Ellenburger Testing At Stanolind Project Under Way In Crockett

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. is attempting to re-open Ellenburger production in the depleted Block 20 (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County with the testing through perforations between 8,140-200 feet at the No. 1-CT University, in 12-30-University, 11 miles southeast of Barnhart.

The project had been drilled "tight" since Nov 17 and no reports were released.

Operator treated through perforations with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 3,000 gallons of fracture fluid. Operator swabbed an unreported time, recovering only lead.

Perforations were re-acidized with 2,000 gallons and refractured with 5,000 gallons. Operator swabbed 17 barrels of lead oil in two hours. The project then died. It then swabbed and flowed 88 barrels of lead oil in 24 hours, then died.

Perforations then were refractured with 20,000 gallons and operator still was recovering lead.

Ozonan Elected President At Close Of 41st Convention

T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Ozona ranchman and breeder of registered Rambouillet sheep, was elected president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association at the close of the 41st annual convention of the Association in San Angelo yesterday. Kincaid succeeds J. B. McCord of Coleman as president.

The Ozonan, son of the late T. A. Kincaid, Sr., who served the TS&GRA as president for eleven years, from 1924 to 1935, had served as second vice president and as first vice president the last two years and has been active for many years in promoting the interests of the sheep and goat industry.

Virgil Powell, San Angelo, was elevated from second vice president to first vice president and Lance Sears, Sweetwater ranchman, was named second vice president.

At a directors meeting following the close of the convention, Ernest L. Williams was reappointed executive secretary of the organization. A new board of directors selected from each of ten districts into which the state was divided was elected by the convention.

During the three day convention, around 300 members of the association attended the sessions to hear a number of out-standing speakers, including Will Wilson, attorney general elect; Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety; Congressman O. C. Breckenridge, Twin Falls, Idaho, president of the National Wool Growers Association.

Lion Cagers Nip Rocksprings For Second In a Row

Win Opener From Mertzon; Young Squad Shows Promise

The Ozona Lions crushed the Rocksprings Angoras 67 to 46 Tuesday night for the Lions second win in as many starts. For Rocksprings it was their first loss, having played Junction to a disputed decision last week.

As was the case in the game against Mertzon last week, the Lions featured a balanced attack with Jake Young leading the way with 12 points. Rodney Franklin had 11 Jerry Jacobs 10, and Bobby Sutton and Cico Cervantez each contributed 9.

The Lions jumped into a lead on Rodney Franklin's layup and after Doug McNealy tied the score at two with two free shots the Lions went ahead to stay on Franklin's set shot.

Coach Swede Pelto used alternating units with the starting five building up a 2, to 13 edge at the end of the first period. The second five had trouble getting started and at one point Rocksprings pulled to within one point before the alternate unit pulled into a 32 to 29 lead at the half.

Jake Young and Rodney Franklin led the way in a sizzling third period that sewed up the contest as the Lions held a 52 to 33 edge as the quarter closed.

Of more importance than the big point production was the Lion offense which held Angoras scoreless during the third period and limited the opposition to a meager 4 points.

In the B game, Ozona also triumphed, winning 45 to 33. Humberto Cervantez led the B attack with 13 points and was tied for high point honors by Tim Moody of the Rocksprings five.

Dix Reeves and Don Powers contributed 10 and 8 points to the Ozona attack. The Lion reserves pulled into an 8 point lead in the first quarter and made it stand up all the way.

Tips On Holiday Mailing And Schedules Of Postal Holiday Deliveries Given By Postmaster

Postmaster Floyd Hokit has prepared a few suggestions to patrons of the postoffice on Christmas mailing and preparations and mailing of gift packages, along with some information on new postal rulings regarding mailings. The postmaster's announcement is as follows:

"Mailing for distant States should be deposited for mailing before Dec. 10. Try to mail local Christmas cards not later than Dec. 15 to insure delivery before Christmas.

"It will be very helpful if cards are separated, local from out-of-town, and all faced the same way. You may deposit your bundles of cards to one of the clerks at the window if they are separated.

"Try to use postal delivery zones for all of your addresses. Air parcel post after Dec. 5 will arrive by Christmas.

"Written matter inclosed in parcels is satisfactory now when properly indorsed on the outside of the wrapper and the first class fee is paid.

"Patrons no longer need to put the notation: 'contents merchandise may be opened for postal inspection,' on second, third and fourth class matter.

"Parcels being sent to an APO overseas by Air mail may not exceed two (2) pounds in weight and 36 inches in length and girth combined.

Crockett Acreage Nets \$840,000 To University Fund From Lease Bonus

Approximately 13 sections of University of Texas owned land in Crockett county netted the University Permanent Fund approximately \$840,000 in bonus money in a recent auction of oil and gas leases on University lands in eight West Texas counties.

The auction sale of 140 tracts netted the University fund a total of \$3,881,000 and boosted the University Permanent Fund to \$272,036, 733. Highest price tract of the auction was \$335,000 paid by Stanolind for a half section in Andrews county. Another sale in that county brought \$320,000 for a half section, \$265,000 for a half section and \$160,000 for a quarter section.

The highest priced tract in Crockett county was paid by Sinclair for a quarter section of land in Block 46, about 20 miles northwest of Ozona. The 160 acres sold for a bonus of \$46,000. Sinclair paid \$37,500 for the west half of the same section. Gulf paid \$45,000 for a half section in Block 42.

Most of the acreage sold in the latest auction was in the northern tier of blocks owned by the University in this county. Blocks 39, 42, 45, 46, 50 and 51, but Sun Oil Co., paid a total of \$112,000 for two sections in University Block 29, about 26 miles west of Ozona and about three miles north of Fort Lancaster.

Ex-Convict Held Here On Charges Of Theft, Sodomy

Seven-Time Loser May Face Habitual Criminal Prosecution

On complaint of a 15-year-old Houston boy hitchhiker, Sheriff V. O. Earnest and his deputies yesterday arrested a man who has been in the Big Lake and Ozona area for several months and today planned to file charges of attempted sodomy and perhaps a series of theft charges.

After the man's arrest, three storage batteries, believed stolen from Crockett county road machinery, other articles identified by county road crews as coming from county machines and a number of tires and oil field equipment believed stolen from operators in the Farmers field of this county, were recovered.

Big Lake officers also plan to question the man and to look over the supposed loot in an effort to solve some burglaries and thefts in that city in recent weeks.

Officers have investigated the man's record and Sheriff Earnest said they found that he had had seven previous convictions in various parts of the country. He is originally from Mississippi but has been in this area for several months. Evidence of use of the pickup to transport marijuana was also found by officers, but Sheriff Earnest said the man denied having trafficked in the dope.

Pending further investigation by officers and District Attorney Connell Ashley of Fort Stockton, theft and attempted sodomy charges will be filed today against the man, Sheriff Earnest said. He may be further prosecuted as an habitual criminal, the Sheriff said, a charge which may bring him a life sentence.

A LIVING THING

We hear much of racial discords and injustices. We should hear more of the opportunities this country offers to people of diverse colors, creeds, and nationalities.

The other day a Hindu, born in India, was elected to Congress. One may approve or disapprove of his particular partisan allegiance and his views on government. But what the Chinese World, published in San Francisco, said of this occurrence is of much greater importance: "In the United States any loyal citizen who devotes himself to public service has an equal chance with other Americans to attain public office." It added that the new Congressman is making a trip to India... to inform the peoples of Asia that in America democracy is a living, active thing, and not just a theoretical device to serve propaganda purposes."

THE REVOLT THAT DIDN'T HAPPEN

Prior to the election, many people felt that disaffection on the part of farmers might prove very costly, in terms of votes, to President Eisenhower. Much political fire was centered on the Administration, and particularly Secretary of Agriculture Benson, for favoring flexible supports as against high and rigid supports.

This "farm revolt" simply did not happen. The President ran with great strength in the principal farming regions.

Why it did not happen is susceptible to several answers. For one thing, as Farm Journal said in its

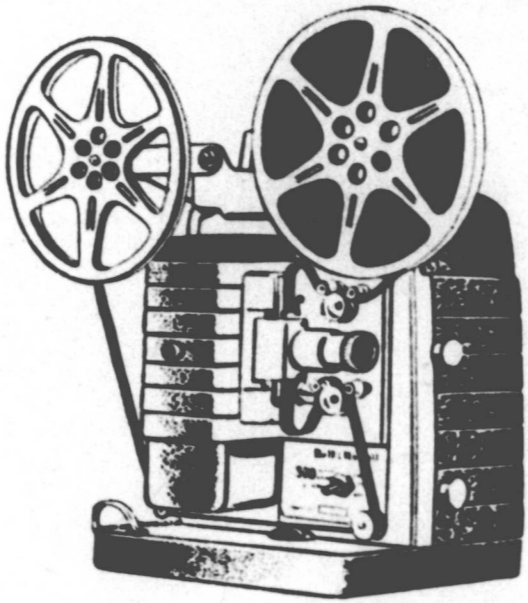
November issue, "Outside drought areas, most farmers, though not all, have been doing pretty well... considerably better than a year ago." For another, recent years have witnessed a strengthening, not a weakening, of the institution of the family farm, which is certainly all to the good. For a third, the government supports apply to only six so-called basic crops and, as Secretary Benson has effectively pointed out, are of primary benefit to big commercial-type farms rather than to the smaller family farms.

There may well be still another reason that is more compelling than any of these. Many farmers must realize that no nation is rich enough to continue indefinitely to

build up government-bought surpluses — and many must realize, on the grounds of both experience and theory, that when government does the paying, government also does the bossing. Some leading farm groups, in fact, have long recognized this. The livestock producers, for instance, have steadfastly opposed government supports and controls, even in times of severe economic strain. Farmers value freedom too.

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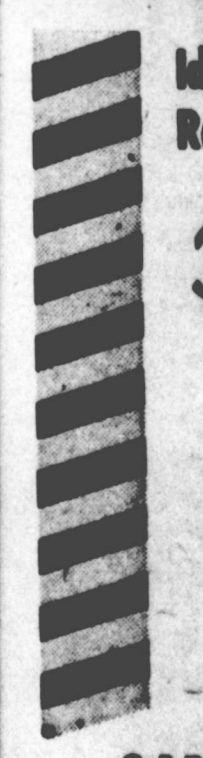

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Dec. 8, 1927

Children playing with an oil stove used for heating purpose is believed to have been the cause of a fire, starting in one of the tourist camp houses at Camp Mike, which resulted in a loss estimated by Mike Couch at \$7,000 about 9:30 Sunday night. One of the children, a boy about 8 years old, suffered severe burns about the head and face when the stove flared up. Twelve new camp houses and a warehouse containing about \$4,000 worth of feed were destroyed by the blaze.

Two ranch deals involving more than \$250,000 and 36 sections of Crockett and Terrell county lands, was completed here recently through Othro Adams of the T. L. Benson Commission Co. of San Angelo. The deal involved sale of the Chas. Schauer ranch southwest of Ozona to Rob and Roy Miller and purchase by Mr. Schauer of the C. B. Hudspeth ranch in Terrell county. The Schauer ranch in Crockett county consisting of 12 1/2 sections, was sold to Rob and Roy Miller at \$13 an acre, the highest price for Crockett ranch land reported in several years. The highest recent price was \$10.50 an acre. In addition to the land, the Miller Bros. bought 3,900 head of yearling ewes at \$15 a head, another record price, about 500 head of goats and other livestock. Mr. Schauer bought the 24-section Hudspeth ranch, about 18 miles northeast of Dryden, at \$6 an acre. No livestock was included in the sale. Eric Anderson, who has been foreman for Mr. Schauer for several years, will be in charge of the Terrell county holdings.

on their respective instruments. F. W. Nixon was elected president of the organization with Richard Flowers, vice president, Herbert Kittle, secretary, Allen McKinney, treasurer and Leonard Hensley, manager.

Will Noelke of San Angelo, who owns a ranch in northwestern Crockett county, recently sold 250 head of mixed cattle to Barrett and Albin of Comanche at \$45 per head.

Henceforth headlight hunting, reported to have been in vogue during the season in some parts of the county, is going to be a dangerous practice in Crockett county, followers of this unsportsmanlike practice being subject not only to prosecution at the hands of county authorities if apprehended, but also to a load of buckshot from guns of long suffering but now plenty riled ranchmen. So obnoxious has become the practice in some parts of the county that ranchmen have declared that the next headlight hunter found on their ranches will be greeted with a full load of buckshot or more if necessary to stop him. These threats in dead earnest from ranchmen and their vigorous pro-

tests has led county authorities to take steps not only to curb an unlawful practice but to prevent bloodshed.
