Ozons Meet Owls Big Lake For Dist. Tuesday

Locals Are Underdogs Contest Between Districts 7&8

The Ozona Lions, champions of district 8-A will journey to Big Lake next Tuesday night to meet the Big Lake Owls, district 7-A champions, for the bi-district title.

Officials of the two schools met Wednesday and an Ozona-Lions flip to determine the site of the contest. The flip of the marked the sixth night flip for bi-district sites in Ozona has lost.

The Lions have met the Owls five times in regular season play and have not been able to make a contest of any of the three years, but the same was true a year when the Owls had to come from behind in the last three ends to win.

The Lions ended their season in district play last Tuesday by winning Junction 51 to 49 and ending up the year with a seven and one lost district standing and a 19 won and 11 lost season mark.

For Coach Pelto, the title mark the seventh he has won in nine years as head of the Ozona cagers, last six have been in a row.

This year was not Pelto's year according to pre-season dops, with only one letterman back and an junior and sophomore five to against superior height and experience in at least three of the other league schools. It was figured that the Lions could not but they did.

In winning, the green, inexperienced Ozona five won five of nine district games by two points less and in doing so became the first club in four years to reach the title before the last district game.

Sophomore Jerry Jacobs led the team scoring attack for the year by tallying 289 points to lead teammate Jake Young by ten points. Bobby Sutton proved best a rather unimpressive group the foul line by sinking 65 of 83 free throws to lead in percent. Jake Young made 79 of 164 for the most.

In district play, Jacobs led the team with 119 points, the only player to reach three figures. Last year's champions had three over a 100 point mark.

A B game has been scheduled to start at 6:30 with the A contest to get under way at 8 p. m.

Big Lake, with a record of 25 wins and one loss, will close its regular season by facing double Pecos in Big Lake. The Pecos are the only team this year to beat the Owls and even though Big Lake will be looking for revenge they will be underdogs.

Coach Pelto plans only light workouts for the balance of the week and will not schedule another contest.

Robert Price, about 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Price, former Ozonan now living in Socorro, N. M., is in critical condition in an Albuquerque, N. M., hospital as a result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident last week near Socorro in which a companion was instantly killed.

Young Price suffered severe injuries, many broken bones and a neck injury which to now has left him paralyzed from his chest down. Friends here received word from Mrs. Price yesterday in which she described her son's condition as still critical although slightly improved. Doctors give him only a slight chance for recovery, it was indicated.

The other boy was driving the car which swerved off the highway after failing to make a curve and overturned. Mr. Price, Sr., is employed with a drilling company in Socorro.

The show will be held at the agricultural building, just north of the Davidson gym, M. A. Barber, VA teacher, announced. Thirty-one FFA boys will exhibit a total of 111 lambs which they have had on feed for more than three months.

Herman Carter of San Angelo will judge the show and classify the lambs into market grades of Prime, Choice, Good and Feeder. A special award will be given the boy whose lambs have shown the best gain in the feeding period.

The order of showing, starting at 9:15 will be for best fitted fine-wool and best fitted crossbred, lightweight fine-wools, heavy-weight fine-wools, pen of three fine-wools, shorn fine-wools, pen of three shorn fine-wools, lightweight crossbreds, heavy-weight crossbreds, pen of three crossbreds, and then the presentation of awards to FFA members.

Arlington Trio Arrest May Solve Local Burglaries

Youths Admit One Job May Be Linked With Others Here

Sheriff Billy Mills yesterday announced the arrest of three Arlington youths, two in Arlington and the third in a juvenile institution in Wyoming, in connection with the December burglary of Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Co., here.

The three young men, 16, 17 and 18 years of age, are said to have confessed burglary of the local lumber company store and theft of four guns, three knives and a quantity of ammunition. The burglary was committed around December 1.

One of the youths, the 18-year-old inmate of the Wyoming institution, is a former Ozonan and investigation is under way here in an effort to link him with a series of burglaries here in which the South Texas Lumber Co., and the Home Gas Co. were entered. The safe at the gas company was broken open and considerable money taken from each place.

Three of the four guns stolen from the Foxworth Galbraith Company were recovered in Del Rio after the two youths arrested in Arlington told officers where they had sold the guns. The fourth gun is still missing. Deputies Oscar Groff and Elmo Wallace went to Arlington to get the two youths. The third is being held in Worling, Wyoming, pending arrival of officers from here to bring him to Ozona for grand jury investigation. Working officers said the youth admitted participation in the burglary here.

Committees Wring Some Concessions On Bracero Rules

TSGRA Prexy Kincaid Back From Tussle With Labor Dept.

T. A. Kincaid, Jr., president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn., just back from Washington, D. C., where he and Buster Dooley of Bracketville, chairman of the TSGRA labor committee, spent nearly a week fighting the livestock raisers' battle with the U. S. Department of Labor, reports committees representing various segments of bracero users won some concessions from the department on the arbitrary rulings recently promulgated without previous announcement governing the standards of housing to be furnished the processed laborers from Mexico.

In caucusses attended by Congressman J. T. Rutherford from the 16th district and other Texas Congressmen, the bracero users committee formulated a set of objections to the Labor Department's ruling and these were later presented to the department's labor advisory committee and a 13-man sub-committee dealing with Mexican labor.

One of the major accomplishments of the conferences, Kincaid said, was the apparent adoption by the advisory committee of a recommendation that certain provisions of the housing requirements which are impossible of accomplishment during certain phases of ranch work be modified to meet these conditions. The users' committee, he pointed out, made no attempt to seek complete withdrawal of the housing ruling, recognizing the justice of minimum standards which would provide these workers with ordinary living comforts, but objected strenuously to the department's action in launching the rulings without conferring with agricultural interests or previous notification to users before enforcing its arbitrary and sometimes impossible requirements.

Ranchmen and farmers will have to "live with" the Labor Department's requirements and more may be in making down the line, but some concessions were won in this instance and if the ruling is finally modified to what committee members believed would be done, the housing ruling may not impose too great hardships on West Texas ranching industry, Mr. Kincaid reported.

General Fall From 1 To 4 Inches Over All Of County

Finest rain that ever fell in West Texas is the generally agreed description of the soaker which fell over a five-day period beginning last Friday night, reaching every nook and cranny of Texas, in varying amounts, but adequate to give a thorough wetting to all of the state, with a particularly generous helping for this long drouth parched section of West Texas.

Perfect from every viewpoint, the rain could not have fallen in a more satisfactory manner had it been ordered and prescribed by a drouth-sick West Texas rancher. Rains up to three and four inches produced negligible run-off, draws, if they ran at all, ran only in a trickle. The rains fell so slowly, stopping intermittently, allowing moisture already on the ground to soak up before more came. The temperature remained high enough throughout the rainy period to cause a minimum of hardship on livestock, although some freshly sheared goats and new-born lambs perished from the long exposure to the dampness. And the long continuing cloudy skies and intermittent rainfall drove the generous moisture deeper into the ground than it has penetrated in this area for more than seven years.

Unheralded by weather prognosticators, the rain began Friday night, with from an inch to two inches across a comparatively narrow belt of Crockett county from west to east. As the rain clouds built up, the area covered expanded north and south until the entire state was covered. The rains let up some Monday, after falling all day Sunday and Sunday night and then started again Monday night and continued intermittently throughout the day Tuesday, stopping again Tuesday night and Wednesday, but with heavy clouds still hanging. The heaviest rains in this county were to the west of Ozona, up to nearly four inches on the western edge of the county and in the Sheffield area. The rains tapered off somewhat to the south, Del Rio reporting a total of around one inch. Both Barnhart and Sonora had over two inches, with the fall solid over the country between these points and Ozona.

The total fall in Ozona varied according to the section of town in which gauges were read. Apparently, however, the west side of town received the heaviest fall, where more than three inches registered in some gauges. The official rain gauges at the fire station and at the Ratliff Furniture store showed a difference of two-tenths, the Ratliff gauge registering 2.46 total and the fire station gauge showing 2.66.

Ranchmen throughout the county were jubilant over the prospect of a final break in the seven-year drouth. The bountiful February moisture will at least assure some weed growth and Spring growth of grass and brush.

Production Indicated In Second Hoover Well

Perkins-Prothro Co., of Wichita Falls was waiting on cement after setting 5 1/2-inch casing at 2,112 feet at the No. 1 W. P. Hoover, in 14-NN-GC&SF, 3 1/2-mile southeast of Texita Oil Co. and John W. Ellis No. 1 W. P. Hoover, Crockett County active Clearfork prospect, 50 miles southwest of Ozona.

Production was indicated with the surfacing of gas in three minutes and the recovery of 120 feet of oil and gas-cut mud on a two-hour drillstem test in the Clearfork between 2,080-79 feet. Flowing pressure was 65 pounds; shut-in pressure for an unreported time, 605 pounds.

Texita and Ellis No. 1 Hoover at the latest report was pumping oil at the rate of four barrels per day-through perforations

Pelto's starting lineup, shot the sickness and injury riddled Ozona Lions into their sixth straight district crown last Friday night when they whipped a determined Eldorado five 41 to 32 before a slim crowd.

The Lions got off to an early lead in the rough and tumble affair as Sutton and Jacobs along with Jake Young carried the load for the Lions. After leading 14 to 11 at the first quarter the Lions saw the Eagles push into a brief 16 to 14 lead before Rodney Franklin hit four quick points to put

the Lions ahead to stay. The Lions got an assist from Junction as they whipped Sonora to give the Lions a clear cut title regardless of how the last game of the season came out. As matters turned out it did not make any difference since the Lions also whipped Junction to wind up two games ahead of the field.

Despite the fact that the Lions maintained their lead from the second quarter on, the game was close and tense with tempers near the flaring point toward the end of the contest as the Lions chose

to stall with the ball and let the clock run out.

The Eldorado five had a big height advantage and took advantage of it fully in the last quarter to pull up on the big five.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Feb. 23, 1928

Roads leading in and out of Powell Field, Crockett county oil field, will soon be worked and put in first class condition. An order for working the road was passed last week by the Commissioners Court.

Mrs. Paul Hallcomb was taken to a San Angelo hospital Tuesday following a fall Tuesday morning near the postoffice which resulted in the fracture of two bones in her ankle.

Two more candidates for county offices threw their sky pieces into the arena this week with announcements from O. W. Smith, county tax assessor, and Tom Casbeer, county treasurer, for re-election. E. B. Baggett, Jr., has announced for re-election as county and district clerk.

A tract of land containing about 27 acres located just off main street adjoining the West Texas Utilities Co. substation lot in the north part of Ozona, was purchased this week by Rusty Smith, proprietor of the Sunshine Dairy, from Pleas Childress and Scott Peters. Total consideration in the deal amounted to approximately

\$3,000. More electric refrigerators will be installed in 1928 than in any previous year in the history of the business. Otho Drake, local manager of the West Texas Utilities Co., predicted following his return from a regional sales convention held recently in Dallas.

An order for dirt and gravel sufficient to fill in the chug holes in the streets of Ozona has been placed by County Commissioner J. M. Baggett. T. J. Cook, local contractor, will do the work. Recent dry weather has caused chug holes to develop in the streets and a general street improvement program is to be undertaken.

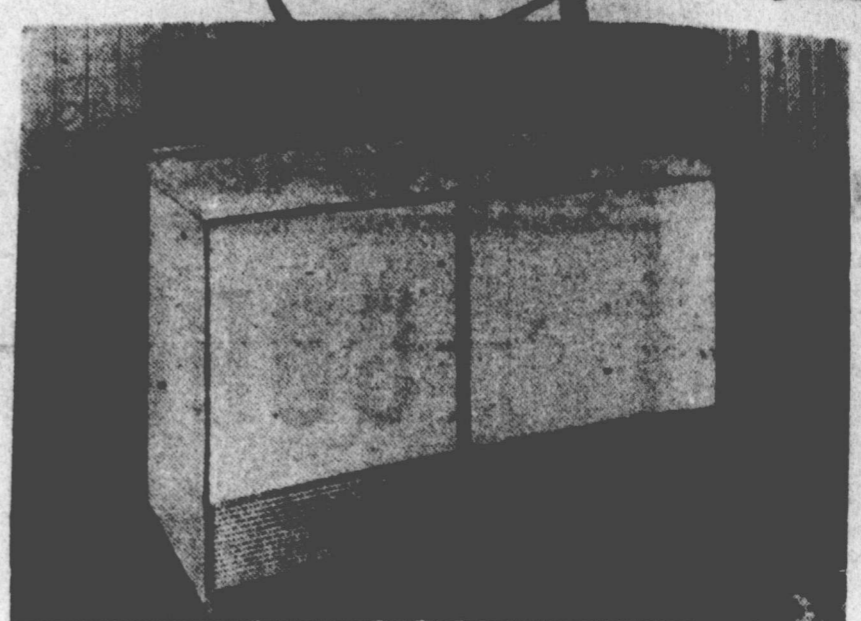

Out of state car owners are advised that it will be necessary for you to have your motor number checked by an officer of the law before you can register your car for the first time in this state.

Owners of trailers of over 4,000 pounds who have not secured a serial number must do so before the trailer can be registered. Application forms are available at the office.

Trucks over one-ton capacity that have not previously been weighed must be weighed before they can be registered.

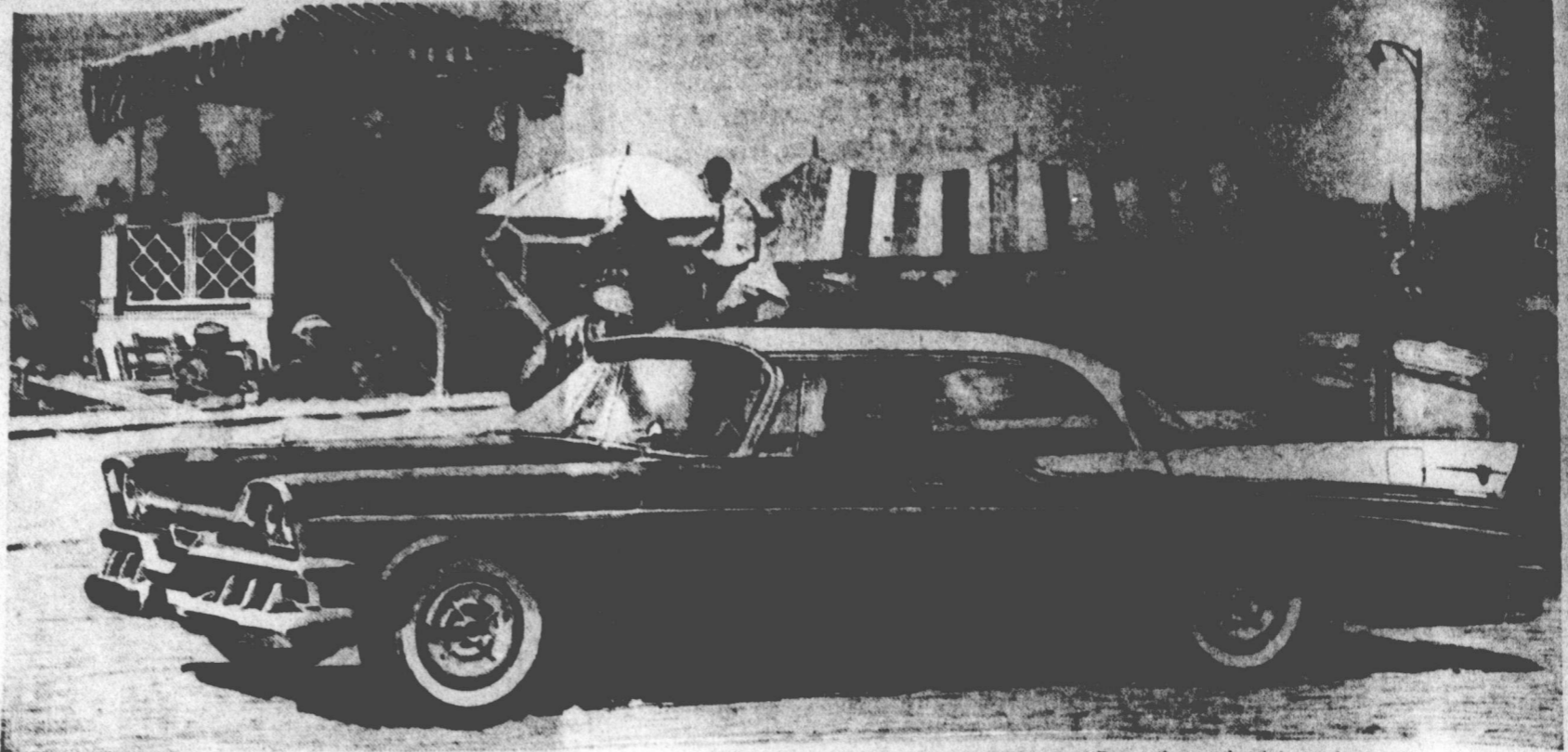

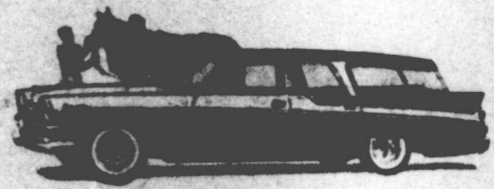
