The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From Stockman Sept. 15, 1927

Blowing in early Saturday morning at 990 feet with a gush of oil and gas, the Gulf No. 1 George L. Thompson on the western edge of Crockett county extended the wonder shallow oil pool of the world, the Yates field in eastern Pecos county, into Crockett county a short distance. The well was flowing a nestimated 40 barrels hourly from brown-sandy lime, with the tool stuck in the hole nine feet from the bottom.

The well is 150 feet from the south and west lines of Sec. 71, block 1, I&GN survey. Gulf No. 1 Thompson is the first Crockett county producer outside the Powell field, discovered late in May, 1924, by the World Oil Co.

Harrison L. Hamer has resigned his position as special officer and inspector for the Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. He was appointed last winter and has been working since that time.

Work on the foundation for the new West Texas Utilities Co. building here was started this week after the work of filling in the building site with dirt from the street cut in front had been completed.

W. A. Adams, Crockett county ranchman for 13 years and in the ranching business continuously for the past 29 years, has leased his eight section ranch northeast of Ozona and sold all his livestock on the ranch to Walter Childress of Ozona.

Immunization of all Ozona residents against typhoid fever and especially those who live near homes that have had cases of the disease was urged this week by Dr. G. L. Coates, county health officer, as a means of preventing further spread of the disease.

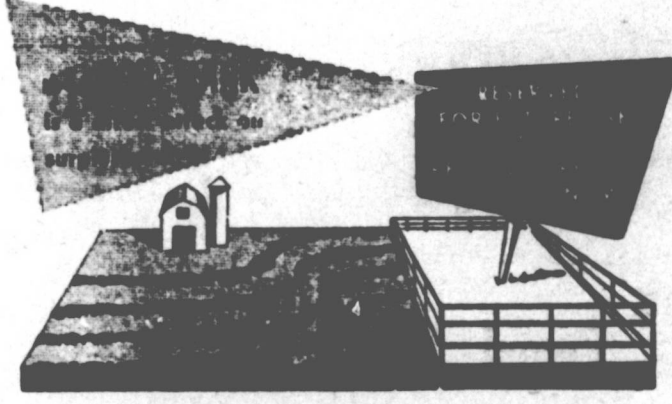

The National Soil Bank program will help reduce price-depressing surpluses of wheat, corn, cotton, peanuts, rice and tobacco without placing all of the burden on the farmer, the U. S. Department of Agriculture says in announcing the 1937 Soil Bank program. Surpluses of these crops in excess of 1937 levels will be placed in "bank" areas long confined to pile up surplus production control and intensive marketing programs here and abroad. The 1937 Average Reserve encourages farmers to cut production below their average allotments and earn bonus, with payments for average reduction to help maintain or improve net farm income. Under the Conservation Reserve, farmers receive payments for land taken out of production and conserved for future use. Participation in the Soil Bank will not affect future establishment of State, county, or farm allotments. The Soil Bank supplements other farm programs. The County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee will assist farmers in planning their participation in the Soil Bank.

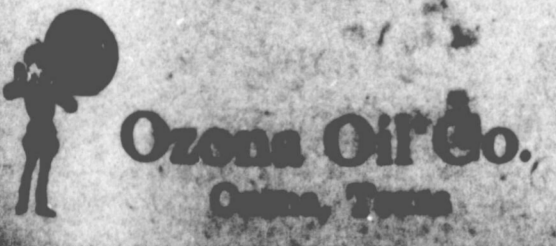
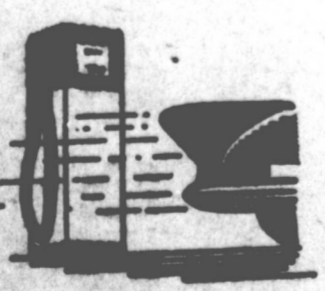

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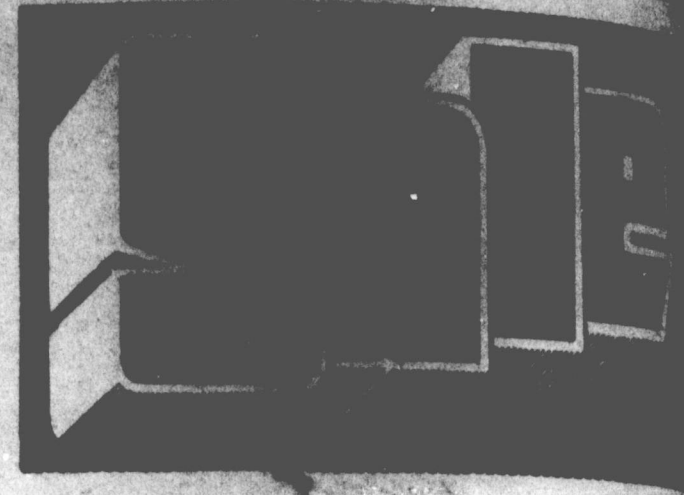
