Utilities executives deplore this idea of sending fake telegrams of protest to Congress—if Congress can prove the telegrams are fakes.

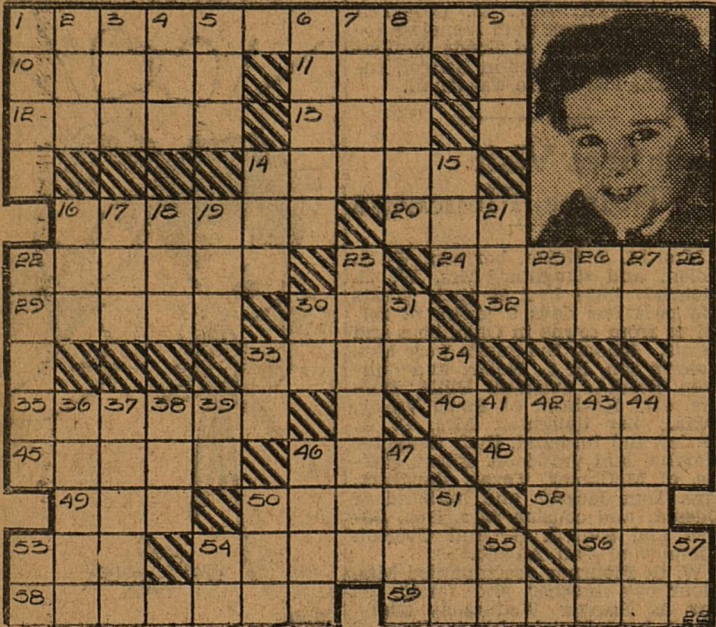

Variety Is Spice Of Eating, So Try Out New Dishes

Have I or haven't I told you about the grand discoveries that have been made about deep-fat frying? That, for instance, the old odium attached to ordinary frying has been removed from it and that it develops food flavors that are distinctive? The cook who does not use deep-fat frying misses much and spends more. For fritters, croquettes, French fried vegetables and such economical dishes as fish and cutlets are appetizing for late summer menus and possible only with this method. Don't get in the habit, though, of repeating family favorites too often because even the greatest delicacies lose their glamor if you get too much of them.

In your fight against sameness, don't hesitate to try new recipes and new food materials. If the novelty doesn't prove popular you don't have to repeat it, but the chances are that every one in the family will welcome the change. Another nut to avoid is the same food combinations over and over. Remember when you were in boarding-school how, without fail, they had certain dinners on certain evenings? Sunday, night always was fruit salad with hot rolls, fudge cake with whipped cream and tea. Grand for the first few weeks, but after that, dull as dish water.

Even a change in the shape of dishes is a relief sometimes. For instance, jellied salad served in a ring mold with the center filled with fresh tomatoes cut in quarters and garnished with mayonnaise seems quite different from the same jelly in individual molds on a slice of tomato. My boy refuses to eat turnips by themselves, but if I boil them whole, cut out the centers to make cups, dip them in melted butter, fill them with buttered peas and slide them in the oven before serving, he loves them. The combination of a cheap vegetable with an expensive one is a worthwhile saving.
