# Lady Mules down Dimmitt to win first district title in 32 years

The Muleshoe Lady Mules nailed down their first district championship in 32 years at home Friday, beating Dimmitt 56-45 before a gym full of rowdy, black-and-white-clad fans.

The District 2-3A victory gave the Lady Mules a 20-9 overall mark and an 8-2 record in the league. It was the second-straight 20-win season for head coach Jim Gruhlkey and his team and the first time in recent history the Lady Mules

put together back-to-back 20win seasons (MHS was 23-7. and second in the district, last

The Lady Mules advance into the bi-district playoffs against District 1-3A runnerup Perryton, with the date and site yet to be determined. Gruhlkey said it appears the Lady Mules will play Perryton Friday, Feb. 18. The optimum neutral site would be in Amarillo at either Tascosa Amarillo High. But the game could

be played at Randall High, or at the West Texas A&M Fieldhouse, depending on how the Amarillo teams line up in their playoff picture.

"Nothing's confirmed. We've got our name on the list for Friday (Feb. 18) at either Tascosa or Amarillo High, but we'll just have to wait and see," Gruhlkey said.

While it appeared the Lady Mules might be forced into a

### Mules end seson in loss to Bobcats

The Muleshoe Mules battled Dimmitt tooth and nail for two quarters here Friday, but the Bobcats pulled away in the second half for an 80-40 District 2-3A victory.

Muleshoe trailed just 26-23 at the half and 34-28 midway in the third period. But the Bobcats went on a 23-2 run the

rest of the third and put the game away.

With the win, the Bobcats improved to 16-12 overall, 8-2 in District 2-3A and clinched second place. Dimmitt advances to the bi-district playoffs against 1-3A champion Canyon.

Littlefield polished off its

2-3A title with a 73-62 win at Tulia. The Wildcats finished the regular season at 27-4 and 10-0 in the league. Littlefield will meet the 1-3A runner-up in the bi-district round. Perryton and Dalhart both finished in a tie for second in 1-

# Valentine's Day is celebration of love

For thousands of years, mid February has been a special time for lovers. The Valentine's Day we know is a hybrid holiday created when early Christian fathers cobbled together a pagan ritual and a nearly forgotten martyrdom. The fact that this odd holiday not only caught on, but endures today more joyously than ever, is a tribute to the power of love.

The Roman Lupercalia, dedicated for a thousand years to the fertility god Lupercus, celebrated love by a lottery in which young men picked the names of women who would serve as companions for a year.

Early Christians, anxious to attract pagans to the Church, purposely absorbed pagan holidays, but the Lupercalia was too licentious. They needed a new holiday, one that would retain the aura of love, but which would also be spiritually uplifting.


Pope Gelasius, who understood both human nature and PR, redisovered St. Valentine,

an early priest who was stoned to death in 270AD for marrying couples against an edict by Emperor Claudius II. Claudius felt single men made better soldiers; and better soldiers were what the troubled Roman Empire desperately needed.

Valentine was caught, imprisoned and condemned. While awaiting execution, he fell in love with his jailer's blind daughter, converted her to Christianity, and restored her sight. His last not to his love, signed "From your Valentine," was history's first Valentine's Day card.

Valentine was an inspired choic for an appropriately decorous holiday to replace the randy old Lupercalia, so in 496AD Gelasius memorialized Valentine with a name day and a new lottery; but instead of women's names, Roman youths would now draw the names of Saints whose lives they had to emulate for a year.

That lottery proved as popular then as it would now, and it quickly passed from

history. But creative Romans preserved a touch of the old Lupercullan spirit by altering the practice of drawing names to offering greetings to sweethearts. To pacify the Church, they signed themselves "From your Valentine." And surely hoped for a better fate than the historical Valentine.

The practice of sending notes

and cards quickly expanded into the gift-giving, and history's great lovers have always given gifts of jewelry to win and hold their loved one's

Initially, lovers gave "magical" amulets in precious metals, often studded with valuable gemstones believed to have supernatural and curative

powers. During the Middle Ages, courtship always included gifts of jewelry or coins made into "benders" - socalled because they were bent to keep them from being spent accidentally.

# Gardening program is offered

Bailey county residents with the proverbial "green thumb" can sharpen their gardening skills and help others in their community by taking part in a program being offered again this Spring by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"We're joining other South Plains counties to conduct an intensive Texas Master Gardener program," said Curtis Preston, county extension agent. "This is 50 hours of outstanding instruction in all aspects of ornamental horticulture and gardening and can lead to designation as a Certified Texas Master Gardner," he said.

Persons wishing to enter the program should already have knowledge and skills in basic ornamental horticulture, gardening and general related areas, the county agent said.

Participants selected for the program will receive 50 hours of instruction during 12 evening sessions and a field trip. Instructors will include faculty of the Extension Service, the Texas Forest Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, which are agencies of the Texas A&M University System; Texas Tech University; and members of the West Texas Arts and Botanical Association, and the Lubbock Rose Society.

All training will be at the Texas A&M University agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

Participants must agree to attend at least nine of the 12 training sessions, pay the \$50.

Tulia's sudden slump left the Lady Hornets tied with Littlefield and Friona for the second playoff spot from 2-3A; all three at 6-4, after Friona won 41-33 at Floydada. A coin flip will determine which team gets a bye and the other two will likely play Monday at a neutral site. The following night, the winner plays the bye team. That winner earns the second seed in 2-3A and will play 1-3A champion Canyon in the bi-district round. Canyon eliminated Muleshoe from the playoffs a year ago.

Against Dimmitt, the Lady Mules got off to a strong start, then fought off the Bobbies' attempts to rally. Muleshoe led 11-5 after one period.

Dimmitt cut the margin to 14-13 midway in the second period, but Muleshoe scraped together a 22-16 halftime lead.

Dimmitt began to score from the outside in the third period, as Cara Josselet got loose for a pair of treys that cut Muleshoe's lead to 28-25.

But Misty Davenport scored seven of her 16 points over the final 1:47 of the third to give the Lady Mules a 35-25 lead with one quarter to play.

A rash of Lady Mule turnovers early in the final period

gave MHS fans a case of nerves, but they soon settled down. The Lady Mules hits 11 of 13 free throws down the stretch to keep the Bobbies at arm's length.

As the final minute began with Muleshoe in control, the MHS student section unfurled a huge banner. 

Also included on the agenda are: A review of departmental reports, approve the payroll, and consider Budget Amendment No. 3 to the fiscal year 1993 budget, among other items.

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


One thing, though, is even more humbling than being entrusted with the wonderful love of a beloved human being--being a recipient of the love of God.






