The fire-making implements are two in number. One is a stick of hardwood, the other a "rope" of rattan. A cleft is made in the stick, and a stone is forced into the cleft to keep the sides apart. The firemaker places one end of the stick be-neath his foot and the other end of the stick over a bunch of dried leaves. Then he places the rattan rope beneath the cleft stick and grasps it with both

Working the rope back and forth as rapidly as his hands can move, the friction of the rattan against the sharp edge of the wood causes ignition. leaves begin to smolder, and he blows them into a flame.

It isn't a speedy process, but it is sure. For generations beyoud memory these pygmies of the forest wered hills have depended upon their fire sticks for cooked food and for heat.


