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Two Ozona Students To Play In All-State Band At Galveston

Becky Davidson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Tom Davidson, and Scotty Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Moore, left with a group of students for Galveston where they will play with the All-State Band at the Texas Music Educators Convention, which is attended by band and choral instructors from all over the state. Gwynel Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Luffy Walker, and Joe Warren Friend, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Friend, also went with the group as candidates for the band. They are accompanied by Corbett Smith and Mrs. Joe T. Davidson.

The students try out at Regional contest and a certain number are selected to play in the Regional Band, and a few chairs in each section are eligible to go to All-State. Ozona has had an unusually high percentage of band students in this band for a town of its size.

Becky and Scotty have played with the band six years. Gwynel has played trumpet 7 years and Joe Warren cornet 5 years. Becky has had the unusual honor of being selected for All-State for three consecutive years. She has just received her letter of acceptance to the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan, for the eight-week session this summer for work with flute, theory, and conducting.

Fire Dept. Acquires Light Plant, Floods And Smoke Ejector

With the addition of a generating plant, flood lights and a smoke ejector during the past week, the Ozona Fire Department has now accumulated one of the best equipped trucks of any fire department the size of Ozona's in the state, Fire Chief Joe Tom Davidson announced this week.

The county has purchased a 2,500 watt generating plant and a set of flood lights for use of the department in combatting fires. The plant will be useful in generating current in emergency situations and the floods, with long extension cords will be available for use in lighting interiors so firemen can fight fire at its source, thus minimizing risk to lives of fire men and damage to property. A smoke ejector, to clear burning buildings of smoke and permit firemen to get at the blaze, is another valuable addition.

In addition to use as fire fighting equipment, the generating plant will be useful in case of emergency at the hospital. Arrangements are being made to provide a quick plug-in of the auxiliary current for hospital use in case of power failure. The generating plant which generates alternating current, will be mounted on the big pumper truck in such a way that it can be quickly dismounted in case of need.

Many Ozonans View Crime Detection Tools In Texas Crimemobile

High school students and grade school students from sixth grade up were among those who visited the Crimemobile, sponsored by the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation, which was on exhibit here Tuesday. A large number of adults also visited the interesting exhibits. Among the scientific paraphernalia for crime detection on exhibit were the polygraph or lie-detector machine, ballistics test equipment, the drunkometer to determine the degree of intoxication, a short wave radio set described as one of the most valuable tools in the hands of law enforcement officers, and various other gadgets such as microscopes, narcotics display, weapons of police etc.

In charge of the exhibit was Bill Squier who explained the various displays. Among the displayed articles was a replica of the electric chair used at Huntsville prison for execution of condemned criminals. Mr. Squier explained that it had never actually been used for putting a criminal to death but was made by prisoners at the Huntsville prison for use of the Law Enforcement Foundation in its efforts to deter crime.

FFA Set For 3rd Annual Livestock Show Here Sat.

106 Lambs, 2 Calves To Be Graded For Class Awards

Ozons FFA members were set at mid-week for the third annual Commercial Livestock Show, to be held Saturday, starting at 9 a. m. at the new Livestock Barn in the fair grounds.

With 106 fat lambs and two calves ready for the show and grading, this year's show is the largest to date in the history of the FFA program here, according to M. A. Barber, vocational ag. teacher.

After a 110 to 120-day feeding period, 26 FFA students will exhibit their lambs and calves to be graded prime, choice, good or feeder. For each prime lamb, the feeder will receive a blue ribbon and a cash prize of \$6. For each choice lamb, the feeder will receive a red ribbon and a cash prize of \$4. The lambs grading good quality will bring the feeder a white ribbon and a \$2 prize. If a lamb still grades feeder after the feeding period, no ribbon or prize will be awarded. Herman Carter of San Angelo will grade the lambs.

The public is cordially invited to attend the FFA project show, which will be underway from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. A benefit barbecue dinner will be served at the barn, the proceeds to go into the local FFA chapter treasury.

No lambs will be auctioned at the local show. All will be sold, however, according to their grade, at the Producers Livestock Auction Co. sale in San Angelo on Wednesday, Feb. 26.

Big Lake And Menard To Play Bi-District Game In Ozona Gym

Ozons Davidson gym will be the site for the bi-district basketball game between District 7-A winner Big Lake and District 8-A champion Menard, it was announced yesterday.

Lions Shell Two Dist. Opponents As Season Wanes

Ozons Cinches Second Place In Downning Eldorado, Sonora

The Ozona Lions shelled two district opponents into submission during the week by blasting the Eldorado Eagles 56 to 38 in Eldorado and then coming from behind to crush the Sonora Broncos 63 to 33 in Sonora.

The Lions bounced back from a poor shooting exhibition in the Menard game to hit a warm 41% of their shots in the first half of the Eldorado game and grab a 32 to 12 half time lead. Coach J. A. Pelto emptied his bench early in the second quarter and all nine players broke into the scoring column before the intermission.

Rodney Franklin led the Lion attack with 13 points but the Lion attack was well distributed with Stan Williams, Jake Young, Jerry Jacobs and Bobby Vargas all getting seven or more points.

The Ozona B team started things off right for the locals when they whipped the highly favored Eagle B team 36 to 30.

Humberto Cervantez, Johnny Cooper and Dizzy Reeves led the Lion reserves with Cervantez counting 13 points to win honors as high man.

The game was a nip and tuck affair until the final seconds but the Ozona crew dumped in five points in the last 37 seconds to win going away.

In Sonora Tuesday night the Ozona Lions turned in a torrid second half to dash the Broncos' upset hopes, and turn the game into a rout as the Lions copped their fifth district win.

Ozona Junior High Cagers Win District Championship With Season Record of 12-1

The Ozona Junior High Cubs closed their basketball season in Menard last Saturday by winning the District tournament. In winning they brought their season standing to twelve wins against one loss. That lone loss was to Del Rio in the opening game of the Sonora tournament. The Cubs went on from this loss to win consolation in the tournament and bring home a very beautiful trophy. The Cubs claim win over Big Lake, Menard, Junction, Eldorado and Sonora.

In winning the District tournament in Menard the Cubs first challenged Sonora for the right to meet the winner of the Menard, Junction and Eldorado games. In the Sonora game the starting five shot into a 26 point lead and turned it over to reserves who played all

of the last half. Final score was 42 to 16 with nine boys scoring, with Martinez and Montgomery doing most of the damage.

In the final game of the night the Cubs downed Eldorado 46 to 25 with Martinez scoring 16 points before the reserves took over. TIME TO START SELLING

As word of the biggest jump in unemployment since 1950 was going out to his fellow citizens over the news wires and air waves, President Eisenhower fired the news-reel and TV cameras to predict a "pickup in job opportunities" to begin in March. The mid-January report, just released, showed 4,494,000 jobs, an increase of 1,120,000 during the preceding 30 days.

The Noelke (3,250-foot) field of Crockett County gained its third producer and a 1/2-mile southwest extension with completion of Inter-State Oil Co. of Kerrville No. 1 H. M. Half Estate, five miles southeast of Iran.

It was finished for a daily pumping potential of 86 barrels of 30 gravity oil, no water, through perforations between 3,100-156 feet in 4 1/2-inch casing seated at 3,250 feet. Total depth is 4,050 feet.

Top of pay was picked at 3,100 feet on elevation of 2,350 feet.

Location is 330 feet from the north and east lines of 68-1-14-G.N.

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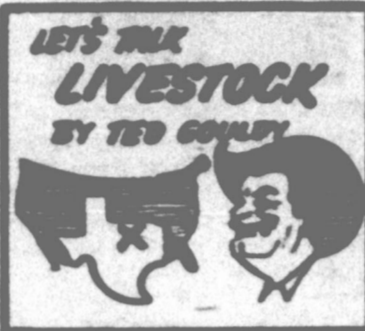
Ladies Plan Tea For Wife Of Bible Lecturer To Be Here Feb. 27th

Livestock Inventory Shows Texas' Improved Position

FORT WORTH — Livestock numbers reported by the USDA in the annual inventory released at Fort Worth this week reveal the upswing in numbers of sheep and goats, and stable numbers of cattle, in Texas reflect the improved pasture situation.

The estimate reveals that on January 1, 1958, Texas had about the same number of cattle as a year ago, the numbers of stock sheep were up five percent to a total of 4,700,000 head. Texas' goat population was up two percent with an estimated figure of 2,864,000 head.

Cattle and Calves Open Monthly Steady

Supplies of cattle and calves were of moderate proportions at Fort Worth and all around the major market circle Monday. Trade at Fort Worth was fully steady to strong on fed cattle, bulls and high grade slaughter calves and

stockers. Plainer stocker, and medium and lower grade calves and cows showed some weakness before the session was completed.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$24 to \$27, and common and medium offerings cleared at \$16 to \$24. Fat cows brought \$16.50 to \$18.50, and canners and cutters drew \$11 to \$17. Bulls sold mostly from \$14 to \$19, a few top-quality individuals to \$19.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves at \$24 to \$27, and common and medium offerings cashed at \$17 to \$23. Cull sorts cashed at \$14 to \$17. Medium and good stocker-ster calves sold from \$22 to \$27.50 with few choice to \$28. Heifer

calves ranged from \$26.75 downward. Stocker-ster yearlings of medium and good quality sold from \$20 to \$22.50, and some choice 575-pound slaughter yearling steers in a head lot cashed at \$27.

Heavy Lambs and Yearlings Weakness, Some Off Market

Sheep and lambs were in the largest supply in some months at Fort Worth Monday and weakness were burdened with heavy supplies of carcasses, and prices turned downward. Prices ranged from barely steady to as much as \$1

lower, with heavy lambs and yearlings selling above 100 pounds under the most severe pressure. Heifer fat and rough quality offerings shared the long end of the line with the heaviest offerings of good quality lambs on these types. Good and choice offerings cashed at \$21 to \$22.50 or more on lambs and yearlings. A few lambs sold as low as \$18.50. Yearling wethers sold from \$18 to \$20.50. A few yearling ewes sold from \$18 to \$20.50. Slaughter goats cashed at \$7.50. A few small lots of heavy good feeder lambs sold at \$10 to \$11.50.

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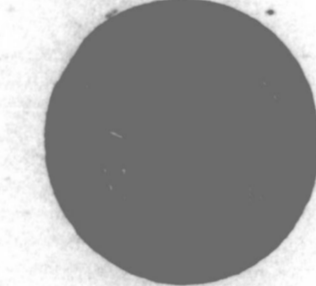

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — Money is making the biggest news in Austin at the moment.

Discussion swirls around such topics as campaign funds, unemployment, recession, taxation, receiverships and credit insurance rates — all pocket-prodding issues.

Gov. Price Daniel publicly deplored the money-raising efforts of Texas' Republican National Committeeman H. J. (Jack) Porter. Porter staged a \$100-a-plate dinner in Houston to raise money for Republican congressional campaigns. His widely publicized letter asking contributions pointed out the need to gain support for the natural gas bill now before Congress.

A hard-fought issue for many years, the bill is generally favored in Texas and other gas-producing states, but bitterly opposed in gas-consuming Eastern and Northern cities. Opponents were quick to label bribery and "selling legislation for campaign contributions." Proponents of the bill groaned. They contended that Porter had heaved a huge monkey wrench into plans for passage this session.

More Taxes? — Governor Daniel has slightly and very cautiously amended his determinedly cheerful stand about possible need for new state taxes.

He still doesn't agree with Comptroller Robert S. Calvert's chilly predictions. These are for a \$12,000,000 deficit by the end of this biennium (in 1930) and need for the next Legislature to scratch up \$100,000,000 in new revenue.

Governor Daniel said he felt the state would just about break even by 1930. But he conceded that need of a growing state might call for more money by then. He still favors a gas gathering tax, which he proposed last year, but emphasized he isn't recommending that or any other new tax for the time being.

Let's Face It — It's a recession, all right, but a minor one.

This is the answer Dr. John R. Stockton, one of the state's top business analysts, is giving many groups these days. Dr. Stockton is director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Ebbing of prosperity and fear of another Depression have put the spotlight on BBR's studies. Dr. Stockton mimes no words about there being a recession, but contends that the cures for this one are in plain sight. He cites increased federal spending and easier credit regulations.

A "minor" recession, says the

BBR director, usually lasts about six to eight months.

Anti-Gift Law Tepples — The Attorney General has declared invalid a section of a law prohibiting insurance company officials from making gifts to State Insurance Department employees.

His reason: the bill's caption or title did not mention the subject. Texas' constitution requires that a bill's caption must state specifically what is in the bill in this case, the caption did mention that Insurance Department employees could not accept gifts from industry people. But it did not say that industry people could not give them.

Each year a number of newly-passed laws are thrown out by the attorney general, or by courts, as being improperly written. Governor Daniel has suggested a bill-drafting division in the attorney general's department to help legislators avoid such errors.

House Cleaning — "I can't help but think that just about all of those rotten apples are out of the barrel," said State Insurance Liquidator J. D. Wheeler, in predicting that the wheel of insurance company failures might be over. Our job with the insurance industry is like that of a traffic policeman, said State Insurance Board Chairman Penn Jackson. "If directors and stockholders will discharge their responsibilities, we will have less tickets to issue."

As each Cadet completes certain phases of study and training, he or she becomes eligible for an Orientation Flight Ride. For some of the Cadets receiving flights Sunday, this was their first ride, for the others it was their second. Each Cadet advances in the course

of training individually, so that new members will go through the same training that the older members have had, and will be eligible for the same benefits. Next Tuesday night, at 8:00 p.

m. in the High School library, at a joint meeting of the Cadet and Senior Squadrons, the Cadets will have an opportunity to demonstrate some of the results of their training and study. All Cadets are

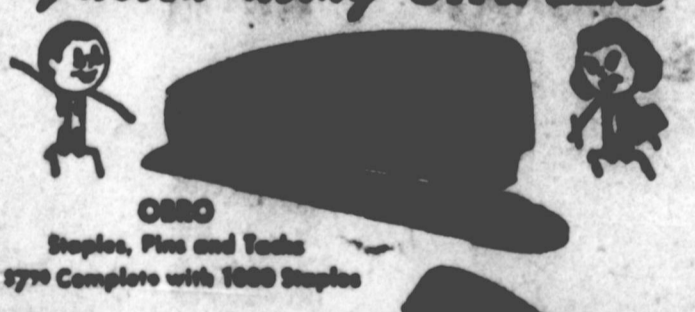

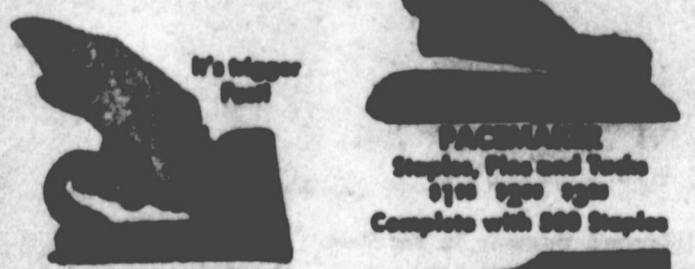

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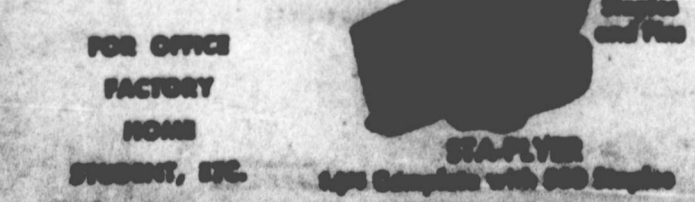
