Seven-Day Pump Test For Radar Station's Water Supply Begins

A seven-day continuous test on the pump began yesterday at a water well on the Chas. E. Davidson, Jr., ranch to determine whether or not the well will produce a sufficient quantity of water to satisfy needs of the new Air Defense Command radar installation five miles east of Ozona.

Air Force officials have specified a minimum of 50-gallons per minute of water needed by the installation. Several tests have already been made on the Davidson well showing it a producer of sufficient quantity but the Army Engineers, in charge of the radar construction, are making a seven-day 24-hours-a-day pumping test on the well to assure officials that the well is a solid producer.

An equipment supplier moved in pump and motor last week and two 9-hour tests were made on the well with a gasoline pump, pumping 50 gallons per minute. Efforts to supply electric current for a big electric motor to power the pump failed and the seven-day test will be made with the gasoline engine.

Football Stadium Reserved Seat Sale Gaining Momentum

Most of the reserved seats in the two sections of the Lions Stadium stands that were reserved last year have been sold. Supt. L. B. T. Sikes reported this week following the opening of the sale last Friday to the general public. Last year's seat holders had first opportunity to buy the reserved seats this year, being given an opportunity to get the same seats again this year.

A new section has been added to the reserved section this year, all seats in these sections to be within the 40-yard lines. Reserved seats are being sold for the five home games at \$5 for the season or \$1 a game, the same as general admission prices. Reserved seat holders have the advantage of being able to go to the games late and be assured of a seat.

New Stands For Football Field Being Erected

Installation Of New Permanent Seats Under Way

Installation of additional seating at Ozona High School Lions Stadium in west Ozona began this week.

Two new sections are being added to the west stands, the home side, and one new section is being added to the visitors stands on the east side of the field. The new stands are supplied by the builders of the original stands and are being installed in exactly the same manner.

In addition to the permanent seating being added to the stadium the schools have acquired a set of portable steel bleachers which can be erected in case of need. One of these portable stands will be used this season to seat the Ozona High School band. It will be set at an angle at the north edge of the new stands so that it will be out of the line of vision of spectators in the stands and at the same time afford band members a good view of the game.

Other improvements at the football field are underway under the direction of Charley Gotcher, buildings and grounds maintenance superintendent. An additional section of the end zones at both the north and south ends of the field have been given a new coating of dirt and seeded to grass. The new grassed section is expected to be in full growth by the time of the first home football game. The practice field east of the playing field was extended to the south this year, also, with a portion formerly given over to weeds now completely grassed over.

Pair Ozona Ranchers Buy 25,000 Acres Of Col. Slaughter Rapch

Sale of a part of the Col. C. C. Slaughter Ranch 18 miles south of Lamesa to William A. Childress and E. H. Chandler, Ozona ranchmen, was announced Saturday. The trade was made by Bill Tyler, San Angelo real estate dealer.

Childress and Chandler purchased 25,289 acres, all in pasture land except for a 40-acre field, from the Slaughter Estate, Dallas. The price was not announced but was understood to have been about \$750,000.

The property, located in Martin County, has been under lease to John Reed, Sterling City ranchman. Reed is to move his stock and give possession of the ranch within the next few weeks.

School Opening Set For Tuesday, September Third

Faculty Complete For Opening; Faculty To Meet Aug. 31

With a faculty complete and standing by, Ozona Public Schools will kick off the new 1957-58 term Tuesday morning, Sept. 3, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes announced this week.

Final plans for the opening and year's program will be outlined to the faculty at a faculty meeting to be held Saturday, August 31, starting at 9 a. m. Supt. Sikes said. Schools will open for a full day of classes at 8:30 Tuesday morning.

Registration of all students in the Junior High and High School will have been completed before the opening of schools. Registration in these two schools will be completed Wednesday and Thursday, August 28 and 29.

Principal P. O. Hatley of the High School has announced registration of high school pupils by grades during the two-day registration period. On Wednesday, August 28, Seniors and Juniors will register, the Seniors in the morning from 9 to 12 and the Juniors in the afternoon from 1 to 4. On Thursday, August 29, Sophomores and Freshmen will register, the Sophs in the morning from 9 to 12 and the Freshmen from 1 to 4 in the afternoon.

At the Junior High School, Principal Roy Killingsworth says pupils will be registered at any time during the two days, from 9 to 12 in the morning and from 1 to 4 in the afternoon. Junior High pupils will not be required to register by groups, the principal said.

All grade school pupils will be enrolled the morning schools open and will not be required to report in advance of the opening.

Heavy Rains Dot Southern Half Of County Sunday

Falls Up to Over 3 Inches Recorded In Shower Activity

A most welcome cool front sweeping across West Texas last Sunday kicked up even more welcome showers over a wide swath of the south half of Crockett county.

The showers hop-skipped over the area south and southwest of Ozona bringing rainfall of over three inches in some sections and from a half to two inches in other spots. The Ralph Watson, Mrs. S. M. Harvick, Phillips, R. A. Harrell and other ranches south of Ozona reported rains of from two inches to 3 1/2 inches in the Sunday afternoon showers. Travelers reported rains of varying intensity all the way from Junction, where over three inches fell, to within eight miles of Ozona. The band of showers extended all across the south half of Crockett county to the Pecos river on the west.

The cool front, which shifted winds to the northeast and north for a time Sunday, served to cool down the extreme heat which gripped the area even where no rains fell. Temperatures were dropped all over the state by the invasion of cooler air.

HARD TO BELIEVE

The taxpayers of the nation rubbed their eyes in disbelief the other day to see in cold type the news that 18,000 civilian employees of the Navy will walk the plank—most of them by the end of October, all by June 30—for a saving of \$6 million a month!

Even though there will be 371,717 left on the payroll, the realization that an actual start is being made in reducing the swarm of Government workers, is something to cheer about. And while a similar announcement is expected from the Army, we hope that this reform will gather momentum rather than to stop with the armed services.

These, after all, are only token reductions, in terms of what could and should be done in throwing out entire bureaus that presently duplicate the work of one or more other bureaus. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare, for instance, could well be cut back to the bureaus from which it sprang, and which, except for the administration of social security, are superfluous anyway.

Nor, in this campaign to sweat our Government down to size, should we continue to overlook the matter of those hundreds of Government-owned and -operated businesses that are competing with taxpaying business and industry—and which were slated for disposal long ago.

Heretofore, in writing this sort of a piece, we have inevitably thought, "We can dream, can't we?" But with cutbacks actually under way, there is at least new

U. S. Air Force Seeks Quality Not Quantity In Economy Program

Recent cutbacks in the United States Air Force manpower requirements have had an effect in the San Angelo area says Sgt. Alton F. Smith, recruiter for the Air Force in this area.

Instructions received by the San Angelo Office indicate that quality and not quantity will be the by-word when accepting Air Force applications.

The San Angelo office has been limited to only eight non-prior service enlistments per month for the area serving 12 west Texas counties. This limitation has made it necessary to establish a waiting list for Air Force entry for September, October and November.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTORS MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 1, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to Section (a) of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State is hereby resolved by the LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to read hereafter as follows: "Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of the State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of the State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-b of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 4, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to each Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each county, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State."

"All funds provided for the operation of each person or the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the State of Texas, shall be deposited in the principal of and income of the United States Government, the amount of which is guaranteed by the United States or in such other manner as the Legislature may determine by law. The amount of said Fund shall be paid to each year out of said Fund an amount of funds to be kept in hand to be determined by the Legislature. Should the Legislature enact any law in anticipation of the expiration of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of the State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election of laws shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AMENDING SUBSECTION (a) OF SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, RELATING TO ESTABLISHMENT OF A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE."

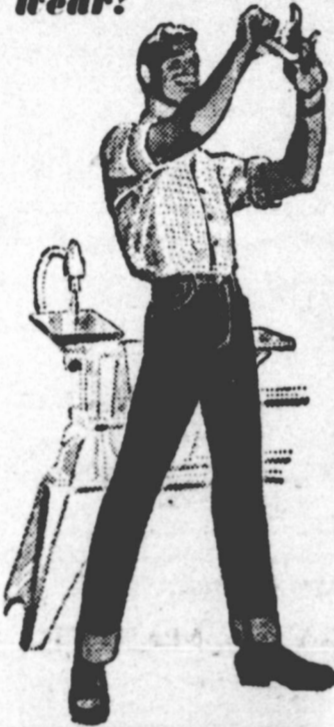

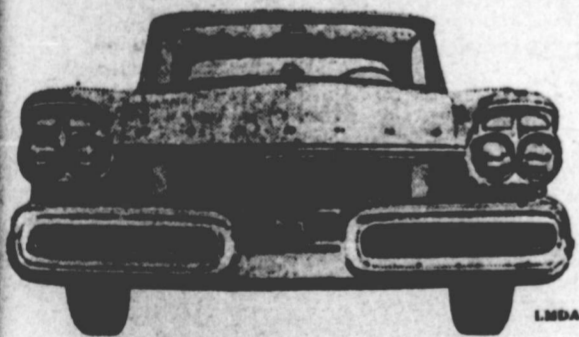

BenJack Cage plans to "blow the lid off" in the LCT probe.

That's what Cage has said he would do when he testifies in the upcoming investigations.

He is set to appear before the Dallas Co. Grand Jury on Sept. 3. In a surprise move, the Travis Co. Grand Jury sent Cage a subpoena to appear on Aug. 20. But Cage wasn't there. His attorney, M. R. Irion, said he didn't know where he was, presumed he was visiting his mother in Los Angeles, and indicated he would not return to Texas until Sept. 3.

Travis and Dallas County Grand Juries both face an Oct. 1 adjournment. District Attorney Les Proctor of Austin said Travis County had no desire to be "first" in questioning Cage, but that they were merely working against a shortage of time. Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade said he preferred to have Cage testify there first, but that his appearance in Austin would neither help nor hurt the Dallas County investigation.

Flu Epidemic Seen — Texas "almost certainly" will have an epidemic of Asiatic flu this fall and winter, say state health officials.

Basis for this prediction is the laboratory samples of virus obtained from Texas patients by the State Health Department. It's a highly communicable strain, says the department's director, Dr. Henry A. Holle. He advised people to be vaccinated as soon as possible.

But availability of vaccine still is a question mark. Production is being rushed, and some cities are setting up priority schedules. Workers performing essential services, such as doctors, nurses, policemen and firemen, will get preference.

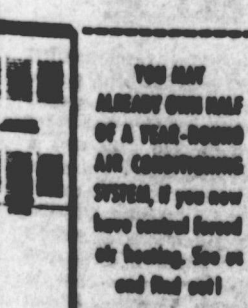

Sports Car Caravan Of 60 Cars To Stop In Ozona August 31

One of the most unusual caravans of the automotive industry will pass through Ozona Memorial Day week-end.

This caravan will consist entirely of Sports cars from the Dallas-Fort Worth area, participating in a "rally." The cars, some 60 of them, will stop for refueling in Ozona Saturday morning, Aug. 31, at 11 a. m.

A sports car Rally, which is not to be confused with a race, is a test of driving skill and automobile safety. It is a competitive sport of European origin where heavy emphasis is given to precision driving. Awards in a rally are presented on the ability of drivers to arrive at a certain destination at an exact time. To make the competition more extreme, the drivers do not know the route they must take until minutes before their departure. The road information given to them at this time tells direction and how far. No highway numbers are included in this material.

Cars entered in this rally include Jaguars, MG's, Triumphs, and Austin-Healeys from England, German Porsche, Mercedes-Benz, and Volkswagens. Also included will be French Renaults, Volvos and Alpha-Romeos. Thunderbirds, Golden Hawks and Corvettes, all representatives of the American sports car industry, will also participate in the event.

This unusual event will have its origin in Dallas, August 30, 7:00 p. m., where each car will leave at one-minute intervals.

From Dallas, the cars will proceed in a southwesterly direction, until they reach Brownwood; the first stop and check point for the rally.

Leaving Brownwood, the drivers will continue to the "Heart of Texas" park where they will spend the night. The next day, the rally will pass through Brady, Menard, Eldorado, and on to Ozona where they will refuel at 11 a. m. and drivers will have refreshments.

Ft. Stockton will be the next fuel stop for this unusual caravan, and then on to Marathon for a compulsory fuel check. After the fuel check, the rally will move on to Big Bend National Park where the drivers will "camp out" for the evening.

The drivers will then head for Presidio, where they will take a short "break" and be allowed to go over the border if they desire. After the "break", the rally will start for Dallas over a route unknown to the drivers, or to your correspondent.

Crockett World Field Gets Extender; Offset To It Is Scheduled

Hancock Oil Co. and Signal Oil & Gas Co. have finalized an extension to the World, West (Strawn) field of Crockett County and filed application to drill an offset to it, 17 miles south of Best.

The No. 1-A Shannon, in 39-BB-TCRR, 1/2-mile east on the south side was completed for a daily flowing potential of 207 barrels of 48.4 gravity oil, plus 1 to 2 per cent basic sediment, with gas-oil ratio 1,170-1.

Production was through a 24-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,007-027 feet and 8,069-99 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 8,120 feet, the total depth. Pay section was fractured with 16,000 gallons. Top of pay was picked at 8,007 feet on derrick floor elevation of


2,484 feet. Tubing pressure was 150 - 400 pounds; with packer on casing. The operators' No. 2-A Shannon, 3/4-mile north, is 700 feet from the north and 600 feet from the west lines of 39-BB-TCRR. It will be drilled to 8,300 feet

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
