companion Hurt When Car Fails To Make Curve

One of the 38 traffic deaths which occurred in Texas over the long labor day holiday week-end was in Crockett county, 22 miles south of Ozona on Highway 163 where a Big Spring cafe operator died almost instantly when his car failed to negotiate a curve.

V. P. (Shorty) Dunbar, 51, was added to the list of the state's record week-end dead when he was crushed to death in the catapulting vehicle. Investigating highway patrolman said Dunbar's car struck a shoulder on the road rap through a guard post and overturned two or three times.

The accident occurred as Dunbar was returning to Big Spring from a visit into Mexico.

Injured in the accident was Mrs. Ruth Neatherlin, 31, also of Big Spring. She was admitted to Crockett County Hospital with a broken collar bone. Her condition is reported good.

Funeral services were held from the River Funeral Home in Big Spring. The body was taken there Monday afternoon in a casket coach from the Cody Funeral Home of Ozona.

Survivors include the widow; three sons, four daughters, his mother, a brother, six sister and eight grandchildren.

## Contributions Sought To Hospital Memorial Fund For Equipment

The Board of Directors of the Crockett County Hospital have established a permanent hospital memorial fund to receive contributions from citizens who wish to set up memorials to loved ones or friends and at the same time provide a practical community help.

The special fund was established in response to many requests from citizens who wished to use this means of honoring the memory of friends or relatives.

Contributions to such a fund would be especially timely at present since the board is in the process of furnishing the new hospital, which will be occupied beginning September 25. There is, however, a continuing need for pieces of equipment, large and small, and the memorial fund will continue to be of benefit to the citizenship as a means of establishing memorials and to the hospital in acquiring needed equipment which operating receipts would not provide, it was pointed out by the hospital administrator, J. B. Post.

All memorials will be properly set up and properly recognized, and acknowledged at the proper time, Mr. Post said. The hospital is in need of a number of pieces of equipment, Mr. Post said, including, among the larger items, furniture for the dining room, a surgical dressing table, wheel chair, TV sets for use in patient rooms (the hospital is wired for connections in each room to the community TV antenna system), linens, kitchen ware, enamel ware and many other items.

Donations to the memorial fund, however large or small, will be appreciated by the board and hospital staff.

## Agreements Signed On Construction & Maintaining Dams

### SCS Officials Meet In Planning Session With Sponsoring Groups

First steps toward the start of construction of flood retardation dams on the upper reaches of the Johnson Draw watershed to protect the town of Ozona and downstream ranch lands from a repetition of the devastating flood of June 1954 were taken here Friday morning when three officials of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service met with the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the board of supervisors of the Crockett Soil Conservation District, local sponsors of the flood control project.

The meeting was held in the office of Bob Scott, area conservationist with the SCS, in the Hotel Ozona. SCS officials attending were Bob Peery from the Washington SCS office, and W. T. Moon and Harold Baker from the state SCS headquarters in Temple. Dick Ketchum, assistant to the local conservationist, was also in attendance.

An official agreement between the federal fund dispensing agency and those in charge of the Crockett county participation was signed to clear the way for the start of operations by the SCS engineers. The local group made it plain that they want the Soil Conservation Service engineers to do the job, since the amendments passed by the last Congress made it possible for the local sponsoring agencies to employ private engineers if they so choose.

First step to be taken locally will be the completion of easements to be signed by land owners on whose properties the structures are to be built. The SCS engineers will begin soon to make core tests and other surveying operations. Agreements is to be reached between the service and the local sponsoring agencies on the sites for the first three structures to be built, these planned for completion within the present fiscal year.

Contracts for actual construction of the dams will be let through the local agencies, probably by the Commissioners Court, with the S.D. supervisors acting in an advisory capacity. After completion of the structures, the local agencies will be charged with their maintenance.

The visiting SCS officials told the group that if the community decides it is interested in providing a reserve municipal supply of water by adding to the height of one of the flood control structures, the selected structure will be redesigned and then submitted to Washington for approval. Original estimate given the local sponsors was \$25,000 as the additional cost for such a dam. The Gurbey draw dam has been suggested as the closest and most convenient site for this purpose but additional tests must be made before its final selection. The Crockett Water District has budgeted a \$25,000 item in its recently approved \$250,000 bond issue to provide for this reserve storage.

**ANOTHER "SCRAP OF PAPER?"**

"Biggest stake in the diplomatic poker game currently being played over the Suez Canal is oil," says The Oil And Gas Journal. If, for instance, Egypt's Premier Nasser's seizure resulted in closing this vital waterway to international traffic, the oil would have to be carried around the Cape of Good Hope or greatly increased pipeline capacity would have to be built between the Middle East and the Mediterranean. In either case the cost — both in money, and in the even more essential coin of time — would be enormous, and the effect on the industry of England and much of Western Europe could be catastrophic.

Going beyond oil, the implications of Nasser's action are ominous in the extreme. The New York Times came straight to the principle at stake in these words: "If, at any time and under any conditions, a man or a nation can simply throw away their commitments the whole basis for normal living is undermined if not destroyed — It isn't a question of how much money General Nasser can take out of the canal or even of whether he can operate it at all. It is a question of whether international agreements such as that respecting Suez are morally binding or are scraps of paper to be torn up at the whim of the dictator. That is a matter of the utmost

concern not merely for Britain, France and Egypt but for all of us."

both Britain and France have made it clear that Nasser's action will not be countenanced. The hope — as President Eisenhower had said — is that this matter of vast gravity can be settled without recourse to force of arms.

**ALICE-IN-TAXLAND**

There is an Alice-In-Wonderland quality about our federal income tax laws, with their extremely high upper-bracket rates. U. S. News & World Report gives an example.

The magazine says: "A baseball player's gesture, during a ball game, may cost the Federal Government \$4,200 in income taxes. It also may bring the athlete a personal profit of \$4,200."

Does that sound absurd? Well, here's the true story. The world's highest-salaried ballplayer (\$100,000 a year) was fined \$5,000 by his club for a display of temper toward the fans. This is considered a business expense, for the reason that the fine must be paid if the player is to keep on practicing his profession. Thus, his taxable income is reduced by the \$5,000.

After deductions, the top tax rate on this player's income is 84 per cent. So the fine gives him a tax reduction of \$4,200, leaving him only \$800 out of pocket.

But that isn't all. Admirers of the player are reported to be making up a fund to pay the fine. U. S. News says: "If they give him \$5,000, that amount is not taxable at all. In that case, the ballplayer would stand an \$800 loss and a \$5,000 gain, for a net profit of \$4,200."

Very few of us have any personal experience with either \$100,000 incomes or \$5,000 fines. But this factual illustration indicates just how confused, inequitable, and generally unsound our tax laws are. Like Topsy, they just grew — and grew into a carzy-quilt. That's why sentiment for a complete overhaul has been snowballing.

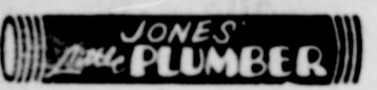

**HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — Instead of simmering down at summer's end, Texas' political pot is boiling more furiously than ever.

New significance has been added to the already-controversial State Democratic Convention next week. Monday the executive committee must certify a winner in one of the most breathtakingly close gubernatorial races in Texas history.

Unofficial counts showed Price Daniel leading Ralph Yarborough by some 3,000 votes. But each side regarded returns in certain areas as questionable.

It promises to be an even closer finish than in 1952 when Mrs. Miriam Ferguson edged out Ross Sterling by 3,798 votes.

Decision of the executive committee apparently is all-important. In the Ferguson-Sterling contest courts refused to interfere with the committee ruling. They said it would delay the general election.

Senate candidate jump in — Would-be successors to Price Daniel didn't wait for the vacancy to develop to start scrambling for his U. S. Senate post.

Political observers predict a "real horse race" if Daniel does resign in time for a special election.

First formal announcement came from State Sen. Searcy Bracewell of Houston. Bracewell promised to vote with Democrats in organizing the Senate, but made it clear he voted for Ike in '52, and would do so again.

He is a major threat to the Texas GOP's official endorsee, Thad Hutcheson, a young Houston attorney. Hutcheson promised "no token fight."

James P. Hart, former Supreme Court justice and University of Texas chancellor, also has announced.

### Reagan and Sutton Counties Named for Roughage Subsidy

Walter T. McKay, State Director of Home Administration, today advised George H. James Jr., County Supervisor, of the designation of Reagan, Sutton and Hay counties under the Hay and Roughage Program for Texas.

Application to participate in the Hay and Roughage program will be received by county Farmers Home Administration committees immediately at the Farmers Home Administration office located at Ozona, Texas, and at the A. S. C. office in Sutton and Reagan Counties.

The Hay and Roughage Program worked out between the Governor and the Secretary of Agriculture to provide emergency assistance to farmers and ranchers in the State's designated disaster areas. Under the program the county FHA committee will examine each applicant's eligibility and will issue a certificate for \$7.50 per ton on roughage actually purchased. The applicant then apply the certificate on purchase price of roughage at any dealer he chooses. The dealer endorses the certificate and sends a draft on the Emergency Relief Committee's account.

Applications may be filed through December 31, for a supply of roughage needed to last through December 31. Roughage under the program includes hay either baled or loose, cotton seed hulls, peanut shells, corn cobs, sorghum bundles and silage.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From Stockman, Sept. 8, 1927

A slight drop in enrollment in the elementary grades of the Ozona schools this year brought the total number of pupils enrolled down slightly from the total of last year, according to figures released by Supt. C. G. Minatra.

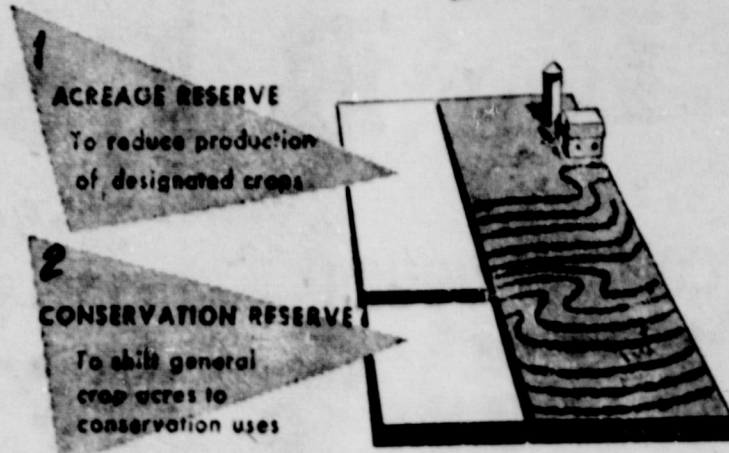

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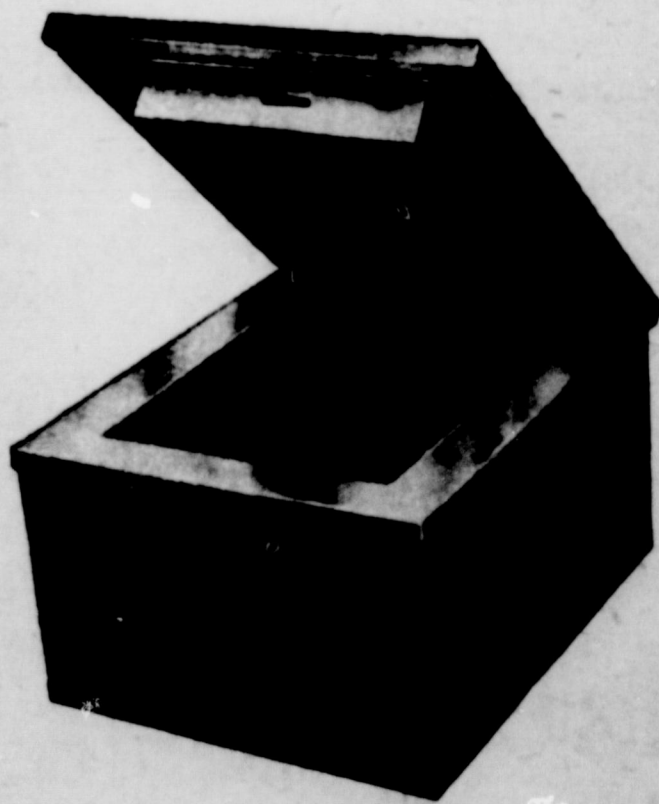

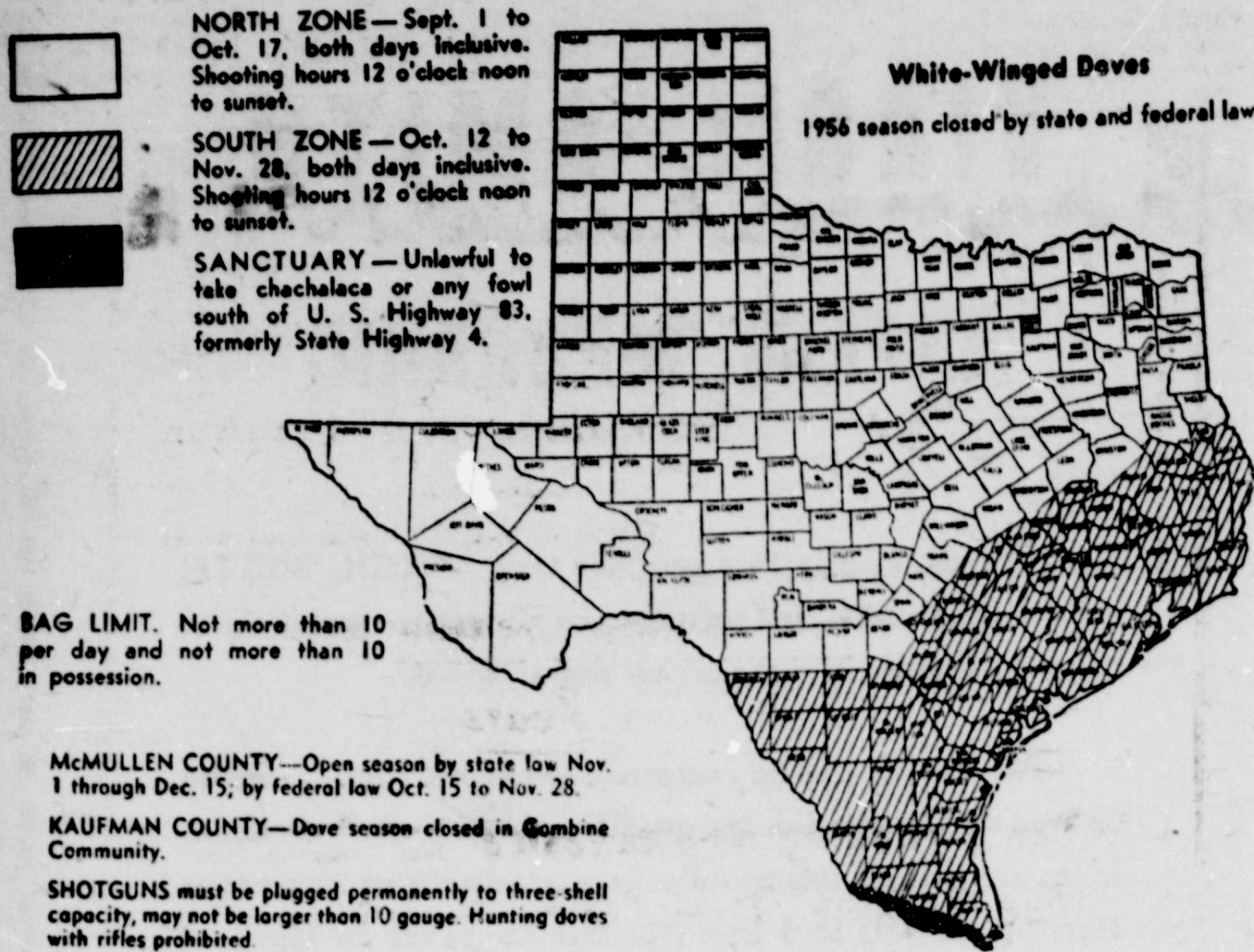

### For Hardeman Presents An Analysis of Proposed Amendments To Texas Constitution

General election ballot will contain several proposed amendments to the State Constitution. These amendments, and subsequent articles, are being presented to the citizens of the Senatorial District in determining their course of action there.

Order of presentation bears relation to the degree of importance which may attach to special proposals as they vary according to interests. Any change in the law is of vital concern and the thoughtful consideration of citizens.

R. 23 relates to the re-allocation of County tax levies and the Commissioner's court than at six-year intervals for an election for such purposes. The overall rate will be held and only its reallocation the four constitutional would be authorized.

R. 30 proposes financial aid for needy disabled persons between the ages of 18 and 65 and an annual appropriation of more than \$1,500,000.00. Authorization would "bridge the gap" between the time that they are "legally" released from support of their children and the time as they become eligible for old age assistance. (Initially, this proposal will not be on at the general election on November 6, but at an election held on November 13. This is a "bust" in writing the law.)

R. 31 relates to the payment of compensation to persons imprisoned unjustly. Some mistakes have occurred and the State has no authority to reimburse these unfortunate individuals. The amount, method, etc., would be left to the discretion of the Legislature.

R. 46 pertains to the oath required to be taken. The oath is applicable only to "appointed" officials, although it is by "appointed" officials. The proposal is designed to proper appropriate oaths for

each type of officials. H. J. R. 9 relates to the denial of bail to any person accused of a felony less than capital who has been heretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction having been subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction therefor, after a hearing and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused pending trial, by a judge or magistrate and providing that if such accused is not accorded a trial within sixty days upon such accusation, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside and such accused be given the right to bail.

This is a major departure in the "law of the land," to the effect that any accused is entitled to bail, except in capital cases where the proof is evident. Sufficient safeguards may have been incorporated in the proposal to not abridge such basic right "unduly," if such can actually be done. "Repeaters" are aggravating to prosecutors and enforcement officers, but sight should not be lost of established fundamental rights. The presentation of proof of substantial guilt of an accused, together with his right to trial within sixty days, will have the tendency of cooling the ardor of "witch-burners."

H. J. R. 11 pertaining to the commitment of persons of unsound mind is a most important departure and is emphasized by the pathetic situation, along with the helplessness of the individual. A similar proposal was rejected by the people of Texas in 1949, but its sponsors were undaunted and have succeeded in bringing about its submission.

This question is highly controversial. While the present method of some 80 years acceptance and experience may not be the best, nevertheless, the utter absence of absolute standards of medical or psychiatric determination and cure for such cases, being decided upon mere opinions based on "hearsay", in most instances, it should receive

the most soul-searching consideration. It appears to hold more possibilities for abuse than under existing procedure; while, on the other hand, less publicity and less embarrassment might attach.

Some apparent safeguards are included, but these may easily be formally complied with, while the substance is overlooked.

S. J. R. 5 proposes changes in the teachers' retirement program by authorizing an increase in the State contribution not to exceed 6% of the compensation received annually, and in no event, not to exceed \$504.00 for any one year, as well as changing the time for retirement and provide for the withdrawal of funds under prescribed conditions.

The rising cost of living and the desire to attract and retain teachers to the profession and to enable others to retire are advanced as justification for its adoption.

S. J. R. 2, if adopted, will authorize

the issuance of an additional one hundred million dollars of bonds for the Veterans Land Board to purchase land for resale to eligible veterans.

Recent scandals in this department, no doubt, will have a tremendous influence on this.

There is one other proposal,

namely, authorizing "playing the stock market" with the Permanent University Fund, which will be discussed in a subsequent story as time and space do not now permit. Its importance cannot be over-emphasized.

It is hoped from the foregoing that readers may be stimulated to

make full investigation of these matters to enable them to cast a patriotic vote.
