Agreements Signed On Construction & **Maintaining Dams**

SCS Officials Meet In Planning Session With Sponsoring Groups

First steps toward the start of construction of flood retardation dams on the upper reaches of the Johnson Draw watershed to protect the town of Ozona and downstream ranch lands from a repetition of the devastating flood of June 1954 were taken here Friday morning when three officials of the U: S. Soil Conservation Service met with the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the board of supervisors of the Crockett Soil Conservation District, local sponsors of the flood control project.

The meeting was held in the office of Bob Scott, area conservationist with the SCS, in the Hotel Ozona. SCS officials attending were Bob Peery from the Washington SCS office, and W. T. Moon and Harold Baker from the state SCS headquarters in Temple Dick Ketchum, assistant to the local conservationist, was also in attendance.

An official agreement between the federal fund dispensing agency and those in charge of the Crockett county participation was signed to clear the way for the start of operations by the SCS engnieers. The local group made it plain that they want the Soil Conservation Service engineers to do
