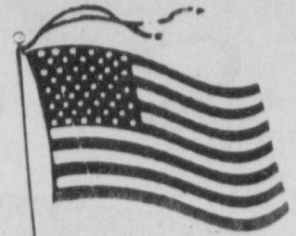

KHOU--CBS Affiliate In Muleshoe Wednesday

KHOU Television Station, the CBS Affiliate in Houston sent reporter Charles Hadlock and cameraman, Victor Cooper to Muleshoe on Wednesday, Dec. 11. While here, they worked on a feature story about Muleshoe's "Biggest Little TV Station in Texas" owned by Jack and Magann Rennels.

Cooper from New York City and Hadlock from Marshall, Texas were impressed by Muleshoe and its people. The TV Station contacted the Rennels' several weeks ago about the possibility of doing a feature story on the station. They called Mrs. Rennels Tuesday, while they were in Muleshoe on their way to Farwell to work on a story about changing the state line. They briefly looked over Muleshoe on Tuesday and chose to come back Tuesday night to the Heritage House Inn for the evening.

The crew arrived at Channel 6 at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday and began their work. They were greeted by the Chamber of Commerce manager, Carolyn Johnson, who had a packet for each of them full of information promoting the Muleshoe area.

After several hours of work, Channel 6 offered them Muleshoe's own prized "spudnuts" for breakfast. "What's a spudnut?", asked Hadlock. He didn't accept the offer to have one until Rennels explained what they were and how they

were made! Before leaving Channel 6, they were delivered snack baskets by the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The chamber also provided lunch for the crew.

In addition to all of the filming at Channel 6, the crew took several shots all over town. They interviewed Sheila Black at EMS about the Christmas Toy Project. In fact, they even made a donation to the project. They also did some film footage inside Wilson Appliance.

The day ended for them with a trip to the top of King Grain Elevator. Robert Montgomery, CofC president, and Mrs. Johnson took the duo to the elevator. SPS Requests Permit To Connect With Mexico

Southwestern Public Service Company has filed a request for a "Presidential Permit" that would allow an interconnection with the electric system of the Republic of Mexico.

The interconnection is part of a proposal being made to Mexico which if accepted, would result in an increased market

for fuel resources in New Mexico and Texas for electric generation, numerous construction jobs and growth for the border region.

To facilitate the interconnection, SPS would build and operate two parallel 345-kilovolt transmission lines that would extend 208 miles from the SPS electric system in New Mexico, crossing the international boundary with the Republic of Mexico.

The permit application was made to the U.S. Department of Energy on Nov. 22. Copies are being furnished to federal and state regulatory agencies which regulate SPS utility service.

The transmission lines would be part of a much more extensive proposal being made to Comision Federal de Electricidad (CFE)--Mexico's national electric utility--to provide electricity to that country, said SPS president and chief operating officer Coyt Webb.

CFE has expressed interest in the proposal, but is examining other options as well, Webb said.

As proposed to CFE, a separate energy development group would purchase firm power from SPS for sale to CFE. This group also would provide financing for much of the project. SPS subsidiary Quixx Corporation is one of the participants in the group.

Mexico is predicting a significant growth rate and corresponding increase in the need for electricity in its northern region, particularly in Ciudad Juarez.

"This proposal is consistent with the philosophy of the proposed Free Trade Agreement between the U.S. and Mexico," Webb said. "We believe it will further international trade and add to the economic vitality of the border regions of both nations."

New Mexico and Texas would benefit as well from the economic impacts of this proposal. Besides extensive construction activities on the lines, operation of SPS's electric-generating plants in New Mexico and Texas would be increased, expanding the market for local fuel resources, added SPS New Mexico Manager Bill Pope.

In addition, the proposed sale would create increased flexibility on the SPS system Cont. Page 8, Col. 3

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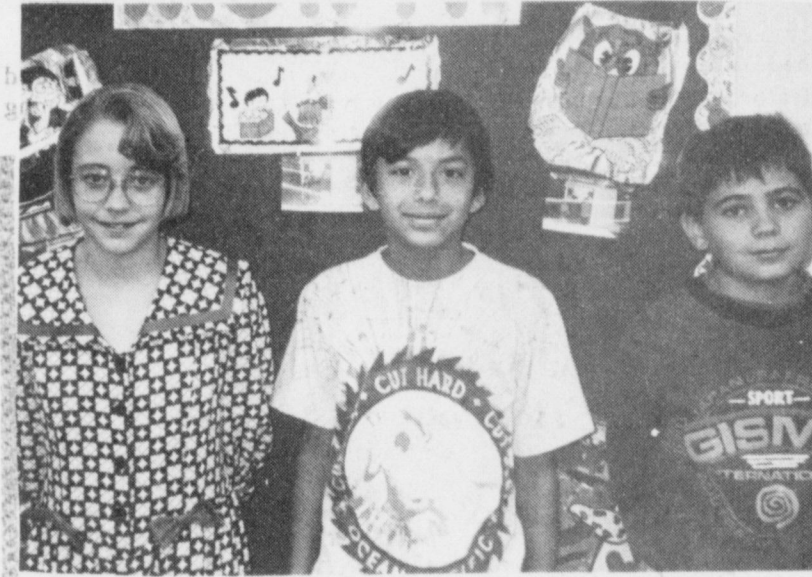

MHS Students Attend "Carol"

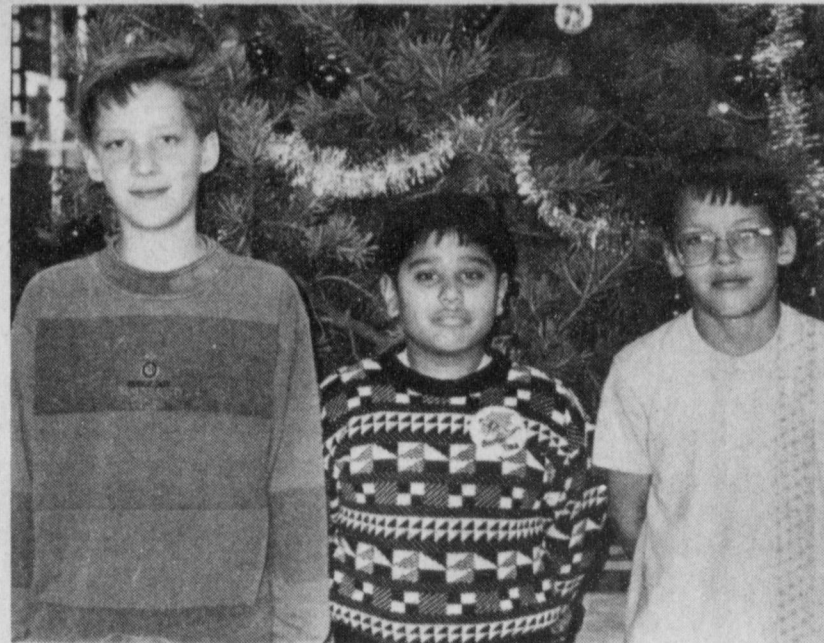

moisture, hail, or any other reason beyond the producer's control must be certified and an ASCS-574 (Disaster Application) filed before the crop is disturbed in order to be eligible for program benefits.

1992 PAYMENT ELIGIBILITY RULES

For 1992, and subsequent years, two status dates for payment limitation determinations have been established for each program. If a producer is participating in more than one program, the first applicable status date applies for all programs. The dates are as follows:

1. January 1
 - Whether individuals were husband and wife
 - Whether an individual was a minor
 - Shares of a Corporation, Trusts, or Joint Operation that was formed in a previous year.
2. Dates for Existing Operations, New Operations, and Contributions to the farming operation:
 - Wool and Mohair program is October 1
 - ARP (Farm Program) is end of signup period
 - CRP is end of applicable signup period
 - ACP is the date the application is submitted

CRP SIGNUP

Signup for the 12th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will be from June 15, 1992, through June 26, 1992. Bids during this signup will be for the 1993 crop year. Bailey County will be accepting bids for windbreaks and shelterbelts (Trees Only). For further information, please contact this office.

WOOL AND MOHAIR

March 2, 1992, is the final date for filing your 1991, Wool and Mohair sales documents for the incentive program.

INTEREST RATE

The Loan interest rate for December is 5.125 percent.

RECONSTITUTIONS

We need to know now of any changes that would cause a farm or farms to be combined or divided for the 1992, program year.

FARM CHANGES

Any changes in Operations, owners, acreage, or miling addresses should be reported to this office so we may keep our records current.

SCS COMMENTS

Milo, Haygrazer, and Wheat that is being used as wind stripcropping, dealing with Conservation Compliance, should be maintained throughout the critical erosion season or until about April 1 of each year.

The minimum stubble height to leave on milo and haygrazer, serving as protective strips, is 10 inches. The area between the strips should be maintained in a ridged condition.

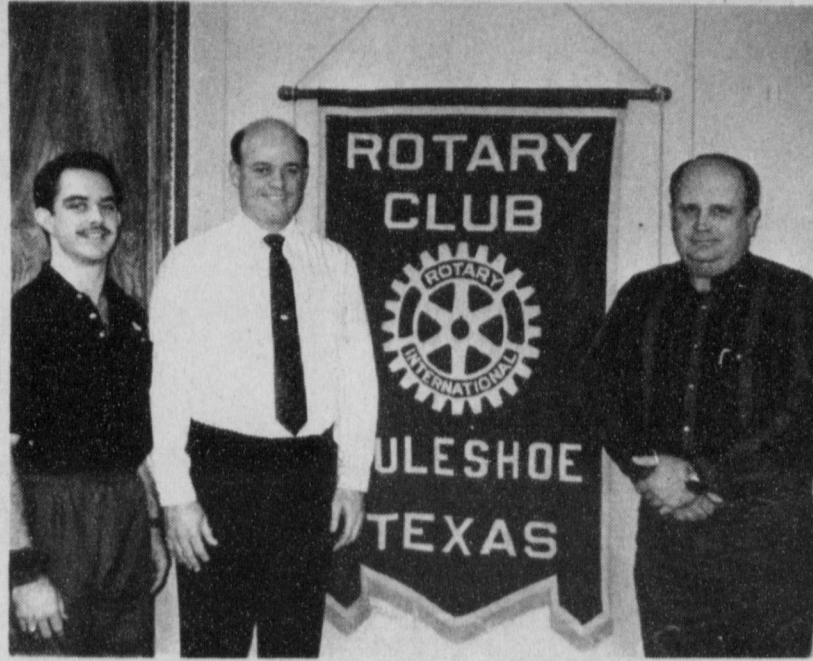

through market diversification, allowing the company to maintain a reliable, low-cost supply of power for its customers, Webb said.

As part of the proposal, the energy development group would build and finance a major high voltage direct current (HVDC) interconnection in Mexico, as well as several miles of transmission lines. Utility Engineering Corporation, another SPS subsidiary, would participate in designing and supervision construction of the facilities in Mexico.

The HVDC facility would allow the interconnection of the Eastern electrical grid of the United States with the electrical grid of Mexico.

The proposed SPS transmission lines would run from SPS's Eddy County interchange near Artesia, N.M., crossing the international boundary, north of Ciudad Juarez, near the proposed Santa Teresa crossing. At the international boundary, the SPS lines would connect with the lines and HVDC facility in Mexico being proposed by the energy development group.

In order for the proposal to be considered, and to meet required deadlines, permitting procedures—which could take up to 24 months—are being initiated now, Webb said.

If the proposal is accepted by CFE, construction of the new SPS lines would begin in October 1993. The lines would be energized by June 1994.

Insofar as has been determined, according to the permit request, the proposed route would not impact any federally designated wetland, critical wildlife habitat or historic site,

The Muleshoe State Bank began as Blackwater Valley State Bank of Muleshoe. The original charter was dated August 1, 1914, and stated that the bank would be operated under the Guaranty Fund Plan. Capitol stock of the new bank was \$10,000 with shares of stock being issued to Paul A. Caldren, E.H. Buhrman, Jess Elrod, W.D. Hamblin, C.W. Harrison, E.R. Hart, H.D. Huyck, Geo. P. Kuykendall, Ed Oden, D.F. McDonald, J.A. Oden, M.P. Smith, and A.J. Tays.

In 1931, the Blackwater Valley State Bank of Muleshoe was reorganized into the Muleshoe State Bank. Stockholders at the time were: Mrs. Hattie Griffiths, Ray Griffiths, E.R. Hart, Mrs. M.E. Hart, and Jesse M. Osborn.

There were several presidents over the years, including: E.R. Hart, Jesse M. Osborn, W.Q. Casey, B.E. Loyd and now Robert E. Finney.

Many officers and employees have worked to make the bank strong, and have caused it to remain the friendly hometown bank that the first stockholders must have had in mind back in 1931.

Changes have also been evident in the bank facility over the years. The first bank building was a small board siding structure located on Main Street. That building was later replaced with a brick building located on the lot that was later replaced with a brick building located on the lot that was later occupied by Cashway Grocery.

The Bank occupied the corner of Main and Ave. C for many years. Then in 1973, the modern facility that is now occupied was dedicated.

In 1990, 34 local families agreed to purchase 100 percent of the stock of Muleshoe State Bank. The new stockholders formed a one bank holding company named High Plains Bancshares, Inc. and then purchased the Muleshoe State Bank. Directors of the Muleshoe State Bank are Dr. Van Brimhall, Edwin R. Cox, Robert E. Finney, Terry Hutton, Cal Jordan, Woodie Lambert, Fred Locker, Don McElroy, Merlyn Neel, Dr. Jerry Redwine and George Richardson.

The Muleshoe State Bank has had many long term employees. Some of the former long term employees are: Mildred Neeley, Billy Jones, Cozette Blackwood, Alice Burge and Glenda Dale.

The bank now employs 26 people, and still has several employees who have been with the bank more than ten years, including: Mary Moore, 32 years; Betty Carpenter, 24 years; Pat Prater, 24 years; Bob Finney, 20 years; Kay Mardis, 19 years; Jackie Jean Whatley, 13 years; Robert Montgomery, 14 years; Berta Combs, 11 years; and Margaret Hamilton 10 years.

Use Safety Precaution

In Holiday Decorating

Decorating is half the fun of the holidays. But those festive items that brighten your home and office can darken your holiday cheer if they aren't handled safely.

If you're using a resin-cut Christmas tree, Texas Safety Association reminds you to keep it fresh by adding water every day. Over 600 fires are started by Christmas trees each year. Keep your tree away from fireplaces and space heaters and use electric lights, not candles. Use care in picking the tree, too. If the tips of the branches won't bend without breaking, the tree is already too dry.

Artificial trees should be labeled flame-retardant. Never put electric lights on a metal tree.

Inspect strands of lights for fraying, bare wires, loose connections, and broken sockets. Make sure that they carry the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) symbol, and that outdoor lights are labeled for outdoor use. Unplug lights when you leave the house or go to bed.

Tinsel, garlands, and evergreen wreaths shouldn't be hung too close to heat sources. Be especially careful with candles. Keep them out of a child's reach, and always extinguish them when leaving the room.

Holly berries and mistletoe are poisonous. Poinsettias are not, but eating the leaves can lead to an upset stomach. Man-made decorations are for fun, not food. Avoid hanging

breakable ornaments near the bottom of the tree, where children and pets can reach them.

If you use a fireplace for holiday warmth, keep a screen in front of it to keep flying sparks off carpets and furniture. And don't burn gift wrappings--they may contain dyes that will give off toxic fumes. Put the wraps in the trash can instead, or recycle them next year!

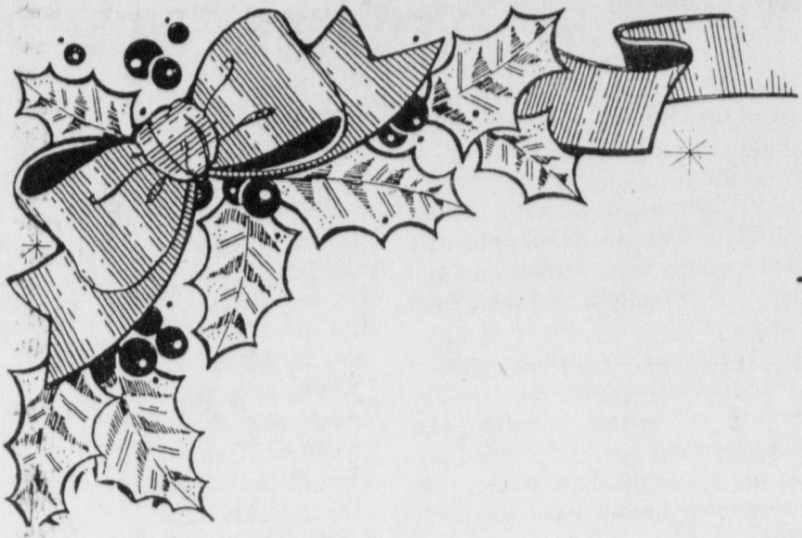

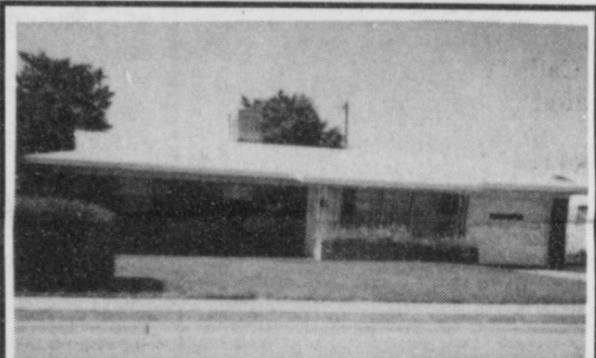

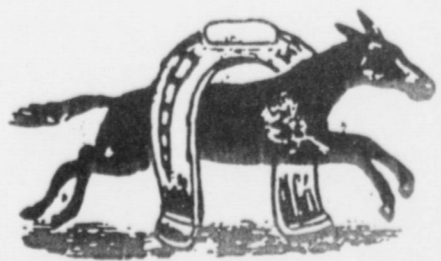
