Half Time Acts Feature Harlem Globe Trotters

7 Outstanding Acts In Store For Local Audience Nov. 27

A year ago Owner-Coach Abe Sapperstein of the Harlem Globetrotters basketball team decided to try out a new kind of act: the added floor show of superb variety artists he carries along before and between halves of a game.

The trial worked out so well, that Abe, the recipient of the test, will be here a regular member of the troupe for the second straight years as the Trotters battle the Washington Generals in Ozona's Davidson gym the night of November 27 under auspices of the Ozona Rotary Club.

It was in Turkey two years ago, on the Trotters' annual summer tour of the Continent, that Abe saw Ali perform and was amazed and mystified by the ingenious magician.

A total of seven star-studded acts are included in the fabulous intermission time show brought by the Globe Trotters.

Among these are those world-traveled hand-balance experts known as the Farias Unit, The Cubans, Julio Farias, his wife Geraldine, and young Steve Munoz, perform their gasp-provoking feats as a part of the lavish half-time entertainment.

Carl Flynn, a 20-year-old aerial hand-balancer, another act in the mid-time array, was discovered by Sapperstein on the nationally televised "Chance of a Lifetime" show two years ago. Since, he has been featured in night clubs, theatres and in numerous TV shows, particularly in his astounding one-finger stand.

Playing his eighth consecutive year with the Globe Trotters is Jacques Cordon, the Bounding Belgian from Brussels, who does an exciting unicycle and juggling act combination that never fails to please the crowds.

Gas-Condensate Producer Fined On Ingham Ranch

15 Million Feet of Gas 125 Bbls. Condensate Daily Potential

Crockett gained a Devonian gas-condensate discovery with completion of J. E. Jones Drilling Co. of San Antonio No. 1 Ingham, 10 miles east of Sheffield.

It was completed for a calculated, daily absolute open flow of 15,000,000 cubic feet of gas plus 125.73 barrels of 59.9 gravity condensate.

Production was through perforations between 7,488-548 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 7,711.64 feet.

The project is 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of 1-FFF-TGRR.

Operator asked that it be given designation as the Ingham (Devonian) field.

DRY HOLE

Albert C. Bruce, of Midland No. 1 Hugh Andrews Trust, wildcat located 730 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of the southeast quarter of 59-UV-University, 16 miles south of Big Lake, plugged and abandoned at 1,755 feet.

Slick Oil Corp. To Drill Ellenburger Wildcat in Crockett

Slick Oil Corp. of Houston will drill an 8,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 20 miles northwest of Luma and four miles east of the Tippett, multi-pay field. It will be the No. 1 E. F. Noelke, et al.

Rotary drilling will begin immediately. Ground elevation is 2,801 feet.

Location, on a 240-acre lease, is 6,930 feet from the northeast lines and 990 feet from the southeast lines of 48-31-HATC.

It is 1/2-mile southeast of Humble 1-E Noelke, a 7,900-foot failure abandoned Jan. 6, 1934. The following tops were picked on elevation of 2,268 feet: Sprayberry 6,900 feet; Ellenburger, 7,755 feet.

'Catfish' Rollins Set For Starring Role In Globe Trotters Show

Oliver ("Catfish") Rollins is favoring with distinction as a member of the Harlem Globetrotters basketball cast, coming to Ozona Nov. 27 to play the professional Washington Generals in Davidson gymnasium, although one of few who made the leap right from high school into the ranks of the world-famed Negro aggregation.

It's no secret that the Globetrotter management feels it has a new "King of Comedy" in the making in the young, growing giant.

To be that type of royalty in the Trotter scheme of things embraces a special basketball playing ability and a real flair for showmanship. Rollins has both.

He was spotted by a Globetrotter scout while playing on the high school team of the small town of Carrier Mills, Ill., where he amassed a total of 2,430 points in four years of play and averaged 33.5 points per game in his final year.

The scout's report on him read: "Best prospect I have seen in a long time. Stands 6-3, 19 years old, weighs 216. Fast for his weight. He sweeps the boards. He has steel springs in his legs. He can jump and throw the ball down through the hoop. He is the fastest six-three cager I've ever seen. He can catch a basketball with either hand like it was a baseball. He's agile and has a deft touch in his hands."

Lions To Finish Regular Season In Menard Fri. Night

Win Would Give Them Undisputed District Championship

The Ozona Lions will close their regular schedule for 1937 Friday night in Menard as they attempt to win an undisputed district 3-A title from the dangerous Yellow Jackets.

The Lions gained a share of the title last week by beating Junction but should they fail to win this week they would have to share the district with Sonora, providing the Broncos defeat Eldorado.

The Yellow Jackets started the season slowly but have come along well and now feature a wide open attack which uses a spread and a great deal of passing.

The Lion defense against running reached a season high Friday night in Junction, but pass defense was shoddy and will have to improve a great deal this week if the Lions don't want to get involved in a scoring duel.

Lion wingman Jerry Jacobs had the best night of his career Friday night as he did a stellar job on defense and attracted three men on offense all evening. The Lion running game was rolling and it was not until late in the game that the Cats went into the air, even though the touchdown strike went to another receiver, much of the credit for his being so open must go to Jacobs.

Humberto Cervantes, the other Lion end, also played extremely well both on offense and defense setting up one touchdown with a pass interception and scoring another.

Menard has a big rangy tall club and it might be noted that they gave Sonora more trouble than did Junction.

The Lions will now be trying to end the season with an 8 won and 2 lost record, a loss would leave the Lions with a 7 and 3 record.

Public Invited To Visit Flood Dam Monday, Nov. 18th

Site 1 Open To Public On Day Of Engineering Inspection

A public showing, dedication and semi-final engineering inspection of the near completed structure is set for next Monday afternoon, Nov. 18 at Johnson Draw flood control dam No. 1 on the Boyd Baker ranch, Bob Scott, area conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, announced this week.

The public is cordially invited to visit the site of the first to be completed of seven dams which ultimately will offer flood control on the big watershed and prevent repetition of the disastrous floods which have ravaged Ozona in the past.

Here for a semi-final engineering inspection of the dam will be Bill Bruce, watershed engineer for the SCS; Cy Richmond, area conservationist from San Angelo; Ralph White, project engineer; Bob Scott, area conservationist, and a representative of the state SCS committee. Only a few minor bits of finishing work, completion of the fence around the dam and other details remain to be completed.

The public is invited to visit the site beginning at 2:30 Monday afternoon. There will be members of the SCS, the Crockett Soil Conservation District board of supervisors and others on hand to explain the design and workings of the flood control dam and a public address system will be installed so that speakers may explain the watershed-control plan as exemplified by the dam and the benefits to be derived from the control program.

No. 1 dam site may be reached by driving 15 miles north on Highway 168, the Barnhart highway, turn left at the Midway Lane, FM 33, a distance of three miles, then turn left at the first cattle guard off the highway. The dam site is about three miles south of Highway 33.

Oil Production Discovered 11 Mi. South Of Ozona

Wildcat on W.C. Montgomery Ranch Is Prolific Producer

Crockett county gained a prolific oil discovery eleven miles south - southwest of Ozona last week, opening up a new production area in pure wildcat territory, at least 20 miles from the nearest oil production. This is the first oil production of consequence yet discovered in the south half of the county.

Ralph E. Fair of San Antonio No. 1 W. C. Montgomery, Crockett County Wichita - Albany sand discovery, located 11 miles south-southwest of Ozona, was finished for a daily flowing potential of 240 barrels of 35.6 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio 225-1.

Production was through a 3/4-inch choke and perforations between 3,224-271 feet in 7-inch casing set at 3,300 feet.

Tubing pressure was 145 pounds, with packer on casing.

Top of pay was picked at 3,266 feet on ground elevation of 2,495 feet. Pay section was treated with 40,000 pounds of fracture.

Location, on a 900-acre lease, is 890 feet from the south and 390 feet from the west lines of 63-GG&SF.

The project is at least 20 miles south and southeast of any oil production.

Operators have scheduled a 900-foot well offset to the No. 1 W. C. Montgomery discovery well. It will be the No. 1 Mary Sue Hunt.

Rotary drilling to 3,400 feet will begin when permit is received. Location, 36 1/2 miles lease, is 290 feet from the east and 1,000 feet from the west lines of 63-GG&SF.

Morning services will be held during the week at 10:00 a. m., at the Methodist Church. Evening services, Monday through Friday, will be held in the High School Auditorium, 7:30 p. m.

An invitation is being extended to all people in Ozona to attend the regular services of the Mission. Programs announcing the Mission have been widely distributed over town under the auspices of the Methodist Commission on Membership and Evangelism. Garden Club Reminders

Rainy days have given gardeners time to rest and to enjoy the prospect of beautiful Spring flowers. They are also faced with the not quite so pleasant prospect of a sore back from battling the myriads of tiny weeds springing from every crack and cranny. Planting conditions will be perfect as soon as the soil dries enough to dig.

The red pyracantha, considered one of the hardiest and most beautiful shrubs in West Texas, is in its fullest glory now. Fall plantings are recommended because their root systems strengthen during the winter months for maximum first year growth and resistance to summer heat. It is a versatile shrub and can be trained to grow into almost any design against a wall. There is a lovely espaliered one on a grey block wall at the Charles Williams, Jr. home, and numerous shrub types are all over Ozona — some 10 or 12 feet high. The snowy blossoms in the Spring are almost as much of a show as the gorgeous berries in the Fall.

Another favorite for this area, but not as well known, is the Buford holly with its large, glossy leaves and profusion of red berries which carry the Christmas motif throughout the winter.

The gay yellow forsythia is one of the first signals that Spring is on its way. Now is a good time to space a few throughout your garden. There are several different shades and types available.

Plant sweet peas this month for sturdy plants and early bloom. They can be planted deeper now than in Jan. so make the trenches eighteen inches deep to start with. Loosen the dirt to that depth and work well-rotted barnyard fertilizer into the soil at the bottom of the hole. Let this stand a few days before planting the seeds a foot apart and beneath a 2 inch

covering of the rich soil. As the young seedlings grow, keep drawing earth around their stems. This and the walls of the trench will protect them from the cold. Before buying seeds investigate some of the new hardier heat resistant types and you may continue cutting lovely fragrant blossoms after hot weather comes next Spring.

Plant Dutch iris now. They are especially lovely in flower arrangements in early spring. As well as the more common blues and yellows, try some of the pure whites and the whites with a yellow throat. You will be as thrilled as if they were orchids.

Don't burn those leaves that are beginning to fall. Your garden needs leaf mold and compost provided by processing them.

Hurry, and you may have pansy blooms for Christmas. Besides being the most popular of bedding plants, they are versatile in the manner in which they fit into your winter garden. No other plant gives so much joy for so little investment. They are sun-loving and will not perform their best in the shade. They like rich, pulverized soil and plenty of water. Space your plants about a foot apart and they will form a solid border of luxuriant, colorful beauty.

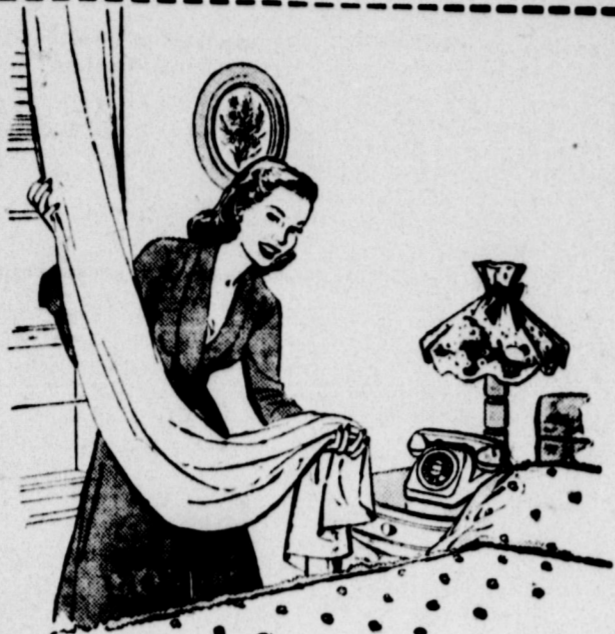

Cattle Open Mixed, Prices Mostly Steady
FORT WORTH — Trade was active and prices were fully steady on most of the 3,800 cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday. Fed cattle were in small supply again, and some shortfed fleshy twoway steers sold to feeders at a little over packer bids.

Cows were a little less active and steady to weak as compared with the high, runaway market late last week brought on by rain which cut the receipts. Bulls were steady to 50 cents higher, some heavies to \$16.50.

Fat calves were selling steady to 25 or 50 cents higher. Toppy baby beef heavies reached \$22 to \$22.50. Stocker cattle and calves were steady. Some good lots of steer calves getting up to \$23 to \$24.50, and their heifer mates selling from \$22 down. Steer yearlings sold from \$22 down. A few stocker cows cashed at \$10 to \$16.

Comparative prices: Good and choice steers and yearlings \$20 to \$22.50, high choice or prime quotable to \$24 or \$25. Medium and lower grades \$14 to \$20. Fat cows \$13.50 to \$15, and canners

and cutters \$10 to \$12.50. Bulls \$11 to \$16.50. Good and choice fat calves \$20 to \$22.50, and medium and lower grades \$13 to \$19.50. Stocker steer calves \$15 to \$24.50 and heifer calves \$22 down.

Sheep Fully Steady, Goats Sell Higher

The offering of sheep and lambs was active and fully steady at Fort Worth Monday. Good and choice fat lambs sold from \$21 to \$22, and some medium to good stocker and feeder lambs drew \$19 to \$20. Some slowness in the stocker lamb trade was reported at most points due to the cold, wet weather, which has hindered grain pastures grazing. A few slaughter ewes sold around \$9.

A rather large offering of goats arrived and found both slaughter and stocker buyers paying stronger prices. Most of the slaughter goats cashed at \$6 to \$6.50, and stocker goats sold from \$7 to \$8, however, some of the goats in the \$7 to \$7.50 range were similar to slaughter goats sold last week around \$1 under Monday's figure.

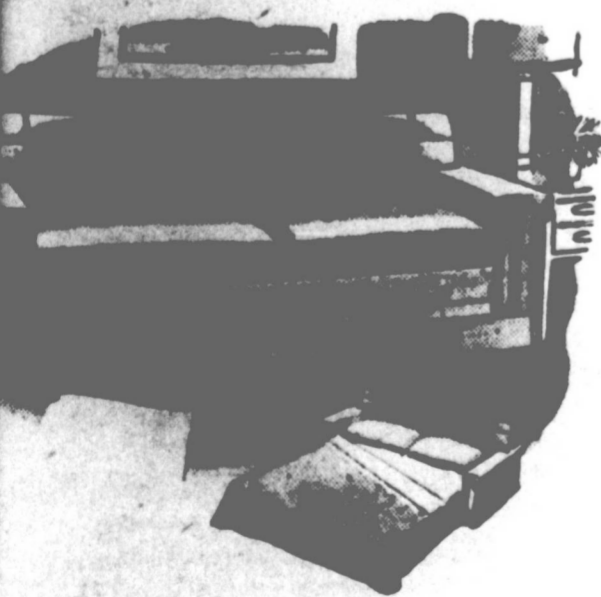

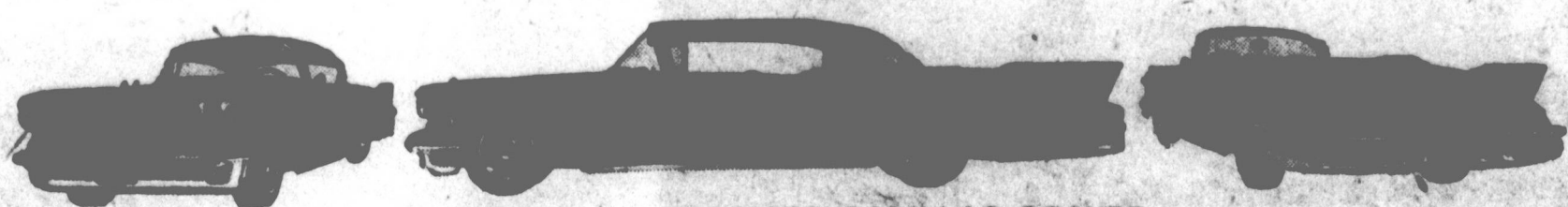
