Guard posts, Billy Bob Cooks good, but offensively the guard post there is experience and size. Ken and Adolph Rivera are so far and it is likely that Ramos will bolster the line. The team seems promising despite the loss of experience and the moment seem to be favorable.

The chief worries of the coaches staff has to do with the lack of size in the backfield. Not a single one of the backs weighs as much as 200 pounds but even if no shifts are made to remedy this situation, the backfield has had outstanding success before and with good blocking could be more adequate.

Back Stan Williams and Bobby Sutton lend speed and aggression to the offensive line and Dicky Reeves, Dan Humberto Cervantes and Paulk are all good athletes and try hard to fill the bill.

Water Well Proves Up For Radar Station Use; Await Further Orders

Without treatment of any kind, a water well on the Chas. E. Davidson ranch proved adequate to meet the water needs of the nearby U. S. Air Force radar installation five miles east of Ozona after a seven day continuous pumping test completed yesterday.

The Air Force specification of 50 gallons per minute of supply was exceeded by the well on the 24-hour a day pumping test and it was estimated that without acid treatment, the well would produce nearly 60 gallons per minute on continuous pumping without depleting the supply.

With the test completed and a representative of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers here to check the results, the next move will be up to the government, a spokesman said. Whether or not the government will make a deal with the land owner and install pumping equipment, or with the Crockett County Water Control District to equip it and furnish the installation with water were unanswered questions here this week but it was presumed that the report of the well's performance would be made and decision reached by authorities in the next few weeks.

Meanwhile, the small personnel unit now stationed at the radar base is being supplied with water from storage on the base by means of truck transports of water from Ozona mains.

Enlarged Grandstands Ready For Ozona Fans On Season Opener

Ozona football fans will be greeted by a greatly enlarged stadium when the Ozona Lions play their first home game here against the Fort Stockton Panthers on September 20.

The addition of two new sections of seats, one at each end of the west or home stands, and one new section on the south side of the visitors stands on the east side of the field has been completed and maintenance crews of the school system were winding up the job of painting the new sections this week.

The new sections will increase the seating capacity of the stadium by about one third. Three sections, about 650 seats, have been reserved in the home stands for sale to local fans in a season packet for the five home games at \$5 for the season or the same per game price as the general admissions.

A faculty meeting is scheduled for Saturday morning to plan the year's program.

Ashby McMullan Laid To Rest In Services Friday

Ozona Ranchman Died Thursday Morning in Angelo Hospital

Following services at the Ozona Methodist Church at 5 p. m. followed by graveside rites conducted by the Masonic lodge, the body of Ashby McMullan, 50, member of a long prominent West Texas ranch family, was laid to rest in Cedar Hill Cemetery Friday afternoon. Rev. Leroy Russell, pastor of the Ozona Methodist Church, conducted the services. Cody Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. McMullan died early Thursday morning in a San Angelo hospital from respiratory complications resulting from a lung ailment. Surviving are the widow three sons, Jim, Ronnie and Joe; three brothers, Frank McMullan of Ozona, Floyd and D. K. McMullan, Jr., of Big Lake and three sisters, Mrs. Lewis Hersey of Big Lake, Mrs. Allan Watts of Midland and Miss Billie McMullan of San Angelo. Also surviving are 15 nephews and nieces.

Mr. McMullan, a native of San Angelo, was born April 17, 1907. He was a member of the First Christian Church a member of the Masonic Lodge, No. 1206, Big Lake, a 32nd degree Mason and a Shriner. He was also a member of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Assn.

Mr. McMullan and Miss Alice Henderson, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Lee Henderson, pioneer West Texas ranching couple, were married in San Angelo Nov. 25, 1929. The family ranch in Reagan County until 12 years ago when they moved to Ozona. At the time of his death Mr. McMullan operated 22 sections of ranchland in Reagan and Crockett counties.

When Mr. McMullan's condition became critical recently, an Air Force plane from Goodfellow Air Force Base made a mercy flight to Kansas where it picked up Joe McMullan, a son, who was en route home following a canoe trip with a group of Explorer Scouts from San Angelo.

Mr. McMullan's father was the late D. K. McMullan Sr., of Big Lake, a pioneer cattleman of this section. He died in San Angelo in October 1954 and is buried there.

SINISTER SHADOWS

Despite the charge of Counsel Robert F. Kennedy of the Senate Rackets committee that Teamster Vice President James R. Hoffa worked with the notorious Johnny Dio (now under indictment for the acid-blinding of labor columnist Victor Riesel) and his hoodlums to gain control of New York teamsters, and despite any and all evidence to skull-druggery the hearing may turn up, you may expect tough Jimmy Hoffa to succeed the unsavory Dave Beck as president of million-and-a-half-man Teamsters' Union.

That will be no break for the members, or for the nation, for big business or for small business, as the investigation — and a glance back over the Hoffa career — will show. But important as the Teamster probe is, we hope that Counsellor Kennedy and Chairman McClellan will not permit the revelations in New York to distract them from their projected inquiry into the three-year-old Kohler strike and the man who has invested UAM millions in it — and who also wants to be president.

Not of a union — that's old stuff — but President of the United States!

"OPEN SKIES" APPEAR BLUE

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who had himself presented the complex aerial-ground inspection plan of the Western powers to the Russians at the London Disarmament Conference, described it to his press conference as "perhaps the most significant

proposal in terms of peace that I think has been made in recent history, perhaps ever."

Actually, Mr. Dulles presented three different proposals, the most ambitious of which would open to inspection most of North America, the entire Arctic and all of Europe from Ireland to the Urals.

Such a plan, the Secretary was confident, would make surprise attack virtually impossible, and this in turn would make heavy armaments unnecessary since an aggressor, denied the advantage of surprise, would not attack and thus no defense or counter-attack would be involved. Asked why Russia should relinquish such an advantage over a democracy that can not make a surprise attack, Mr. Dulles replied that the Kremlin leaders want to appear "peace-loving." "They talk about it all the time. They realize it is a very important propaganda advantage for them," he said.

But, on his visit to East Berlin, Nikita Khrushchev, in his rage against West Germany's Adenauer and without the soothing influence of his erstwhile travelling companion, Bulganin, forgot his cooing, dove-of-peace routine. Instead, he threatened "England, France and other countries whose areas would be in range of atomic and hydrogen weapons," and suggested broadly that rocket development would soon bring the US within

that range.

Further, the arraignment of Col. Rudolf Ivanovich Abel of Russian Intelligence for espionage — in the best cloak-and-dagger tradition — reminds the free world again that Russian "ground inspection" is pretty thorough as it is.

All-in-all, the climate for mutual inspection and disarmament does not seem greatly improved, in spite of London and in spite of Mr. Dulles' convincing theory.

HEAR THIS!

The battered but proud hulk of the USS Constellation, berthed for the time being on Baltimore's downtown waterfront, is — in these days of the \$40 billion war chest — a startling reminder of our past.

Launched in Baltimore September 7, 1797, the Constellation was not only the first naval vessel to be built by the United States, but constituted for a time our entire navy! Her first skipper, Captain (later Commodore) Thomas Truxton, established systems of duty and discipline, such as the four-hour watch and the three degrees of court martial that remain

today fundamental operating routine. Fabulous for her speed as well as her battle record, the Constellation was known to sailors the world over as "The Yankee Racehorse" and also outdistanced every naval service record — remaining in commission for 149 years!

She fought the French privateers within days of her commissioning, fought the British in 1812, then the North African pirates. In 1840 she went to the aid of Americans caught in the war between China and Great Britain. During the Civil War, the still spry Constellation ranged the Mediterranean capturing blockade runners. Later she served as a receiving ship at the Philadelphia Navy Yard, then as a training ship at Annapolis. But she sailed again in 1880 with the food that saved Ireland from famine. In 1894 she began her long service in Newport as a training ship. But still her days of glory were not over. In 1941, by Presidential proclamation, she became Admiral Ernest J. King's Atlantic Fleet flagship. Massive switchboards and super-modern communications gear replaced her ancient, long-silent guns. Her cabins, that had sheltered many a naval hero, became general staff headquarters.

Finally decommissioned at the end of World War II, the Constellation lay in the Boston Naval Shipyard until she was ordered scrapped in 1963. At this news, aroused Baltimoreans formed a "Constellation Committee," pressed Congress for a bill, signed by President Eisenhower in 1955, to save this historic and gallant vessel.

Today, she rests but a short distance from the ways on which she was built 160 years ago — waiting for those who love ships, American history, or are partial to the US Navy, to get up the \$2 million it will take to put her in fighting trim once more, to give her towering new masts, streets spars and an acre or so of billowing canvas.

There should be millions of such Americans in the land — in fact there are an estimated four million Navy veterans alone. Thus, if every one of these were to help, the job would come to only a few cents apiece. But human nature

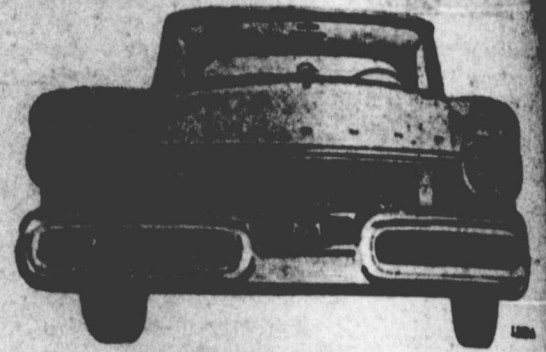

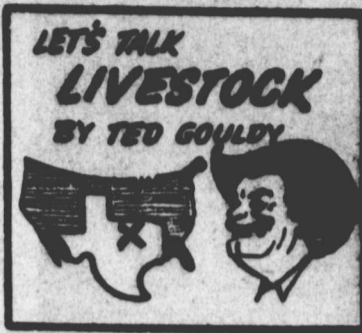

FORT WORTH — Movement of cattle and calves was slightly expanded in the opening session at Fort Worth Monday. Trade was uneven to some degree, as Northern markets came in with a lower tone, and this coupled with bearish cattle trade late last week made national packers and out-of-state orders buyers cautious.

Cows were very active, and most cows and bulls ruled steady, with some spots higher. Slaughter calves were steady. Stocker and feeder buyers with out-of-state con-

nections were generally talking lower prices on the early rounds on the heels of the weakness in those parts of the country last week on replacements. However, the offering sold generally steady, with some of the higher grades fully steady to strong.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$20 to \$25, the higher figure for a load of 1,055 pound steers from H. W. Strickland of Jack County, providing the day's top on beef cattle. Common and medium sorts sold from \$14 to \$19.

Fat cows cashed at \$12.50 to \$15.50, and canners and cutters drew \$8.50 to \$13. Bulls sold from \$11 to \$15.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves cashed at \$19 to \$22.50, and common and medium offerings sold from \$14 to \$18.50. Culls brought \$10 to \$13.

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$20 to \$24.50, and heifer calves ranged from \$22 down. Stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$21 down. Stocker cows cashed at \$10 to \$15.

It is a Well-Known fact that the so-called Civil Rights Bill, officially known as H. R. 6127 is still the predominant factor in adjournment considerations and is the reason for keeping Congress in session longer than usual.

Congressman Howard Smith (D-Va.), Chairman of the Rules Committee, is opposed to any Civil Rights measure and is asking for "unconditional surrender" from the proponents.

Joe Martin (R-Mass) GOP House leader, is calling for a "second front" and recently has proposed a compromise on the jury trial section of the bill.

Kenneth Keating (R-N.Y.), floor leader for the Administration on this bill, is attempting to get some compromise from Smith.

President Eisenhower, meanwhile, threatens to call a special session later this year.

Regardless of who is bluffing or who is calling for various actions, it would appear at the moment Congressman Smith has the whip handle.

Of course, should be continue to remain in session, there would be no need of the special session threatened by the President. So to those many persons who have asked me when we will adjourn, the only advice I can give is: pick a number.

The House Passed a 2.3 billion

to retain control over money matters.

The Government Operations Committee has completed an investigation into a public opinion poll conducted by the Department of State. The State Department hired a professional, commercial poll-taking service to conduct the poll to get public reaction to the job being done by the State Department. The Committee blasts the State Department for illegal spending of funds in this regard and says total expenditures for these samplings of public opinion has been about \$563,000.

Even worse, says the Committee, the findings do not make sense. Example: Of all people asked whether they thought John Foster Dulles was doing a good job, 63% responded and split this way: "Yes", 58%; "no" 5%. But, of all those persons who responded to the question, only 52% could then identify Dulles! In other words, almost half the people who had an impression as to the kind of job Dulles was doing had absolutely no idea who he is.

On another occasion, informants were asked how important they thought it was for the U. S. to help the countries of Africa improve their living standards. Only 18% said they didn't know; 41% expressed an opinion, with 41% saying it is "very important" for us to help these countries. When the 41% who said it was "very important" were asked to name one or more countries of Africa, 67% could not and only 14% could name more than two.

On still another occasion, 51% said the Foreign Service was doing a good job; 20% said it was doing a fair job, and 6% said a poor job. Then, from that group, only 33% had any idea of the duties of the Foreign Service.

Government Operations Committee feels this meaningless, and expensive, numbers game has gone far enough.

dollar bill for the Atomic Energy Commission this week, ending its action on the regular "money bills" for the session. The request was 8% less than that asked by President Eisenhower for the AEC.

This brought total House reductions of the President's proposed 71.8 billion dollar budget to \$5.1 billion. Of that amount, the Senate has confirmed some \$3.9 billion, with a few more measure to go.

This does not mean the Administration will keep spending far below the proposed budget, however. Reason: some \$70 billion in unspent "carry over" funds, over which Congress has lost control, are on hand and the Administration can go into them to carry out full program. Legislation is pending which would prohibit the carry over fund situation in the future, allowing Congress

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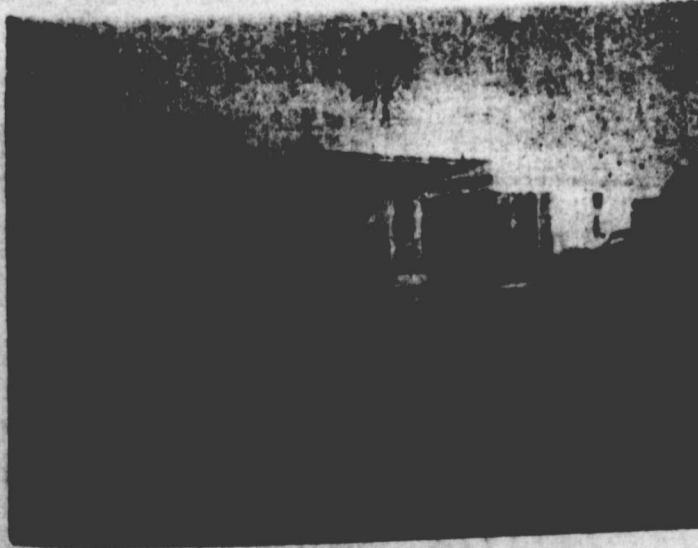
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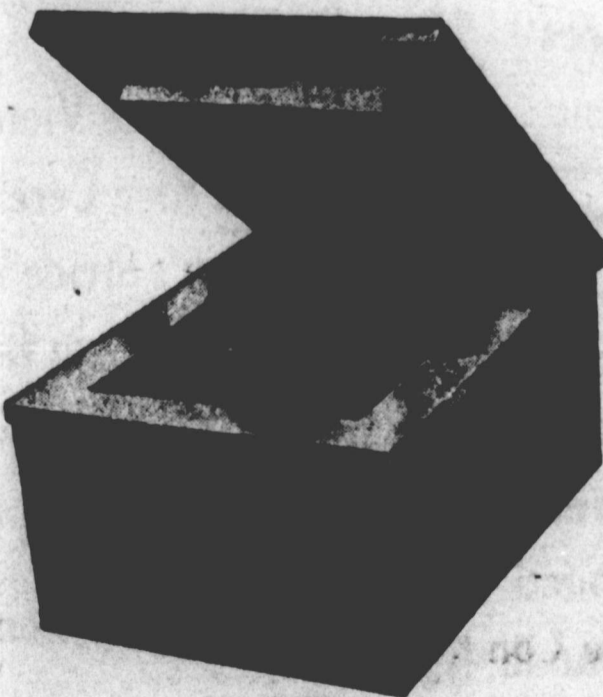
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Top Attractions Booked By SAC Entertainment Assn. 1957-58 Series

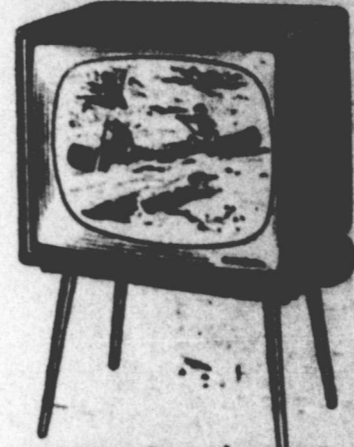

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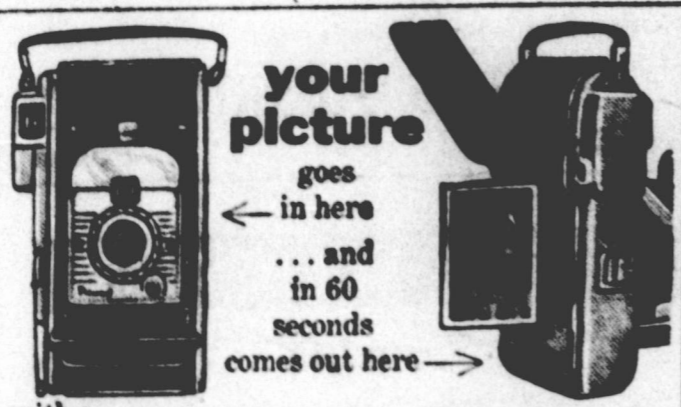
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
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
