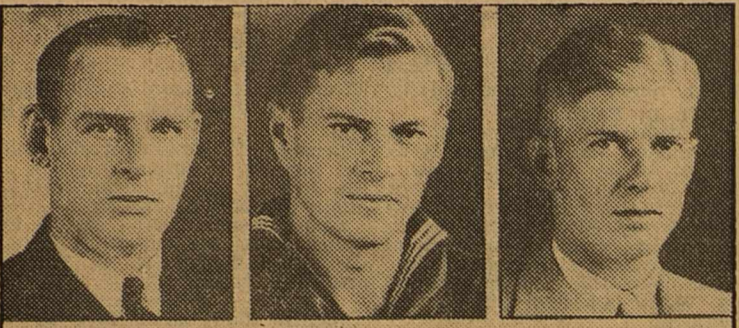

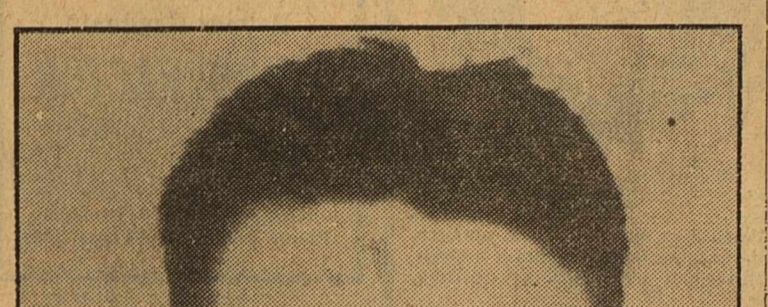

Mid-Continent No. 1 Walton is showing for the largest producer in the Kermit area of Winkler by flowing 110 barrels of oil the first hour of test after shooting early today.

CRANE'S WADDELL POOL ADDING FLUSH WELL

The heavily producing Waddell pool of northern Crane county was credited with another flush producer today when Magnolia No. 5 Edwards, 330 feet from the south and 990 feet from the west line of section 20, block B-23, public school land, flowed through casing at the rate of 228 barrels in one hour after topping up at 3,518. Plans of operators are unannounced, but it may be given the large time far higher customary with some of the wells in the field.

PREPARE TO PLUG GLASSCOCK TEST AS WATER INCREASES

After encountering an increase in water from 3,187 to 3,212, operators have decided to plug and abandon section 20, block B-23, public school land, Floyd C. 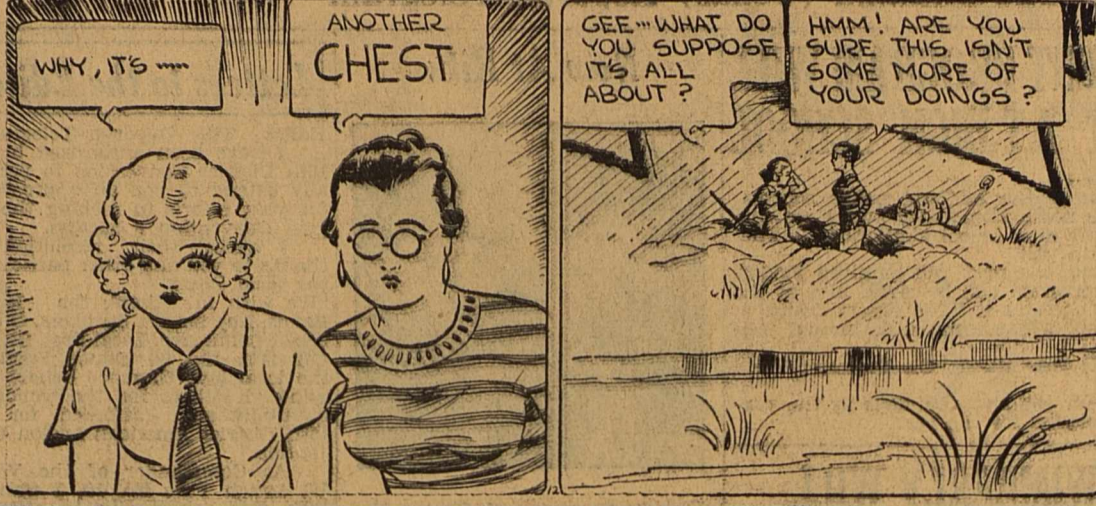
Dr. Bybee To Accept Another Position

**CRANE DEEP TESTS ARE AT CRITICAL DEPTHS**

Sinclair-Prairie and others No. 1 Tubb, western Crane County deep test drilling to the Tubb pay horizon over 1,800 feet in the big lime, had reached 4,278 feet in lime. It is the intention of operators to core ahead from 4,285. The test is about midway between the Gulf No. 1 Waddell Ordovician discovery and the Humble No. 2 Tubb deep Permian strike. The unit test is in the southeast corner of section 3, block B-27, public school land.

Coring continued to 4,324 feet in Humble No. 2 Tubb in section 11, a quarter of a mile southeast of the No. 1 well. Whether any saturated cores were recovered has not been made public.

Plug was scheduled to be drilled at midnight in Gulf No. 2 Waddell. Ten and 3-4-inch casing was set and cemented at 1,696, with total depth at 1,742. Blowout preventer was rigged up while waiting for cement to set. Gulf No. 2 Tubb is drilling salt below 1,270.

**Black Widow Spider Bites If Disturbed**

AUSTIN—The "Black Widow" spider continues to be a menace even though the number of persons bitten is comparatively small, according to morbidity reports received by the State Department of Health. The habit of this spider in building its web in dimly lighted places makes it difficult to establish any effective method of control.

Though the "Black Widow" is frequently found in basements, wood sheds, and other places which have dark corners or recesses, more cases of spider poisoning that have been reported in past years have occurred in old toilets in the rural districts. The spraying of cresote in cracks and crevices, particularly around the seats of oil toilets, is an invaluable procedure, but precautions must be taken against fire. The egg cocoon may also be crushed.

The adult female spider is about half an inch long and has a shiny black body with a brilliant scarlet hourglass marking on the under surface. The name "Black Widow" is derived from the fact that the female kills and eats the male after mating.

The web of the "Black Widow" is characterized by the fact that the strands are tough. If a straw is applied to the web of an ordinary house spider the web will immediately break, but if a straw be stroked through a "Black Widow" web the strands will be found to be so tough that the straw will bend or even break. The female spider stays close to her web but will rush out and attack violently any object disturbing this web.

The "Black Widow" is not an aggressive spider, and rarely bites unless disturbed. Acute pains develop in the region of the surface bitten, spreading to other parts of the body. There is a general muscle contraction, difficult breathing, cold perspiration, nausea and an extreme rigidity of the abdomen.

The general public should be taught to recognize the "Black Widow", to take the necessary precautions, and to consult a physician immediately, if bitten.

Odessa will send a large delegation to the Midland Downs race meet on "Odessa Day," May 27, if plans of F. M. Gwin, manager of the chamber of commerce there, work out.

Gwin wrote the publicity committee of the Midland Downs today that the designation was appreciated and that Odessa will have a good crowd that day and on other days of the meet.

"Should any of the boys over there own a 'Jeep' they will loan. I am sure we could bring about all the population," Gwin wrote, "but even without this we will give it due publicity and hope to be well represented."

"We want to see your meet a success and if there is any special service we can render in addition, please feel free to advise."

**Hitch-hiking Not Singular to Age**

SAN ANGELO, (AP)— Hitch-hiking is not singular to the automobile age says Mrs. W. B. Fletcher, 94, of Bronte, Texas, who traveled from Texas to California and back in 1886 and 1870.

Mrs. Fletcher recalls camping at San Angelo, then Fort Concho, in 1880 on her way to the West Coast in a train of 40 ox-wagons. When the train returned two years later, three men to each wagon hitch-hiked back, just as they are catching rides on automobiles today. They were more welcome than now, she said, as they were needed to stand guard against Indians.

"Mrs. Fletcher saw only one 'wild' Indian on the trip and he was a prisoner, but says she saw many 'tame' Indians and had several scares. She buried her 18-month-old daughter on the trip. Supplies were obtained from state stations with flour at 10 cents a pound. While
